

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# TALL CORN ALUMNI HOST CONVENTION

Three Day Meeting Acclaimed By Delegates

With the call to order by Supreme Vice Justice Charles Tom Henderson, Assistant Attorney General of Florida, the 30th Biennial Convention of Phi Alpha Delta convened on Thursday, September 2, 1954, at the Hotel Fort Des Moines, in Des Moines, Iowa. Our beloved Supreme Justice Hon. Anthony P. Savarese of New York was taken ill several days prior to the opening of the meeting and Brother Henderson very capably and ably took over as presiding officer.

Following the invocation by Dr. Ernest L. Lack, Pastor of the First Evangelical Lutheran Church of Des Moines, Brother Henderson introduced the Hon. Martin D. Van Oosterhout (Hammond), Judge of the 21st Judicial District of Iowa and member of the Tall Corn Alumni Chapter, who delivered a warm and hospitable address of welcome to Iowa. Brother Van Oosterhout pointed out some of the outstanding characteristics of Iowa as well as some of its more prominent PADs including John Randall (Hammond), the current president of the House of Delegates of the American Bar Association.

The Keynote Address of the convention was delivered by Judge Elwyn Thomas of the Florida Supreme Court, a former Chief Justice of that Court and a District Justice of the fraternity for the past several months. To say that his address was magnificent and inspirational would fall far short of giving it due credit, for delegates for several days continued to comment on the message he brought.

### **Business Committees**

To expedite the business of the convention committees were appointed whose duty it was to discuss particular topics and render a report of their de-

liberations to the convention assembled for its action. Each delegate present was appointed to a committee and an alumni member served as chairman. Meeting for discussions on Thursday afternoon were: Publications Committee, John Griffin, Chairman; Awards and Scholarship Committee, William B. Robertson, Chairman; Ritual Committee, John L. Griffith, Chairman; Constitution and By-Laws Committee, Sandy Rae, Chairman; Resolutions Committee, Jimmy Broz, Chairman; Credentials Committee, Fred Weitkamp, Chairman; Audit and Finance Committee, Carl Dietz, Chairman; Directory Committee, Carl Dietz, Chairman; and Nominations Committee, John Shuart, Chairman.

The matter of the new Directory to be published in 1955 was discussed by the convention which made recommendations to the Supreme Executive Board regarding its content and distribution. It was determined not to include advertising in this issue and that the general format of the 1950 edition should be followed. Also under the heading of publications two important resolutions regarding The Reporter were passed by the convention. It was decided to continue mailing the official publication to our entire membership without charge or subscription fee and that additional copies should be sent the active chapters for their own uses.

Executive Secretary Fred Weitkamp gathered together a model initiation team composed of men from across the country and Thursday evening five pledges from Cole Chapter at Drake University were initiated into the fraternity. This was followed by a reception given by the Tall Corn Alumni Chapter which throughout the convention gained for itself the nickname "Hospitality Inc." One of the finest events of the three day meeting, the reception served as an excellent opportunity for officers, alumni, delegates and guests to become personally acgainted.

### Workshops Added

Two program innovations for PAD conventions were tried and found extremely successful. On Friday afternoon the District Justices met under the chairmanship of Judge Douglas Edmonds in a District Justice Workshop to discus conclaves, finances and other problems. At the same time Supreme Secretary Frank E. Gray was

conducting a Chapter Workshop for the active delegates. Various professional programs were presented by delegates from selected chapters. Included were: A Legal Aid Program (Eugene Heinrich, Fish Chapter); A Student Directory (George Martz, Hamill Chapter), How to Establish a Scholarship Fund, (Sandy Ehrman, McKenna Chapter); The Integrated Law Fraternity Program (Bob Doyle, More Chapter); and A More Effective Speaking Program (Bob Redding, Washington, D.C., Alumni, Don Campbell, Jay Chapter, Jim Gardner, Taft Chapter).

Friday evening the Tall Corn Alumni provided tickets to the Iowa State Fair and everyone went out to see the "granddaddy" of state fairs. The Brothers literally covered miles of territory without seeing even a minor portion of the exhibits and other attractions. All agreed that it was a most worthwhile production.

The tradition of holding district breakfasts during the convention was continued with six breakfasts on Friday and six more on Saturday. All delegates, active and alumni, as well as the district justice and interested alumni and officers were invited to attend their respective district breakfasts and many matters of district importance were discussed. Several districts laid the groundwork for their spring district conclave in 1955.

### Awards Established

Saturday was a real work day as the convention moved into high gear in order to finish the tremendous amount of business before it. A new system of awards which is designed to increase interest and enthusiasm on all levels was approved by the fraternity. Four different awards have been established including (1) an

award to the individual in each chapter who has made the most significant contribution to his chapter, (2) an award to an alumnus member of each chapter for his contribution to the chapter, (3) an award to outstanding law students in each law school regardless of fraternity affiliation, and (4) an award to the one chapter in the country with the greatest percentage increase in membership, the best social and professional program, the most outstanding achievement members of the chapter, whether in extracurricular activities or scholarship, the best chapter school relationships, the highest percentage attendance at district conclaves, and the most nearly perfect record of required report submissions.

### Chapter Advisors

Another forward step in fraternity organization was taken when an amendment to the constitution was adopted establishing an alumni advisor for each active chapter to serve under the jurisdiction of the district justice. Several chapters have in the past had such an alumnus advisor with increased benefits to the chapter.

An amendment to increase the national initiation fee from \$22.00 to \$23.00 was defeated as was the proposal of one of the alumni chapters to levy an annual assessment on the active chapters to assist in financing the biennial convention.

Inasmuch as space in this issue will not permit a complete summary of the action taken by the convention the Executive Office has arranged to make a detailed condensation available to each active and alumni chapter in the near future.

Brother Jimmy Broz and his excellent resolutions committee brought forth a multitude of fine resolutions

including one of tribute to our brother Leonard J. Curtis, professor emeritus of the University of Arizona and recently a visiting professor of law at Stetson College of Law. Professor Curtis is 92 years of age and has just retired from teaching. The Brothers were told of his inspirational guidance to the members of PAD during his many years of teaching and his devotion to the fraternity. As a small token of the fraternity's affection for Brother Curtis he was awarded a plaque of appreciation and a life membership.

Another professional program for PAD was commenced when the convention adopted a resolution approving a program designed to develop the effective speaking of the members. Brother Bob Redding, former justice of District XII together with District Justice Bill Robertson and several of the District XII chapters has done a tremendous amount of work on the program as was evidenced by the excellent demonstration which he put on at the Chapter Workshop.

Unanimous ballots were cast for the following Brothers who will guide the destinies of PAD for the forthcoming biennium: Robert D. Jackson, Supreme Justice; Judge Elwyn Thomas, Supreme Vice-Justice; John L. Griffith, Supreme Vice-Justice; Frank E. Gray, Supreme Secretary; Anthony A. DiGrazia, Supreme Treasurer; Henry C. Foss, Supreme Historian; John W. Shuart, Supreme Marshal.

Our ladies attending the convention were royally entertained by the charming and most gracious Des Moines PAD wives. Among a full schedule of activities was a visit to the testing kitchens of Better Homes & Gardens magazine, a tour of the Des Moines Art Gallery, luncheon at the Wakonda

Club and a fashion show.

The Convention Dinner Dance was the highlight of the three day meeting. Our own Brother Martin Tollefson, Dean of Drake Law School was toastmaster and his keen sense of humor was well appreciated by the group. Scene of the banquet was the Grand Ballroom of the Hotel Fort Des Moines, our convention hotel. The orchestra of Bob Hoy provided very danceable music for the two hundred and fifty in attendance as the 1954 convention drew to a close.

### The Welcome to Iowa

was extended by Judge Martin D. Van Oosterhout of the 21st Judicial District of Iowa at the opening session of the convention. A member of Hammond Chapter at the state university Brother Van Oosterhout told us of Iowa's agricultural, industrial and cultural progress over a period of years. We were surprised to learn that literacy in the state is over 99

The Judge went back over his 32 years of membership in the fraternity tracing many of his friends and acquaintances including Congressman Charles B. Hoeven (Hammond) and John Randall (Hammond) president of the House of Delegates of the American Bar Association.

The words of greeting of Brother Van Oosterhout were indeed warm and hospitable ones which we later found out typified our friends and brothers from the great state of Iowa.

Keynote Speaker was our good brother Judge Elwyn Thomas of the Supreme Court of Florida and a past Chief Justice of that court. Judge Thomas is presently the chairman of the Judicial Council of that state. Active in American Bar Association affairs he also served as Justice of District X of Phi Alpha Delta until his elevation to Supreme Vice-Justice of the National Chapter by the convention.

Possessing a keen wit and armed with a bundle of anecdotes Brother Thomas set the mood for the remainder of the convention in fine style. His basic theme was what we as members of the legal profession and as members of PAD could do to improve the administration of justice in our country.

Urging a simplification of the administration of justice he illustrated how one of the most beautiful pieces of prose of all time, Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, takes only two minutes to recite, but it is not at all uncommon for a judge to have to take two hours to charge a jury. And then, he stated, very often even the judge does not know precisely what he has told them.

One of the methods which we as advocates can utilize to simplify matters of justice is that of getting to the heart of a case and stating it simply and

"You can bring distinction to this Fraternity and be a credit to your law school," stated Judge Thomas, "and you can help in the administration of justice immeasurably if you will get behind any movement that trains men to present cases concisely to courts so that the salient points will stand out against the background of concisely stated facts.

The inspirational message which Judge Thomas brought us was much appreciated for many of us knew that a few weeks before he had attended the American Bar Association meeting in Chicago where he very capably presided over a group of one thousand laymen who were interested in the improvement of the administration of justice, and after that meeting was over he had stayed over some ten days just so that he would be able to attend our convention. Not only that but a large family reunion of his relations had been planned for quite some time and another would not be held for probably many years and our Brother Elwyn Thomas thought so much of his fraternity that he took time away from his family relations to join us.

Those who attended the 1954 convention will never forget the genuine sincerity, the fraternal spirit and the humbleness of this brother, for he has truly won a large place in our hearts.



in the world of law today. He spent most of the summer meeting with the Commission in Paris and told us of his experiences.

He was introduced by Judge Russell Jordan, Justice of the Tail Corn Alumni Chapter and Judge of the Ninth Judicial District of Iowa, who served as Toastmaster.

We enjoyed hearing Brother Ed-

monds and were proud to be members of the same legal fraternity as this outstanding American jurist. Although it was not generally told around Judge Edmonds recently became Chairman of the Section of Judicial Administration of the American Bar Association. This position is the highest post in the ABA which a jurist may attain.





### Hon. Robert H. Jackson Supreme Court of the United States

(Editor's Note: The Executive Office received with sorrow the news of the death of Justice Robert H. Jackson on October 9, 1954. Inasmuch as the following material was already prepared and in the hands of the printer it was too late to delete it from this issue.)

Apart from his excellent work on the Supreme Court of the United States, Justice Robert H. Jackson is probably best known for the prominent part he played in the Nurnberg trials in Germany. President Truman, recognizing his capabilities, on May 2, 1945, designated Mr. Justice Jackson to act as chief Counsel for the United States in the preparation of prosecution of charges of atrocities and war crimes against the leaders of the European Axis Powers. The leadership of the Nurnberg trial brought much recognition and many honors to Justice Jackson and he was twice received for lengthy audiences by Pope Pius XII on visits to Rome. He is the holder of numerous medals for his courageous work and the holder of an L.L.D. from the University of Brussels. On his return to the United States, President Truman awarded him the Medal of Merit "for extraordinary fidelity and exceptionally meritorious conduct." He also received an honorary L.L.D. from the University of Warsaw.

During his early years in the practice of the law he engaged in private practice, corporation work, and in 1930 was appointed by President Roosevelt to serve on a special commission created by the legislature to investigate the administration of justice in that State. He also has served as General Counsel of the Bureau of Internal Revenue, the Treasury Department, and in other legal capacities for the Government. In 1940 he was appointed Attorney General for the United States and in that office exe-

cuted a most efficient job.

It was in June of 1941 that he was appointed to a vacancy on the United States Supreme Court by President Roosevelt.

He holds his membership in Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity in Jay Chapter at George Washington University.

Some of his many affiliations include the American Law Institute, the A.B.A., Federal Bar Association, Masonic Order, the National Press Club, and the University Club.

### Hon. Harold H. Burton Supreme Court of the United States

A former mayor of the City of

Cleveland, Brother Justice Harold H. Burton took his seat on the United States Supreme Court October 1, 1945.

He is a graduate of Bowdoin College in Maine, where he received his A.B. and L.L.D. His L.L.B. was received at Harvard University School of Law. He holds many doctor of laws degrees including: Oberlin College (1941), Ohio Wesleyan University (1942), Kenyon College (1944), Boston University (1944), College of Wooster (1945), Heidelberg College (1945), Western Reserve University (1946), Wesleyan University (1947), Fenn College (1952). He also holds a J.D. from the University of Toledo (1953) and a Lit. Hum. D. from Mt. Union College (1943).

Brother Justice Burton is a member of Hay Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity at Western Reserve University. At that school of law he served as an instructor of corporation law.

From 1941 to 1945 he served as United States Senator from the State of Ohio.

His memberships include Phi Beta Kappa, A.B.A., Ohio Bar, Cleveland Bar, American Judicature Society, American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Cleveland Grays, Thirty-Third Degree Mason, Moose, Eagles, and the Sons of the American Revolution.

### Hon. Tom C. Clark Supreme Court of the United States

The Hon. Tom C. Clark, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, was born in Dallas, Texas, on September 23, 1899. He is a graduate of the University of Texas and received his A.B. in 1921 and his L.L.B. in 1922. He holds honorary degrees from Bethany College, John Marshall College, Centre College, Missouri Valley College, and Texas Technological College.

Mr. Justice Clark is well known for his many years of extensive service with the United States Department of Justice and more particularly for his role as U. S. Attorney General. During his ten years as Attorney General, four hundred fourteen cases were presented to the U. S. Supreme Court and in these the Government's position prevailed in three hundred fourteen and was rejected in one hundred.

Brother Justice Clark is a member of Taney Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity at Southern Methodist University School of Law.

His affiliations include: National Press Club, Chevy Chase Country Club, Masonic Lodge, Delta Tau Delta, Order of the Coif, A.B.A., Texas Bar, Dallas Bar, Federal Bar Association, American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Eagles, Exchange Club, and Rotary International.

### Hon. William O. Douglas Supreme Court of the United States

Mr. Justice Douglas was born October 16, 1898, and received his A.B. from Whitman College in 1920 and his L.L.B. from Columbia Law School in 1925. He is a member of Livingston Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta at Columbia Law School. His honorary degrees are: M.A., Yale (1932), L.L.D., Whitman (1938), Wesleyan (1940), Washington and Jefferson (1942), William and Mary (1943), Rolins (1947), National University (1949), New School for Social Research (1950). Brother Justice Douglas was a member of the faculty of the Columbia School of Law from 1924 to 1928 and the Yale School of Law from 1928 to 1939.

Admitted to the bar in 1926, Justice Douglas practiced law in New York City and was a member of the law faculty of Columbia University.

He is a former Commissioner and Chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission of the United States. It was in 1939 that he was nominated to the Supreme Court by President Roosevelt and he assumed his seat on April 17, 1939.

He is a noted author, having written "Democracy & Finance," "Being An American," "Of Men and Mountains" and numerous articles for law journals.


His memberships include Beta Theta Phi, Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Rho, Masons, Yale Club and University Club.

# United States Court of Appeals



Hon. Herbert F. Goodrich
United States Court of Appeals
Third Circuit

Judge Goodrich has lived at least three careers, any one of which would have been sufficient for one man. From law professor, he moved to the position of Dean of the Law School at the University of Penssylvania and subsequently became Vice President of the University. At the same time he was serving as advisor for the American Law Institute.

He is the author of the famous work on the conflict of laws entitled "Goodrich on Conflict of Laws." His appointment in 1940 to the Circuit Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit necessitated his resignation from the University of Pennsylvania but he continued those teaching duties which he could. He is noted for his liberalism, his scholarship, his influence on youth, his administrative ability, and his realist approach to all problems.

Brother Goodrich is a member of Hammond Chapter at the University of Iowa where he also served as Acting Dean of the College of Law.



Hon. Philip J. Finnegan
United States Court of Appeals
Seventh Circuit

A former judge of the Chicago Mun-

icipal Court and Cook County Circuit Court, Judge Finnegan holds an L.L.D. from Chicago Law School and has served as a Judge of the U. S. Court of Appeals, Seventh Circuit, since 1949. Born in 1886, he was admitted to the Illinois Bar in 1913. He holds a membership in the Chicago, Illinois and American Bar Associations.

Brother Finnegan was initiated into Webster Chapter at Loyola University in Chicago.



Hon. F. Ryan Duffy
Chief Justice
United States Court of Appeals
Seventh Circuit

Educated at the University of Wisconsin (B.A., 1910, L.L.B., 1912, L.L.D., 1952), Judge Duffy served as a member of the United States Senate from 1933 to 1939 and as a United States District Judge from 1939 to 1949. He was appointed to the U. S. Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit in 1949 and is presently Chief Justice of that court.

He is a former Department Commander of the American Legion and a former National Vice Commander of that organization.

Brother Duffy is a member of Ryan Chapter at the University of Wisconsin and has a son, F. Ryan Duffy, Jr., also a member of that chapter, who is now in the private practice of law.

# Hon. Curtis D. Wilbur, Retired United States Court of Appeals Ninth Circuit

The holder of three L.L.D.'s (University of Southern California, 1923, Occidental College, 1924, Pennsylvania Military College, 1920), Brother Curtis D. Wilbur began the practice of law in Los Angeles in 1890. He served as a Judge of the Los Angeles Superior Court and also as a Justice on the California Supreme and was Chief Justice of the latter Court from 1922 to 1927, when he resigned. He was from 1924 to 1929 Secretary of the Navy by appointment of President Coolidge. His appointment to the U. S. Court of Appeals took effect in May of 1929, and he served on that Court until 1945 when he retired.

Judge Wilbur is a member of Temple Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta at Hastings College of Law.




Hon. Walter E. Pope



# United States District Courts



Hon. Richmond B. Keech
United States District Court

Judge Richmond B. Keech is a man who has devoted almost a lifetime to public service in the District of Columbia. He has held such positions in the District as Assistant Corporation Counsel, People's Counsel, Vice Chairman Public Utilities Commission, and Corporation Counsel.

From 1945 to 1946 he served as ad-

ministrative assistant to President Truman. His appointment to the United States District Court for the District of Columbia became effective November 1, 1946.

It is of interest to note that as a resident of the District of Columbia for his entire life he has never voted nor affiliated with either party, but has received appointments made by both Republican and Democratic Presidents.

One of his most famous decisions was that in which the United Mine Workers were found not guilty of contempt of court in the 1950 coal strike.

A member of Taft Chapter at Georgetown University, he was also graduated from that University in 1922, receiving his L.L.B. and L.L.M. a year later.

Hon. Bolitha J. Laws 
Chief Justice
United States District Court
District of Columbia

Since 1938, Brother Laws has served as judge of the U. S. District Court in the District of Columbia. His appointment as Chief Justice of the Court came about in 1945 and he has since served in that capacity. The highest post of the A.B.A. which can be conferred on a jurist is that of the chairmanship of the Section of Judicial Administration, which position was held by Judge Laws in 1946.

He is an authority on pre-trial pro-



cedure having made widespread studies on the subject and is an expert lecturer thereon. He holds two degrees from Georgetown University, an L.L.B. attained in 1913, and an L.L.M. which he received in 1914. An L.L.D. was also conferred on Judge Laws by the same University in 1950. He is currently a professor at the University teaching trial preparation and technique.

Hon. Jesse C. Adkins, Retired
United States District Court
District of Columbia

Admitted to practice in the State of California in 1928, Brother James M. 
Hon. Raymond C. Vaughan Supreme Court of New York

He is a graduate of the University of


South Carolina, having received his L.L.B. in 1926. Brother Taylor is a member of Pinckney Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta.



Hon. Matthew W. Hill Supreme Court of Washington

Judge Matthew W. Hill engaged in the private practice of law in Seattle, Washington, for some twenty-six years prior his ascension to the Superior Court of Kings County, Washington. He served on that Court for two years and then became an Associate Justice of the State Supreme Court in 1947.




Hon. John J. Sparkman United States Senate Alabama

He has authored much important legislation including the Soldiers and Sailors Relief Act and had a large part in writing

Hon. Eugene D. Millikin United States Senate Colorado

Eugene D. Millikin is a graduate of the School of Law of the University of Colorado (1913) and a former Executive Secretary to the Governor of, that State.

He was appointed by the Governor as United States Senator in 1941 and the following year was reelected and has subsequently gained reelection two additional times. His current term will expire in 1956.

Senator Millikin is a member of several important Senate committees including Committee on Finance (Chairman), the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy and the Joint Committee on Internal Revenue Taxation (Chairman). He is also Chairman of the Republican Conference.

Hon. Herman Welker United States Senate Idaho




Hon. Thomas A. Burke

He has been named by the Congressional Quarterly as the "outstanding young watchdog" against subversive activities in the Federal Government.




Hon. Edgar A. Jonas

### Elmo Christianson, Retired







He is recognized as one of the most distinguished jurists in the United States.
