PAD Loses Two Stalwarts

Frank M. Ludwick **Passes Suddenly**

On May 8, 1957, Phi Alpha Delta lost to the Great Beyond one of its most illustrious sons. On that date, Frank M. Ludwick suddenly passed away, leaving behind him a record of service and devotion to the fraternity which has probably been unmatched during its 55 years of existence.

Brother Ludwick was initiated as a member of Benton Chapter at the University of Kansas City. From the very beginning he was an active and loyal member of PAD and during the formative years worked vigorously for the fraternity's betterment. His service to the fraternity ultimately earned him the position of Supreme Secretary, which he first occupied in 1921.

25 Years Supreme Secretary

For a period of 25 years Brother Ludwick thereafter served as the fraternity's Supreme Secretary and later Editor of our Reporter magazine. No other preson has ever, in the history of the fraternity, held a tenure of office even approaching the period of service by Frank Ludwick.

It was during the period of Frank's service that the fraternity prospered and grew in the late 1920's and then weathered the depression in the early 1930's. He continued to hold high office during the critical years of World bonds of brotherhood tightly bound but also prevented the fraternity from dissolution during this trying period.

Supreme Justice 1946-48 Brother Ludwick was further honored by the entire organization by his elevation to the office of Supreme Justice for the 1946-1948 period. Thus, there is very likely no man in this organization who had greater familiarity with its operations and problems over a period of almost three decades than our beloved brother, Frank M. Ludwick.

It is not enough, however, to pay our respects to Brother Ludwick as a distinguished member of the fraternity. Another story should be told about Frank Ludwick, the man and host for official Washington.

Host To Washington

George E. Fink Dies

On April 14, 1957, Past Supreme Justice George E. Fink, of Chicago, Illinois, was called to his eternal reward, and so ended a career that paralleled the first 50 golden years of our beloved Fraternity and whose entire life epitomized the ideals purposes upon which Phi Alpha Delta was founded.

Partner Also Supreme Justice For years, and up to the time of his passing, Brother Fink was a member of the law firm of Fink and Meier. It was this same Brother and Past Supreme Jus-tice (1905-06), Paul C. Meier (Story 1901), who drafted the Articles of Organization at South Haven, Michigan, on July 27, 1902, when the 21 who that day affixed their signatures became the founders of the greatest law fraternity the world has ever

Upon the death of his revered aw partner, Brother Meier retired from the practice and so ended this intimate association of two Past Supreme Justices of Phi Alpha Delta.

Brother Fink's wife, Kathleen, truly a sweetheart of PAD, predeceased him by about one year, they having observed together their 50th marriage anniversary in 1955, steadfastly devoted to one another. Brother Fink left a son, Robert E. Fink, a Navy veteran of the Pacific theater in War II and managed not only to World War II, and a daughter, ena E. Fink.

Brother Fink attended the Illinois College of Law, now De Paul Law School, received his LL.B. and LL.M. from the University of Michigan and was admitted to the Illinois bar in 1900.

George was formerly house attorney for the State Bank of Chicago and the Foreman State Bank, as well as general coun-sel for the Illinois State Bankers Association.

Active in Bar Association activities, he was a member of the American, Illinois and Chicago Bar Associations, the Swedish Club of Chicago and various other fraternal and social organizations. He was also a Past President of the University of Michigan Club in Chicago.

In 1950, the Illinois State Bar Association conferred the title of Senior Counsellor on Brother Fink "in recognition of more than 50 years' honorable service at the bar of Illinois...and for date of his death. Prior to that having set an inspiring example time, he practiced law in Kansas of devotion and fidelity to the (Continued on Page 12)


Harry Gershenson Heads Missouri Bar

Message From The Supreme Justice

Few members of the fraternity realize the great quantity of time devoted to fraternity matters by the national officers and the District Justices. The amount of this expenditure became apparent when recently the extent of the contacts, direct and indirect, of national officers and the various chapters was surveyed from headquarters.

Aside from the huge volume of correspondence and matters of administrative nature, probably the most important function which any of your officers performs is that of visitation to the various active and alumni chapters.

In the fall of 1956, I went on 9 a trip which included calls on Chapters at Vanderbilt University, Cumberland University, the Chicago Alumni Chapter, Northwestern University, Valparaiso University, University of Chicago, and the University of Louisville. During the year I have also been able to visit other chapters in various localities, as well as be present at the District X conclave in St. Petersburg, Florida, attended by representatives of Chapters at Stetson University, University of Miami, University of Florida, University of Georgia and Emory University. Also I attended the conclave of District V at Knoxville where delegates of chapters located in four



The next meeting of the Section is at the Ohio Valley Regional Meeting of the American Bar Association at Louisville, Ky., November 7th, at the Brown Hotel, 2 p.m.

Besides Mr. Justice Clark, Mr. Justice Stanley Reed, Mr. Jus-tice Sherman Minton, and Chief Judge John Biggs Jr. (Temple U.) are expected to attend the Regional Meeting on November 7 through 9 at Louisville, Ky.

All Phi Alpha Delta brothers are urged to attend this meeting, which will be profitable as well as pleasant.
Emphasis at the meeting will

be placed on the rule-making function. Heretofore the general rules of practice and procedure have been first formulated by committees appointed by the Supreme Court. The committee then submitted its recommendations to the Cupreme Court, and, if it approved, the Chief Justice transmitted them to the Congress for final action.

The proposal is that Congress implement this procedure by authorizing the Judicial Conference of the United States to conduct a continuing study of the rules, after which it would make recommendations to the Supreme Court. Tasks of the Trial Judge

THE WORLD'S LARGEST LAW FIRM

The Judge Advocate General's School, U. S. Army

(The following material was prepared especially for the Reporter, by the Judge Advocate General's School, U.S. Army, Charlottesville, Va.)

Since the appointment of the first Judge Advocate of the Army in 1775, the U.S. Army Judge Advocate General's Corps has grown to be probably the largest law firm in the world. Today over 1,000 officers on active duty and approximately 2,000 officers in the United States Army Reserve and United States National Guard comprise the membership of this firm. Members of the Corps are stationed throughout the world and their work varies from the preparation for the defense of the United States in complex litigation to the processing of a soldier's claim for damage to household goods during a change of station. The continuing education of these military lawyers is the responsibility of The Judge Advocate General's School, U.S. Army.

Perhaps the most unusual feature of the Schol from the standpoint of the lawyer whose experience has been limited to civilian law schools is the composition of the student body. The students at the School are all members of the Bar and many of them bring years of civilian and military legal experience to the courses they study.

yer, after eight weeks of training in weapons and military subiects at Fort Benning, Georgia, is assigned to the School for eleven weeks of intensive legal training designed to prepare him for the responsibilities he will assume. In contrast to the 14 to 16 hours of classroom time demanded in the typical civilian law school, The Judge Advocate General's School Special Course requires the newly commissioned member of the Corps to spend 35 hours of classroom time a week in the pursuit of his study.

Because of the variety of problems with which the military lawyer must be competent to deal, the Special Course includes instruction in such diverse areas as procurement law, international law, military justice, claims, and court-martial procedure. Not only the heavy course load, but also the high caliber of the student, makes the Special Course a demanding experience.

have had experience in leading

law firms. An example of the competition a student in the Special Course faces is found in the background of the first man in the most recent graduating class. He was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Stanford University, an editor of the Harvard Law Review, a Magna Cum Laude graduate of the Harvard Law School, a Fulbright Scholar, and the author of a book published by the Princeton University Press. His margin over the second man in his class at The Judge Advocate General's School was a scant 1.4 percent.

The training of newly commissioned members of the Corps is only one phase of the School's academic program. Through an Advanced Course, the School gives selected judge advocates and law specialists with several years of military experience an opportunity for additional scholarly study and exchange of ideas. The purpose of this course is two-fold, namely, (1) to educate selected judge advocates and law specialists for leader-ship in the field of military law and 2) to provide opportunity for research in the military-legal field so as to make a significant contribution to the development of military law. The duration of the Advanced Course is 35 weeks. Again, the course load is heavy and in addition to advanced study in the area of military justice ,emphasis is given to subjects of increasing current importance such as international law, comparative law, and civil emergencies.

A requirement for successful completion of this course is the acceptance by the faculty of the School of a thesis prepared by the student. The completed thesis must represent a significant contribution to military law to be accepted in fulfillment of the requirement for graduatoion.

The Advanced Course is accredited as an approved graduate program of legal education by the American Bar Association. The annual inspection visits to the School by the Adviser to the Section of Legal Education and Admissions to the Bar of the American Association help insure that the course continues to meet the high standards required by the Association.

In addition to the Special and Advanced Courses, the School periodically gives a three-week course in an area which is of growing interest to the civilian bar—procurement law. It also conducts courses for law officers, a course for judge advocates of school in the nation. It has at-the United States National tained an excellence unsurpassed

class is conducted by the School for enlisted personnel who will serve as reporters for courts-martial. This six-week course in-structs the students in the fine art of taking verbatim transcripts of court proceedings accurately and expeditiously.

Besides the on-campus instruction, the School prepares nonresident legal training programs for members of the Army re-serve. The programs, both in United States Army Reserve Schools and extension courses, are designed to parallel the instruction offered in the Special and Advanced Courses at the School. The School prepares and distributes instructional material in support of these programs and checks on the effectiveness of the USAR School courses through staff visits to reserve training

Another important feature of the continuing education program of the School is the annual Army Judge Advocates Conference. Here senior judge advocates from around the world are given an opportunity to exchange ideas, consider mutual problems, and discuss new developments in the law. At the Conference, as well as during the year, distinguished speakers are invited to speak at the School.

As in the civilian law school, considerable importance is attached to research and publica-tion by members of the staff and faculty. The School conducts and coordinates research and the development of doctrine in areas where there is a lack of judical precedent and other authoritative writing. It prepares a procurement law reporter, a Chronicle Letter of recent developments in military law, an annual cumulative pocket part to supplement the Manual for Courts-Martial, and various pamphets to assist courts-martial. A recent aspect of the research and publications program has resulted in the development and preparation of training films designed to acquaint our soldiers throughout the world with court-martial pro-


The myriad functions of the School are carried on by the approximately 40 members of the staff and faculty. Their work is aided immeasurably by both the fortunate location of the School and the School's advisory groups. The School occupies a building, dedicated in September 1956, on the University of Virginia grounds at Charlottesville, Virginia. It also utilizes the classroom, office, and library facilities of the adjacent University of Virginia Law School building. The extensive research facilities which the University libraries afford, together with the specialized military law library in The Judge Advocate General's School building, are ideally suited to assist the students and faculty in fulfilling the scholarly demands which the School program makes.



DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD—Justice Elwyn Thomas of the Supreme Court of Florida has been awarded a high honor by The Florida Bar, official statewide organization of lawyers and judges. trict Court for the District of Columbia, whose contributions to his chosen profession as a lawyer, jurist and professor of law in their totality comprise an impressive and outstanding record of service to that profession and reflect credit upon our Fraternity in which he holds honorary membership.

The outstanding contributions of Judge Laws to his profession can best be appreciated by a brief review of some of the high-

lights of his legal career. Judge Laws was graduated from Georgetown University Law School in 1913 with the LL.B. degree and later reecived the degree of LL. M. and LL. D. from this university. After graduation he was admitted to the Bars of the District of Columbia, New York and Maryland, and began practice in the District of Columbia, which he continued until his selection under President Woodrow Wilson as Assistant Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, District Attorney. He served in at Georgetown University. Chapter officers for the coming fore becoming Assistant General Counsel of the United States Shipping Board, in which post he continued until 1922, when he returned to private practice.

In 1930, Judge Laws was appointed a member of the Grievance Committee of the then Supreme Court of the District of Columbia; he was selected as Chairman of this committee in

In 1935, Judge Laws was elected Treasurer of the District of Columbia Bar Association. In 1937, he was elected President of the Association.

During his first year on the bench after his appointment in 1938 as Judge of the United States District Court for the Disrections Committee of the Council of Social Agencies for its annual award as a person who had rendered outstanding service in the field of administration of criminal justice and prevention of delinquency.

In 1939, Judge Laws began extensive study of pre-trial procedure and brought about the organization of a pre-trial divi-sion in the District Court. He has lectured extensively on pretrial procedure and has put on demonstrations throughout the United States. His writings on the subject for magazines and law journals have been extensive.

Since 1938, Judge Laws has acted as Chairman of the American Bar Association's Special Committee on Improving the Administration of Justice in the District of Columbia.

In 1941, Judge Laws was appointed by Chief Justice Stone of the United States Supreme

tee of Federal judges to study the problem of correction of crime in the Federal courts. He has been assisted in the drafting of legislation passed by the Congress in this field and has spoken by designation before four Judicial Conferences, the American Bar Association, and other organizations on th esubject. He was instrumental in the passage of the Youth Corrections Act and in making it applicable to the District of Columbia. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of the National Probation and Parole Association. He has served since 1953 as Chairman of the Advisory Council of Judges.


Gunnels remarked that from all indications, Corliss Chapter was upholding its outstanding past record of leadership in the law school.

To his wife, Isabel, graduation came as a long awaited dream and the end of shouldering sole responsibility of caring for the children.







HEAVY AGENDA FACING BOARD OF GOVERNORS

Proposed new rules for dealing with complaints against members of the Association involving violations of the canons of ethics are scheduled to be considered by the Board of Governors at its fall meeting at the American Bar Center in Chicago October 18-19.

A report and recommendations will be submitted by a special committee authorized by the Board to study the subject. The committee met recently in Chicago under the chairmanship of Cuthbert S. Baldwin of New Orleans to draft its report. Because the plan would entail a by-laws amendment which must be published in advance, it could not receive final action until the Annual meeting in Los Angeles, Calif., Aug. 25-29, 1958.

The plan would provide for hearing of ethics complaints against ABA members by the proposed committees. The committee at large then could recommend to the Board of Governors the censure, suspension or expulsion from membership of the member according to its findings. The Association has no authority to suspend or disbar a lawyer from practice, nor does it have any disciplinary jurisdiction over non-member law-

Several other important items are on the Board's agenda. One is consideration of a recommendation that the creation of the proposed new Section of Family Law be submitted to the House meeting in Atlanta, Ga. next Feb. 23-25. Another is a proof Delegates at the Midyear posed contract under which the Association would cooperate with a leading film producer for the production, without expense to the Association, of a series of six films about the legal profession for public showings. The newly-reated Survey Committee on Economics of Law Practice also may make a preliminary report teo the Board.

The Committee on Regional Meetings, which oversees the program through which the Association has been staging two or more regional meetings each year in different sections of the country, will be under the chairmanship of Lewis F. Powell, Jr., of Richmond, Va. The important Committee on Membership will be headed by Robert G Jr., of Dallas, Tex., and Charles A. Horsky, of Washington, D.C., becomes chairman of the special Committee on Legal Services and Procedures currently pushing in Congress the House of Delegatesapproved legislative program to overhaul basic procedures and functions of the more than 70 administrative agencies of the federal gavernment.

Mrs. Fanney N. Litvin, of Washington, D.C., was the re-cipient of one of the rare ABA major committee appointments ever to go to a woman lawyer. She will be chairman of the Standing Committee on Civil Service.

to admit for a limited time new or present ABA members under 46 without medical examination or other evidence of insurability. This non-medical "open period" extends to November 15 this year. It is limited to members of the American Bar Association who will not have reached their 46th birthday by December 1.

Basic maximum insurance coverage is raised from \$6,000 to \$10,000 under the liberalized plan. These added benefits will apply to all present and new enrollees under age 40, in varying amounts depending upon age. Present participants will automatically receive the increased coverage, effective December 1 this year.

Here are the highlights of the new plan:

All American Bar Association members, including lawyers who join the Association prior to Nov. 15, may enroll without evidence of insurability. (Except those in Texas and Ohio.)

Benefits are raised in varying amounts depending upon age, up to \$10,000 maximum, without increase in the \$20 yearly preminum. Preminums are waived in the event of total disability.

At age 50, enrollees in the \$20 a year plan have an option to enroll in the companion "50 Plus Plan" providing an additional \$5,000 of protection, again without evidence of insurability.

The "\$20 a year" group life plan is now two years old and has approximately 18,000 partied to afford protection for members between the ages of 50 and 70. The latter became effective January 1 this year.

The twin plans have enjoyed a remarkable growth. Today they insure the lives of over 22,000 lawyers and afford over \$80 millions of insurance protection. The Endowment has thus far paid out more than \$300,000 in death claims. The American Bar Foundation, research arm of the ABA, has benefitted substantially through bequests and dividends. Directors of the Endowment recently made a grant of \$40,000 to the Foundation for major projects of legal research.

The Endowment's group life insurance program, now one of the largest in existence, is administered by a full-time staff headquartered in the American Bar Center in Chicago. Carl B. Rix, of Milwaukee, Wis., is Pres-

City and California for 20-odd years and also served with the War Production Board. He resided at "Marwick", a large farm located north of Washington with a spacious farmhouse, extensive outbuildings, beautiful guesthouse, and the many rolling fields and green landscapes for which Maryland is so famous.

At "Marwick", Brother Ludwick really enjoyed life. There he lived with his closest friend for many years standing, Ken Allen, who is widely known throughout the east as a distinguished interior designer. Brother Ludwick gradually earned the reputation of being one of the finest chefs in all of Washington, a man who knew cooking from apples to zucchini.

On many occasions, Brother Ludwick played host to members of PAD from all over the world. Frequent parties were held at his spacious farmhouse for the local active chapters in the area. In 1953, he was host to the Supreme Executive Board during its annual meeting held in Washington.

Brother Ludwick was an accomplished horseman, having been a member for many years of Rancheros Vistadores, an exclusive riding group on the West Coast.

In addition to this, Frank's personal records disclose a constant association with innumerable high personages in official Washington, ranging all the way from the judiciary and Capitol Hill, to the Cabinet and White

House. His name appeared many times in Washington society columns which reflected his close association with the Who's Who of Washington, irrespective of political affiliations.

Thus, Frank and "Marwick" were well known to the President and Mrs. Eisenhower, former President Truman, Vice President Nixon, Sherman Adams, Chief Justice Warren, Justice Tom Clark, Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey, Secretary of Com-merce Sinclair Weeks, Postmaster General Summerfield, Attorney General Brownell, Secretary of State Dulles, Secretary of Agriculture Benson, Governor Mc-Keldin of Maryland, Jim Haggerty, Homer Gruenther, Secretary of the Interior Seaton, Wilton B. Persons, Commissioner Camalier of the District of Columbia, Senator Knowland, Senator Long, Senator Chavez, Perle Mesta, and other notables to numerous to mention.

Brother Ludwick also enjoyed the distinction of attending one of the President's famous stag dinners held at the White House on May 19, 1954.

Although Brother Ludwick has now passed away, his work in the fraternity will long be re-membered. His remains now rest in Arlington National Cemetery, Washington, D. C., and his many years of time, effort and personal expense devoted to PAD stand as a shining example of his devotion to the brotherhood of man. One of PAD's finest sons has left this earth.

But then, George Fink's life was Phi Alpha Delta and he will always live in the fond memory of all PAD Brothers who had the good fortune to know him. To know him was to love him, and to the Brothers of the Chicago Alumni Chapter, which he founded (it being the first alumni chapter to be chartered by the Supreme Executive Board), George Fink will never die, and as always, he will be ever affectionately known as the "Grand-daddy of PAD."

Held Many Offices

The following are some of the offices Brother Fink held in the Fraternity: Supreme Treasurer 1907-08); President of Chicago Alumni Chapter (1912); member of Board of Tribunes (1921-23); Supreme Justice (1923-25); Chairman, Board of Tribunes (1925-27); member, Supreme Advisory Board (1925-57); member, Board of Tribunes (1930-34).

The following is an editorial excerpt from the Phi Alpha Delta Quarterly for December, 1911: "In this issue appears the portrait of Brother George E. Fink -a patriarch in Phi Alpha Delta, whose untiring efforts in behalf of the Order have materially advanced its interests and in no little measure contributed to make it the greatest legal fraternity in the world."

Then follows a review of his labors in our glorious cause, ending on this note: "Truly, Brother Fink is a 'little' man of 'big' consequence," and all this,

Chicago Alumni Award

On October 29, 1956, less than six months before he died, George Fink received his final accolade from the Chicago Alumni Chapter, in the form of a beautiful illuminated citation, which read in part as follows, "In recognition of more than half a century of devoted service, help and leadership in contributing to the welfare and advancement of our great Fraternity, we present this testimonial with the sincere thanks and appreciation of all the Brothers of the Chicago Alumnal Chapter." Supreme Justice Elwyn Thomas made the presentation.

In the history of our Fraternity, the name of Brother George E. Fink will always be legend, as one who contributed heroic service in the building of an edifice which is the heritage of every Brother in Phi Alpha Delta. He was the repository of the entire lore and ritual of our Order. Truly fond of his Brothers he was a kindly man, with ever an outstretched hand to help a member of P.A.D., and legion were the brothers who beat a path to his door.

George was never known to miss a funeral service of a departed brother in the Chicago area and he personally dis-tributed the purple and black funeral badges of the Fraternity on each such occasion. And by the same token he never missed a summer or golf outing of the Chicago Alumni Chapter.

After World Wars I and II,

mind you, before December, 1911, Brother Fink played an important role in the reactivation of many chapters of Phi Alpha Delta. He was seldom absent from a convention or other meeting of the Fraternity and on many occasions he personally arranged for the P.A.D. luncheons and smokers at the annual meetings of the American Bar Association.

> Brother Fink was in daily attendance at the P.A.D. luncheon table of the Chicago Bar Asociation, a custom he established years ago, and he was never without his Past Supreme Justice's pin, which he wore so proudly. He believed that every P.A.D. should be identified and long ago arranged to have the Greek letters Phi Alpha Delta appear in our annual listing in Sullivan's State Bar Directory, together with a complete listing of the names, addresses and telephone numbers of all officers of the Chicago Alumni Chapter.

> A modest man of great humility, he would meet you at an appointed time and place, "God be willing." Even in death, his stature will never grow less for he loved Phi Alpha Delta as few Brothers ever have before him. Well it may be said that his life and works exemplified all and everything that P.A.D. stands for. Through all his years, and without complaint he bore them well, his intense love for Phi Alpha Delta burned with an all consuming flame. Next to God and family, Phi Alpha Delta was his destiny
