THE PAD INITIATION FEE

During the current school year, over 1,500 law students will become members of Phi Alpha Delta. Each of these new members will pay an initiation fee to the Supreme Chapter of \$25.00. Over the years we have had inquiries as to what use is made of the initiation fee, and it was felt that an article explaining its use would be of great interest to the membership.

Usually, the first physical evidence of a return for one's initiation fee is the membership certificate which is received a short time after the initiation takes place. This membership certificate is prepared by the official jeweler of the fraternity, L. G. Balfour Co., and costs the Supereme Chapter \$2.50.

PAD sponsors annual meetings of the active and alumni chapters in each District, which are called District Conclaves. \$2.00 of each initiation fee is returned to the districts for the holding of these Conclaves.

Immediately upon his initia-tion each member receives a lifetime subscription to The Reporter, the fraternity's official publication. No extra charge or subscription fee is made for this. This is not the case with the other major law fraternities, for each of them charges an annual subscription fee. Thus, PAD sends some 36,000 copies of each issue to all of its members. The other major law fraternities only mail to subscribers and thus mail slightly less than 10,000 copies each issue. The cost of publication and mailing of The Reporter currently involves an annual expenditure of approximately \$6,000.00.

The fraternity periodically publishes a Professional Directory which has been acclaimed by many as the finest of its kind. The Directory is published every six years and is periodically supplemented to keep it current and up to date. Through the Direc-tory a tremendous amount of business is referred from one PAD to another across the country from day to day and, of course, to the young attorney just starting in practice this is a very distinct advantage. The Directory has both an alphabetical and geographical section and is, to your editor's knowledge, the only law fraternity Directory which lists, in addition to the name and address of the individual the date of his admission to the bar and type of practice in which he engages. PAD is the only major law fraternity which issues a supplement to its Directory. The 1960 Directory only recently was published at a total cost of approximately \$26,000. 90th Active Chapter Charter Granted to U. of San Diego









In presenting Dean Landis for hnorary membership, Brother Moore hailed him as "a man whose name is already written large in the annals of legal education, the profession of law and public service." He pointed out that "bestowal of honorary membership in an organization such as ours involves a re-ciprocal interaction." He said that the fraternity was con-ferring an honor upon Dean Landis in recognition of his record of devoted service to the law and to government under law and that at the same time, Dean Landis was honoring the fra-ternity by joining with its membership in its program of service to legal education and to the legal profession. He expressed confidence that it will be a mutually beneficial relationship

Brother Moore then gave a brief biographical sketch of Dean Landis, highlights of

Dean Landis was born September 25, 1899 in Tokyo, Japan, the son of a Presbyterian missionary, and spent his early years in the Orient. At the age of thirteen, he was sent to the United States to attend Mercersburg Academy, where he grad-uated in 1916. He enrolled at Princeton University and led the class of 1921. He interrupted his career at Princton to serve the British Y.M.C.A. in World War I, returning later for his degree.

Awarded a scholarship by Harvard Law School, young Landis graduated at the head of his class, attaining the highest rating since Mr. Justice Brandeis. It was not surprising that Mr. Justice Brandeis chose Landis, in 1924, as Harvard Law School's "Man of the Year" to serve as his law clerk. After a year in that capacity, he returned to Harvard Law School to teach and became a full professor at the age of 29.

Mr. Landis' governmental service began in 1933, when he was called to Washington, at he behest of profess Frankfurter, to draft the Security Exchange Regulations. He was instrumental in writing the major portion of the Security Exchange Act of 1933 and became one of its administrators, first as a member of the Federal Trade Commission and later as chairman of the newly created Securities and Exchange Commission.

After four years in Washington, Mr. Landis returned to Harvard as Dean of the Law School, succeeding Roscoe Pound. He held this post until 1946, but his activities in government did not cease. During these years he was a member of the National Power Policy Commission; a

gency Board on the National Frankfurter, 1927; "Cases on Railway strike; special Trial Labor Law," 1934 and 1942; "The Examiner of the U. S. Depart-Administrative Process," 1938; ment of Labor; a consultant to the Council of National Defense and to the War Department; Regional Director and later Director of the United States office of Civilian Defense; Director of American Economic Operations and Minister to the Middle East. Subsequently he became chairman of the Civil Aeronautics Board and Chairman of the President's special board on Air Safety.

Dean Landis is also distinguished as an author. His books include

Against this background, it was not surprising that President Kennedy appointed Dean Landis as a special Whitehouse Assistant to help the administrative agencies achieve the potential envisioned for them. 

A Book Review:

BROADCASTING AND GOVERNMENT:

Responsibilities and Regulations

By Walter B. Emery

(Michigan State University Press, East Lansing)

Brother Walter B. Emery, a member of Harlan Chapter at the University of Oklahoma, has recently published a book which represents an important contribution to the field of broadcasting and government.

Communications have come a long way since Marconi thrilled the world more than a half century ago by sending radio signals across the Atlantic. Without the farflung telegraph, telephone and broadcasting facilities of today, the intricate pattern of modern civilization would be impossible.

A glimpse at the current di-mensions of these media indicates the indispensable part they have come to play in American life. Western Union operates more than four million miles of telegraph circuits. The Bell system has more than 70 million telephones. It is estimated that Americans used the telephone more han one hundred billion times last year.

There are almost 5,000 radio and television stations in this country broadcasting programs to the general public. We have more than 200 million receivers, almost two-thirds of the world's total.

As important as public broadcasting has come to be, quanti-tatively, it is only a small part of the total radio picture. For every station transmitting programs to the general public, there are more than seventy-five others being used for a wide variety of other purposes - to facilitate transportation, to aid scientific research in many areas, to serve public functions of many kinds such as police and fire protection, to mention only a few. In fact, there are more than two million radio stations of various types authorized to operate in this country.

These various radio and television facilities, as well as the huge telegraph and telephone industries, are so vital to the security and well being of our people, it is unthinkable that they could be carried on effectively without some governmental regulation. The FCC is charged with the responsibility of providing this regulation and has established a multiplicity of policies and rules governing these communication media. The President, Congress, the Federal Trade Commission and other federal agencies, as well as some authorities at state and local levels, also exercise functions which influence their operations.

This book, as no other has attempted, explains the role of these agencies in the control of wire and radio communication, particularly broadcasting, and presents in an orderly and intelligible fashion the important policies and regulations that govern these media.

The work is divided into six major parts. Part I discusses the primary technological, economic and social factors which led to the creation of the FCC and the American system of broadcasting, combining enterprise and limited governmental controls. Part II defines the statutory powers and functions of the FCC and describes its organization and tive machinery. A look is also taken at other agencies of government at federal, state and local levels which exercise regulatory functions that impinge on broadcasting.

Part III is concerned with the broadcast spectrum, its character and utility for communication, and the technical rules which govern the allocation of radio frequencies and their uses by the various classes of stations as prescribed by the FCC-Standard (AM), Frequency Modulation | ment Auxiliary, Experimental (FM), Television, International, and others.

mental requirements which must be met to get a license, responsibilities which must be assumed and conduct which must be avoided if one is to keep a license.

Part VI analyzes some of the current problems of broadcast regulations and suggests clarifying legislation and other remedial measures to make it more effective.

The book is an outgrowth of the author's experience and research over a period of twentyfive years. It not only presents and analyzes governmental policies and regulations, but provides a great amount of documented history explaining how the more important ones developed, both from the legislative and administrative points of view.

The reader will find the Appendices especially informative. The Communications Act of 1934, including the 1960 amendments, a detailed and documented chronology of the FCC plus biographical data and character studies of present commissioners and all former chairmen, CON-ELRAD regulations, Federal Trade Commission guides for advertising, recent policy state-ments of the FCC with respect to programming, the recently re-vised radio and TV codes of the casters-this and other material is reproduced for easy reference

Walter B. Emery is a professor in the Television and Radio Department of Michigan State University. He has been a student of broadcasting and government for more than twenty-five years. He was the manager of an educational station and a program producer on commercial stations during the early days of radioa period about which he writes in the first part of his book.

After completing a law degree at the University of Oklahoma in 1934, he went to Washington during the first Roosevelt administration and worked for a time on the legal staff of the then newly created FCC. This was followed by four years of teaching at the University of Wisconsin.

After holding professorships at the University of Oklahoma and Ohio State University, he re-turned to the FCC in 1943, where he served successively as attorney, examiner, Chief of the Renewals and Revocation Section, and Legal Assistant to former Chairman Paul A. Walker. 1952 he left the government and for five years was employed as a general consultant by the Joint Council on Educational Television, after which he went to his present position in Michigan State University in 1957.

The author is a member of the Oklahoma Bar, and is licensed to practice before the FCC, the United States District Court, the U. S. Court of Appeals for the District, and the U. S. Supreme Court. He has been a frequent contributor over the past fifteen years to educational journals, writing on subjects mainly concerned with the broadcast media.



alumni who are in good standing.

The Supreme Chapter holds a national convention every two years, which is attended by delegates from all active and alumni chapters. A considerable portion of the fraternity's revenue is appropriated for this convention. For example, \$26,000 was paid for the 1960 convention. It is interesting to note that we are the only law fraternity which pays the full expenses of active chapter delegates, including round trip railroad fares, subsistence and hotel accommodations.

Of course, the initiation fee also helps to sustain the National Executive Office. The functions of the Executive Office are extremely varied. 
part time clerk, one part time stenographer and the Executive Secretary.

An item in the fraternity's budget which is of considerable moment is that of chapter supplies. Pledge questionnaires, ititiation reports, rushing booklets, match bookcovers, identification badges, membership cards, Constitutions and By-Laws, and many other forms are supplied to the chapters at no charge.

The fraternity, of course, sustains many other functions which cost money, such as re-ceptions for members attending the annual American Bar Convention and the American Association of Law Schools, and a series of awards for outstanding PAD chapters, etc.

Only recently the fraternity has developed a life insurance program and a disability income insurance program which are offered to members at rates substantially below those prevailing on today's market. The savings in one year's premiums on either of these programs more than pays for one's initiation fee in PAD.

None of the elective officers of the fraternity receive any monetary compensation whatsoever. In fact only one member of the fraternity receives any compensation at all and he is the Executive Secretary. At the present time we have seven men who comprise the Supreme Executive Board. These men believe so strongly in the pur-poses, principles, ideals and benefits of PAD that they collectively sacrifice literally thousands of dollars worth of their time annually for the opportunity of serving as national of-ficers of PAD. These men are of the highest caliber and enjoy the highest regard of their fellow attorneys. If they had joined PAD only for the material benefits which might be theirs while attending law school, they would have ceased their active partici-

pation in fraternity activities many, many years ago.

If one considers membership in PAD only for the benefits which it can offer while in law school, he is overlooking the greatest advantages of a professional fraternity. The friendships and associations which are formed in law school will endure through one's professional career. Many law students who will consider membership in PAD are members of social fraternities. While I treasure my membership in my social fra-ternity, I can honestly say that it does not offer me any bene-fits which can even compare with those which are mine through PAD and I believe that you will agree that the same is true of all social fraternities. However, I know of few, if any, social fraternities, whose national initiation fee is anywhere near as low as that of PAD.

In an address before a District Conclave, our Supreme Treasurer, Robert E. Redding, stated that PAD can help one, as follows: "First of all, it offers practical


He was a former Assistant States' Attorney for 20 years and was a professor on the DePaul faculty for 47 years until he retired in 1956.
