Supreme Court Justice Jackson Dies

Supreme Court Justice Robert H. Jackson, 62, died of a heart attack Saturday, October 9, 1954. One of the stalwarts of the highest court of our country, Brother Jackson will be sorely missed.

Apart from his excellent work on the Supreme Court, he is well known for the prominent part he played in the Nurnberg trials in Germany. He was designated by President Truman (Benton) as Chief Counsel for the United States in the preparation of prosecution of charges of atrocities and war crimes against the leaders of the European Axis Powers. He wrote two books on the trials and their meaning in international affairs. Jackson received many honors both here and abroad for his conduct of the war crimes trials.

Former Attorney General

He was well known for writing opinions with a minimum of complex legal language. Laymen could understand his opinions at first reading. His early years in the practice of the law were taken up in private practice and corporation work. He has served as General Counsel of the Bureau of Internal Reve-nue for the Treasury Department and in many other legal capacities for the Government. In 1940, he was appointed Attorney General for the United States and in that office executed a most efficient job.

It was in June of 1941 that he the United States Supreme Court by President Roosevelt. He held membership in Phi Alpha Delta in Jay Chapter at George Washington University. It is interesting to note that of twentyfour cases which he personally argued before the Supreme Court he lost only three.

Four More PAD'S Become Governors

The recent elections saw four PAD candidates emerge victorious in the race for the governorships of their respective states. They are Fred Hall of Kansas, Edmund S. Muskie of Maine, Robert E. Smylie of Idaho and Goodwin J. Knight of California.

Hall for Kansas

Hall, a member of Ross Chapter at the University of Southern California is no newcomer to public office having been lieutenant governor of his state of Kansas since 1950.

Born and reared in Dodge City he is descended from pioneer homesteaders on both sides of the family. He attended USC on a scholarship receiving his A.B. in 1938 and his LL.B. in 1941.

During World War II he served with the Combined Chiefs of Staff in the position of Assistant Director of the Combined Production and Resources Board. This Board allocated critical war materials produced by the United States, Great Britain and Canaad to their Allies throughout the world. After the War, he entered the private practice of law in Topeka, Kansas, for one year and then moved to Dodge City, was appointed to a vacancy on Kansas, where he practiced law as County Attorney of Ford County, Kansas, from 1946 to 1948.

Active in political, civic, legal and church affairs, he is a member of the Methodist Church, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Trinity Methodist Hospital and a member and officer of many clubs, lodges, fraternal and patriotic societies.

Other prominent PAD's in the State of Kansas are Senators Frank Carlson and Andrew Schoeppel and John W. Shuart, Executive Secretary of the State Bar and Supreme Marshal of the National Chapter.

Maine Selects Muskie

On September 13, 1954, at the age of 39, Brother Edmund S. Muskie was selected by the people of the State of Maine to be their new governor.

He was a member of the House of Representatives of the State for the 93rd, 94th and 95th Maine legislatures and has served on many various committees. An extremely active member of the Democratic party, he also enjoys a distinguished World War II record.

His A.B. was obtained from Bates College where he graduated cum laude in 1936, and he received his LL.B. from Cornell Law School in 1939. He was a member of Phi Beta Kappa and a member of Wilson Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta at Cornell.

Smylie Governs Idaho

Brother Robert E. Smylie is the new governor of the State of Idaho. He has been Attorney General of the state since 1947. A member of Jay Chapter, he holds

an A.B. from the College of Idaho and a J.D. from George Wash ington University.

He became Assistant Attorney General of Idaho in 1947 and the same year ascended to the top position. He is a member of District of Columbia and Idaho Bars.

Knight Re-elected

Reelected to the Governorship of California is our Brother Goodwin J. Knight. Knight first became governor when he succeeded to the post by virtue of Earl Warren leaving to become Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court. Thus the recent election actually marks the first time he has been elected to the office.

He graduated in 1919 from Stanford University with an A.B. and was admitted to the California Bar in 1921. While at Stanford he became a member of Holmes Chapter of PAD.

Governor Knight served seven years as lieutenant governor of the State and prior to that was Superior Court Judge for Los Angeles County. He also spent many years in private practice.

Charter Presented

On Friday, October 29, 1954, the John Doyle Carmody Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta was formally installed at the Syracuse University School of Law. The impressive ceremony was held in the Appellate Division Court Rooms of the Onondaga County Courthouse with an initiation team from Wilson Chapter at Cornell University officiating.

The charter group, The Syracuse Law League, was composed of seventeen men who elected to name their chapter after John Doyle Carmody. Carmody is well known to PADs, for he was one of the loyal stalwarts of the fraternity from the time of his initiation until his death in 1952. He led PAD as Supreme Justice for two terms from 1910 to 1912. Among othher offices he held were those of Supreme Treasurer and Chairman of the Board of Tribunes.

Brother Carmody was one of the first balloon pilots and one of the first aviators when the Air Corps was still part of the Signal Corps. He was, for many years, a prominent member of the Judge Advocate General's Office and received numerous medals and citations for his outstanding service. It is indeed a tribute to his memory that this newest chapter of Phi Alpha Delta has chosen to perpetuate his name in this manner.

Accredited by ABA

The Syracuse University College of Law, founded in 1895, recently moved into a new physical plant on the main campus of the University. Located on the western edge of the campus, the structure affords a magnificent view of the city and contains all of the latest facilities available for a law school. It is a charter member of the Association of American Law Schools and is accredited by the American Bar Association in accordance with the requirement of our Constitution and By-Laws.

Henry C. Foss (Rutledge), Supreme Historian, represented the Supreme Executive Board at the ceremonies and made the presentation of the charter to Richard H. Buechner, newly elected justice. Also present was Albert Some of his many affiliations Verrilli (Calhoun), Past Justice of District XI, wno served Toastmaster at the Installation banquet following the initiation. After extending his own congratulations and reading the many congratulatory telegrams Verrilli introduced Dean Ralph E. Kharas of the Law School who

Forty Years Ago

(The official publication of Phi Alpha Delta was known as the Phi Alpha Delta Quarterly for many years. "Phi Alpha Delta emerged in the last collegiate year with three new Chapters, Henry Clay Chapter at the University of Kentucky, Lexington, Kentucky; James Kent Chapter at the University of Idaho, Moscow, Idaho; and Ralph Oregon Dunbar Chapter at the University of Washington, Seattle, Washington. ern States have proven to be de-

The Chapters in Idaho and Washington caused greater concern because they were farther away from other chapters and in schools where enrollment was smaller.

Conkling, Missouri Chief Justice, Dies

The Chief Justice of the Missouri Supreme Court, the Honorable Roscoe P. Conkling, passed away suddenly on October 28, 1954. Brother Conkling was an honorary initiate of Lawson Chapter in 1950.

As a Supreme Court Judge, he was noted for the clarity and pungency of his opinions. He frequently came up with some striking phrases to clarify some complicated legal point. One of his outstanding attributes was his understanding treatment of young lawyers appearing before the high court.

Graduated from the University of Missouri School of Law he was admitted to the bar in 1912 and subsequently engaged in private practice. He is a for-mer Prosecuting Attorney of Jackson County and served for many years as Special Commis-sioner of the Supreme Count sioner of the Supreme Court.

Appointed to the Supreme Court in 1947, he served as Chief Justice from February, 1953, until October, 1954.

He was a member of the Con-ference of State Chief Justices, the American Law Institute and Presiding Officer of the Missouri Judicial Conference. He belonged to many Masonic orders including the Shrine and 32nd degree Scottish Rite.

Baker Succeeds Shuart as Justice District VII

Taking over where Brother John W. Shuart left off in District VII is Leo M. Baker, a member of Hammond Chapter at the University of Iowa. Shuart was elected to the Supreme Executive Board in the capacity of Supreme Marshal by the 1954 convention.

Shortly thereafter, Robert D. Jackson, Supreme Justice, announced the appointment of Baker as his successor. The new District Justice is a former Justice of his active chapter and also served as student district justice for the fraternity. He was admitted to the Iowa Bar in 1952, is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, a Mason, a Shriner, and an Elk.

He is currently engaged in corporation, labor, and tax and corporate financing. His address is 509 Equitable Building, Des Moines, Iowa.

District VII covers the states of Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Minnesota.

Convention Confers Special Award on Dr. L. J. Curtis

The 1954 convention of Phi Alpha Delta confered a special award on Dr. Leonard J. Curtis who at the age of 92 recently retired from the active teaching of law. Dr. Curtis has been a Professor of Law at Stetson University where Brewer Chapter of P.A.D. is located. The convention adopted a resolution conferring upon Brother Curtis a life membership and a general expression of appreciation for his helpfulness and guidance to P.A.D.'s for many, many years.

Brother Curtis worked his way through Franklin College in Indiana and obtained his legal education at Harvard and Chicago Universities. He holds a B.S., M.S., and L.L.D. from Franklin College and a J.D. from the University of Chicago.

For approximately twenty years he taught in the public school system and engaged in the private practice of law. In 1918 he began teaching as a Professor of Law at Missouri State University, and in 1920 joined the faculty at the University of Arizona where he continued to teach until his retirement in 1939 as Professor Emeritus. At that time he went to Stetson School of Law and has been teaching as a Visiting Professor ever

He became a P.A.D. at the University of Missouri in 1918 and assisted in the organization of Knox Chapter at the University of Arizona. He is a man who has truly lived the ideals and principles of Phi Alpha Delta.

It is worthy of note that during more than thirty-five years of teaching he has missed only one day of class which in itself illustrates his dedication to the teaching profession.


The resolution of the Supreme Executive Board as adopted, reads as follows:





Thurmond has a long and distinguished war record, having volunteered for service in World War II on the first day that war was declared against Germany. He served in all battles of the First Army and holds numerous medals and honors, including the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal, Purple Heart, and Presidential Distinguished Unit Cita-


