Dale attended the University of Tennessee, where he attained a BS degree in 1955, and his LL B in 1956.

Dale was formerly associated with the law firm of Watkins, McGugin and Stewart, in Nashville, and later became Associate Counsel with the Department of Public Welfare and presently is Assistant Counsel for the Department of Insurance and Banking







FBI Offers Placement **Opportunities** J. Edgar Hoover, Director,

Federal Bureau of Investigation, has announced that the FBI is interested in accepting applications for the Special Agent position. Applications will be accepted from male citizens of the United States between the ages of 25 and 40. Applicants must be at least five feet, seven inches without shoes and must have uncorrected vision of not less than 20/40 (snellen) in one eye, and at least 20/20 in each eye corrected. Aplicants must be graduates of state-accredited resident law schools and also possess at least an Associate in Arts degree or its educational ehuivalent from a resident college.

The entrance salary is \$6.996.00 per annum and additional compensation may be earned for overtime. Agents are paid their regular salary while attending a training school for 13 to 16 weeks. New Agents training schools are scheduled from time

Applicants must be willing to serve in any part of the United States or its territorial possessions in which it is determined that their services are required.

Persons interested in applying for the position of Special Agent may communicate with the Special Agent in Charge of the nearest office of the FBI in the United States for further information.

Brandeis Chapter Installed in D. C.





Dudley Warner Woodbridge, Dean of the Marshall-Wythe School of Law at the College of William & Mary, in Williamsburg, Virginia. has been elected to the Hall of Fame in the category of Legal Education. Dean Woodbridge is a member of Magruder Chapter at the University of Illinois and also Wythe Chapter at the College of Law where he is presently serving as Dean.

Dean Woodbridge's law career has been long and varied. After receiving his J.D. degree at the University of Illinois in 1927. he joined the faculty of the College of William & Mary. In 1929 he was admitted to the Virginia State Bar and he is presently also a member of the American Bar Association. 
