


Douglas Lyman Edmonds, Past Supreme Justice of the fraternity (1948-1952) and retired Associate Justice of the California Supreme Court, was killed on May 10, 1962, when his car crashed into the rear of a truck on a freeway near Los Angeles, California. His wife, Gertrude, suffered severe injuries in the accident but is making a miraculous and steady recovery. Justice Edmonds apparently fell asleep at the wheel of his car while returning to Los Angeles

in the late afternoon. Death was instantaneous.

Born in Chicago, Justice Edmonds attended public schools in Chicago, Denver and San Diego. He attended the University of Southern California Law School and was admitted to the practice of law in California in 1910.

In rapid succession he was appointed to the Municipal and Superior Courts of Los Angeles and was the first Justice in California to be appointed to the Supreme Court from a trial court. Attaining this distinction in 1936, he served on the Su-preme Court until 1956 when he retired to enter into private practice and to accept the appointment to represent the United States on the International Law Commission in Geneva, Switzerland, which post he completed in 1961.

of California, he moved to San Francisco where he was known as Mr. PAD a title which later became nationwide. He was appointed District Justice and served in this capacity during the war years. Under his guidance the chapters at Stanford, Boalt Hall and Hastings were reactivated after the war and the chapter at University of San Francisco was initiated.

In 1946 at the Kansas City Convention, Douglas L. Edmonds, then a Justice of the Supreme Court in California, was recognized for his fraternal devotion and ability by being elected First Supreme Vice Justice. At-the 1948 Convention in Los Angeles he was elevated to the highest honor the fraternity can bestow by being selected its leader as Supreme Justice.

A leader was Justice Edmonds in every sense of he word. With only 47 active chapters represented at the 1948 Convention, with a treasury depleted to a deficit balance, and with innumerable problems facing the fraternity, he started his program of not just rebuilding but also of substantial progress.

The Reporter was published at regular intervals; a new Directory was published and through his efforts and persuasion at a cost far below the next nearest bid, a complete audit was made by a national firm at no cost to the fraternity; alumni support was solicited and successfully received in the way of dues; chapters were reactivated at an amazing rate; new chapters were installed; a traveling secretary was retained by the fraternity; a program of legal aid was instituted; and recognition of our fraternity in the highest legal ments became realities under his leadership. His ability to secure cooperation, support and activity from his fellow officers and brothers made him the leader who attained the national status of Mr. PAD.

Then for the second time in the history of the fraternity and after a span of 40 years, a Supreme Justice was re-elected to office. At the French Lick Convention in 1950, Douglas L. Edmonds was retained in office, not solely for what he had done not only as a recognition, but also because his dynamic program was under way, firm foundations were being established and the future of Phi Alpha Delta as the leading law fraternity was being assured. He was needed to again head the fraternity and he answered the

What he has done as a member and officer in this Fraternity, not even time itself can strike off from the living memories of his fellow brothers.

Edmonds, Supreme Justice from 1948 to 1952. I have asked our Past Executive and Supreme Secretary, Frank Gray, to write a special article in memory of Brother Edmonds. On behalf of all the members of our Fraternity, I extend our sincere sympathy to Mrs. Edmonds and her family. I first met Judge Edmonds at the convention in 1950, and at once saw what a sincere interest he had in PAD, and his aim was to make it the best professional legal fraternity in the world. Mrs. Edmonds expressed a desire that flowers be omitted and in lieu thereof to make contributions to the PAD Endowment Fund.

All members in our fraternity should be proud of the fact that through their generous contri-butions, small and large, many loans have been made through the Endowment Fund to our student members so that they could continue their education, and I wish to take this op-portunity to thank the many alumni that participated directly by making their contributions to the Endowment Fund, or indirectly by taking out Life or Disability Insurance to help this worthy project.

Not even Donovan's wife knew that he was in Berlin. He said that "the nature of my practice requires me to go to Europe once a year. So in an ordinary way I laid out a trip to London and made ordinary arrangements by commercial airline. Then just before leaving London I sent a cable to my wife that I was going up to Scotland for a vacation. I actually went to an RAF base near London, then flew to Berlin." Mrs. Donovan first learned of her husband's trip to Berlin and the spy exchange when the Associated Press called her at 3:00 o'clock one morning. By that time Donovan and Powers were returning home.

# **PAD Becomes First Fraternity** At Cal Western

There's certainly no doubt but that PAD is first in San Diego. A few years ago PAD became the first law fraternity to establish an alumni chapter in that fast growing area with the chartering of the San Diego Alumni Chapter. In 1961, the Paul McCormick Chapter

at the University of San Diego School of Law became the first law fraternity chapter to be installed at that law school. Now PAD has established the first law fraternity at the California Western School of Law with the chartering of the Campbell E. Beaumont Chapter on April 13. 1962.

The law school came into existence in 1958, and shortly thereafter a colonization group was formed for the express purpose of petitioning Phi Alpha Delta for an active chapter charter when the school became approved by the American Bar Association. Approval came this past spring and procedures were immediately placed into operation to effect the installation of the chapter.

The members of the San Diego Alumni Chapter sparkplugged the formation of the new chapter and richly deserve plaudits for a job most well done.

The initiation took place in the beautiful new moot court room of the California Western Law School overlooking the Blue Pacific. McCormick Chapter at the University of San Diego furnished the initiation team which was headed by Chapter Justice Tony Piazza. Others takpart in the initiation were Supreme Justice Anthony A. # John M. Court Wins \$7500 Award




