

The opening business session was held at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, March 22, 1958 at Columbia, at which time each Chapter reported on its past year's activities and future plans. In the informal discussions that followed, Supreme Marshal Redding informed the delegates of the condition of the Chapter at Rutgers and reported on his previous day's visit thereto and also gave a preliminary report on the Fraternity's Survey of Professional Activities conducted by each chapter. The report graphically showed that although many potential chapter activities had been assumed by the Law Schools themselves, there was still a wide field of service to the profession that each chapter could undertake.

## formal discussion and workshop District XII In Large onclave Attendance

The Roosevelt Hotel in Washington, D.C., was the scene of the Ninth Annual District XII Conclave February 28-March 1. Nearly 100 delegates from all the active and alumni chapters in the District were treated to an outstanding program which was hosted by John Jay Chapter of George Washington University, with the active assistance of Taft Chapter of Georgetown University sity and the District of Columbia Alumni Chapter.

In addition to the business sessions, other notable events were the honorary initiation of and address by the Honorable Lister Hill, United States Senator from Alabama; the keynote address by Brother Thomas J. O'Connell, a prominent government attorney, and the Conclave luncheon address by Brother Joseph Bulman, wellknown trial attorney.

#### Senator Hill Initiated

The culmination of the weekend activities was the banquet at which Senator Hill was int-tiated as an honorary member of John Jay Chapter. District Justice Donald R. Moore acted as toastmaster at this affair and administered the oath to Senator Hill, who then addressed the group on the subject of "America on Trial."

At the conclusion of these ceremonies the delegates repaired to the main ballroom for the Conclave dance, with music provided by Ed Pierce's Orchestra, a well-known group which had the honor of playing at the President's inaugural ball.

The Conclave luncheon, toastmastered by Supreme Marshal Robert E. Redding, was the oc-casion for the address by Brother Joseph Bulman, a former professor of law at George Washington University, and one of the most outstanding trial attorneys in the East. Brother Bulman discussed some of the practical problems and considera-tions in "The Trial of a Negli-gence Case." He advised the delegates that notwithstanding what appears in television and other mass media, a case is won with preparation in the law of-

fice, not with the slick tactic in the courtroom. He stated that the law of negligence is very simple, and he stressed the importance of utilizing facts in each particular case. In that regard he urged that the attorney personally interview and take statements of all witnesses, as well as visit the location of the incident. Brother Bulman also mentioned the importance of irst impressions at the trial Specifically, he noted the value of making a favorable impression upon the jury at the voir dire and of using the strongest witness first in the presentation of the case. In summary, he declared that the attorney must base his presentation on the strength of his own case rather than on any supposed weakness in his opponent's case.

The opening session of the Conclave featured the keynote address by Brother Tom O'Connell, former professor of law at Georgetown University, former Assistant U.S. Attorney, and presently the Assistant General Counsel, Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System. Brother O'Connell discussed "The Trial of a Criminal Case" commenting on the role of the attorney from the moment of his (Continued on Page 10)

# Louisville Site Of District IX Conclave

The week-end meeting was opened with a reception and cocktail party at the 235 Club, with Louisville alumni as hosts. The occasion served as an ice breaker and an opportunity for delegates to the Conclave to become better acquainted.

The lovely ladies of PAD (PAD Wives' Auxiliary) helped to liven things up a little Saturday morning when they conducted registration for the Conclave.

Presiding at the Saturday morning session was PAD Dean William B. Peden, of the University of Louisville. Judge Lawrence S. Grauman, himself a PAD, delivered the welcoming address.

Round table discussions on such items as pledging, initiation and rushing, inter-chapter relations, and chapter programs and social activities, were participated in with a great deal of interest and enthusiasm.

The keynote address of the Conclave was delivered by the PAD Dean of the University School of Law, W. L. Matthews.

## Message From The Supreme Justice

To those who are now, and who will soon be, members of the Bar:

Every law school dean with whom I have discussed the matter has assured me, unequivocally and unhesitantly, that the chapter of Phi Alpha Delta at his college was making a definite, valuable, contribution to the success of the institution. Having heard the report repeatedly, and not having heard a dissent, I feel confident in accepting the situation as a premise for the plea this message will contain.

Before reaching the point, it seems fitting to stress the value of the position the fraternity has attained. Not only is it a means of fostering associations of the finest character but its existence is fully justified, aside from social contacts, as an agency for furthering the curricular of the law schools, therefore, vicariously, improving the profession itself.

One who enters earnestly in the activities of the law school is the better equipped to participate effectively in the programs of the bar associations with which he should become affiliated once the dread examinations have been met and conquered.

These programs are many and varied. There is no occasion to enumerate them here, or even to list a few. I ask that you hear me or but one of them, the eternal struggle to improve the administration of justice. And I narrow the subject even farther by referring to the Section of Judicial Administration of the American Bar Association.

I truly hope that you will join the Association when you enter upon your career. And you who will be new attorneys and you who are already practicing but are not yet members, I urge to join the Section of Judicial Administration when you are enrolled as a member of the Association.

For many long years those who belong to the Section have striven to better the judicial process wherever it is needed and, inasmuch as we humans never attain perfection but only approach it, the need is everywhere.

The Section operates on a very modest budget and the only practicable way appreciably to increase its income is to enlarge the membership. The cost of a membership is the meager sum of \$3 a year. If you will pay that small amount annually you will participate in a perennial movement to make justice more expeditious, more inexpensive and more sure.

The chairmanship of the Section is now in the able hands of Justice Tom C. Clark, himself a P.A.D. The other officers are Judges Emory H. Niles, Thomas

## Past Supreme Justice Green Dies; Was Former Illinois Governor

Born Dwight Herbert Green, at Legonier, Indiana on January 9, 1897, Brother Green graduated from elementary and high school there, later attending Wabash College at Crawfordsville, Indiana.

Here he starred on the baseball and football teams and, somehow, picked up the nickname "Pete", by which he was effectionately known for the rest of his life.

If it had not been for the start of World War I in 1917, Pete may have realized his ambition to be big league baseball player. However, in his sophomore year he enlisted in the Aviation Corps of the U.S. Army where he was commissioned a lieutenant and served as flight instruc-

After his discharge from the service in 1919, he studied at Stanford University where he became a member of Holmes Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta, but, after the end of one quarter, he entered the University of Chicago and there, in 1920 received his bachelor of philosophy degree and in 1922 his degree of doctor of jurisprudence.

In the same year Pete was admitted to the Illinois bar, practicing in Chicago until 1926 when he was appointed special attorney in the Bureau of Internal Revenue in Washington.

Surviving our beloved and lamented brother are his widow Mabel Green, nee Mabel Victoria Kingston, and his two daughters, Gloria, and Nancy, now the wife of Dr. James B. Gilbert of Alexandria, Va., and two granddaughters. He also leaves a sister, Mrs. Mary Shearer of Chi-

#### Prosecuted Al Capone

Pete Green will always be best remembered as the gang-busting prosecutor of "Scarface" Al Capone, the prosecutor, who, on October 17, 1931, sent the most notorious gangster of all time, to the Federal Penitentiary. Of his many accomplishments, Governor Green took greatest pride in the Capone conviction

It is said that during this fatrial, Capone himself nodded towards the prosecutor and was overheard to remark: "If I had that guy defending

me I wouldn't have a worry in the world."

In 1937 Brother Green was the youngest man ever named to the post of United States Attorney for the Northern District of

Although a novice in politics, in 1939, Dwight H. Green, was the Republican candidate for mayor of Chicago. While he was defeated, he polled more than 638,000 votes and convinced Repulican slatemakers that they had a future winner.

#### **Elected Governor**

very next year, 1940, Brother Green was elected Governor of Illinois and in 1944 was re-elected for a second term. The phenomenon was, that Green, a Republican, was twice elected governor while Roosevelt swept

the state on the Democratic Presidential ticket.

1948 saw Governor Green the keynote speaker at the Republican National Convention in Philadelphia where he was a darkhorse candidate for the nomination for president.

The following are some of the offices Brother Green held in the Fraternity; Supreme Historian (1921-23); Supreme Vice Justice (1934-36); Supreme Justice (1936-38); Chairman, Board of Tri-bunes (1938-46); Member, Board of Tribunes (1946-48); Member, Supreme Advisory Board (1938-

While Governor of Illinois, he led a pilgrimage to Washington to induct Tom C. Clark, then Attorney General, into Phi Alpha Delta and addressed at the Mayflower Hotel, one of the greatest P.A.D. banquets ever held in the Capitol.

In 1956, in the full flower of health and just shortly before he was stricken, our esteemed brother Pete Green delivered the banquet address on the occasion of the reactivation of the Marshall Chapter at the University of Chicago. And as Pete said at that time, "nothing in my entire career gives me more pleasure than to see Marshall Chapter (where I was Justice for two years and lived at the Chapter House) again take its rightful place upon the campus of a great university.'

Many were the times the Chicago Alumni Chapter made the rafters ring for Pete with, "He's a damn fine man." On October 17, 1941, the greatest dinner meeting ever held by the Chapter honored Dwight H. Green, Governor of Illinois, as the "Man of Destiny."

Supreme Justice J. Harry Labrum was present and Brother Michael L. Igoe, Judge of the United States Court for the Northern District of Illinois acted as toastmaster. In all the history of Phi Alpha Delta few brothers were ever given a more heartfelt and deserving accolade.

The recipient of many honors during his public life, Brother Green wore them well, never losing the common touch. During a 1956 appearance before the U.S. Senate Investigating Committee on scandals in government, Senator Fullbright of Arkansas asked Green how he wished to be addressed—as "Mr. Governor" or as "Mr. Green."

"Just call me Pete," was the

At his passing, Governor William G. Stratton of Illinois said, "All of Illinois is grieved at the death of Dwight H. Green, distinguished and devoted citizen of our state. His outstanding record of public service as our wartime governor will honor the pages of history.'

If one had to sum up the character of Dwight H. Green in a single word, that word would be be "kind," for he never did a mean or unkind thing. Yet, his kindness, even his gentleness, was coupled with courage of the highest order. From the time he won prominence in his fight against another scourge, his bravery was never in questionnot even by his political enemies.

Yes. Pete Green was a man of immense loyalty, compassion and kindness. He had thousands of friends and he never forgot them.

## Personal Injury Trial Highlights District I Conclave

District One's fourth annual conclave, held in Portland, Oregon, on April 12, 1958, was highlighted by a reenactment of a personal injury trial, in which the attorneys and several of the witnesses were those who had participated in the actual trial some months previously.

Brother J. Kelly Farris portrayed himself in the role of man of the Conclave Committee, plaintiff's attorney, Brother K. C. Tanner sat as the trial judge and brother Ken Poole portrayed the defendant. Mr. Robert H. Hollister of Portland appeared in turn, introduced Supreme for the defendant, as he had done when the actual case was tried. Special thanks should also go to Drs. John L. Maxer and Lawrence J. Cohen who contributed their valuable time to add a tuoch of instructive realism to the trial, and to the reallife plaintiff and his wife who were kind enough to reappear as witness.

After a hard-fought courtroom battle, the jury of delegates from various active chapters returned a verdict for the plaintiff, with an amount less than the actual verdict in the case. During an informal question and answer period following the trial, delegates enjoyed an opportunity to gain further insight into trial tactics. Dr. Cohen, who participated in the question and answer period, gave the con-clave the benefit of the views of an experienced medical expert on how to best utilize medical and other expert testimony, and also graphically described modern procedure for reduction of a compound fracture of the

#### Griffith, Nickell, McCarroll

A luncheon for the delegates and their guests was held in the Castillian Room of Portland's Heathman Hotel. Brother Tolbert H. Following the moot trial, Williams Chapter conducted initiation ceremonies for new members:

Concluding the official program of the conclave were a cocktail hour and banquet in the Georgian Room of the Heathman Hotel. Featured speaker was Brother Richard R. Carney of Portland, whose topic was "Practice Before Congressional Committees." Brother Carney. who has had wide experience before Congressional Committees, focused on the basic problems faced by a lawyer who is called upon to represent a client appearing before an investigating committee.

The well-organized program of the conclave was the result of the oustanding leadership of George Nickell, District Justice, Tolbert H. McCarroll, Conclave Committee Chairman, and Vice-Chairman Herman L. Lind. This leadership was implemented by the integrated teamwork of committee members Wayne Annala, B.B. Bouneff, Alan H. Johansen, Edwin J. Peterson and Kenneth A. Poole, and of the many other active and alumni members who contributed generously of their time and means.

## Judge James H. **Gray Dies**

Brother James H. Gray, a former Judge of the Common Pleas Court of Allegheny County. Pennsylvania, passed away on December 20, 1957. PADs who attended the 1956 Cleveland convention will well remember Judge Gray, who attended the convention and spoke to the brothers assembled.

Judge Gray, since 1938, was associated with his son, James D. Gray, in the private practice of law. He was 85 years of age and was in active practice until last Thanksgiving when he suffered a coronary attack.

Brother Gray was a member of the American Judicature Society, the Board of Trustees of the Western Theological Seminary, the Board of Trustees of Pennsylvania State Penitentiary, Masonic Lodge, and had been an Elder in the 6th Presbyterian Church for 40 years.

## PAD Succeeds PAD on Kansas Supreme Court

It was PAD succeeding PAD in Kansas recently, when Dean Schuyler Jackson of the Washburn University School of Law. was named to fill the Kansas Supreme Court vacancy created by the resignation of ex-Governor Fred Hall. Alumni chapters are entitled to one delegate and one alternate delegate. However, both active and alumni chapters have two votes each on all matters arising in convenion.

It should be noted that in order for any chapter to have its delegates' credentials approved, it must have all of its reports filed and its affairs in good order. No alumni chapter may have its delegates' credentials approved unless its annual alumni tax is paid.





pal policy decisions made by the Supreme Board at their last annual meeting. His talk was of particular interest to the newer members present who had joined the Fraternity after the last biennial convention and who had only a vague conception of the importance of the functions performed by the National officers. Although Mr. Redding was too modest to acknowledge it, it was through his direct efforts that this District XI Conclave program became a reality. 

Robert Dunn, of Matt I. Sullivan Chapter at the University of San Francisco, discussed the "Chapter in Competition with Evening Classes."
