### University of Houston Receives PAD Charter

A new chapter of Phi Alpha Delta has been formed at the University of Houston College of Law. The John E. Hickman Chapter was formally installed on Saturday, May 11, 1963 in Judge T. J. Stovall's 129th District Courtroom in the Harris County Civil Courts Building.

The chapter, after much thought, deemed it desirable to select as its names keep a man not colly received.

to select as its namesake a man not only prominent in American Jurisprudence but one who was particularly representative of the area in which the chapter originated and who was also a member of Phi Alpha Delta.

John E. Hickman was born in Liberty Hill, Texas in 1883. Having grown up in a predominately rural area, he was particularly aware of the educational needs of people in similar circum-stances. Attempting to satisfy this need, he began to teach in country schools, finally rising to the position of Principal of Lampassas High School in 1902. In 1908, he entered the Univer-sity of Texas College of Law, receiving his LLB, in 1910. Admitted to the Texas State Bar in 1910, he established a practice in Erath and Stephens Counties from 1911 to 1926. His judiciary potential was recognized by the people in 1926 when he was elected Associate Justice of the Texas Court of Civil Appeals becoming Chief Justice of that court in 1928. In 1935 he became Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas and in 1948 rose to Chief Justice. He had served as trustee of Southern Methodist University, trustee of Southwest-ern Legal Foundation and chair-man of the Conference of Chief Justices. He has also been honored with a L.L.D. at Southwest ern University and was a member of the State and American Bar Association, Phi Alpha Delta and the Philosophers Society of

The brothers realized that John E. Hickman set a standard in the profession and in his per-sonal life that all would do well to follow.

The new chapter becomes the third legal fraternity repre-sented at the University of Houston College of Law. The College of Law was organized in 1947 and has grown steadily to a current enrollment of 420.

The objectives of the College are to train students to practice law wherever the Anglo-American system of law prevails. The College of Law provides training in fundamental techniques required in the practice and administration of the law; it imparts to all students an understanding and appreciation of the high nature of the profession into which they are about to enter; it equips students to participate intelligently in the af ticipate intelligently in the affairs of their community, state and nation; and, it seeks to develop in students a sense of social balance, a respect for rights and privileges and an un-derstanding of the obligation such rights and privileges en-

The College of Law is headed by a dean and nine full time and eighteen part time faculty members. The students receive instruction in related courses in other colleges of the University.

### LSU Chapter Installed as 51 Initiated

One of the largest charter groups in the history of the fraternity, fifty-one in number, received an active chapter charter of Phi Alpha Delta last May at Louisiana State Univer-sity School of Law. The new chapter was named for Edward Douglass White, the only Louisianian ever to serve as Chief Justice of the United States Su-preme Court, The Chief Justice during his tenure with the Su-preme Court, became quite expert in matters of procedure and some very sophisticated decisions on why the court should or should not entertain a particu-lar case, on jurisdictional grounds.

The installation of the new chapter was presided over by Supreme Justice Alfred P. Murrah, Chief Judge of the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. The retirement of Past Supreme Justice of Phi Alpha Delta, Anthony P. Savarese, as Surrogate of Queens County, New York, was the occasion of a testimonial dinner tendered him recently by the New York Alumni Chapter, at the Forest Hills Inn, Forest Hills, New York City, N.Y.

Judge Savarese is nationally known and beloved. He was Supreme Justice from 1952 to 1954, having previously served as Supreme Treasurer from 1948 to 1952. His career in PAD started at New York University Law School when he was initiated into Rapallo Chapter back in 1921. Since that time he has served his fraternity, his profession and his country well.

PAD's indebtedness to his untiring devotion was recognized by the presence on the dais of Brothers Anthony Di Grazia, Past Supreme Justice, Brother Elden S. Magaw, Supreme Vice Justice, and Brother Robert E Redding, Second Supreme Vice Justice, who travelled, respec-tively, from Chicago, Philadel-phia and Washington to attend. Supreme Justice Alfred P. Murrah, who was unable to attend because of his court's calendar, sent a telegram to Justice Savarese full of commendations.

Among other distinguished guests were Brother Charles Digangi, National Chief Tribune, who acted as toastmaster for the evening Brother Donald R. Moore, Past District Justice, District XII, and presently Associate Tribune, Brother Howard F. Cerny, Past Chief Tribune, who presented the Judge with a plaque on behalf of the brothers of the New York Alumni Chap-ter, and Brother James W. O'Neil, the present Justice of the New York Alumni Chapter, who spoke on behalf of the Alumni.

The highlight of the evening was the introduction, by Brother Digangi, of the brothers present who had been members of PAD for more than 50 years, and who had been associated for many of those years with the Judge in PAD. Each one reminisced about the bygone days when he, and the Judge, were taking their first steps in a new profession. Those who brought back "old times" were Brothers Ambrose A. Arnold, Joseph P. Brennan, Nicholas Byron, Thomas W. Constable, James W. Farrell, William P. McCool, Charles D. Prutzman, Louis F. Rebori, Frank R. Serri and Albert A. Verrilli. A number of young members also spoke words of tribute to Judge Savarese for the kindness and consideration he had shown them during the time of their membership in PAD.

Judge Savarese, in accepting the plaque, announced that he did not want anyone to get the idea that, because he had re-tired from the bench at the age of seventy, he was putting himself to pasture. On the contrary, he was returning to his first love, which is the active practice of the law, after a brief vaca-

Present throughout the entire evening was Mrs. Savarese, who is the unsung heroine of the story to date. She, too, has been a tireless worker for PAD, and much is owed her.

### Message From The Supreme Justice

Your Supreme Executive Board takes great pleasure in announcing another FIRST for PAD. For a considerable period of time our law fraternity has led all others in providing new services for its members. Among the many FIRSTS for PAD have been the offering to members of a life insurance program at greatly reduced rates, a disability income insurance program with lower than usual premiums, the holding of annual regional meetings which we call District Conclaves and the providing of a Professional Directory at no charge.

Now our fraternity has made arrangements with the American Casualty Company to provide Attorneys Professional Liability Insurance coverage to members at a rate which is approximately forty per cent under that adopted by the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters. No other law fraternity has such a program.

This program is the result of over nine months of negatiations involving our Executive Secretary, our insurance administrator and various casualty companies. In addition, our insurance committee carefully reviewed the proposed plan before it was adopted by the Supreme Executive Board. Our insurance committee, incidently, consists of members who are well qualified to pass on our various insurance programs. They are Howard Cerny, outstanding insurance and trial attorney of New York, Chairman; Carroll M. Shanks, past President of Prudential Insurance Company; J. Harry La-Brum, Past President of the Fed-eration of Insurance Counsel, Past Supreme Justice of the fraternity and nationally known insurance counsel; Rollin R. Ecke, Treasurer, Farmers Insurance Group; John J. Corkhill, Executive Secretary, Kansas Public Employees Retirement System; and Anthony A. Di Grazia, Past Supreme Justice.

#### O'Brien Becomes Ass't. Dean U. of Minn.



### **Now! Attorneys Professional** Liability Ins. Sponsored By PAD

PAD announces its sponsorship of a Professional Liability insurance policy for practicing alumni members of the fraternity. This coverage is commonly referred to as "attorneys errors and omissions." The new program is the result of a great deal of intensive study and involved the contacting of many major companies in the field of professional liability. All members will receive details shortly.

As most members are aware, though not accorded the wide publicity of prosional liability suits against physicians, attorneys are becoming the increasing target of suits for so-called "acts of errors and omissions." Quite frequently, suits occur not because of any lapse on the part of the attorney, but through alleged negligence on the part of an employee or associate, for whom the attorney may be legally liable.

Certainly, the first line of defense against malpractice claims is one's own professional skill, training and integrity. However the SECOND LINE OF DEFENSE is an Attorneys Professional Liability policy.

- 4. PRIOR ACTS COVERAGE—Coverage is also applicable to acts or omissions committed prior to the policy period, providing claim is made or suit is brought against the insured during the policy period and such insured at the effective date of the insurance did not know or could not have reasonable forseen that such acts or omissions might be expected to be the basis of a claim or suit. Knowledge of any associate or an employee does not penalize the insured.
- 5. NEW PARTNERS AND EMPLOYED LAWYERS ARE AUTOMATICALLY COVERED-Automatic coverage is provided for additional lawyers who, during the policy period, become partners of the partnership insured. If, at the effective date, the policy included as named insured all employed lawyers, automatic coverage is provided for additional lawyers employed during the policy.

#### MORE CHAPTER ACQUIRES FRATERNITY HOUSE

Saturday, May 4, 1963, marked the fulfillment of more than a year's hard labor by the members of More Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta Legal Fraternity, Creighton University School of Law, in that it dedicated its recently acquired fraternity house.

This dedication was the climax of a drive for the acquisition of a house which was conceived in the late spring of 1962 by past justice Richard Francis Rowley II, whose father had lived in the Benson Chapter house in Topeka, Kansas, some thirty years prior to this date.

Once the idea was formed, Brother Rowley appointed a committee to study the feasibility of obtaining a house for the use of More Chapter members. The committee agreed that a definite need and necessity existed for a fraternity house; but they were faced with the common nemesis - lack of funds. With the dim and grim outlook of this lack facing them, Brothers Rowley, Lamb, Cannon, McGill, and Hunker decided that they would attend the National PAD Convention to be held in Denver, Colorado, in August of 1962, and discuss the matter with other chapters to see how they had overcome this problem and what solutions were open to them.

While Brother Lamb was engaged in a "friendly" card game with Brother Anthony DiGrazia; said game being held on top of one of the Rocky Mountains, Brother Rowley and Lamb explained the problem and need concerning the house to Brother DiGrazia, the Past Supreme Justice of PAD. After listening to their story, Brother DiGrazia assured the members representing the More Chapter that he would be of any assistance possible, in whatever way, in the acquisition of a house. The More representatives advised Brother DiGrazia that they had located what they felt would be a satisfactory house and asked if it would be possible for Brother DiGrazia to stop off in Omaha on his return trip to Chicago and look at the house. Brother DiGrazia did so and felt, as the More Chapter did, that the house they had located would be ideal for the fraternity house. Brother DiGrazia remained in Omaha long enough to supervise the purchase of the house for the More Chap-

After purchase of the house was completed, a zoning controversy arose over the operation of a fraternity house in the particular neighborhood. More Chapter was represented before Omaha Planning Commission by an Omaha attorney, and the Commission voted 5 to 0 against allowing a fraternity house in the area requested. Not to be daunted at this stage, the Chapter appealed this decision to the City Council of Omaha; this time foregoing the aid of legal counsel. The "zoning squabble" of the ensuing weeks within the City Council Chambers has been described as one of the most controversial in the history of Omaha. Local press and television gave full coverage of all proceedings. Members of More Chapter were described by their opponents as everything from immoralists to green-eyed monsters, thieves and even murderers. Tension was spread on all sides thick as the proverbial 'pea soup'.

The members of More Chapter appeared before the City Council, and in the words of City Council president, Harry Trustin, "represented themselves and the legal profession amicably in the face of the slanderous onslaughts by their opponents." more than a mere roof and bed.
This firm appeal by the Chapter The house has already acquired

members resulted in a 7 to 0 vote overriding the City Planning Commission's decision. However, the Mayor of Omaha saw fit to veto the action of the City Council on the matter, but the Council, feeling the Chapter had a legitimate appeal, voted 7 to 0 to override the Mayor's veto, and thus gave final approval to the establishment of the house.

The foregoing serves only to explain the high feelings and exultation of all concerned during the activities of the dedication. Among the PAD dignitaries in attendance were past Supreme Justice DiGrazia and Judge Robert Jackson and their respective wives, and C. Glenn Lewis, Associate District Justice. Special congratulatory telegrams were received from District Justice Jay Gunnels, Greater Kansas City PAD Alumni, and the Governor of Nebraska, Frank Morrison, who sent not only his congratulations, but his regrets at not being able to attend the dedication due to other pressing engagements. The Governor is also a PAD.

Some of the special guests included Very Reverend Henry Linn, S. J., President of Creighton University, James A. Doyle, Dean of the Creighton University School of Law, and several of the law school faculty who had followed the acquisition of the house with interest.

The new PAD house was dedicated to Anthony A. DiGrazia because of his continued encouragement and assistance throughout the acquisition of the house. The National office of PAD provided a portrait of Brother DiGrazia, who in return presented to More Chapter an oil painting of Saint Thomas More, the patron saint of lawyers, and namesake of the chapter at Creighton University. The dedication ceremony was culminated with the blessing of the house by the Reverend Leroy Endres, S.J., faculty member of the law school.

Dedication over, the festivities of the day did not end, but rather continued into the annual Law Day Dinner-Dance of the Student Bar Association, with the Brothers DiGrazia and Judge Jackson being honored guests of the evening.

Brother Frank Morrison, Governor of the State of Nebraska. was the guest speaker at this event, and in a joking manner commented on the attendance of so many distinguished PAD members by stating. . didn't know that I was going to attend a PAD rally . . . ", said remark was met with a rousing cheer by the few non-PAD members present.

The acquisition of this fraternity house has given and will continue to give additional stability to the Saint Thomas More Chapter of PAD. It will provide housing facilities for the law students where previously there has been none, and this housing will be a drawing card for the fraternity for it will provide much


"Nothing new, happily. Have been dropping activities trying to retire for the past seven years but haven't been able to let go yet.
