The Honorary Chairman of the 1964 PAD National Convention in New York, the Honorable Anthony P. Savarese, Past Supreme Justice of the fraternity, and General Chairman Howard F. Cerny, have invited all members and their families attending the PAD Convention to visit the most outstanding World's Fair ever. The New York Alumni Chapter will provide tickets to the Fair to all registered at PAD's Thirty-Fifth Biennial Convention.

The meeting of Brothers from across the country will be held August 10, 11 and 12, 1964, with headquarters at the Park Sheraton Hotel.

This year's World Fair is a BILLION DOLLAR SHOW.

Represented are 58 nations, 26 states, 80 industries, 300 companies who have invested one million dollars in 150 pavilions spread across the 646 acres that comprise the Fair site in New York's Borough of Queens.

To say that the Fair dazzles the eye is truly an understatement. Never before has so much money and energy been expended to create so many unusual and extraordinary exhibits. Not only does the Fair overwhelm the eye, it staggers the imagination.

In the General Electric pavilion, visitors see the first public demonstration of thermonuclear fusion. Here is created a manmade sum in which, for an instant, atoms fuse as they do in the sun. At the IBM exhibit viewers rise on a People Wall into an information machine. The experience is something like being ingested by the brain of an electronic computer.

Hop aboard the General Motors Futurama and see men exploring the Moon, an undersea vacation hotel, a city of the future with electronically controlled traffic. Ford's Time Tunnel shuttles visitors from the dawn of history, where animated cave men discover fire amidst sething volcanoes and browsing dinosaurs, to the world of to-

The 1964-1965 World's Fair celebrates the tercentenary of New York City, reports the N. Y. Convention and Visitors Bureau. The theme is "peace through understanding." But like New York itself, the Fair is a celebration of man in his infinite diversity. The Fair grounds is divided into five sections: International, Industrial, Transportation, Federal and State and Lake Amusement

Centerpriece of it all is the Unisphere, the 135-foot-high globe of stainless steel. Affixed to its massive hoops are the continents and islands of the earth. Circling it are the orbits of whirling satellites.

Spread around the glistening globe is profusion of fountains, lagoons and pavilions that make the visitor feel he has, indeed, stepped into the future. The building of the United States is one of the most impressive. It is a striking modern, rectangular structure with an interior court. The pavilion is mounted on four pillars and seems to hover 18 feet above the ground.

Not far distant is a jagged mountain of triangular prisms of anodized aluminum. They make up the Electric Power and Light Building. At its center is a 12billion-candlepower beacon that stabs into the sky and is visible from 100 miles away at night. The Bell System's pavilion seems


NY Convention Chairmen Selected

PAD Goes to Fordham

99th Chapter Installed

On Tuesday evening, April 21, 1964, a solemn fraternal conclave met in New York City to conduct what might properly be called an inevitable joining of two revered associations, Phi Alpha Delta and Fordham. It was on this day that the I. Maurice Wormser Chapter of Fordham Law School was installed into Phi Alpha Delta. The eloquent and moving ceremony was presided over by Judge Paul P. Rao, in his Courtroom of the United States Customs Court, in New York City, where he presides daily in his judicial capacity.

The brief exposure to the great > dignity, solemnity and truly clerk; and George J. Renner, Jr. noble principles of Phi Alpha then in his sagacious manner Delta left all visibly and deeply impressed. The idea of living up to the tradition of excellence which has from its inception permeated this fraternity had a very sobering effect on these young men.

Following the ceremony at the Courthouse, all retired to the New York Rifle Club for cocktails and conversation, followed by a banquet and a program of speeches presided over by the Honorable Sylvester J. Ryan, Chief Judge of the United States District Court of the Southern District of New York, Judge Ryan swore in the new officers, including William R. Kohler, Justice; B. Dennis O'Connor, Vice-Justice: Wayne M. Treasurer; Stephen J. McKenna, Esq., Chief Tribune of Phi Alpha

then, in his sagacious manner, proceeded to reminisce about his early days at Fordham and his memories of I. Maurice Wormser, the namesake of the chapter. Other distinguished speakers on the dais were Judge John M. Cannella, Judge of the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York; Judge Paul P. Rao, United States Customs Court; Justice Thomas A. Aurelio, Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of New York; William Hughes Mulligan, Dean of Fordham Law School; Robert A. Kessler, Professor at Fordham Law School; Elmer Million, Professor at New York University Law School and Districe Justice: Charles Digangi

Delta; Patrick Beary, Esq., Justice of New York Alumni Chapter; and Howard F. Cerny, Esq., who presented the charter for the national at the installation.

As was evidenced by the speeches at the banquet and the very life of the man himself, the new brothers acted wisely in naming their chapter after I. Maurice Wormser. During his lifetime the late Professor Wormser brought much credit and honor to both Fordham and the legal profession. Professor Wormser received his L.L.B. from Columbia in 1909 and proceeded to immerse himself in an appellate practice lending clarity to the case law of the New York metropolitan area by participating of counseling in such cases as Glanzer v. Shepard, to mention but one. Professor Wormser, as a practicing attorney, served as Assistant United States Attorney, Government Appeals Agent during World War I, Counsel to New York Transit Commission, and Counsel to Kings County Crime Investigation. Professor Wormser also served as editor of the New York Law Journal from 1914 to 1931. He came to the faculty of Marshal. Having sworn in the new officers, Judge Ryan proceeded to expound the respective responsibilities of each officer and reminded them of the great

It is with great pleasure that Phi Alpha Delta announces the selection of Edward E. Murane as the new Chairman-Nominee of the House of Delegates of the American Bar Association. Brother Murane graduated from the University of Michigan Law School in 1925 where he was an active member of Campbell Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta. Shortly thereafter he commenced the practice of law in Wyoming where he has held such offices as City Attorney of Casper, Past President of the Natrona County Bar Association and Past President of the Wyoming State Bar Association.

Upon completion of his term of office as president of the Wyoming State Bar Association, Brother Murane became active in the American Bar Association by becoming a delegate for the State of Wyoming to the House of Delegates in 1952 and has retained that position since that time. In 1960 he was appointed a member of the board of directors of the American Bar Association and retained that position until last year.

Brother Murane has also become affiliated with the American Counsel Association, the Federation of Insurance Counsel, the International Association of Insurance Counsel and the American Judicature Society, as well as being a Fellow in the American Bar Association, the American College of Trial Lawyers, and in the International Academy of Trial Lawyers.

In addition to the above-mentioned activities in his profession, Brother Murane has served on the Casper Junior College Advisory Board, the Wyoming State College Commission, the Boy Scouts of America, the Lions Club, the Masons and the National Panel of Arbitrators of the American Arbitration Associa-

To complete Brother Murane's active life, he has had the opportunity to travel extensively, having traversed the world twice European Continent, Africa, South America, Central America, and the Arctic Circle on the North American Continent.

Law Librarians Meet

Dr. Mortimer D. 

Noto Addresses District XII

The Honorable Mario A. Noto, Associate Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization addressed the Fifteenth Annual District XII Conclave luncheon on "The Role of the Lawyer in Immigration and Naturaliza-

The speech was a masterful blending of administrative law and Constitutional guarantees. Mr. Noto emphasized the unique power which has been slowly vested in his agency. This power allows the agency to arrest an alien without a warrant, consider his case, and systematically deport him. The Commissioner pointed out that power of this magnitude necessitates a self-imposed system of checks and balances to prevent arbitrary and unfair treatment.

The Commissioner then said that one of the more effective ways to protect the rights of the individual and enforce the laws of the United States was to have lawyers who knew of and supported both of these concepts in all positions of investigative, adjudicative or administrative responsibilty.

Commissioner Noto then discussed the duties which fall to the Commissioner on Immigration and Naturalization from admission of aliens to deportation proceedings. Within each duty he discussed the position which lawyers have taken and the administrative procedures which are followed in every action, attempting to give each individual the Due Process of Law guaranteed by the Constitution.

(Continued From Page 1) to float in the air like a giant wing, while the Eastman Kodak struture has a lunar landscape roof topped by an eighty-foot tower displaying five color photographs each 30 by 36 feet.

Thousands of colored lights in the doomed roof of the GE building make the whole structure seem to spin like a child's top. The Travelers pavilion is built in the shape of the firm's red umbrella trademark. New York's State Fair of the Future will feature a 226-foot observation tower. Visitors to the exhibit of New York City take a simulated helicopter ride over a gigantic model of the metropolis, which includes all 840,000 buildings in the city.

Other pavilions reflect the traditions of the nations they represent, as in the pagoda-like buildings of China and Thailand and the mosque-styled structures of Sudan and Pakistan. In the Vatican pavilion, Michelangelo's incomparable Pieta is on display. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints has constructed a 127-foot replica of the facade of the famous Mormon Temple in Salt Lake City. In the Protestant and Orthodox Center there is the charred cross from the Cathedral of St. Michael Coventry, which was destroyed by bombing in World War II. Jordan shows the Dead Sea scrolls. In the American-Israel exhibit there is ore from King Solomon's mines; in the Spanish pavilion art by Goya, Velasquez and El Greco.

Fortunately, Fair-going has been mobilized and no one need get footsore. Glass-topped sightseeing busses tour the grounds. Also available are open-sided trailer trains and four-passenger taxis. In the exhibits themselves floating armchairs, plush automobiles, simulated space ships and moving walks and staircases allow the viewer to relax and enjoy the show. Overhead there is a Swiss sky ride as well as a monorail train. If you get too pooped to continue despite all the rides, you can rent a mattress in a "rest alcove" at the Simmons exhibit and cork off for forty winks.

It's a fun Fair, too, with a long list of spectacular amusements There are daily concerts by college and school bands and choral groups, a circus in an air-conditioned tent, an ice show, a water show, an auto thrill show, a wax museum and daily fireworks. In the Florida pavilion trained porpoises cavort; Texas presents a 90-minute musical. In the Polynesian lagoon, women divers search for pearls. There is an American Indian Village, and a Parisian puppet show. For those with a nautical bent, there are replicas of Columbus' Santa Maria and HMS Bounty.

Name your preference and chances are you'll find not one but several exhibits catering to it. Do you long for the days gone by? Antique cars are for rent and Liebmann Breweries has reconstructed a Little Old New York where you can quaff nostalgia and brew simultaneously

makes reservations. Its services are free. A post card to the Housing Bureau will bring a booklet listing 380 hotels and motels in the Metropolitan area and rates guaranteed through 1964.

If you want to plan your Fair visit before heading out to the grounds, stop at Macy's. On the fifth floor of the department store is a 400-foot-square model of the Fair. Guides explain all exhibits, so you can decide in advance what you want to see. On its sixth floor, Gimbels department store also has an exhibit of many of the most interesting pavilions at the Fair.

More than \$125 million has been spent improving roads and super highways around the Fair grounds. You'll have no trouble driving there, providing you familiarize yourself with the Fair location and highway SVStem first. Parking at the Fair will be \$1.50. Admission to the World's Fair is \$2 for adults; \$1 for children 2 to 12. In 1964, the Fair will be open from April 22 to October 18. In 1965 it will be open from April 21 to October 17. The Fair grounds will open daily at 9:30 a.m. and all exhibits will be open until 10 p.m. Some exhibits and many restaurants and places of amusement will be open until 2 a.m.

It's doubtful there has ever been a Fair you could get to so many ways. Special buses and trains go directly there from Manhattan. By subway is is a 20-minute, 15-cent ride from Midtown. In addition, you can hop out by helicopter. Whirlybirds land on the roof of the Port Authority pavilion, atop the plush restaurant and cocktail lounge the structure also houses.

LaGuardia and Kennedy International Airports are just a few minutes from the site. Hydrofoil boats cruise out from an East River pier, and the Circle Line sightseeing yachts also take passengers to the Fair. Circle line vachts leave from Pier 80 at the New York City has gone all foot of W. 40th St., Manhattan. If you absolutely refuse to go any other way than aboard your private yacht, a marina has been constructed on the shore of Flushing Bay adjacent to the Fair grounds.

No one is going hungry at the Fair. There are 113 restaurants, ranging from snack bars to the fanciest of eateries. Featured is everything from the Hongkongburger (hamburger and noodles) served from a motorized rickshaw to a three-hour luau at the

Hawaiian pavilion.

In conjunction with the Fair, Lincoln Center is staging a special international cultural program. And you won't want to miss sightseeing in New York City, which is really a World's Fair all by itself. Attractions such as the Empire State Building, United Nations, Statue of Liverty, Times Square, Rockefeller Center, the Metropolitan Museum of Art and all the other museums and art galleries offer a warm welcome to Fair visitors.
