Prominent PADs Feature District VIII Conclave

The District VIII Conclave was held February 8 and 9, 1963, in Waco, Texas, with Baylor Chapter at Baylor University serving as host. Student District Justice H. Wayne Gillies performed a miraculous job of arranging and coordinating the events. Taking an active part in the Conclave were the Hon. Tom C. Clark, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, Hon. Alfred P. Murrah, Supreme Justice of PAD, and Chief Judge of the

Tenth U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals; Winthrop Rockefeller, and Dean William J. Boswell. As guests were Texas Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert and Associate Justices Meade F. Griffin, Ruel C. Walker, James R. Norvell, Robert W. Hamilton and Zolie Steakley, together with Presiding Justice of Texas Court of Criminal Appeals K. K. Woodley and Judges W. A. Morrison and W. T. MacDonald. Other Judges in attendance were Frank Wilson and Jake Tirey.

The Conclave got under way on Friday, February 8, with registration in the law school at Baylor. Immediately thereafter, the delegates were driven to the hotel to check in and get ready for the evening's events, which included a cocktail party, at Ridgewood Country Club, and a banquet at the Baylor University Student Union Drawing Room.

Several hundred local attorneys, PADs and their wives, greeted Justice Clark, Supreme Justice Murrah and the other notables at the country club reception. Also greeting guests were Student District Justice H. Wayne Gillies, Conclave hostess Nancy Redmon, and David Kultgen, President of the Waco Bar Association.

Police escort ushered delegates and guests from the hotel to the club and returned them to the School Union Building where they heard Justice Clark speak on "Modernization of the Judicial System." He told of the success some states were having with Conciliation Courts for divorce cases, and how 68% of the marriages were saved in one particular locality. He advocated more improvement in the judicial handling of juveniles and other problems of the courts in the large cities. Justice Clark, only Texas attorney ever to be mamed to the nation's highest court, explained briefly the work of a Judicial Committee he heads and how it is holding conferences throughout the nation, advocating the modernization of the judicial organizations.

"Judges cannot administer justice unless they have the tools with which to work," Clark said. Clark is Chairman of a Committee doing a three year study of judicial administration in the United States. The study, which has been under way for one year, has been conducted in eight states. "In the eight states where we have held meetings, the states have modernized judicial structures so the judges would have something with which to work," Clark stated.

Justice Clark also said that the large number of cases coming before the Supreme Court prevent the Justices from spending

sufficient time studying each case.

On Saturday, the Conclave opened with a business session at 8:15 A.M., at which time Supreme Justice Murrah addressed the delegates on the history of the fraternity, the responsibilities of members and the relationship that must be effected between the national organiza-tion and the local chapters. Later that morning, a coffee hour was held honoring Justice Fom Clark and Supreme Justice Murrah. Over 200 people attended the event. Greeting those attending, in the reception line in addition to Justices Murrah and Clark, were Student District Justice H. Wayne Gillies, Vice Justice Landon Winstead, Baylor Chapter Justice Mike Liles, and Baylor Law School Dean William J. Boswell. Conclave Hostess Nancy Redmon and members of the Baylor Law Wives' Club served, while a string quartet from the Baylor School of Music provided background music. (Turn to Page 6)

Among the members of the reactivation group are many law school leaders and students who rank high scholastically. Rutledge Chapter was originally chartered at Duke University on October 2, 1946, and was named for the late Wiley Rutledge, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court. Probably the most famous alumnus member of the chapter is former Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Chase Chapter Tops U. of Cincinnati

William Foss Hopkins, leading Cincinnati criminal attorney and alumnus of Chase Chaper of P. A. D., the University of Cincinnati College of Law, highlighted that chapter's rush pro-gram with a discussion of the need for trained criminal attorneys in the modern administration of criminal law at Chase Chapter's closing rush party of the 1962 season.

Mr. Hopkins cited two causes for the lack of qualified criminal practitioners: (1) That most law schools play down the im-portance of criminal law in the profession, and (2) that the public and the press have created an aura of "dirtiness" associated with the criminal attorney.

Mr. Hopkins also stressed his belief that there is never any justification for society to use the penalty of capital punishment. "What society cannot give, it should never take away," he

Mr. Hopkins illustrated his discussion with personal experiences gleaned from a long career in the field. He closed his talk with an open invitation to all PAD's to visit him at his office or in court for an inside view of a criminal attorney's

35 Pledged

Chase chaper, one of two legal fraternities at the University of Cincinnati, finished its most successful rush season in the past decade by pledging 35 men from a class of 47. On the national level, Harold G. Maier, member of Chase Chapter and Editor-in-Chief of the Cincinnati Law Review placed as one of three finalists in a competition sponsored by the national fraternity to select a law clerk to serve under Su-preme Court Justice Tom C. Clark, a PAD alumnus.

Members of Chase Chapter have made exceptional progress in extra-curricular activities. The Editor-in-Chief and both asso-ciate editors of the Cincinnati Law Review are PAD's, as well as three members of the Board of Editors and seven out of 13 junior contributors.

PAD's dominate Cincinnati's Student Court, a three judge, two circuit tribunal with universitywide jurisdiction over student traffic offenses, identification card violations and constitutional questions arising under the University of Cincinnati Student Council constitution. Five of the court's seven justices are PAD's as well as all seven defense counsel and the Court's chief prosecutor.

PAD's also serve as Vice-President and Secretary of the Student Bar Association and hold five out of six positions on the Law School's Honor Council. In addition Chase Chapter claims both the President and Secretary-Treasurer of the Senior Class and Vice-President of the Freshman Class. One of the three members of Cincinnati's National Moot Court team is a PAD.

The competition for the award is open to all students of the School of Law and is not limited to fraternity members. The fraternity hopes, by this award, to give deserving recognition to those students who, throughout the years, give so much of their time and leadership to the betterment of student activties and funcions, while at the same time maintaining good scholastic standing.

The judging for the award will be done by a panel of faculty members and student leaders from all student organizations.

PADs scored heavily in the many contests for governor, United States Senate and House of Representatives last November. Newly elected Governor of New Mexico is Jack M. Campbell, a member of Benson Chapter at Washburn University. Brother Campbell has served four terms in the State House of Representatives and was Speaker of the House in 1961 and 1962. Joining him as a newly elected Governor is Brother John W. Reynolds of Wisconsin. Governor Reynolds is a member of Ryan Chapter at the University of Wisconsin. He is a former United States Commissioner for the Eastern District of Wisconsin and a former District Director of the Office of Price Stabilization. He served the State of Wisconsin as its Attorney General for two terms from 1958 to 1962.

Two other PADs were reelected to the highest post in their respective states, Robert E. Smylie of Idaho and Frank Morrison of Nebraska.

New PAD members of Congress include Edward M. "Ted" Kennedy, a member of Jefferson Chapter at the University of Virginia, Claude Pepper of Florida, Joe Pool of Texas, and Carl W. Rich of Ohio. Pepper has previously served 14 years in the United States Senate.





WINTHROP ROCKEFELLER addressing evening session at District VIII Conclave.





Later that morning, the representatives from the District VIII chapters went to the airport to greet Winthrop Rockefeller, from Arkansas, who spoke at the luncheon in the Union Building. He described our time as part of a "cold and changing world." He cited two quotations to confirm this. "There has been more knowledge as to what we know of science since World War II than in the entire history of mankind," he said, quoting Eric Johnson, of Texas Instruments.

Then, from a Conference on Nuclear Energy, "50% of the boys and girls in school today will be holding jobs before htey reach retirement age that do not exist today."

Rockefeller said specific areas to think about were the ever expanding population, the change of communications, the attitude of responsibility in reviewing revolutions, employment, the question of politics and our culture and education.

Later that afternoon the Conclave continued with the business meeting, which saw fraternity rushing discussed by delegates from Southern Methodist Law School, fraternity fund raising discussed by delegates from the University of Texas, and fraternity public relations discussed by Baylor Chapter delegates. District VIII Justice Robert E. Lee and Supreme Treasurer Dee Brown Walker presided.

Huckaby, University of Oklahoma; Vice Justice, John Crews, University of Texas; Marshal, Pete Baker, Southern Methodist University; Clerk, Paul Lyle, Baylor University; Treasurer, Ernest A. PSJ Rex Hardy Passes

Brother Rex Hardy, Supreme Justice of the fraternity from 1925 to 1927, passed away on November 24, 1962. He had only recently retired from the Los Angeles Superior Court Bench and was living with his wife, Dorothy, at Three Rivers in Tulare County, California.

Brother Hardy was a much decorated veteran of both world wars and has served as senior assistant city attorney of Los Angeles and as a member of the California Public Utilities Commission before his appointment to the bench in 1958. In 1917 he enlisted in the Army as a private and was discharged as a major of infantry. After the attack on Pearl Harbor he again volunteered for service and served overseas as a colonel in the General Staff Corps of the Army.

He was in charge of the collection, maintenance and repatriation of hundreds of thousands of displaced persons in the U.S. military sector in Europe.

He was awarded the U.S. Victory Medal for both wars, the U.S. Legion of Merit and the Bronze Star. He also received decorations from France, Italy and Luxemburg.

The "old line" professionals present were as attentive as the first semester students, for these areas of Supreme Court practice and procedure are seldom if ever discussed by one of its members.



The featured speaker was Matthew S. "Sandy" Rae, the Justice of District III. Sandy welcomed the new chapter and made the presentation of its charter.


