


# JUSTICE CLARK CELEBRATES FIFTEENTH YEAR ON UNITED STATES SUPREME COURT

Brother Justice Tom C. Clark, Supreme Vice-Justice of Phi Alpha Delta, was nominated as Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court by President Harry S. Truman on August 2, 1949, and on October 3, he took his seat as successor to Mr. Justice Murphy. Brother Clark is now celebrating his 15th year on the Court and is the only Justice remaining on the Court who was appointed by Brother Truman.

Most observers will agree that Brother Clark has added measurably to his stature since he accepted the judicial position after a 12 year career in the Department of Justice. He has come to be a solid anchor on the Court and in recent years has been prominent in the work of

justice in all tribunals.

Brother Justice Clark is aware that some of the decisions in which he has joined have drawn bitter criticism. It was he who wrote the Majority Opinion in the School Prayer Case and he participated in the unanimous 1954 vote in which the Court held that segregation in schools unconstitutional. However, Brother Justice Clark welcomes criticism. He feels that "it is in keeping with the tradition of the democratic system. While we would like for it to be constructive, it is their right. It gets a bit discouraging sometimes. Sometimes remarks are made that hit below the belt. But I rather think that with most of the people the image of the Court now is better than it has ever been.'

Known as one of the hardest working members of the Court and as one of its most prolific writers of opinions and considered more or less a moderate between the more liberals and conservatives of the Court members, Clark regularly takes home stacks of briefs to review. 

# **Retired Justice Burton Dies**

Brother Harold Hitz Burton, retired Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court and member of Phi Alpha Delta, died on October 28, 1964 at the age

Ill health forced Brother Justice Burton to retire from the United States Supreme Court on October 13, 1958 after thirteen years on the bench.

One of his most noted Supreme Court decisions outlawed racial segregation on railroad dining cars. This was the first of a line of major rulings in the civil rights field by the high court. He also wrote the opinion after World War II upholding the validity of a law providing for renegotiation of war contracts to prevent excess profits.

Another major opinion by Burton reversed a perjury conviction against Harry Bridges, the West Coast Labor Leader.


Upon retirement from the United States Supreme Court, Brother Burton remained active by helping the Appeals Court in Washington and the Court of Claims with their crowded dock-

Before taking the bench Brother Burton was the Mayor of Cleveland and served as Republican Senator from Ohio during the period of Jan. 3, 1941 until Sept. 3, 1945 when he was appointed to the Supreme Court by President Truman, also a member of Phi Alpha Delta.

Brother Burton served in World War I as First Lieutenant and Captain of the 361st Infantry, and took part in several major offenses. He received the Belgian Croix-de-Guerre and the Purple Heart.

Brother Burton became a member of Hay Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta at Western Reserve University while an instructor of Corporation Law and was always active in our fraternity. He was present at such memorial occasions as the initiation of Justice Tom C. Clark, our Supreme Vice-Justice, as an honorary member of our fraternity. He was also always ready and willing to speak at any occasion upon request.

Brother Burton's death is certainly a loss to our fraternity and to the country.

My first official visitation as Supreme Justice was indeed a most pleasant one. It involved a visit to Syracuse University Law School and the occasion was the tenth anniversary of the founding of Carmody Chapter. Since it had been chartered while I was District Justice of District XI and I had the pleasure of installing the Syracuse Alumni Chapter in 1957, the event was to me a most significant and gratifying one.

A reception on Friday evening, October 30, 1964, was followed by a banquet the following evening. Mrs. Kharas and Dean Kharas honored us with their presence. The Dean assured me that Carmody Chapter was well respected and had a program of real value to the Law School. The Chapter is under the excellent leadership of the Justice, S. Parker Jones. On Thursday morning I called on Dean Myers in the fine new Law building which bears his name. During a personally conducted tour the Dean assured me that our Chapter at American University, Brandeis Chapter, has an important place in the Law School and an excellent professional program. The Justice, Richard Mahan, and the members are justifiably proud of the Chapter which is in its fourth

At Catholic University School of Law I was most graciously received by its Dean, Vernon X. Miller, President-elect of the Association of American Law Schools. He has a high regard for our Chapter, Cardozo Chapter, now in its third year, and very proud that one of his students, Thomas E. Patton, also a member of Cardozo Chapter, was one of the three students selected out of thirty-two as finalists in the competition for the Tom C. Clark clerkship. At 6 p.m. I had the privilege of conducting the pledging ceremony for nine students for Lincoln Chapter at John Marshall College of Law. This Chapter is under the able leadership of Justice Sidney Gold.

At 6:30 p.m. it was my privilege to induct the honorable Abraham L. Marovitz, United States District Judge, into Honorary membership through Lincoln Chapter, ably assisted by Honorable John Dempsey of the Appellate Court. Following this ceremony I participated in the initiation of three faculty members, Professor John Waltz, Fuller Chapter, Northwestern; William Garrett, Lincoln Chapter at John Marshall College of Law; Howard Newcomb Morse, Story Chapter, De Paul University.

On Friday morning I flew to Pittsburgh for a visit with Dean Quinn and the Egan Chapter. A welcoming committee composed pledges, and four of our faculty of Eddie O'Connor, Vice Justice

of Egan Chapter, Erwin Wedner, Marshall, Frank Truzo, and Captain Keith Wagner, an alumnus, had sad news to convey and which required the cancellation of a luncheon and pledging ceremony. Professor Hector Alexander, a recent appointee to the faculty had been killed in a highway accident.

Judge John G. 

# **KNOW OUR** DISTRICT JUSTICES

Our fraternity is divided into 12 districts. In each district an alumnus member of our fraternity has accepted the position of District Justice. This position is formed to provide assistance to the chapters in each district. His job is also to insure that there is complete communication between the fraternity nationally and the individual chapters. He also assumes the responsibility of coordinating the district conclaves.

Each of the men who has assumed this position certainly deserves to be commended by the fraternity. The job requires a great deal of time and is on a purely voluntary basis.

Following is a short biography of each of our District Jus-

#### DISTRICT I

Brother Joe Holleman has accepted the position of District I Justice. He is a Past Justice of Dunbar Chapter at the University of Washington where he obtained his LL.B. degree. He is a former Minority Counsel of the Washington State Senate and also served as Majority Counsel for the Senate.

He has served as Justice of the Seattle Alumni Chapter since 1956 and as District I Justice since 1961.

#### DISTRICT II

He is a native of Utah and obtained his LL.B. degree at the University of Utah School of Law where he was a member of Sutherland Chapter.

He was admitted to practice in 1940 and commenced private practice at Fillmore, Utah. He was attorney for the Utah House of Representatives during the 1953 term and thereafter became Assistant United States Attorney for Utah and served as such until 1962, when he was named as a Deputy Attorney General for Utah. In 1962 he was appointed to the bench of the 5th Judicial District of Utah.

He is presently serving as President of the Utah District Judges' Association.





# DANHOF HONORED BY ALUMNI

John J. Danhof, President of the Detroit College of Law, was admitted to practice in 1912, after having graduated from the University of Michigan where he was a member of Campbell Chapter.

In five decades, his boys grew into judges, justices, congressmen, and fine attorneys and more than could possibly be named.

The Detroit College of Law Alumni Association recently honored Brother Danhof, who was 80 in July, at a reunion banquet in the Sheraton Cadillac Hotel.

While Brother Danhof was teaching at Detroit College of Law, he was also on the legal staff of the New York Central Railroad System, the last 20 years as General Counsel.

"I wanted to teach," he said, "but I also wanted to be part of an active, competitive business. In 1913, the year after I received my law degree at the University of Michigan, I accepted both jobs."

When he retired from the New York Central in 1951, he continued for some time as chairman of the Michigan Railroads Association.

"You can't stand still," he said. "Law is growth like everything else, an evolution not a revolution. You've got to meet the growing condition."

Brother Danhof goes to his Detroit College of Law office several times a week. The enrollment now is 599, he said, compared to the 69 in 1891.

He is proud that the majority of his students work as they study and are familiar with the court system. He continues his presidency because he supports the independent law school

"Only two are left," he said, "ours and the Kent School of Law, in Chicago. We receive no public funds. We are rightfully accredited — but can do as we please, uninfluenced by Washington, Lansing, or by any big university."

He turned to a volume of Shakespeare — one of those he bought at 13 — and said he intends, at 80, 90, whatever, to be busy.

"I'll practice law a little, travel, read, hunt, fish and play golf which for me is mostly walking."

In 1939 Brother Danhof became a Trustee of Detroit College of Law and in 1945 he became president. "I had a desire to take to the students the kind of practical, day-in-day-out law, I was handling every day. It has always been important at Detroit College of Law to teach practical law as well as theory."

The Danhofs have three children who are married. The son, John Danhof, Jr., is a New York Central System executive. "He went out on a railroad section gang when he was very young," Danhof said. "I encouraged all three to go where they wanted to go after high school. My son chose Dartmouth — and the railroads."

Danhof's father encouraged him similarly. They were a Grand Haven, Michigan family, the grandfather coming to Michigan in 1854.

"My father was an insurance

man who gave me anything but money," Danhof said. "As a boy, I worked summers in a grocery store for \$5 a week, I loved to read. In my teens, I bought a set of Shakespeare from a door-todoor salesman on a 50-cent-aweek deal."

He got his Bachelor of Arts at the University of Michigan in 1906. He had a whole year of law by then. . . "But I was offered \$20 a month as principal of the Hurley Wisconsin High School."

In Hurley, he married the German teacher. They came back to Grand Haven, "because the Grand Haven schools offered me \$100 a month to be principal of the Grand Haven High School."

At University of Michigan, he remembers "being enthralled by the silver tones of William Jennings Bryan campaigning for the presidency. I listened with open eyes and mouth, but back in my room I'd say to myself, 'Did that fellow really say anything?' When my father asked me who I voted for, I answered Bryan. 'Young man, you'll live and learn,' my father said."

His father, who had three lawyer brothers, wanted him to be a "preacher or a doctor or anything but a lawyer." His Greek professor howled, "It's a shame for a good language teacher to become a damn lawyer."

# The End of a Long, Hard Road

Brother Edward J. Reasor, of Cole Chapter at Drake University, recently received his LL.B. degree. This marks the end of a long and hard road.

The victim of a broken home, Ed was placed in an Illinois orphanage at the age of 6. At 14 he was sent to a foster home, a dairy farm, in Upper New York State. Upon graduation from high school, he was in the top 5% of his class and he had saved \$350. He obtained a full tuition scholarship at the Jamestown Extension of the New York University and a part-time job as a cub reporter on the Jamestown "SUN."

In 1958, Ed found part-time jobs scarce so he enlisted in the Army and volunteered for the Paratroopers. He said 77 did this to "get the extra jump pay, \$55.00 a month, for my educa-

During 3 years at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, he rose from Private to Staff Sergeant, made 50 jumps, devoted 4 nights a week and Saturdays to North Carolina State and the University of North Carolina courses, and became a court reporter through summer studies at the University of Virginia Law

At the termination of his military service, Ed had credits for 90 of the 120 hours required for Liberal Arts degree, with a

He had been court reporter for Major Reid W. Kennedy, a Drake Law School graduate, former Clay County attorney at Spencer, and defense counsel for general court martial. Kennedy urged Reasor to go to Drake and helped him obtain a one-half tuition scholarship.

Since entering Drake in the fall of 1961, Ed has continued to jam-pack his life. Along with full law studies he completed his Liberal Arts requirements and for most of the time had averaged 30 hours a week examining claims for Employers Mutual Casualty Co.

He stood fourth in his law class, was president of the Student Bar and Editorial Notes Editor of the Drake "Law Review." His article in the "Law Review" on "Uninsured Motorists Coverage," reprinted in the Insurance Law Journal was described by a leading Chicago attorney as "by far the best I have read" on the subject.

Five years ago Ed married Nancy Clyme of Bradford, Pennsylvania. Though they had 2 sons, she has worked 3 years to help the education along. Both have fallen in love with Alaska since their arrival in June.

The career of James N. Landis, honorary member of Taft Chapter, has come to an end. Until his death at 64, Brother Landis gave unstintingly of himself in public affairs. A few weeks ago, Attorney General Kennedy asked Brother Landis to correlate the President's papers. He was to come to Washington to begin the task.

Those who knew and worked with him recall his extraordinary brilliance and unselfishness.

#### **ENDOWMENT FUND LOANS HELP MANY PADS**

The Endowment Fund is one method by which Phi Alpha Delta endeavors to be of service to its student members in that it provides funds to needy students who are unable to obtain financial assistance elsewhere. This assists them in providing funds necessary to complete their legal education.

The Endowment Fund has existed for many years. It was revitalized after the Second World War as a result of increased need for financial assistance.

The Fund has continued to assist needy students in the completion of their legal education and has provided loans for a large number of students.

Although the Fund is a sizeable amount it represents contributions from many of our Brothers in varying amounts from \$1.00 to \$1,000.00, coming from many of the individuals who had a loan themselves which enabled them to complete their legal education.

The circumstances surrounding the granting of loans from this Fund are practically as numerous as the number of loans having been granted. Many of the students are closely associated with tragedy, such as the loss or parents or property through disaster. Other loans are the result of accomplishments, such as having been admitted to graduate school to pursue legal training.

The following are just a few illustrations of situations where Endowment Fund loans have assisted Brother PAD's:

- **CASE A:** A PAD student whose parents had both passed away had borrowed \$500.00 from his sister while at school. In the following year his sister needed the money which she had loaned to her brother so that she herself could complete college. The Fraternity loaned him \$500.00 so that he could complete his legal education. It should be noted that upon graduating from law school he promptly repaid the loan and enclosed a letter with his final payment which thanked the Fraternity for the assistance that it was able to render.
- **CASE B:** Another individual lost all of his personal property, including clothing and school books, as a result of a fire in the dormitory of his law school. Unfortunately, none of his property was covered by insurance. This individual had saved money from prior employment but the loss of all of his personal property required an unexpected expenditure which made it impossible for him to complete his legal education without outside assistance.
- CASE C: Another student had worked his way through law school and had obtained very good grades in the process. He felt that if he could quit working he would be able to achieve cum laude recognition upon graduation. The loan was granted and this Brother was able to achieve the highest grade point average ever compiled at his law school.
- **CASE D:** Another Fraternity Brother was dependent upon his wife's income in order to complete his legal education. His wife was employed by a local doctor and was summarily discharged because of a personality clash. Apparently the dentist had a reputation for discharging people for little or no cause. Consequently the student and his wife were left without a source of income. The Endowment Fund loan enabled the student to complete his legal education by providing them with funds until his wife could secure other employment.
- **CASE E:** This Brother was given the opportunity to study law in England following completion of his LL.B. degree. Unfortunately he had nearly exhausted his funds in obtaining his LL.B. degree. Therefore, he would have been unable to take advantage of the opportunity to pursue his legal education in England without the assistance of a loan from the Endowment Fund.
- CASE F: One of our Brothers had obtained his LL.B. degree but was without the necessary funds to take a bar review course. A PAD loan was granted and he is today enjoying a flourishing practice.

#### LOAN REQUIREMENTS

Senior law students who are members of our fraternity may receive an application for an Endowment Fund Loan by writing the Executive Office. Accompanying each application must be:

- 1. A recommendation from the Administrative Head of the Law School which indicates that the grade average of the applicant is at least a "C" or equivalent thereto;
- 2. A recommendation from the Chapter Justice indicating that all of the applicants' chapter dues and financial obligations are in a current status. In the event the applicant is a Chapter Justice himself, then the recommendation shall be made by the Chapter Vice-Justice;
  - 3. A recommendation from the Distirct Justice; and
  - 4. A recommendation from the Faculty or Alumni Advisor of the active chapter.

The maximum amount of each loan is restricted to \$500.00 and the Supreme Executive Board will approve a loan application only if the application shows that the applicant is a worthy individual; that he is unable to obtain funds to continue his law school education elsewhere, and that after the loan is granted he will have sufficient funds to complete his law school education.

No interest is charged on loans at the present time. Each applicant is, however, required to make a contribution in the amount of \$25.00 to the Endowment Fund. The amount of this contribution may be added to the principal of the Loan. If the individual becomes delinquent in his payments, interest in the amount of 5% per anum is charged on the amount of the loan in arrears.

All borrowers are also required to take out a minimum life insurance policy under the PAD Life Plan. The minimum policy is \$5,000.00 and the premium is \$25.00. The applicant is required to assign sufficient of the proceeds of the life insurance policy to the Fraternity's Endowment Fund to cover the principal amount of the loan. The balance of the proceeds may be designated to the beneficiary of the applicant's choice. The requirement that the borrower take out out a life insurance policy is necessary to protect the Endownment Fund because these are unsecured loans. The amount of the first year premium may be added to the principal of the loan.

A Promissory Note evidencing the loan must be executed not only by the applicant but also by his wife and some other financially responsible person. The other financially responsible person must also submit with the application a financial statement. The form for this financial statement may be obtained from Executive Office.

Repayment of the loans is made monthly in an amount not less than \$25.00 and commences within six months after graduation or leaving law school, or at an earlier date, in the discretion of the Supreme Executive Board.

A minimum of 30 days after submission of all required information must be allowed for final action on any application. Thereafter, upon submission of a properly executed Promissory Note and insurance application, a check for the funds will be immediately forthcoming.
