

Wrigley Co. **Executive Dies**

Brother William H. Stanley, for many years vice-president and secretary of the Wm. Wrigley Jr. Company, Chicago chewing gum manufacturers, died in Chicago on December 2, 1959, at the age of 79. Following his retirement as an officer of the Wrigley Company after thirty-eight years of service, Brother Stanley conti-nued as a member of the board directors of the company until the time of his death.

Born in Scotland, he left school and went to work to help support his father's family at the age of fourteen. At sixteen he obtained a job as a clerk in Paris, later worked for the Hamburg-American Line. As a cruise director for the steamship line he came to the attention of the late William Wrigley Jr., founder of the chewing gum company, when the latter was on a world cruise with his family.

This meeting led to a business relationship which began when Mr. Stanley opened an office in Paris in early 1914 as agent for the Wrigley Company. When the First World War broke out, the office was closed and Mr. Stanley came to the United States to join the company at its headquarters office in Chicago.

DISTRICT X CONCLAVE COMMENTS ON MANY PROGRAMS

The District X Conclave was held in Tallahassee, Florida, March 25-26, 1960. The Conclave was called to order by Charles Tom Henderson, District Justice. After a roll call of the active chapter representatives and introductory comments by the District Justice, discussion of the topics on the Conclave Agenda was commenced, a summary of which follows:

Chapter intra activities:

1. SERVICE A. Book Exchange:

B. Quiz Files:

Discussion indicated that the preparation of quiz files is a difficult program to effect, and should not be attempted unless it meets with the approval of the administration of the law school.

C. Loan Fund:

The Rasco Chapter discussed a loan fund in effect at the University of Miami. This loan fund, sponsored by PAD, is for the benefit of the entire law school, regardless of fraternity affiliation. The fund is administered through a University appointed trustee and is for the purpose of assisting worthy and needy law students.

The Fletcher Chapter described loan fund established at the University of Florida for the purpose of assisting initiates to finance the payment of the Na-tional PAD initiation fee. Under this fund, initiates are permitted to borrow enough funds to pay initiation fees. The initiate must sign a demand note which is made payable to National PAD.

D. Briefing for Attorneys and Part Time Employment Referral Servics:

Several Chapters assist practicing attorneys in the communwith legal research. The establishment of a referral service of law students as law clerks has been established on an experimental basis at Fletcher Chapter. The Rasco Chapter reports the conduct of a moot trial each year under the auspices of PAD and with the financial assistance and sponsorship of a local law firm. gram argue before a jury, and a member of the Bench usually sits as judge. A prize is awarded to the winning counsel.

Since several schools offer a course in trial techniqe or practice court as a part of the curriculum, similar programs to that sponsored by Rasco Chapter have not been attempted.

C. Speakers Club:

Fish and Keener Chapters have instituted a program of public speaking patterned after the "Toastmasters Club." The purpose of this program has been to afford the brothers some opportunity to practice public speaking in the course of the regular Chapter meetings as well as at Chapter luncheons. Fletcher Chapter has in the past attempted to have periodic luncheons in which some prominent member of the local bar or of the University faculty has been invited to speak on some subject of interest to law students.

D. Law Review: Reports from the various Chap-

3. ADMISTRATIVE PROBLEMS

A. Rushing:

The following techniques were suggested as ways to achieve a more effective rushing program:

1. Contact alumni early enough to have them write to prospective rushees, and then follow up these letters with personal contacts by the active Brothers.

2. Chapter should write a personal "welcome letter" to each new freshman.

It was recommended that National PAD investigate the possibility of drafting an official rushing brochure concerned with topics to be discussed during rushing.

B. Conclave Expenses:

It was recommended that the Chapters consider the establishment of a fund by way of a regular assessment of the Brothers for the purpose of providing funds to defray the expenses of future District Concloves. Some provision for an accumulation of such funds will greatly assist the District Justice in planning and carsrying out a successful Conclave.

C. District Justice Visitation:

The District Justice requested that visitations be planned at such times as will serve some real service to the Chapter, and in Chapter affairs by assigning attend meetings or other affairs


