Chicago Attorney New District VI Justice

Well known Chicago attorney, Robert J. Gorman, has recently been appointed Justice of District VI by Supreme Justice Elwyn Thomas. Gorman takes the reins over from Hilmond O. Vogel, patent attorney with International Harvester.

When Brother Gorman was requested to furnish a detailed autobiography for The Reporter, he responded with a letter which was so full of humor and wit that it is reprinted herewith:
"Because you have Martindale.

Hubbell available, I will confess I was born in 1915. At the

time I was so surprised I didn't utter a word for a year. "My undergraduate work was at Northwestern University. In 1940 I received my L.L.B. at Chicago Kent College of Law. Of course I was an active PAD at law school and during my last

year was Justice of Blackstone Chapter. It was a blind date at a PAD affair that introduced me

to my charming spouse.
"Upon passing the bar in 1940 I at once commenced the general practice for myself. My first six months in practice I netted an average of \$6.00 per week. Of course I was living at home, but I remember wishing I could push it up to \$10.00 per week so I would be self-supporting in spending money.

"After a year and a half of practicing law World War II intervened, and I was drafted. That evening I went home and turned on the gas-and cooked a cup of coffee.

"Being a true PAD, however, I adjusted after a quick highball, and went on to interesting assignments in Washington, D. C. and on the Special and General Staffs of Eisenhower's Headquarters in London, Paris, the

beaches of Normandy, etc. "The War over I commenced again my law practice in which I indulge to this day. My confidence in the public's perspicacity on election day has been slightly undermined by having run for Congress and the judiciary unsuccessfully. Last July I acquired a slight measure of renown by being written up in the Saturday Evening Post as the attorney who helped free Roy Eaton, a prisoner who served sixteen years for a crime he did not

commit. "As a result of my marital venture, I have acquired three little Gormans. Another hobby is a




Supreme Secretary

MESSAGE FROM THE SUPREME JUSTICE

Lamar Chapter, at the University of Mississippi, was selected as the Most Outstanding PAD Chapter for the school year 1955-1956 by the Supreme Executive Board during the 1956 convention in Cleveland. Presentation of the beautiful plaque which is awarded annually was made at the convention banquet on the evening of June 23.

U. S. Circuit Court

Chief Justice Frederick G. Hamley of the Washington State Supreme Court, was named by President Eisenhower last May to be a Judge for the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals.

The Court, which sits in San Francisco, covers a number of western states and also Alaska

and Guam. Brother Hamley, a member of Dunbar Chapter at the University of Washington, has long been a very active and enthusiastic PAD. His nomination for the federal bench came as no surprise, as it had been expected for several months. He was appointed to Washington state's highest Court in 1949 by PAD Governor Arthur B. Langlie. Subsequently he was elected for a six year term in 1950, and has been serving as Chief Justice since January of this year.

When Langlie first won the governorship in 1940, Hamley went to Olympia and served in a number of State positions between 1941 and 1943. In 1943, Hamley moved to Washington, D. C. as Assistant General Solicitor for the National Association of Railroads and there he remained until his appointment in 1949 to the Washington Supreme Court.

editor of the Reporter, Brother Farrer outlined his plans for the Junior Bar Conference during the next year, as follows:

1. Full support by the 25,000 members of the Jenkins-Keogh Bills or similar legislation designed to extend retirement benefits available to corporate executives and corporate employees to the self-employed, this to be done through the organiza-tion of bi-partisan committees in each senatorial and congressional district.

2. Increased cooperation between state and local Junior Bar groups in order that the young lawyer may develop a more effective voice in the profession.

3. Increase the effectiveness of committee work, particularly in the fields of public relations and unauthorized practice of the law.



Brother Cleaveland R. Cross, lawyer, civic leader and educator in Cleveanld, Ohio, since early in the century, died Monday April 16, in Berea Commun-ity Hospital. Brother Cros was one of the founders of Hay Chapters at Western Reserve University and was one of the guiding lights of the Cleveland Alumni Chapter.

He practiced law from 1907 to 1951, with various firms in the Cleveland area. In addition to his membership in Phi Alpha Delta, Brother Cross was a member of the Masonic order, the Union and Mayfield Clubs. He was also a Trustee of Oberlin College, Hathaway-Brown School, and the Cleveland Museaum of Natural History.





Convention Action

A great deal of important fraternity business was transacted during the three-day meeting and the action which was taken by the convention is as follows:
INITIATION FEES AND

ALUMNI DUES: The initiation fee payable to the National Chapter was increased from \$22.00 to \$25.00 per initiate, and alumni dues, which have heretofore been \$3.00 per year, were changed to \$5.00 per year for those who have been out of law school more than five years, and \$3.00 per year for those who have been out of law school five years or less.

PLACEMENT: The Supreme brochure to be used ment activities between the active senior members of the fraternity and the Alumni Chapters throughout the country. The thinking of the convention was that any graduating senior who is interested in placement would prepare a one- or two-page outline of his background and qualifications, together with a picture, and the National Fraternity would have these reproduced in some manner and a quantity would be sent to the nearest Alumni Chapter several months prior to the individual's graduation. The local Alumni Chapter would then mail these sheets to all of the fraternity members on its mailing list. 



AUDIT AND FINANCE: The convention directed the Supreme Executive Board to pay the sum of \$3,438.50 to the National Endowment Fund before the convening of the next biennial convention, which sum of \$3,438.50 has been owing to the National Endowment Fund since 1933.

AWARDS AND SCHOLAR-SHIPS: The convention adopted the following resolutions:

1. With respect to the Most Outstanding PAD Chapter Competition, awards shall be made to the top three Chapters in the country in order of rank, and each District winner shall also receive an appropriate award.

2. Delinquency in filing any Chapter's entry in the Most Outstanding PAD Chapter Competition, whether by local chapter or District Justice, shall disqualify that Chapter from District or National Competition, respec-

3. The Supreme Executive Board was directed to set up a committee to study the possibility of a Scholarship Program which might be put into effect in 1957 or 1958.

PERSONS ELIGIBLE FOR MEMBERSHIP: The convention changed the Constitution to provide that any male graduate or any male law instructor of any law school accredited by the American Bar Association or the Association of American Law Schools shall be eligible to become an active member of the fraternity. Heretofore, only inance, law instructors or graduates of law schools where a Chapter of the Fraternity was established were eligible for membership.

FORFEITURE OF MEMBER-SHIP: A new section was added to the By-Laws providing as fol-

"Any member, active, alumni or honorary, who may be disbarred by any state, federal or territorial Bar Association, shall automatically forfeit his membership in this fraternity."

American Bar Association Section

The American Bar Association has been given the green light to immediately launch a nation-wide campaign for enactment of Congressional legislation to enable 10 million self-employed, including lawyers, to set up individual, income-tax deferred, retirement programs.

At the Association's 79th annual meeting in Dallas, Texas, Aug. 27-31, the 230-member House of Delegates roundly applauded an announcement by David F. Maxwell, newly elected president of the ABA from Philadelphia, that two lawyers from every state would be appointed "to serve on committees to be established in every state and congressional district" to work for early passage of appropriate retirement legislation.

The Association's 80th president told the members of the House that legislation would be re-introduced in the 85th Congress soon after it convenes in January and that state and local bar help would be needed in contacting all candidates for Congress in the elections this

Mr. Maxwell stated emphatically that the proposed measure, as embraced by the Jenkins-Keogh bills which failed to pass the last session of Congress, was "not a lawyers bill' but a bill which would "aid all professions," and all self-employed persons.

Briefly the bills would allow self-employed persons to deduct up to 10 per cent of current income (or not more than \$5,000 yearly) to be set aside in individual retirement funds. These deductions would be income tax-defered until withdrawn for use by the individual upon retirement at the age of 65.

ABA To Inspect Law Schools

The American Bar Association is also preparing to begin the reinspection of 129 law schools throughout the United States which have heretofore been approved by the ABA.

In a meeting that concluded the 79th annual convention of the ABA, the Board of Governors announced that a reinspection of the schools would begin immediately.

The reinspections will apply to the 129 law schools throughout the country which have been approved by the ABA since 1923. There are 167 law schools in teh United States, but of these, 38 have not received ABA approval. Approved schools are those whose standards meets requirements laid down by the American Bar Association. These standards include qualifications of faculty, curriculum, library and other plant facilities, and various other criteria.
