## 83rd Chapter Installed At University of Toledo

On March 5, 1960, the 83rd chapter of Phi Alpha Delta was formally installed at the University of Toledo College of Law in impressive ceremonies conducted by Supreme Vice Justice Anthony A. DiGrazia, assisted by an initiation team from Wayne State University, and by Toledo alumni. The chapter was installed as the Sir Edward Coke Chapter, being named after the famed English

town University Law School.
Brother Shaffer first organized the Phi Alpha Legal Society at the University, which subsequently received university recognition and then petitioned the Supreme Executive Board for an active chapter charter. Of great assistance to the group in its organizational phases were Brothers Frank Pitt, Secretary of The DeVilbiss Co., and a law instructor at the Toledo University College of Law, District IX Justice James L. Broz, Jr., and Supreme Vice Justice Anthony A. DiGrazia.

The initiation team was furnished by Cooley Chapter at Wayne State University. Cooley Chapter is itself less than a year old, and the invitation to furnish the initiation team was a singular one for a relatively new chapter. Also joining in the inasmuch Shaffer had already been initiated as a member of the fraternity at Taft Chapter.

The initiation proper took place in the afternoon at the Federal District Court Room in the new Federal Building in Toledo. The initiation was followed by a cocktail reception in the Great Lakes Room of the Toledo Club. Several Toledo alumni attended, including Willard Jacquot, Frank Pitt, Ted Cruey, George P. Smith, Harold Sivers, and Edwin P. Johnson. Several national officers attended, including Supreme Vice

The colonization group was spearheaded by John S. Shaffer, District IX Justice James L. Broz, a PAD transfer from George- Jr., and District VI Justice Stanley H. Jakala.

Speaker of the evening was Judge John M. McCabe, for 28 years a distinguished Judge of the Common Pleas Court of Toledo, Ohio.

The College of Law at the University of Toledo was organized in 1906 as a part of the educational program of the YMCA and staffed by members of the bench and bar of the community. It was an undertaking responsive to the obvious need for the opportunity of acquiring a legal education in a metropolitan area. In 1909 the College bencame a part of the University, where the profession continued to provide the driving force for the program. In 1941 the American Bar Association gave full approval and accreditation to the College, and in December of that year the College was elected to meminitiation team as a member was bership in the Association of John S. vention of PAD, originally scheduled to be held in Nashville, Tennessee, has been changed to Miami Beach, Florida, with the Deauville Hotel as the head-quarters hotel quarters hotel.

The change came about when members of the Nashville, Ten-nessee, Alumni Convention Committee requested that a convention in Nashville be deferred for a two year period, due princi-pally to problems of integration and convention facilities.

Dates for the convention, which will see active and alumni delegates convene from 83 active and 45 alumni chapters, have been reset for August 22, 23 and 24.

The Deauville Hotel is a magnificent convention hotel, engineered in advance design, architecture and decor, and offers a perfect setting for Phi Alpha Delta's 33rd Biennial Convention. This ultra modern convention luxury hotel occupies two blocks on the Atlantic Ocean in the

heart of Miami Beach. Each active chapter is entitled to have two delegates and two alternate delgates at the convention, while each alumni chapter is entitled to have one delegate and one alternate at the convention. As many observers and guests as wish to attend may do

The Supreme Chapter pays the actual cost of first class railroad fare, upper berth rates, hotel accommodations and a subsistence allowance, for each day of travel to and from the convention and each day of the convention, all of which is paid for one delegate from each active chapter.

The Florida Alumni have pledged all-out efforts to assure all attending the convention a most entertaining time and the 1960 convention promises to be one of the best attended ever.

Clark of the Supreme Court of the United States and a devoted PAD was the guest of honor and principal speaker at the Golden Anniversary Dinner tendered by the Phi Alpha Delta New York Alumni Chapter, on February 20, 1960, which honored eight men who have been members of the fraternity for more than fifty years. The date also marked the Fifty-First Anniversary of the granting of the Charter to Rapallo Chapter at New York University School of Law. This was the first commemorative occasion scheduled in the country honoring members who have been in the fraternity for fifty years or more. The banquet was held in conjunction with the District XI Conclave so that approximately 175 members of the fraternity, and their ladies, were present for the festivities at the New York University Club in midtown New York.

Saturday evening's activities Anthony A. Di Grazia, Supreme commenced with cocktails and a Vice Justice, Elden S. Magaw, pre-banquet reception for Justice Clark. Thereafter, the national officers, members of the alumni chapter, delegates to the Conchapter, delegates to the Con-clave from Columbia, Cornell, New York, Rutgers, St. John, Syracuse, Temple and Yale Uni-versities, and students adjourned to the Club's large banquet hall, filling it to capacity. DOUGLAS L. EDMONDS



## How Good Is Your Chapter's Rushing Program?

One of the most important problems confronting a chapter of our fraternity is that of rushing prospective members. chapter will be strong, active and an asset to the law school at which it is located only if its members continually think of bringing the right types of pledges into it. The technique of rushing will vary from school to school. However, there is one important factor which all of us should remember; we are brothers of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity and the way we conduct our affairs and ourselves in law school will largely determine the types of law students we will attract.

In my own experience both as a law student at Southern Methodist University and as an alumnus here in Dallas, Texas, I find the best parties for rushees are held when large numbers of the alumni are present. The programs which obviously produced the greatest number of new pledges were those in which the subject of law itself was paramount. An interested and reasonably successful alumnus at such a party can do wonders with the rushees.

Of course the rules of each school will vary concerning the use of alcoholic beverages. It is my opinion formed after twentyseven years of active membership in Phi Alpha Delta that the least successful rushing parties are those which might be called "beer busts." I believe that the rushees are more interested in the pracitce of law and in knowing an talking to those in its pursuit than in just another social party.

Last year we mailed to each chapter a list of "rushing tips." Those are again given here for present and future use. Good rushing!

- 1. Remember that rushing is a year-round activity.
- 2. Hold a free coffee hour for
- all students.
  3. Offer a "How to Study" program during the first few weeks of law school.
  4. Hold a PAD breakfast for
- all new students.
- Prepare mimeographed diagrams of the Law Library, showing the location of each set of Statutes, Reports, Encyclopedias, etc., and dis-tribute these to the entire law school.
- 6. Prepare a list of abbreviations suggested for use in the preparation of briefs and the taking of notes, and distribute these to the entire law school.
- 7. Prepare a PAD Chapter Di-

rectory, which also serves as a Rushing Booklet, containing members; names, a history of the local chapter, names of faculty members, and other information.

- 8. Leave PAD matchbooks in the Student Lounge for all to use and pick up.
- 9. Have your active members study with the freshmen or new students, and take coffee breaks with them.
- 10. Hold periodic reviews for the new students prior to their first round of examinations.
- 11. Make use of your PAD wives. For example, hold a Wives Tea before your rushing functions, for the wives of rushees. Establish a Wives' Bridge Club. Have PAD wives serve at rushing parties and functions.
- 12. Place in the hands of every new student the National Rushing Booklet and perhaps also one prepared by the local chapter dealing with local chapter points.
- 13. Take those who appear to be the leaders of the fresh-man class to lunch with prominent alumni.
- 14. Maintain a special library for prospective members, from which they may borrow law books.
- Use your new pledges in rushing. They can do more to tell others why they decided to pledge PAD than can the actives of your chapter.
- 16. Take pictures of your important PAD functions, enlarge them and place them on a large bulletin board where they can be seen by the entire law school.
- 17. Make sure that your active members have PAD recognition pins.
- Maintain a "PAD inkwell" which can be used by all students in the Law Library.
- 19. Make sure that each of your guests has a ride to and from the rushing func-
- 20. Sponsor trips to Supreme Court or other government agencies or institutions.
- Sustain an Effective Speaking Program, patterned atfer Toastmasters International.
- Stress the "professionalism" of PAD.
- 23. Remember that rushing is nothing but WORK, WORK, WORK and MORE WORK all year round.

### N.Y. Site of District XI Conclave

The District XI Conclave got underway on Friday afternoon, February 19, 1960, when the delegates convened at the Law School of the host chapter, New York University, on its Washington Square campus. National officers Anthony A. DiGrazia, Elden S. Magaw, Robert E. Redding, District Justice Robert J. Chadwick, and delegates from the chapters in District XI comprising the library display and special pronortheastern portion of the United States were in attendance. On Friday evening a reception and cocktail party in honor of the visiting delegates was held at Hayden Hall on Washington Square. Fraternity members of the local through the chapter and alumni chapter, faculty members, alumni and their ladies attended a full evening of fellowship and good cheer.

The opening business session was held at 10:00 a.m. on Satur-Loeb Student Activity Center overlooking Washington Square Park in Greenwich Village. Opening remarks by Supreme Treasurer Robert E. Redding and District Justice Robert J. Chadwick set the pattern for the informative informal discussions that followed. To avoid a sterotyped chapter-by-chapter presentation of the past year's activities, the discussions this year were held in panel fashion and highlighted the individual problems of each chapter, rather than individual strong points. It was felt that this method was extremely helpful and that the discussions could help to resolve local difficulties and bring assistence to the Chapters concerned. Throughout the session, the comments and assistance of the national officers present were extremely helpful and rewarding.

Discussions concerning the inday, February 20, 1960, in the surance plan provided by the national chapter for individual members disclosed that information bulletins from the national chapter, and the Reporter, are not being thoroughly digested nor was the information being disseminated to all active members; the office of the District Justice can play an effective role here by pointing up such new plans and activities so that all become aware of the many benefits being provided. On the question of adequate receipt of information, the delegates requested that only one person n each chapter be on the mailing list of the national board so that either the Justice or the Clerk would be responsible for obtaining and disseminating all correspondence. In a similar vein, the problem of continuity of officers was discussed together with the mandatory requirement that outgoing chapter officers turn over all of their files and materials intact so that they may be used to the greatest advantage by their successors, together with a thorough briefing by the old officers as to their duties and functions.

The problem of adequate alumni coordination was also thoroughly discussed with the decision that liaison personnel be designated by both the alumni and the active chapters so that each would be in close contact with the other. The question of adequate coordination and the fruits therof is graphically shown in the fine joint function of the Golden Anniversary Celebration and this Conclave, wherein both the alumni and the undergraduate members worked in close coopreation and harmony. This cooperation was further emphasized for the future in the plans that were developed to have the metropolitan New York chapters hold a joint initiation in a New York court house with a banquet to follow, and an open invitation being extend-

Among the problems discussed by the delegates and national officers was the question of maintaining the second year class at a high level of activity, interest and numbers. The discussion developed into the general question of rushing practices and among some of the suggestions was the publication and use of a class directory, gramming. It was decided that one of the biggest assets available was the use of alumni support in this area, coordinated advisors and the District Justice. The question also arose concerning professional activites that could be engaged in by the active chapters and attention was again called to an excellent memorandum in this area prepared by Supreme Treasurer Robert E. Redding.

The delegates requested that the national officers continue to provide adequate information and publicity on the varied services performed by the Supreme chapter for the local members and their chapters. It was especially requested that full information concerning the National Convention this year be sent early for adequate planning purposes. The economical purchase of banners for each chapter at the nominal cost of \$30 each was discussed and emphasized. Another point not very often raised was the function and activity of the Board of Tribunes and it was suggested that a particular question raised as to the admission of a foreign attorney who has discontinued legal studies in the United States, but who is attending local universities, would be an appropri-ate question for the Board of Tribunes to decide.

At lunchtime, the delegates proceeded to partake of a sumptuous buffet provided by an efficient catering staff in Loeb Hall. #### Placement Director Urges **Expanded Local Efforts**

In the February, 1959, issue of THE REPORTER, appeared a "Statement of Policy" by the National Placement Director. The key paragraph in that statement read:

"Experience has taught that placement on a national level will not work. Placement activities can achieve success only in the local community. The National Placement Director cannot effect placement on an individual basis. He can only stimulate, advise, and co-ordinate local ac-

The "Statement" then proceeded to suggest a simple form of Alumni program, as exemplified local organization for placement by activities in Washington, activities. Mimeograph copies Chicago and Los Angeles, include of the statement were mailed to both job locating and placement all Active and Alumni Chapters and District Judges. Covering letters requested appointment of local alumni and student placement committees and reports to the Director on appointments made and procedures being fol-

Replies were received from 3 Active Chapters, 1 Alumni Chapter and 2 District Justices. Of the three Active Chapters replying, two forwarded detailed information on their placement activities and one stated that because of local conditions it did not believe a Placement program would be of particular value. The Alumni Chapter replying was a state-wide organization which reported the appointment of a Placement Director for the State. One District Justice replying was faced with the preliminary problem of at-tempting to organize the Alumni in his area, the other, in a highly organized District, provided valuable suggestions on expansion of existing programs.

The foregoing summary is not intended in any way to be critical of those who did not reply. It is known that successful placement activities are being carried on in many areas from which no replies were received. The purpose of this review is to emphasize the proposition that placement can operate only on the local level. can This lack of response to national placement efforts is but a duplication of results experienced in prior years relative to national placement activities. It is to be assumed that the necessity of local effort is so obvious that most areas see no benefits to be gained from a national program.

In at least one field national efforts can be of value. That is reviewing local activities which have been successful for their areas and may be worth copying in other areas. In New York, Chicago, San Francisco and Los Angeles, Active Chapters have used varying versions of the basic idea of circularizing all Alumni in the area in an effort to locate possible job openings.
An indirect benefit of this progrom is to keep Alumni alert to the needs of job placement, even if no direct placements result.

The program developed by Ross Chapter last year, and contemplated for expansion to include Ford and McKenna Chapters this year, is based around a preliminary mailing to all Alumni advising that biographical material for graduating Brothers is available upon request. Last year, 3,285 preliminary letters were mailed, resulting in approximately 150 requests by Alumni for biographical data on 20 graduating Brothers. In addition, information was received on 13 part time openings and 15 summer openings for students still in school.

Such a program, which can be carried on most effectively by the student chapters, should not be the sole placment activity, but is a valuable addition to the basic placement program wnich must be conducted by Alumni. The essential elements of an

and the equally essential function of job counelling. These are time-consuming tasks which should not be imposed upon a single individual alumnus in any large area, but rather should be spread among as large an alumni committee as

Placement requires continual effort. A progress report is meaningless. Prior accomplishments are of value only in pointing the way to further effort. It is the objective of this report to attempt to induce additional activity. Each year's graduating classes must be assisted anew. If your area was successful in placing Brothers of last year's class, this should spur extra efforts this year. If you feel that efforts in your area last year were insufficient, each year provides a new opportunity to serve the fraternity in this most vital of all fields.


