This membership certificate is prepared by the official jeweler of the fraternity, L. G. Balfour Co., and costs the Supreme Chapter \$1.50.

PAD sponsors annual meetings of the active and alumni chapters in each District, which are called District Conclaves. \$2.00 of each initiation fee is returned to the districts for the holding of these Conclaves.

Immediately upon his initiation each member receives a lifetime subscription to The Reporter, the fraternity's official publication. No extra charge or subscription fee is made for this. This is not the case with the other major law fraternities, for subscription fee. Thus, PAD sends some 30,000 copies of each issue to all of its members each issue. Your editor is informed that the other major law fracernities only mail to subscribers and thus mail slightly less than 10,000 copies each issue. The cost of publication and mailing of The Reporter currently involves an annual expenditure of slightly in excess of \$5,000.

fraternity periodically The publishes a Professional Directory which has been acclaimed by many as the finest of its kind. The Directory is published every six years and is periodically supplemented to keep it current and up to date. Through the Directory a tremendous amount of business is referred from one PAD to another across the country from day to day and, of course, to the young attorney just starting in practice this is a very distinct advantage. The Directory has both an alphabetical and geographical section and is, to your editor's knowledge, the only law fraternity Directory which lists, in addition to the name and address of the individual, the date of his admission to the bar and type of practice in which he engages. PAD is the only major law fraternity which issues a supplement to its Directory. The next Directory is scheduled to be issued in 1960 and it is estimated that it will cost in the neighborhood of \$24,000.00. It is distributed free of charge to all alumni who are in good standing.

(Continued from Page 2) national convention every two years, which is attended by delegates from all active and alumni chapters. A considerable portion of the fraternity's revenue is appropriated for this convention. For example, \$20,000.00 has been set aside for the 1960 convention, which will be held in Nashville, Tennessee. It is interesting to note that we are the only law fraternity which pays the full expenses of active chapter delegates, including round trip railroad fares, subsistance and hotel accommodations.

Of course, the initiation fee also helps to sustain the Na-tional Executive Office. The functions of the Executive Office are extremely varied. Among other things it processes pledge questionnaires, enrolls new members, maintains complete records on each individual, keeps up to date address records, collects alumni dues, assists in planning District Conclaves, national conventions, publishes The Re-porter and the Directory, maintains a staggering correspondence burden, and performs literally dozens of other functions which cannot be here enumerated. The office staff consists of two full time clerks, one part time stenographer, and the Executive Secretary.

An item in the fraternity's

budget which is of considerable moment is that of chapter supplies. Pledge questionnaires, initiation reports, rushing booklets, match book covers, identification badges, membership cards, Constitutions & By-Laws, and many other forms are supplied to the chapters at no charge.

The fraternity, of course, sustains many other functions which cost money, such as receptions for members attending the annual American Bar Convention and the American Association of Law Schools, a series of awards for oustanding PAD chapters, etc.

None of the elective officers of the fraterity receive any mone-tary compensation whatsoever. In fact only one member of the fraternity receives any compensation at all and he is the Executive Secretary. At the present time we have seven men who comprise the Supreme Executive Board. These men believe so strongly in the purposes, principles, ideals and benefits of PAD that they collectively sacrifice literally thousands of dollars worth of their time annually for the opportunity of serving as national officers of PAD. These men are of the highest caliber and enjoy the highest regard of their fellow attorneys. If they had joined PAD only for the material benefits which might be theirs while attending law school, they would have ceased their active participation in fraternity activities many, many years ago.

If one considers membership in PAD only for the benefits which it can offer while in law school, he is overlooking the greatest advantages of a professional fraternity. The friendships and associations which are formed in law school will endure throughout one's profes-

Many law students who will consider membership in PAD are members of social fraternities. While I treasure my membership in my social fraternity very much, I can honestly say that it does not offer me any benefits which can even compare with those which are mine through PAD and I believe that you will agree that the same is true of all social fraternities. However, I know of few, if any, social fraternities, whose national initia-tion fee is anywhere near as low as that of PAD.

## Denver Host to SEB

Denver, Colorado, was host to members of the Supreme Execu-tive Board June 20-23,1959, when it met pursuant to call of the Supreme Justice for its annual meeting. Matters of great importance to the fraternity were resolved in the four day meeting, which was probably one of the most productive in the history of Phi Alpha Delta.

Among the important issues discussed was the finalizing of the plans for the Endowment Fund enlargement program and the adoption of a life insurance program calculated to make available to members life insurance at a considerable saving.

It was determined to establish an award to be known as the Senior PAD Award, which will be given to all PADs who have been members of the fraternity for fifty years or more. Records of the fraternity are not complete in the early years of PAD, and it would therefore be appreciated if anyone knowing of a brother who qualifies for the Senior Award, would send his name and pertinent information to the Executive Secretary.

The Board formaly determined to hold the 1960 National Convention in Nashville, Tennessee, with the Hermitage Hotel as the headquarters hotel. Dates for the meeting will be Wednesday Thursday and Friday, August 31, September 1 and September 2, 1960.

Other matters taken up were the revision of the Rushing Booklet, the publication of a 1960 Directory, the adoption of a budget for the fiscal year 1959-1960, the selection of the winners of the Most Outstanding PAD Chapter contest for 1959, and the adoption of an official motto of the

#### PAD Lawyer-Teacher Handwriting Expert

Brother Winsor C. Moore is an Omaha attorney who has an avocation that brings him into court more frequently as a witness than a lawyer.

Since Brother Moore is a full time teacher at the Creighton University School of Law, his time for practice as a lawer is limited. As a handwriting expert, he has made frequent trips to the witness stand.

Professor Moore, who is probably the only Nebraskan who is an expert in all phases of questioned documents, picked up this avocation while serving as a Lt. Colonel in the Army in World War II.

A number of soldiers were taking unauthorized leave by using forged passes. No handwriting expert was available to prove that the passes were forged.

Colonel Moore began studying handwriting as an avocation in his spare time. "Those spurious passes were easy to spot even with my limited experience," he

His initial successes whetted his interest in handwriting. After the war, he noted that there was a scarcity of qualified document experts in civilian courts.

He also learned that a good man in the field had to know typewriting identification, proper aging processes, paper type and other things in order to be a handwriting sleuth. Studying various phases of the subject has taken much of his spare time for

He has an extensive laboratory set up in his home, which is well equipped with photographic dark rooms, stereoscopic and standard miscroscopes and precision measuring instruments.




