## Placement Program Gets Under Way

(The 1958 Convention established a National Placement Director position to coordinate placement activities for the fraternity. Matthew S. "Sandy" Rae has been named Placement Director, and his first memorandum on Placement follows.) STATEMENT OF POLICY

Phi A pha Delta has long recognized that the most important Fraternity activities are those designed to aid its student members in becoming useful, respected members of the legal profession. The first, and vital, step in this process is assisting the law school graduate in finding employment suitable to his abilities and desires.

The organized bar, particularly with the tremendous increases in bar admissions since World War II, has come to recognize the necessity for placement assistance as a service to the profession. Individual attorneys and firms are no longer capable of, nor willing to, interview the greatly increased number of graduates in the search for the individual who meets their own

particular rigid qualifications.

Preliminary applicant screening in some form, has become a necessity under present condi-tions for the Bar. Efforts along this line are now being conducted, with varying degrees of success, by local bar associations, law schools, law book publishers and Phi Alpha Delta.

If Phi Alpha Delta is to continue to render maximum service to its members, Active and Alumni, it must increase its placement activities. For this purpose, the 1958 National Convention ordered the appointment of a Nation Placement Director.

## **OBJECTIVES**

1. To create effective local PAD Placement service.

a. To assist PAD graduates locating suitable employment opportunities.
b. To assist PAD attorneys

in locating qualified associates through preliminary screening techniques.

2. To educate PAD Alumni to give preference to PAD applicants, all other factors being

## PROCEDURES

Experience has taught that placement on a national level will not work. Placement activities can achieve success only in the local community. The National Placement Director cannot effect placement on an individual basis. He can only stimulate, advise, and co-ordinate local activities.

The need for placement activities exists amongst PAD attorneys as well as amongst students, a vital factor frequently overlooked. It is primarily the responsibility of local alumni chapters to fill this need.

Here is the attorneys' problem

and the ideal solution:

Problem: A PAD attorney, or firm with one or more PAD members needs a young attorney qualified to perform satisfactorily in the type of practice being conducted. The normal present choice: publicize the opening and interview several score applicants (at an average 30 min-

opening secret and turn to existing placement services, if any, or faculty contacts and trust to luck in having a qualified few applicants recommended.

Solution: Present the desired list of qualifications to the local PAD Placement Service, let it perform the preliminary screening through personal interviews and records, and present the names and records only of qualified applicants, choose from its records the applicants

desired for a personal interview.

And here is the students' problem and the ideal solution:

Problem: A PAD graduate, with individual desires and qualifi-cations, seeks a suitable association in practice. Normally, from lack of experience, training, or professional contacts, he is not certain exactly what he desires ard needs personal counselling. The normal present choice: try to obtain interviews with as many different types of law firms as possible and hope to reach a sound decision; or take the first reasonable offer which is made and hope that the posi-tion turns out to be suitable.

Solution: Present qualifications to the local PAD Placement Service early in law school career, and revise them prior to graduation, seek personal counselling advice from experienced PAD Alumni, cooperating with the Placement Service, determine the type of practice desired and ask assistance in locating suitable openings.

## ORGANIZATION

- c. Education of, and laison with, PAD attorneys, to seek out all available openings and secure preference for PAD appilcants.
- d. Education of, and laison with, the student chapters, to seek out all available applicants and assist them in choosing a

  - a. Maintain laison with the Alumni Placement Com-
  - mittee. 3. District Justice.
  - a. Stimulate, coordinate and supervise local placement activities to guarantee effective functioning.
  - Include placement advice by experienced alumni in every conclave program.
  - 4. National Placement Director. a. Stimulate, coordinate and supervise local placement activities
    - b. Disseminate forms and information on procedures and opportunities.
  - c. Receive, evaluate and publicize reports and source materials.





For Lawyers J. Edgar Hoover, Director, Federal Bureau of Investigation, has announced that the FBI is interested in accepting applications for the Special Agent position. Applications will be accepted from male citizens of the United States between the ages of 25 and 40. Applicants must be at least five feet, seven inches without shoes and must have uncorrected vision of not less than 20/40 (Snellen) in one eye, at least 20/50 in the weaker eye without glasses, and at least 20/ 20 in each eye corrected. Applicants must be graduates of stateaccredited resident law schools and also possess at least an Associate of Arts degree or its educational equivalent from a resident college.

The entrance salary is \$6,505 per annum, and additional compensation may be earned for overtime. Agents are paid their regular salary while attending a training school for 13 to 16 weeks. It is anticipated that the next training school will be scheduled for the late summer of 1959.

Applicants must be willing to serve in any part of the United States or its territorial possessions in which it is determined that their services are required.

Persons interested in applying for the position of Special Agent may communicate with the Special Agent in Charge of his nearest office of the FBI in the United States for further infor-

## LAWYER REFERRAL -

SERVICE TO CLIENTS WITH *MODERATE MEANS*

There was a time when the services of lawyers were only for the few, yet none complained for the others did not need them. In a feudal world the tenant, the shopkeeper and the bonded apprentice had little call for legal advice, though an Erskine appeared on occasion to justify the great tradition of the bar that its services were available to rich and poor alike.

In our lifetime the lines of class and wealth have largely disappeared and "Jack" enjoys nearly all the things that were formerly the heritage of his master.

Mass production, however, is for material things, and our profession, along with the medical, has had great difficulty in attuning itself to the modern world. In an age of drum beating and salesmanship, we are unable as individual lawyers to tell people of their need for sound advice without running the risk of violating the canons of ethics. At a time when the complexities of the simplest form of existence challenge the ingenuity of the specialist in a multitude of fields, nothing like the chain store has been grafted into the legal profession to enable it to cope with the perplexities of people of all walks of life. As a result, until very recently the clientele of the attorneys of this country was little broader than it was in the days of the Civil War.

#### Blue Cross, Legal Aid and Lawyer Referral

The profession has not worked up anything as specular as the Blue Cross, which provides forty million people, one-quarter of the entire nation, with assistance toward the obtaining of medical care. However, the device of legal aid has set an example of organized bar association activity in the direction of better public understanding of the work of lawyers, in addition to making substantial inroads on the legal problems of the indigent class.

The lawyer referral service presents a plan whereby the services of the entire profession are made available to the greatest single group in the nation's population, the often forgotten class of people who have moderate means.

The plan is based on two considerations. Despite the ordinary lawyer's egotistic belief that everyone in the community either knows him or has heard of him, the fact is that the great majority of people in nearly all communities do not know a single lawyer, and have little, if any, desire to get to know one either socially or professionally.

The second premise is that most of these people are quite ignorant of their legal rights and incapable or recognizing a legal problem when they encounter one. While these statements are sometimes disputed at bar association meetings, they are strongly borne out by surveys that have been made in various parts of the country and also by the experience of referral serv ices which are in actual opera tion.

How then does this bar association plan to improve our professional relations? By means of the simple mechanism that we shall describe, it guides large numbers of people, who have no attorneys, into our law offices and establishes the lawyer-client relationship. This otherwise unresponsive clientele is induced to come in because of confidence in the name of the sponsoring bar association and because of the publicized arangement of the fixed fee for a consultation which destroys the prevalent fear that the cost of legal services is prohibitive.

It should be added that people make use of the service because it is permissible under the canons of ethics to advertise it and to make known the public's need for legal advice in connection with all the complex problems of modern life. Thus the referral plan presents the bar with the greatest vehicle yet devised for the improvement of its public relations. Publicity for the plan stresses the advantages of fixed in accordance with the can-

consulting a lawyer, and only if a person has no lawyer of his own is he urged to make use of the referral service.

#### An Opportunity to Improve Our Public Relations

Every consideration looking toward the welfare of the legal profession militates in support of the referral plan. We can scarcely retain the monopoly of the practice of law unless our services are available to all who have need for them. If our advice is not there for the askingand at a cost which is within the pocketbook of those who ask -we know that the Government will supply the demand on a basis which will surely seem to us unsatisfactory and unfair. In addition to combating the threat of socialism, with one stroke through this simple device we dispose forever of the communist theme that in capitalist countries the lawyer is the slave of the wealthy class. No other program that has been suggested to the bar-save only that of legal aid-has offered a comparable effort to build up preventive law, the giving of timely advice which heads off the burden, the cost and the heartache of litigation. Along with legal aid, the referral plan can spearhead the best possible program of improved public relations for the profession.

Most lawyers render services from time to time to persons of moderate means and charity clients though they probably derive their principal livelihood from the services they perform on behalf of corporations or those who have claims against them. or from legal work for individuals who are well-to-do. None of us can close his eyes to the fact that the lower income groups have not fared as well as the concerned. For that reason if for no other, the bar is bound to derive enormous satisfaction from the referral plan. With it in operation, we know that every inhabitant of our community can obtain the best in the way of legal service that lawyers have to offer.

The plan is in effect in some 180 communities now as compared with some 70 a year ago. This will indicate how fast it is taking hold and how valuable it is both to the lawyers and to the public.

#### How the Lawyer Referral Plan Operates

It is important that the lawyers and the public should know that this is not a low cost legal service plan. It is a plan whereby each person who needs a lawyer may secure a lawyer at a reasonable fee. The fee is to be

ons of ethics of the American Bar Association.

It is true that a minimum charge is made for a consultation in order to give the average person confidence that he will not be charged a large fee for a simple conference on a simple matter. After that point, how-ever, the lawyer and the client fix fees in accordance with the rules of our profession. There is no effort made on the part of any lawyer referral system to set a standard of fees or a minimum fee schedule.

The average lawyer may have the notion that only "junk" cases are referred to him. No doubt many such cases will be referred and should be taken care of so that people know that their problms can be discussed with confident lawyers. From experience, I may say that many worthwhile cases are referred from lawyer referral systems, and that lawyers are able to earn decent fees therefrom.

The feature which is the most important to the bar is the fact that if the lawyers are unwilling or unable to render legal services, lay agencies are perfectly willing, if not able to render them. Our constant struggle is with the lay agencies, which are encroaching upon our field and which advertise extensively what fine services they can render to the public. This is done in many ways and with more or less finesse, but the result is the samethe clients are going to the laymen and not to their lawyers. The lawyers must be available and ready, willing and able to do their jobs or there will soon be a time when there will not be any the lawyer referral system seeks to cover.
