# Senator Norris Cotton Becomes Honorary Member

United States Senator Norris Cotton of New Hampshire has become an honorary member of Phi Alpha Delta. Senator Cotton was inducted into Roberts Chapter (Temple University) at the District XII Conclave in Washington February 25.

The ceremony was conducted by District XII Justice Donald R. Moore at the conclave banquet at the Shoreham Hotel. The oath was administered by Supreme Justice Anthony A. DiGrazia.

On hand to welcome the Senator into Roberts Chapter was its justice, Donald F. Copeland. He made the presentation of the honorary alumnus key.

"Old Monuments and New Boundaries" was the subject of an inspiring address by Senator Cotton following the ceremony. challenges of today, America must hold fast to those fundamental principles that made it great.

The twelve other members of the Senate who are P.A.D.'s sent messages of congratulations and welcome.

Born 60 years ago in the small farming community of Warren, New Hampshire, Senator Cotton mar school, and worked his way through Tilton School, Philips Exeter Academy and Wesleyan University.

His legal education he obtained at George Washington University Law School while working as secretary to Senator George H. Moses.

But his political career had already begun even before he became a lawyer. He was elected to the New Hampshire legislature at the age of 22. When only 24, he presided over his party's State convention and subsequently served as secretary of the State Committee. For 12 years he was county chairman has served on the Judiciary com-


served as delegate to two Republican national conventions.

His service from 1924 to 1928 as secretary to Senator Moses was followed by two terms as clerk of the New Hampshire State Senate.

For nearly 20 years he was engaged in active law practice in Concord and Lebanon, New Hampshire. He refers to himself as a "country lawyer" but was known as one of the leading trial lawyers in Northern New Hampshire. He served as prosecuting attorney for Grafton county for six years and also sat as Justice of the Municipal Court of Lebanon for four years.

In his later service (1943-1947) in the New Hampshire legislature, he was majority leader and chairman of the Judiciary committe and was Speaker of the House immediately before his election to Congress in 1946.

While a member of the House of Representatives, Senator Cotton served on the Committee on Agriculture for four years and on the influential Committee on Appropriations for a like period. He was elected to the United States Senate in 1954 to fill the unexpired term of the late Senator Charles W. Toby and reelected in 1956. In the Senate he has been a member of the Public Works, Government Operations and Finance committees. He was appointed by the Vice President in 1956 as one of two Senators to serve on the bipartisan Commission on Government Security. on Interstate and Foreign Commerce.

Particularly noteworthy have been two of Senator Cotton's activities in his service both in the House and in the Senate. The second year he was in Washington, he began sending regular reports to his constituents. He writes them himself. These newsletters are widely read by members of Congress and newspapermen, as well as by his constitutents. A national news magazine, referring to the columns Senator Cotton wrote for his home state papers, noted that he had "carved himself a special niche as the Congressional columnist with the deftest pen, a commentator with the true Will Rogers touch." His columns are often quoted nationally.

Another activity which has at tracted widespread attention and acclaim is what he calls his "office hours." Every non-election year he holds sessions in court houses, city halls and select-men's offices throughout New Hampshire, inviting his constitutents by notice in the public press to come to him if they require his asssistance in Washington and to give him their administration.

views on public questions. At his own expense, he takes his office staff with him to give prompt attention to case work.

Throughout his years of service as Congressman and Senator, his attendance on roll calls has been among the best in Congress. Dur. ing a recent session he missed only one vote out of 123.

Senator Cotton enjoys a de-served reputation as a public speaker. He is renowned as a story teller, with a vast fund of Lincolnesque stores.

#### Supreme Justice Reports on Visitations

Thursday: Feb. 16th, 1961

By air my wife, Nelle and I left Chicago for Dallas, Texas. That evening I met with Past Supreme Justice John Griffith and Supreme Historian Dee Brown Walker, with whom I discussed Endowment Fund, 1962 Convention, and District IV mat-

Friday: February 17th, 1961 Supreme Board convened at 4:30 p.m. and adjourned at 7:30 p.m. to attend reception of the District VIII Conclave.

Saturday: February 18th, 1961

Supreme Board convened at 9:00 a.m., adjourned at 12:30 for lunch and visit to S.M.U., reconvened at 2:30 p.m. and adjourned at 6:00 p.m. to attend District V Rushing banquet and initiation of former Congressman Edward Gossett, of Dallas, Texas, as an honorary member of Taney Chapter. The Board reconvened again at 9:30 p.m. and adjourned at 1:00 a.m. It is apparent that everyone present had time for nothing but work. All Board members, including National Placement Director Richard Loewe, attended the meeting.

Shortly I will appoint committees to consider and report on the following subjects:

Revision of Declaration of Purpose.

International Expansion.

Redistricting and National Field Representative.

Method of Electing Officers. I discussed with the Board my

intention to put the members of the Board of Tribunes to work, and all agreed that certain duties should be allocated to them.

The next Board meeting will be held in St. Louis, immediately following the A.B.A. convention.

Monday, Feb. 20th, 1961

Via rented auto, I drove to the Baylor University, Baylor Chapter, and arrived at 11:00 a.m. There I was met by Dan Mayfield, Justice of Baylor Chapter, and Brother Professor Angus S McSwain, Jr. I visited with members until 12:30. Unfortunately, I could not visit with the Dean as he was home ill. At 1:00 p.m. I had lunch with Professor Mc-Swain, the officers of Baylor Chapter and about fifteen of its members. Although this chapter was unable to attend the Conclave, as they are on the quarterly system, it is a fine healthy chapter. # Escape from Reds Leads To Law Career for Pads

Eleven years ago, a 16 year old Czechoslovakian hockey player defected from the hockey team and arrived in New York with \$5.00. Today, at 28, he is a promising young lawyer in Newton, Kansas, and a well known

speaker.

Brother Richard Frantisek Hrd. licka (he was initiated by Benson Chapter at Washburn University) was born in Prague in 1932. His father was Secretary-Treasurer of a large surgical instrument company and had been a professional soccer player. Young Richard belonged to the Boy Scouts and in 1947 had attended the Boy Scout International Jamboree in France, where he met two Americans, with whom he thereafter maintained correspondence. These two friends passed the hat for a transportation fund for young Dick Hrdlicka, and later were to become his benefactors.

When Russian domination came in 1948, it became unbearable for the freedom loving Czech schoolboy. Many of his classmates started disappearing and leaving for other places. The communists decided that they would take a national amateur hockey team to a meet in Paris, and young Hrdlicka was

selected to go.

He tells the story of how, when he arrived in France, he was one of the first ones off the plane. "I was standing at the bottom of the steps and I had the precious passport in my hand. A large crowd of passangers who had just gotten off two other planes swarmed past me. I melted into the crowd and walked with them into the terminal. Then I ran as Wes Santee never ran." He made his way to a small refugee hotel on the outskirts of Paris. "The next morning," he said, "I got up early. The team had been scheduled to play France the night before but I couldn't stand the suspense. I had to know how the team made out. I slipped down to the corner and bought a newspaper. There on the front page was the headline, "13 OUT OF 19 CZECH HOCKEY PLAYERS DISAPPEAR IN PARIS." There had been no game."

When he arrived in Wichita, Kansas, he was not only broke but already \$600.00 in debt for his airplane passage to America. The only certainty that awaited him was guaranteed tuition at Friends' University. At that time he was 16½ years old.

Today, Dick Hrdlicka is a personable, resonant voiced, thoroughly American young man. He has the bright, confident looks of one who is going places. He is a naturalized citizen now, with a two year stint in the United States Army behind him. He is a rising lawyer in the Spier, Stroberg & Size-

He has recently celebrated the second anniversary of his marriage, and has made a reputa-tion as a speaker of eloquence. In fact, he recently addressed a gathering of 1,000 midwestern Republicans.

Many will wonder how this friendly young man has traveled so far so quickly. He explains it this way. "This may sound trite, but the opportunities that have come to me could only have happened in America. I can't say enough for the generosity and helpfulness of the American people."

On his desk there stands a small, gold framed inscription propped against the stack of law books. The title is, "My Creed." The author, Dean Alfange, a New York attorney. It reads in

"I do not choose to be a common man. It is my right to be uncommon—if I can.

"I seek opportunity-not se-

curity. I do not wish to be a kept citizen, humbled and dulled by having the State look after me. I want to take the calculated risk to dream and to build, to fail and to succeed. All this is what it means to be an American."

At Washburn University Law School, he was Vice Justice of Benson Chapter of PAD, and Vice President of the Student Bar Association.







Justice Clark was admitted to the Texas bar in 1922 and was engaged in private practice for five years in Dallas, Texas. He subsequently became Cicil District Attorney of Dallis County, and was a special assistant to the Attorney General assigned to the Anti-Trust Division in the Department of Justice in 1938. He later became Chief of the West Coast offices and Chief of the War Frauds Unit of the Department of Justice. From 1945 to 1949 he served as Attorney General of the United States and was appointed to the United States Supreme Court in August of 1949.

Justice Clerk served with the 153rd Infantry of the United States Army in World War I. He is a men ber of the American, Texas, Dallas and Federal Bar Associations as well as the American Legion, Delta Thau Delta, the Presbyterian Church and Masonic Lodge and International Press Club.

Justice Clark has the distinction of having the PAD chapter at the University of Texas School of Law named after him.
