Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity owes much of its cohesion and growth to its members' interest in the practice of law, coupled with common endeavor and jovial social com-radeship. The great majority of our members became associated with Phi Alpha Delta during the formal study of law. To most of us, the fraternal relationship was, initially, a student activity. FRENCH LICK SPRINGS SITE **FOR 1950 CONVENTION**



French Lick Springs Hotel has 600 rooms

French Lick Springs Hotel, located in the southern part of Indiana, just 15 miles from Louisville, Kentucky, will be the site of the 1950 Convention which will be held August 31 through September 2.

Within the next two months your Supreme Board will notify each active chapter of the appropriation to be allocated to that chapter to cover the cost of one delegate to the Convention. Each active chapter is entitled to two delegates and two alternate delegates. The By-Laws provide that the Supreme Chapter shall pay only the expenses of one delegate. Each alumni chapter and each State Alumni Association is entitled to have one delegate and one alternate at the Convention. The expenses of these delegates are not paid by the Supreme Chapter.

Election of Delegates

Delegates to the Convention must be elected at least thirty (30) days prior to the Convention and the delegates of an active chapter must have at least six months additional law school work after the convention. The delegates to the Convention hold office until the next convention and their successors are elected and qualified.

The credentials for the delegates to the convention will be sent to all active and alumni chapters in the very near future for the certification by the chapter of their delegates to the convention.


While the By-Laws can be amended at the convention, the Constitution cannot be amended unless the proposed amendment is submitted to the Supreme Executive Board not later than 60 days proceeding the convention for submission to each chapter at least 30 days before the convention. A two-thirds vote of the accredited delegates is necessary to amend the Constitution. A majority vote of the delegates is all that is necessary to amend the By-Laws.





Kent Chapter, which was chartered on May 25, 1914, and is the only law fraternity at the University of Idaho, has 27 members out of a total school enrollment of approximately 140 students. The chapter requires a high scholastic average before a student is eligible to be pledged and initiated.

The professional program of the chapter at the present time includes a series of bi-weekly lunches addressed by speakers from the local Bar and from related faculties in the University. These luncheons have grown so in importance that the leading members of the Bar in the State of Idaho are very happy to appear and address these students.

The chapter presented a plaque to the Law School on which is engraved annually the name of the student with the highest scholastic average for his first five semesters of work, the award being known as the William E. Borah Memorial Plaque. At the present time the chapter is also gathering used case books from graduating veterans to form the basis for a lending and low rental library for the benefit of the students in the school in future years. These activities carried on by Kent Chapter are not restricted ex-clusively to members of the Fraternity but are open to all students at the school.

Its History The Roots of PAD

To many of us it has been a long time since we refreshed our memory of the history and structure of Phi Alpha Delta. While our memory may be hazy as to its factual past, its purposes, ideals and declarations are those which we never forget.

Phi Alpha Delta can trace its heritage to the action of the Supreme Court of Illinois and the adoption by that Court of a rule for admission to the Illinois Bar, which seriously affected many of the students then preparing for admission. To protect their rights they organized the "Law Students League." The League secured the passage of an Act by the Illinois legislature which exempted the students then studying for the bar from certain requirements of the rule.

On July 26, 1902, Lambda Epsilon was dissolved by unanimous consent of the delegates attending its Third Biennial Convention at South Haven, Michigan, and on the next day the "South Haven Articles" which were the foundation of Phi Alpha Delta, were signed. On November 8, 1902, at a meeting held in Chicago, the name of Phi Alpha Delta was formally adopted together with a complete Constitution and Ritual.

While Phi Alpha Delta did not appear as the name of this organization in 1902, the actual birth date of the organization was in the year 1898.

Marshall Chapter Installed

On November 15, 1902, the Lambda Epsilon Chapters, Blackstone, Story, Ford and Webster, and the National Field Represenwere formally installed as chapters of Phi Alpha Delta and on November 20, 1902, the John Marshall Chapter was installed at the University of Chicago.

By 1910 the Roster of Chapters had increased to 23 in number. alumni to discuss their problems The 14th Convention held June and to build Phi Alpha Delta on 27, 1913, adopted the policy of a strong basis. restricting the installation of chapters to the larger and stronger schools. This policy was later restricted to Class "A" law schools which are recognized by the American Bar Association and the National Association of American Law Schools.

Many of them have been training under Williston but, through the years, when reference has been made to the law on contracts, the name of Williston seems to be at the top of the heap. That is not to say that the others have not been good but that Williston has been among the best.

As stated before, Williston is now publishing his fifth edition "Cases on Contracts." His first edition appeared in 1894, his second in 1903, his third in 1922 and his fourth in 1937. A check of the cases in the fourth and fifth editions indicates that there have been eliminated from the fifth edition 95 cases which appeared in the fourth edition, and that there are 97 new cases in the fifth edition, either recorded or cited, which do not appear in the fourth edition.

Federal Question

The next witness called by Prosecutor Gray was Charles Carr, formerly U. S. Attorney for the Southern District of California. Brother Carr testified that all the time he acted as Federal Attorney, great difficulty existed between his office and the court room presided over by Judge Archbald in that Judge Archbald could never determine between a Federal question and a state question. He stated that in his opinion, by reason of the foregoing, Judge Archbald would probably erroneously determine to retire from PAD and that the charges against him were properly laid.

Defense Counsel Blalock attempted to destroy the credibility of his witness by showing that represented the interest owning the Del Mar Race Track and that the witness had, on the side, run a bookie establishment and had been engaged in other nefarious activities. Judge Vallee ruled that the witness was competent to testify in this proceeding and vociferously and with great pounding of his gavel overruled objections of defense counsel.

With the presentation of this strong evidence against Judge Archbald, and confident that the burden of proof had been carried by the prosecution, the Fraternity rested its case. Defense Counsel Blalock attempted to call witnesses on behalf of the defendant but the Court would not allow such proceed ings.

Summation

At the conclusion of his argument between Defense Counsel and the Court, and only upon a strong plea of Defense Attorney Blalock was he allowed to make a summation of the case in a plea on behalf of his client. His remarks, adroitly made on behalf of Judge Archbald, summed up the Judge's many years of service on the bench and in Phi Alpha Delta. The loquaciousness of Defense Counsel and his ability to portray a true picture of the defendant was properly brought home in this tribute.

The Court, at the conclusion of the summation, made another tribute to Judge Archbald, and stated that the charges of the Fraternity were groundless, and that the witnesses produced on behalf of the Fraternity were blackguards and "wolves in sheep's clothing." He found the defendant not guilty and ordered him to stand and receive the award of the Court of Phi Alpha Delta. Judge Vallee then placed over the head and around the neck of the beloved Harry Archbald a ribbon to which was affixed a key of Phi Alpha Delta. The defendant was then offered an opportunity to make a statement and in all the sincerity of a true brother in Phi Alpha Delta Judge Archbald thanked those assembled for the tribute they had paid him.
