# Justice Arthur J. Goldberg **Becomes Honorary Member**

Honorary Membership in Phi Alpha Delta has been conferred on the newest Associate Justice of the United

States Supreme Court, the Honorable Arthur J. Goldberg.
In the presence of five other Supreme Court Justices,
three of them also PAD's, Mr. Justice Goldberg was inducted into the fraternity by the Louis D. Brandeis Chapter at the American University's Washington College of Law. The ceremony took place at a banquet, March 23, at the Mayflower Hotel in Washington, D. C. Nearly 200 active and alumni brothers and their ladies attended.

Mr. Justice Goldberg was presented to the group by Associate Justice Tom C. Clark. The initiation ceremony was conducted by Brandeis Chapter Justice John O. Harper, who presented the honorary alumnus key and a framed membership certificate to the initiate.

The Honorable Brooks Hays. Special Assistant to the President was toastmaster and more than lived up to his reputation as one of the capital's top humorists.

Besides Mr. Justice Clark, other PAD's on hand from the Supreme Court were Associate Justices William O. Douglas and Harold H. Burton (retired). Joining them at the head table were Associate Justices Hugo L. Black and Stanley F. Reed (retired).

Responding to the bestowal of honorary membership, Mr. Justice Goldberg took as his theme the importance or our having, "the courage of our own constitutional convictions."

If we are to lead the free world, or even survive as a nation, he said, we must have a "good society" here at home. Our survival ultimately will depend on the kind of law and the system of government we have, he

Calling for an amalgamation of "what we profess and what we practice," he hailed the great legal principles that under-gird ring opinion in Whitney vs. Calthis country. "This is our strength," he declared—"the type (1927): of country we are."

Military security is not enough to meet the challenge of today's troubled world, the Justice continued. "If we rely on armor alone and ignore the things of the spirit, then we are poorly armed indeed."

The "good society" that is America, the "normal quality" implicit in it—this is our great- piness and courage to be the est export, he asserted; this is the basis of our competition with that the greatest menace to freethe Soviet Union.

For our way of life to survive, according to Mr. Justice Goldberg, we must solve such current problems as unemployment. schools and the care of the elderly.

But even more important is the question of the kind of law government we have, he stated. It was here that he urged the audience to have courage of our Constitutional Convictions to put into practice the great legal principles that underlie this country—these include, he said, the right of habeas corpus; chairman for the banquet and equality before the law; due

process-especially the presumption of innocence and the right to trial by peers; such individual rights as freedom of speech, vote, and belief; and the corollary right of privacy for individual and family, with government authority limited.

"This is what we are committed to," he declared, "but we need to put our own house in order in these fields" before we can bring about a world rule of

Although the course "is not a straight course, and has many turns and detours," he said, "the tradition is straight and true."

Mr. Justice Goldberg took note that the chapter he was joining was named for Mr. Justice Brandeis. He pointed out that the judicial philosophy of Brandeis with his view of the law "as an instrument of social policy" was especially relevant to the subject under discussion.

The new initiate praised Brandeis as "inquiring, not inquisitive; dignified, not stiff;" and though a rebel, not a rebel simply for the sake of being a rebel."

The philisophy of Brandeis is exemplified, the speaker said, in these excerpts from his concur-

"Those who won our independence believed that the final end of the state was to make men free to develop their faculties; and that in its government the deliberative forces should permit over the arbitrary. They valued liberty both as an end and as a means. They believed liberty to be the secret of hapsecret of liberty. They believed dom is inert people. They recognized the risks to which all human institutions are subject. But they knew that order cannot be secured merely through fear of punishment for its infraction; that fear breeds repression; that repression breeds hate; that hate menaces stable governments.

Those who won our independence revolution were not cowards. They did not fear political change. They did not exalt order at the cost of liberty."

# Moves Ahead

Reese Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta at the University of Nebraska is on the march again! When eight energetic law students found themselves dissatis-fied with the legal fraternity system at Nebraska University's College of Law in the fall of 1960 (for PAD had become inactive there six years earlier) they undertook the task of re-organizing and reinstating the present chapter. Their aim was to make Reese chapter an example of the fraternity leadership and professional ability which Phi Alpha Delta repre-

It was due to discontent with the other two legal organizations then existing at Nebraska that brothers John Ilich, William Gourley, Larry Knox, Lyle Win-kle, Charles Rogers, Dennis Winkle, Don Fitch, and Herb Brugh decided it was time that PAD be restored to its former position of prominence at Nebraska. Their efforts, combined with active participation and assistence from Associate District Justice C. Glenn Lewis of Omaha, and a contribution of \$250 from alum Harold H. Schaaf of Lake Wales, Florida, culminated in an initiation ceremony presided over by Supreme Justice Tony DiGrazia on November 12, 1960.

Since then, Reese Chapter has continued to grow. From the initial membership of eight men at reactivation, the chapter has since more than doubled its size. Having initiated six new members in the spring of 1962, and four more just last fall, its plans include a second initiation for this school year, to take place some time in April.

The scholarship programs and calendar of professional-social functions of Reese Chapter seem characteristic of other PAD chapters. Its programs have included such topics as "How to Confer With a Client," "How to Handle the Investigation Aspect of a Case," and more recently, a study of the American jury system. Not ignoring the social events, Reese Chapter PAD's host special - event (such as Christmas, etc.) dinner-parties, chapter-alum stags, and plans in-clude a joint "venture" with

that our good Brother, the Hon. Tom C. Clark, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, has again agreed to select a law clerk from among the student members of our fraternity. The appointment will probably be made in October of this year and the person selected will begin his service in July of 1964.

Those interested in taking advantage of this outstanding op-portunity should utilize the following procedure:

1. Advise the Eexecutive Secretary of your intention to file an application, by July 1, 1963.

2. Submit an application in letter form, in quadruplicate, setting forth your qualifications for the position, including information regarding your extracurricular activities, such as Moot Court participation, Student Bar Association. Honor Councils, and particularly, Law experience.

3. Submit with the application an official transcript o' your law school record and a letter of recommendation from the Dean of your law school.

4. Attach to the letter application, in quadruplicate, as evidence of your ability in legal research and writing, any printed or typewritten manuscript of reasonable length, such as a note or case note previously written or being written for the school's Bar Review or other material submitted to other publications or professors.

5. Submit a 3 x 5 glossy print photograph of yourself.

6. All items must be received by the Executive Secretary no later than August 1, 1963.



Egan Chapter Installed

At Duquesne University

The John P. Egan Active Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta
was formally installed in ceremonies held on March 25,
1963 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The new chapter is located at Duquesne University School of Law.

The chapter was named for the late Judge John P. Egan. Judge Egan was graduated from the Duquesne University Law School and admitted to the Allepheny County Bar in 1915. He began the general practice of law and served as Secretary of the Duquesne University School of Law.

After serving in World War I' in France in 1918 and 1919 he returned to Pittsburgh and resumed his post on the faculty of the Law School.

Dean of the Duquesne University master of the banquet. Law School which office he filled until June, 1931. He was appointed by the governor, in 1931, to a vacancy on the Allegheny County Court of Common Pleas and was elected for a full term of ten years beginning January,

Judge Egan was re-elected to the Court of Common Pleas of Allegheny County in the November, 1941, elections and in the November, 1951, elections and served until his death in 1952.

He remained on the faculty of the School of Law at Duquesne University until June, 1948, when he resigned to accept the deanship of the law department of the Robert Morris School of Business in Pittsburgh.

The Duquesne University School of Law was founded in 1911, when by amendment of the charter, the Pittsburgh Cath-olic College of the Holy Ghost became Duquesne University.
The law school received its first class in September of that year and has had continuous existence since that time.

From 1911 through June 1958, the School of Law operated as an evening law school. Begin-ning in September, 1958, the School began operating both day and evening divisions. The School of Law is coeducational and the present enrollment in both day and evening classes numbers approximately 183 stu-

The initiation ceremonies were held in the Moot Court Room of the Duquesne University School of Law. Members of the Pittsburgh Alumni Chapter served as the initiating team.



the panel discussion, the delegates heard Dr. Frank Cleveland, Assistant Hamilton County Coroner and Director of the Deparment of Toxicology at the Kettering Laboratory in Cincinnati, speak on "Law and Medicine." Dr. Cleveland pointed out the many ways in which the Academy of Medicine attempts to aid the legal profession in malpractice claims involving doctors connected with the Academy. The current procedure followed is a panel of Academy doctors who review the evidence presented to them by an attorney representing a prospective litigant. If the panel finds evidence of malpractice, they recommend settlement to the doctor involved. In all such cases brought before them they recommend to the doctor and attorney what course of action should be followed, but their recommendations are not binding on either party.

At 11:30 A.M., the Ladies Program, directed by Mrs. Kenneth Segal, presented Miss Jean Stanton, a member of the legal staff of the Proctor and Gamble Company of Cincinnati, who spoke following the luncheon on "Law in Your Life." The ladies afternoon program consisted of bridge playing and shopping in downtown Cincinnati.

At 12:00 noon, the delegates luncheon featured the Honorable Otis R. Hess, Judge of the Hamilton County Court of Common Pleas, as speaker. #### Green Chapter Reactivated; Justice Whittaker Speaks

Green Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta reorganized this year after a two-year lapse of activity. The reorganization effort was initiated by a speech given to Phi Alpha Delta alums, KU faculty, and invited student guests by recently retired Supreme Court Justice Charles Evan Whittaker in December, 1962. Justice Whittaker spoke of the interaction of the members of the legal profession at the highest level of American law and drew analogies to the need of law students to take part in personal associations with the men and ideals of the profession.

Following the dinner with Justice Whittaker, students at KU, with the help of alumni from the Kansas City area, applied for reactivation of Green's charter. At the March dinner meeting of Green Chapter, Judge Walter A. Huxman, A KU alum and member of Phi Alpha Delta, spoke concerning the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure. Judge Huxman served as Governor of Kansas prior to his appointment to the Federal bench in 1939. Although he no longer tries cases, his services are still frequently requested as a factfinder and legal scholar by Chief Justice Warren. Speakers such as Judge Huxman who are highly qualified to speak on particular topics that relate both to philosophical issues and daily problems facing he legal profession will be heard at each monthly dinner meeting of Green Chapter.

On April 25, the speaker was Mr. John Gage, nationally known as the "clean-up mayor" of Kansas City. Thomas is a member of Houston Chapter at South Texas College of Laws.


#### Paul Dwyer Passes On


