Tom Henderson, Second Supreme Vice-Justice J. Westwood Smithers, Supreme Treasurer Robert D. Jackson, Supreme Secretary Frank E. Gray, Supreme Historian Henry Foss and Supreme Anthony A. Di Grazia. Executive Secretary Frederick J. Weitkamp sat with the board and took the minutes.

# College of William and Mary **Installs Seventy-fourth Chapter**

CHAPTER NAMED AFTER GEORGE WYTHE

On May 23, 1953, the seventy-fourth chapter of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity was installed at the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia. The new chapter became the ninth active chapter in District No.

The Department of Jurisprudence at the College of William and Mary holds a Class "A" rating by the American Bar Association Committee on Law Schools. It was established in 1779 and is thus held the oldest law school in the United States. There are no other law fraternities on the school campus.

ed as charter members. They elected to name their chapter the George Wythe Chapter. Mr. Wythe was a member of the Continental Congress and a signer of the Declaration of Independence. It was in 1779 George Wythe took the newly established chair of law at the College of William and Mary and thus became the first professor of law in the United States and the second in the English-speaking world, closely following Sir William Blackstone of England.

A chapter gavel was presented by the Washington Alumni Chapter.



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#### MESSAGE FROM THE SUPREME JUSTICE

August 1, 1953, ended the fiscal year of PAD. This is in the nature of a report by Your Supreme Justice of the events and progress of the year 1952-53.

The George Wythe Chapter at the College of William and Mary, Williamsburg, Virginia, the oldest Law School in the country, was installed early this year, as the 74th Active Chapter. The Knoxville, Tennessee, Alumni Chapter was installed last September, and a charter for the Arkansas Alumni Chapter was unanimously

approved and recently formally installed. A petition for an next PAD Directory, to come out Alumni Chapter in the State of Alabama and another for the City of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, have been submitted to the Executive Board for ap-

The Endowment Fund is now completely under the control of the Supreme Board. This fund came into being in 1934 and was under the exclusive control of a Board of three Trustees under a Trust Agreement with The Northern Trust Company of Chicago. Outstanding loans by the Trustees are presently being collected; the Trust Agreement has been cancelled, Thus saving an annual service charge; the funds are presently invested, part in government bonds and part in 3% savings accounts, thus earning an income; the Board of Trustees has been abolished by Convention action, and the fund is in the proper control of the Supreme Board. This Endowment Fund amounts to approximately \$24,000. Early next year, there will be a special message from the Supreme Justice devoted entirely to the Endowment Fund.

Ten out of the 12 Districts have held their annual Conclave. Five were excellent, displaying great leadership and producing highly desirable results. Five were good. They can stand some improvement. Two Districts held no Conclave whatever.

The Supreme Board met in Washington, D. C. late in September. The budget was approved for the fiscal year August 1, 1953-July 31, 1954. The place and the approximate date for the next Convention was fixed. The Endowment Fund, its purposes and uses received considerable attention and study. District problems and financial assistance to District Justices were discussed at length and certain phases of an overall plan were adopted. Plans and ways and means for the publication of the

in 1955, were set and authorized to be carried out.

The full Board was in session from 9:00 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. September 19th and 20th, taking time out for only a short luncheon. They worked hard, long and effectively. Much was accomplished. As your Supreme Justice, I am grateful for their cooperation and assistance.

The coming fiscal year should show much progress in expansion, strengthening of Chapters, improvement of your financial position and the building up of an effective and useful Endowment Fund.

Our importance and prestige as a National institution depends in large measure upon the effective cooperation of each Chapter, Active and Alumni, with the National Office. Rushing, pledging, initiations and programming are vital factors, which should have constant attention and carried out with care and intelligence. I urge upon the Officers of all Chapters to report to the National Office regularly and completely on the forms necessary for accurate records

Since we are investing more money each year in the District programs, the prompt payment of dues becomes a very important factor. For this reason, I urge upon all of our Alumni to pay their dues promptly.

We are making progress, and if we all pull together we should in a very short time become the best organized, the best financed and the most effective Law Fraternity in the country.

Call on the National Office at any time for any help or advice you may require. The Suprema Secretary and his staff and all of your Supreme Officers are at all times ready, willing and able to assist yo uin any and every way.

**Charles Tom Henderson** Supreme Vice-Justice

Charles Tom Henderson, Supreme Vice-Justice of the fraternity, has served on the Supreme Executive Board since 1946. Tom was born at High Springs, Florida, in 1902 and was educated in the Florida public schools. In 1925 he graduated from John B. Stetson University with a B.S. degree. The study of law was divided between Yale University and Stetson college of Law, and he graduated from the latter school in 1928 with a Bachelor of Laws degree. Then followed post-graduate work at Peabody College, Florida, specializing in Governmental Administration.

Thereafter, Brother Henderson taught for twelve years, until 1940, when he entered the private practice of law. It was in this year that Tom became special assistant to the Attorney General of Florida.

He entered the United States Navy in 1942 and served as a Lieutenant Commander at General Courts Martial trials. Following his discharge from service, he returned to Stetson University School of Law, where he became a Professor of Law on the faculty.

During his legal career Tom was a member of the Florida Legislature from 1938 to 1941. He holds a life teacher's certificate and is a member of the Florida Education Association; he has served on special state committees on parole and proba-tion laws. He is also a member of the Florida and Federal Bar Associations.

Becoming a member of Phi Alpha Delta (Brewer Chapter) in 1926, Tom has long been an active member in the Fraternity. He was directly instrumental in the reactivation of Brewer Chapter and has lent his experience and advice to many other chapwhich have benefitted therefrom.

ONCE UPON A TIME (the exact date is not known, but it is not likely to be put in issue, since the memory of man runneth not to the contrary), a little girl (about whose parentage there is no issue and who will be presumed, therefore, to be legitimate) named Goldilocks, wanted to visit her grandmother, (whether paternal or maternal is immaterial), who lived on the other side cf the forest (the exact location of which may be determined by metes and bounds by consulting the records of the Registry of Deeds in the county in which the said premises are located). Little Goldilocks was given permission by her parents. Throughout this narrative the parents will be presumed to be reasonable and prudent parents because they warned Goldilocks of all known and foreseeable dangers and instructed her to be guided accordingly.

When little Goldilocks was perambulating the perimeter of McClain Lauds the forest, she was attracted by a single dwelling of unusual construction set back from the highway in a manner which conformed exactly to the zoning regulations lawfully enacted and promulgated. This was not, as you will note, an attractive nuisance since the object was one with which all children are familiar and the dangers of which, if any, are obvious.

Disregarding the instructions of her prudent parents, she entered the land by crossing over the imaginary white fence which Blackstone says surrounds each parcel of realty. For this she became guilty of trespass quare clausum fregit pedibus ambu-lando. Knocking at the door and receiving no reply, she turned the knob, gave a good push and entered. This, as you know, was trespass quare clausum fregit vi et armis.

She saw on the table three bowls of porridge. The first was too hot and the second was too cold. The third was just right, so she ate it all up. This was trespass de bonis asportatis.

Inside the house she spied three chairs. She sat in the big chair, which belonged, quite obviously, to the Daddy Bear, but it was too hard. (Since she did no harm, this could be no trespass.) The medium-sized chair was too soft, so she sat in the little chair, which she assumed belonged to the Baby Bear. Since her weight exceeded the capacity of the chair, she broke it all down. Harm being done, she committed an ordinary trespass to personal property.

By that time little Goldilocks was tired. She found a bedroom with three beds. She tried the first and found it too hard, the second was too soft, but the third was just right. So she lay down in the third or Baby Bear's bed, and soon was fast asleep. It is not so easy to tell what kind of a wrong this happens to be, and it may well be that on this point there are two schools of thought. It is not, however, trespass quare clausum fregit vi et armis ab initio, since this misfeasance did not follow an entry under license of law.

While she was fast asleep, the proprietors of the premises returned. Angered and aroused at the torts and the trespasses, they sought out the tortfeasor. Baby Bear found her in his own little bed and raised a hue and cry. Just then little Goldilocks woke up, realized her predicament and ran home as fast as she could with the Three Bears in fresh and hot pursuit.

She got home just in time to slam the door in the faces of three angry bears. It is a good thing she did, too, because now we do not have to decide if a bear can be guilty of assault and battery.

And now I think it would be

a good idea for you to go to sleep before you make the discovery, made by judges in the courts before which I practiced once upon a time, that most of what I have to say is incompetent, irrelevant and immaterial.

# **Private Schools**

The existence of private universities minimizes the danger of a political clique securing control of tax-supported schools of higher education, according to Dean Joseph A. McClain (Fish chapter) of the Duke University School of Law.

Addressing a university alumni meeting, Brother McClain cited the experience of Mississippi under Senator Theodore Bilbo's regime and Georgia under the late Governor Gene Talmadge to illustrate what could happen when the state public education system comes under the control of a political clique. In such cases, Dean McClain said, the private institution is able to retain its academic freedom and its freedom in research for the public benefit.

Referring to the effects of the private school on the state university, Dean McClain noted that the traditional competitive spirit between the University of North Carolina and Duke University has assisted the state supported school in its advance to a point far ahead of what it might have reached had Duke University not

#### **Livengood Submits ABA Labor Report**

The value of man's labor is "unpredictable," according to the recently submitted report of the American Bar Association Committee on Wage-Law Legislation.

Headed by Charles H. Liven-good, Jr. (Rutledge Chapter), Professor of Law at Duke University, the committee has spent two years studying the effect of wage-hour legislation such as the Fair Labor Standards Act. Its report shows that the outcome of court action for minimum wages, overtime pay, and other factors in fair labor standards still is not wholly predictable.

According to the report, difficulties and inconsistencies still exist despite recent attempts to set up dependable standards for employer and employee. Some of these difficulties mentioned by the committee are:

(1) You are not covered by federal law if you collect empty bottles that will be filled with ginger ale shipped into other states, but you are if you produce the containers for interstate-commerce shipping.

(2) If you employ workers for longer than a 40-hour week, you can get into a legal position which compels you to pay added overtime for a total of fewer hours worked because the regular rate per hour has been increased.

(3) If you are a 17-year old girl, you may take a non-hazardous job covered by the Fair Labor Standards Act, but you are too young for similar employment if the Walsh-Healey Act, with more protective standards, applies to the job.

The nine attorneys on the committee agree that many complaints about the Fair Labor Standards Act add up to a feeling that it has been interpreted too favorably for employees. But, they add, since the purpose of the legislation is to help employees, by its very nature it is not to be applied grudgingly. Brother Livengood's committee

recommends no policy changes, but suggests that a Congressional committee set to work to eliminate duplication, inconsistency, and confusion in the present statutes.

"Once people realize the value of preventive law, they can profit a great deal by thinking of lawyers as a community resource-to be used like the police and fire departments," he


# Attorney for So. Calif.

John P. McGoorty: John P. McGoorty, a Past Justice of the Chicago Alumni Chapter and a member of the Chicago Bar Association since 1900, died at Chicago, Illinois, on August 23, 1953.

Mr. McGoorty was born at Conneeaut, Ohio, on August 25, 1866, was reared in Wisconsin and attended the public schools of Berlin, Wisconsin.

In 1896 he was elected to the Illinois House of Representatives (Legislature) and re-elected in 1898, the next year becoming minority leader of the House. He was successively elected to the Legislature in 1904 and 1906. He served 33 years in Cook County Courts, starting in 1911 as a Judge of the Circuit Court, to which he was re-elected in 1915, and was assigned to the Appellate Court in 1915, on which he served until his resignation in December, 1920. In November, 1923, he was elected to the Superior Court of Cook County, where he served until December 1, 1947.

Judge McGoorty was Chief Justice of the Criminal Court of Cook County from 1930 to 1931, during which time he helped found the Courts Behavior Clinic and the system of Public Defenders for Indigent Accused Persons. He was Chairman of the Chicago Recreation Commission for several years prior to his death, and also Secretary of the John Howard Association.

He was also a member of the Executive Committee of Catholic Charities of Chicago, Chicago Council of Boy Scouts of America, co-Chairman of the Chicago Chapter of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, and had served on the Faculty of the College of Law of Notre Dame University.

Following the First World War he was a major in the Judge Advocate's Department of the United States Army.

Among the many other general and civic organizations to which he belonged were: Chicago Charter Commission, Travelers' Aid Society of Chicago, Ohio Society, Wisconsin Society, Third Order of St. Francis, De La Salle Council of the Knights of Columbus 4th Degree, Catholic Order of Foresters, Royal Arcanum, Ancient Order of Hibernians, and Chicago Association of Commerce. He was also a member of the Chicago Athletic Club, Iroquois Club, Irish Fellowship Club, Forty Club, Olympic Country Club, and White Lake Golf Club.


