





Cooper to U.S. District Court

Brother Irving Ben Cooper, Chief Justice of the Court of Special Sessions of the City of New York, has been appointed to the United States District Court by President John F. Kennedy.

Judge Cooper served as Administrative Head of the Court of Special Sessons for nine years up to his retirement on March 1, 1960. This court is one of the largest Criminal Courts in the world with jurisdiction over persons 16 years old. In 1959 approximately 74,000 defendants came before this court.

Judge Cooper has also served as City Magistrate of the City of New York, Special Counsel for the Department of Investigation of the City of New York, Counsel for the United States Senate Banking and Currency Committee, and Associate Counsel for the Ambulance Chasing Investi-

He holds memberships in the American Bar Association, Association of the Bar of the City of New York, New York County Lawyers' Association, New York State Bar Association, and American Judicature Society.








Plummer New Alaska Dist. Court Judge

His memberships include: Nebraska, Alaska, American and Federal Bar Associations and the American Judicature Society.





Brother Holleman, a former Clerk and Treasurer of the Seattle Alumni Chapter, has served as Justice for four consecutive terms.



Coke Chapter Sets Pace

Coke Chapter at the University of Toledo has established a record in being the youngest chapter to ever place in the National Outstanding Chapter Competition. It was only chartered in 1960 and has been awarded second place in the competition.

The question which comes to mind immediately is: How does a chapter in existence for only two years capture such an honor. There is an old saying "if you want something done give it to the busiest person you know to do it." Since the Spring of 1960 when the Sir Edward was founded its men have been extremely active.

In the Fall of 1960 the chapter sponsored a reception for the entering students to acquaint them with the school and the study of law. Soon after the start of school a Student Directory was published by the chapter presenting an up-to-date listing of faculty student and administrative personnel. To further assist the student in note taking and brief preparation a recommended list of abbreviations was prepared and distributed. September also saw the beginning of the Chapter Professional meetings, the first highlighted by Judge Harvey Straub, of the Lucas County Court of Common Pleas, speaking about his problems and experiences on the bench.

In October Judge Robert Franklin, of the Toledo Municipal

Court trial presented by the Chapter for the student body.

The fall also brought with it the creation of the P.A.D. Wives Club, an organization of wives formed to assist the active chapter and to better acquaint the wives with the law school and the problems of the student. This group is one of the key factors in the chapter's success.




