

The fact that these men are willing to assume the duties of running our national fraternity in addition to the arduous duties they have assumed as scholars, jurists and successful attorneys exemplifies the close fraternal bond which each of our members experience. It is the loyalty of brothers such as these that make us all proud to be members of Phi Alpha Delta.

Supreme Justice

S. Magaw, was unanimously elected to the position of Supreme Justice of Phi Alpha Delta. Dr. Magaw, or "Mac," as he is affectionately known, is the assistant dean of Temple University School of Law, having graduated from the University of Oklahoma School of Law, where he was a member of Harlan Chapter.

The devotion of our new Supreme Justice to the assistance and guidance of the novices in our profession has been outstanding. Dr. Magaw has taught law at Temple University for thirty-one years and has acted as assistant dean since

He attended his first National Convention of Phi Alpha Delta in 1930 when he was a student delegate. It was through his sponsorship and active participation that Roberts Chapter was installed at Temple University in 1939. He is also a Charter Member of the Phi Alpha Delta Alumni Chapter in Philadelphia which is named The Elden S. Magaw Alumni Chapter in his

One of the most distinguished orable Tom C. Clark, Associate scholars in our nation, Dr. Elden Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States was unanimously elected to the position of Supreme Vice-Justice of Phi Alpha Delta.

Justice Clark has devoted his life to public service since he obtained his LLB Degree from the University of Texas in 1922. His service began in 1927 when he became Civil District Attorney for Dallas County. In 1937 Brother Justice Clark joined the department of Justice as an attorney where he served for eight years.

In 1945 Brother Harry S. Truman, also a member of Phi Alpha Delta, named Justice Clark to the position of Attorney General of the United States. Prior to this appointment, he served in such posts as Special Attorney in the Bureau of War Risk Litigation, Special Assistant to the Attorney General in the Anti-Trust Division, Chief of Anti-Trust Division, Coordinator | Whittaker. Brother Justice Clark of Alien Enemy Control of the Western Defense Command and Chief of the Civilian Staff for Japanese War Relocation. First Assistant in the Anti-Trust Division, Assistant Attorney General in charge of the Anti-Trust Division, and Assistant Attorney General in charge of the Criminal Division.

Justice Clark was nominated Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court by Brother Truman on August 2, 1949 and on October 3, 1949 he took his seat as successor to Mr. Justice Murphy, thereby joining Brother Justices William O. Douglas, Harold H. Burton and Robert Jackson, and being present to receive Brother Justices Arthur West Coast Offices of the F. Goldberg and Charles E.

(Address of the Supreme Justice, following his election to office at the 35th Biennial Convention in New York, August 10-12, 1964.)

"Mr. Supreme Justice, Hon. Irving C. Kaufman, Judge of the Federal and Circuit Court of Appeals, who you have tonight seen inducted into honorary membership by Brother Tom C. Clark, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, honored guests, brothers in Phi Alpha Delta, our lovely ladies and guests:

I have a telegram here from the Honorable John Biggs, Jr., Chief Justice of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals For the Third Circuit, our illustrious Brother from Philadelphia, which I am proud and happy to read. It says:

"I am up to my neck in the second trial of the Delaware reapportionment case and I will not be able to get to New York on Wednesday Evening, August 12th, in time to attend the meeting when my very good friend Judge Irving R. Kaufman is to be inducted as an Honorary Member of Phi Alpha Delta in a ceremony to be conducted by Mr. Justice Tom Clark.

"Will you please express to Judge Kaufman and to Mr. Justice Clark and to all the brothers my great regret that I cannot be present to see this honor conferred upon Judge Kaufman, an Honor which he so richly deserves. Fraternally, John Biggs, Jr."

We are present here in New York City, the home of our illustrious Honorary Chairman of this Thirty-Fifth Biennial Convention, The Honorable and Past Supreme Justice Anthony P. Savarese, in the business of Phi Alpha Delta, the leading and largest Legal Fraternity in the United States. On the sixty second anniversary of its founding, although its roots had first been established in 1898, sixty six years ago, we are in obedience to a natural impulse which bids a people to do honor to its past.

I note, with pride and pleasure, at their positions of honor, the presence with their ladies, of three Past Supreme Justices of our Fraternity; Brother Anthony A. DiGrazia, of the Chicago Bar, who served from 1960 to 1962; Brother John L. Griffith, of the Denver, Colorado Bar, whose term of office was 1958-1960; Honorable Elwyn Thomas, Supreme Court of Florida, our leader from 1956 to 1958.

Honorable Robert D. Jaskson, a Judge in Des Moines, Iowa, and who was Supreme Justice from 1954 to 1956, had planned to be here, but last minute circumstances over which he had no control, prevented his attend-

The Honorable Anthony Savarese, recently retired after many years of public service as Surrogate, Queen's County, New York, Past Supreme Justice of Phi Alpha Delta from 1952 to 1954, was unable to attend for reasons of health but he was well represented by his son, An-Savarese, prominent New York attorney, and an Honorary member of our Fraternity.

Past Supreme Justice J. Harry Labrum, Supreme Justice during the years 1938 to 1946, was unable to attend because of the pressure of his duties as President of the Board of Education of Philadelphia. This accounts for six of the twelve living Past Supreme Justices of Phi Alpha Delta and who constitute under our Constitution, the Supreme Advisory Board.

Although the Founders of our Fraternity, with one exception. the Honorable John A. Brown, Story Chapter, 1898, deceased,, their memory remains, as it has over half a century, to inspire those who have from time to time been entrusted with the care, preservation, and management of Phi Alpha Delta through war and peace, depression and prosperity so that today with one hundred Chapters, ninety four of which are presently active, we are truly the greatest of them all.

"The Past is secure; it is finished"; but the half century and more which lie ahead, rests upon license be in jeopardy. The Ad-

us and those who follow us. Your presence at this Convention as students of the Law is not only a tribute to those who have preceded us in their interest and devotion to a great cause, but also a recognition that the work of Phi Alpha Delta is the responsibility of the active members of each Chapter. It is, indeed, the membership of each Chapter which is responsible for our "professional image" seen by the legal profession, the University, and quite importantly the administration and faculty, and quite importantly the administration and faculty of the Law School.

The fact, unfortunate as it may be, is that the legal fraternity system is undergoing an attack similar to that to which the social fraternity has been subjected for many years. That attack, unwarranted in my opinion and that of many other educators, was the result, partially of course, and as an attempted justification, of unsatisfactory conduct by a few individuals within a few groups, in some Universities. The evil of 'generalization" was to brand all fraternities, and the system as well, as an undesirable influence.

The social fraternities rose to the challenge, corrected abuses where such existed with the result that in twenty three years their Chapter numbers have increased over fifty per cent. The battle is not ended, and it will not be. As in the case of freedom and our democratic way of life, the right to it must be earned by each succeeding generation. Each year each Chapter will have to prove that its existence is of value to Society generally, the legal profession and the Law School in particular, and not merely to its members. That is the fundamental purpose of Phi Alpha Delta: Service to the student, to the Law School and to the Legal Profession.

This Convention, and others like it, will be in vain unless each of you as representatives of your respective Law Schools, your Chapter, and as prospective members of an ancient and noble Profession, recognize an individual responsibility to conduct yourself, and the affairs of your Chapter, as though the universal "image" of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity rests solely on you. Each active member of P.A.D. is only one or two years away from the receipt of a license from the State certifying to the public that he is a professionally competent trustworthy integrity to v ent may confidently entrust his life, his property, or his freedom. What a sobering thought! What a heavy responsibility!

Occasionally a Chapter gets into difficulty. When this happens it is usually the direct result of the failure of Chapter officers to recognize that they hold positions of trust and confidence; that they are subject to a fiduciary obligation exactly as will be incurred with respect to their clients.

It is the duty of each officer to study the Constitution and By-Laws of our Fraternity, and the duty of each active Chapter member to be familiar with it just as it will be his duty as a lawyer to know the law before he acts for his client. It is the lawyer's duty to observe Rules of Court and to peform certain duties within the exact time allowed by such Rules. Thus, for the conscientious law

student an opportunity to serve a professional fraternity as an officer of the Chapter, is an opportunity to acquire good habits, habits which he must have as an attorney lest his

ministration of a Law School and its Faculty soon ascertain the weakness or strength of Chapter officers and members, and such knowledge may determine whether a good recommendation can be made to prospective employers. How can a Dean or a Professor give a favorable recommendation if he knows that there has been a lack of responsibility where money, rules and regulations are concerned?

The attorney is a salesman; and he must do his selling, or much of it, by the spoken word. Too often legal fraternity members neglect the extra opportunity to acquire skill and facility in expression, and self confidence, by debate, Moot Court competition, and active participation in properly conducted Chapter meetings. What an opportunity to become accustomed to and proficient in the conduct of a meeting! The public expects the attorney to have that ability and woe to the lawyer who, at a public meeting, shows inept-

Our Chapters have developed splendid programs which are valuable to the student and to the Law School, and therefore to the Legal Profession, and which the foundation for the 'Goodwill" which a professional fraternity must have. The significance of such contributions is recognized by our Constitution and By-Laws under which we have established District Awards as well as National Awards for the outstanding Chapters. It is my hope and expectation that copies of the winning entries will be made available to all our Chapters since such may suggest significant areas in which an important contribution may be made in keeping with our National purpose.

From the ranks of the law students of today will come the leaders of tomorrow, active as members of the Bar Association. as political leaders, as members of a legislative or judicial body. Service in these important areas comes most naturally to those who, as law students, developed interests and talents beyond the law books. Success in public life as well as at the Bench and Bar on the part of our Brothers has added to the dignity and prestige of Phi Alpha Delta. The demands of a new era, the space our responsibility as a Professional Fraternity to encourage its membership to develop its greatest potential. The world in which we live is much too complex to accept mediocrity - such will fall inevitably to competition, automation, or the computer.

Your Fraternity has indeed been fortunate with respect to the men who have served as National officers. They are dedicated men who believe in what they represent and serve out of loyalty to that purpose and to the Fraternity, and at personal economic sacrifice. For me it has been a most gratifying experience and I am grateful that the privilege of serving as Supreme Treasurer, Second Supreme Vice Justice, First Supreme Vice Justice, has been given to me by delegates in prior Conventions. I am honored and grateful for the privilege which you, the delegates at the Thirty-Fifth Biennial Convention, have today bestowed upon me, our highest office, Supreme Justice.

A pre-convention meeting of the members of the Supreme Executive Board began the six days of events. The Board met for two days to discuss pressing items of fraternity business. On the second day the District Justices, upon whose shoulders much of the responsibility for the welfare of the fraternity rests, also met in a District Justice workshop, presided over by District VII Justice Don Hutson. The workshop considered the areas of; visitations by District Justices, professional programs, rushing, pledging, initiations, alumni and faculty advisors, conclaves, communications, use of the District Justice Manual, discussion and promotion of insurance programs, and the functions of the National Field Representative (now known as the "Assistant to the Supreme Justice"). A great deal was accomplished as a result of the exchange of views of our twelve District Justices.

On the third day the Supreme Officers' Seminar was conducted and the members of the Supreme Executive Board, together with the District Justices, attended. At this meeting those in attendance discussed the Out-

**THE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE** worked many hours to resolve the controversies arising about the 45 amendments to the Constitution and 28 amendments to the By-Laws.



**THE RUSHING AND PLEDGESHIP COMMITTEE** discussed the Rushing Manual, Rushing Guide, Pledge Manual, bookmark and plastic ruler, and concluded that these materials are of assistance to the chapters in their rushing program.



THE RITUAL COMMITTEE had the arduous task of reviewing the final revision of our ritual.



**THE AUDIT AND FINANCE COMMITTEE**, after examining the audit report of our fraternity prepared by an independent CPA, concluded that our fraternity is in an excellent financial condition and that approximately 95% of the present active fraternity fees are being used for chapter services.



**THE PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE** reviewed the Directory, The Reporter, Rushing Booklet, Pledge Manual, and Constitution and By-Laws and made various recommendations concerning these publications.

## **CONVENTION COMMITTEE REPORTS**

Again during the 35th Biennial National Convention our Fraternity was strengthened and improved through the active participation of the delegates and alumni members present. Much of the work was accomplished in committee where strong debate and complete discussion was given to the various issues. The following is a summary of the Committee reports:

#### RUSHING AND PLEDGING COMMITTEE

This Committee discussed the Rush Manual, Rushing Guide Manual, the PAD bookmark, the plastic ruler, the PAD Fact Sheet and PAD Rushing Tips sheet.

The Committee agreed that the Rushing Guide Manual prepared by Brother Don Hutson, District VII Justice, would be of great value to each of the active chapters. Therefore, it was resolved that a copy would be distributed to the Justice and Marshal of each active chapter of our Fraternity.

The Committee also agreed that the Pledge Manual prepared by Brother Ray Judice, Assistant to the Supreme Justice, would be of great assistance in familiarizing the pledges about the history and goals of our Fraternity. Therefore, the Committee resolved that copies should be distributed to all active chapters.

The Committee saw great value in the PAD bookmark and proposed plastic rulers and therefore resolved that the bookmarks should be distributed to all active chapters and the plastic rulers should be distributed on an at-cost basis.

#### PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE

The Publications Committee discussed the Directory, "The Reporter," the Rushing Booklet, the Pledge Manual and the Constitution and By-Laws. With regard to "The Reporter," the Committee concluded that the twocolor format of the April, 1964 issue should be continued as to each issue in the future. They suggested that the content of "The Reporter" should be upgraded and that articles from students and alumni of general national interest should be included. However, they agreed that "The Reporter" should not contain articles which would place it in competition with law reviews.

The Committee agreed that the Pledge Manual fills a gap which has long existed in Phi Alpha Delta and will add much to the effectiveness of each chapter's rushing procedure.

#### RITUAL COMMITTEE

The Ritual Committee concluded that both the first and second alternate lectures on the Shield and Coat of Arms should be included in the revision of the Ritual and that each local chapter should be given the option as to which alternate lecture to use.

Also, the Committee concluded that only certain enumerated ceremonies in the Ritual could be held in public. They are the initiation of honorary members, installation of active chapter, installation of alumni chapter, installation of officers, and commemoration of brother's death at a funeral or graveside.

## SCHOLARSHIP AND AWARDS COMMITTEE

The Committee on Scholarship and Awards recommended the adoption of two awards. The first suggestion was that the National Fraternity should authorize each chapter to make an annual award to its graduating member attaining the highest weighted cumulative average for his complete course. It was suggested that this award be signified by a certificate furnished by the National Fraternity.

The Committee also suggested that the National Fraternity should grant an award to each graduating PAD member who attains the highest weighted cumulative average in his entire class for his complete course. This award will be made in lieu of the first award. An alternative suggestion was to the effect that the National Fraternity should make an award to the person attaining the highest weighted cumulative average in his class irrespective of his affiliation with Phi Alpha Delta.

For the purpose of both of these awards the Committee

suggested that no student should be ineligible by reason of having transferred during his law school career provided that all his work is done at law schools approved by the American Bar Association. They also suggested that students graduating subsequent to the principal graduation date of his school should be included in the succeeding principal graduation class.

## PROFESSIONAL PROGRAMS COMMITTEE

This Committee suggested that a liaison program be established under the by-laws of the local chapters in order to foster better communications between local chapters, alumni chapters and the National fraternity. They also recommended that the District Justice contact all chapters within his district to learn of new programs and continuing programs that have been successful in his chapters and to make a report on his findings.

The Committee felt that a packet of the PAD Library should be sent to each local chapter at the beginning of each year.

They suggested that the relationship between alumni chapters and active chapters would be improved by at least one joint function each year and that each pledge class be named after an alumnus in the community. The relationship would also be strengthened by promoting and participating in the observance of Law Day with other legal organizations.

The Committee felt that each chapter should maintain good faculty relations by inviting faculty members to all chapter functions where appropriate and inviting participation whenever possible.

#### AUDIT & FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Audit and Finance Committee examined in detail the audit of the fraternity for the past two years. The Committee ascertained that because of improved financial support from active chapter new member fees, alumni dues, insurance commissions and incidental funds, the fraternity is in excellent financial condition and approximately 95% of the present active fraternity fees are being used for chapter services.

The Committee ascertained that the National Office has operated within the budget adopted by the Supreme Board and in most items below the budget, thereby ending the biennium with a balance in reserve.

The Committee also ascertained that funds for the forthcoming Directory and The Reporter are in the bank and a substantial balance is in savings and loan associations.

The Committee heard an explanation of the use and financial condition of the Endowment Fund.

It should be noted that the Supreme Executive Board has reopened applications for loans from the Endowment Fund to senior law students only.

The Audit and Finance Committee examined and discussed the proposed revised Treasurer's Manual and upon motion and by majority approval the Committee recommended that the Manual be adopted and sent to all chapters as a guide for the chapter Treasurer.

Resolutions Committee

The Resolutions Commitee took time to recognize individuals who made the 1964 Thirtyfifth Biennial Convention a reality. They recommended that Phi Alpha Delta express its sincere appreciation to Brother Howard F. Cerny for his outstanding and untiring service in organizing the Thirty-Fifth Biennial Convention, and Brothers Edward A. Siragusa, Edward Atnally, James O'Neil, Jr., Charles DiGangi, Andrew S. Sichenze and Mrs. Edward Atnally, Convention Committee Hosts.

The Committee further recommended that Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity express its best wishes to Brother Anthony P. Savarese, of New York City, for improved health in order to continue to serve his community, profession and fraternity.

Of course, they recommended that Phi Alpha Delta express its sincere gratitude to Brother Alfred P. Murrah for the progress it has made under his direction and guidance.

It was further recommended that Phi Alpha Delta express its admiration and deep appreciation to Brother Tom C. Clark, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, for the inspiring Keynote address delivered to the convention.

Brother Calvin A. Behle, a distinguished member of Phi Alpha Delta and of the Utah Bar, deserves Phi Alpha Delta's sincere thanks for his service on the Endowment Committee and his interest in the purposes and growth of the Endowment Fund, as is exemplified by the fact that he is the first member of the One Thousand Dollar Club of the Endowment Fund of our fraternity.

The Committee further resolved that the Convention extend to Mrs. Douglas Edmonds, wife of the Late Honorable Douglas Edmonds of the California Supreme Court and Past Justice, their felicitations and warm fraternal greetings.

Mrs. Phyllis Andresen was also recognized by the Resolutions Committee for her untiring service and sincere devotion to Phi Alpha Delta during her sixteen years of devoted service to the fraternity as Chief Clerk of the Executive Office.

Finally, the Committee recommended that the Supreme Executive Board consider programs which will correct the expanding problems of the assistance of indigents in prisons and programs which will encourage the development of greater inter-American understanding.

## CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee had the very difficult job of examining 45 proposed amendments to the Constitution and 28 proposed amendments to our national By-Laws.

Submitted was a proposed amendment to Section 1 of Article III which would permit women to become members of our Fraternity.

The national chapter in convention assembled defeated the proposed amendment.

Wilson Chapter also submitted a proposed amendment which would amend Section 3 and 4 of Article III to remove the provision that under no system of voting may an individual receive more than two black balls. These proposed amendments, provided that the active chapter upon two-thirds majority of its active members, could adopt a different procedure for election of pledges other than by unanimous vote.

The proposed amendment was further amended on the convention floor to provide that the requirement of a unanimous vote could be waived by a two-thirds majority vote of all active chapter members provided however, that whatever procedure may be adopted hereunder, in no event

shall any person be pledged if more than ten per cent of the active members present or the vote of two active members, whichever is greater, vote against such pledging. The delegates then approved the proposed amendment as amended on the convention floor.

Of course, Section 3 and Section 4 of Article III still guarantee each member of the right to vote by secret ballot on pledging.

Chapter X of the By-Laws was amended by deleting all sections in their entirety and substituting new sections which reflect the following facts:

- 1. No subscription fee shall be charged for the Reporter.
- 2. All members of record shall receive "The Reporter" for life.

A new section was added to Chapter I. This Section subjects pledges to certain provisions. The provisions are:

- 1. Pledges shall not participate in a formal chapter meeting, exercise any voting rights, or be appointed or inducted to any chapter office.
- 2. Pledges shall incur and be liable for payment to the chapter treasurer of any pledge fee established by the chapter but shall not be liable for any dues levied on members only.

3. Pledges shall be subject to and may be de-pledged for violation or disregard of the Constitution of this Fraternity or the National By-Laws, or the By-Laws of the active chapter to which they are pledged.

4. No person who is a pledge of any other law fraternity may become a pledge in a chapter of this fraternity unless he first terminates such other pledgeship. Any pledge of a chapter of this fraternity who becomes a pledge of another law fraternity shall forfeit his pledgeship in this fraternity.

This amendment is to prevent active chapters from giving pledges the privilege of membership, including voting and holding office. The amendment also provides for de-pledging upon violation or disregard of the Constitution and National By-Laws as well as forfeiture of pledgeship if he becomes a pledge for another law fraternity.

Chapter III Section I was amended to permit our fraternity to expand to countries other than the United States as long as the college of law located in any other country is approved by the Supreme Executive Board as suitable location for an active chapter in our fraternity.

Siction Six of Chapter III was amended to add the recognition pin to the membership jewelry. It also provides that this recognition pin **shall** be purchased by the active chapter and presented to the initiate. The cost of the pin is to be included in the chapter, pledge or initiation fee.

Each of the committees at our convention worked extremely hard. Through their efforts our fraternity is in a position to step further ahead as the most outstanding law fraternity in the country.



In addition Magruder Chapter is currently attempting to initiate a Legal Aid Program. The goal is to either have the College of Law establish such a program or to establish a legal aid program sponsored by active and alumni members of Phi Alpha Delta in the Chicago area.

Magruder Chapter boasts the winners of First and Second Place in the Fredrick Green Moot Court Competition, as well as the president and vice-president of the Stock Investers Club, which was recently formed at the University of Illinois.

Magruder Chapter has found its Professional Luncheon Program to be a valuable method of contributing to the professional development of the active brothers and strengthening the fraternal bond of brotherhood through enabling the active members to join together frequently with alumni members, thus maintaining a close relationship through luncheons together on numerous occasions. Recognizing the value of this program, Magruder Chapter has sponsored 10 luncheons at which topics such as "How to Invest in "The Case Against Medicare," "How to Select a Jury," and the "Law School Graduate Student Program," have been presented.

Magruder Chapter conducts a seminar program shortly before the beginning of final examinations each semester. The seminar is offered for each first year course and certain advanced courses. The seminars are conducted by brothers who attain the grade of "A" in a particular course covered by the seminar.

A lending library consisting of case books, horn books, commercially prepared outlines, individually prepared outlines and class notes has been established by Magruder Chapter. Magruder Chapter has established good relationship with local civic organizations and local newspapers and radio stations through its community participation program. In this program, the brothers and pledges of Magruder Chapter have offered their voluntary services to the Champaign-Urbana Chamber of Commerce and to the United Fund for the purpose of participating in charitable drives and canvassing.

Magruder Chapter also sponsors various field trips throughout the year. This year Magruder Chapter toured the State Mental Hospital and the Statesville Penetentiary.

While Magruder Chapter places primary emphasis on professional programs, they also engage in various social activities, including stag parties, dances and banquets.

While Magruder Chapter is not the largest chapter in our fraternity, it has increased from 12 members in 1963 to 84 members in good standing at the present time. Magruder Chapter intends to enlarge its membership even more as a result of an active rushing program this fall.

#### Benson Chapter

Benson Chapter at Washburn University School of Law was chosen as the Second Most Outstanding Chapter in our National competition. Like Magruder Chapter, Benson Chapter's success is due to the hard work of each of its members. Its members belong to the Moot Court Team; are Student Bar Association officers, committee chairmen, committee members, Law Review writers, and student newspaper editors; as well as working hard for the fraternity directly.

A close bond has been formed between the active members of Benson Chapter and its alumni as a result of the formation of the Benson Chapter Alumni Association. As a result of this close association, a chapter fraternity house was acquired and is maintained by the Alumni Association.

Meetings of Benson Chapter are held at the chapter house twice a month. On the first Monday of the month there is a dinner meeting followed by a speaker and then a short chapter meeting. On the third Monday of the month there is usually a short cocktail hour preceding the speaker and then a regular business meeting afterward. Speakers are selected from various areas of the legal profession, including judges, practicing attorneys, professors, men who are qualified lawyers but have chosen some related walk of life, and politicians.

Moore and George T. Nickell, spent many hours in reviewing the applications. Three applicants were finally selected as finalists from which Justice Clark will personally select his clerk. They are David John Hase, Thomas Patton, and Charles D. Reed.


Each of the applicants was outstanding in his own right, both in his academic record and extracurricular activities.

Brother David John Hase was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. He obtained his A. B. degree at Dartmouth College, where he graduated magna cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa. While at Dartmouth Brother Hase majored in government, receiving a citation for work of highest distinction in the major.

He then returned to Wisconsin to work for his LLB degree at the University of Wisconsin. During the first two years at the University of Wisconsin, Brother Hase earned a cumulative average of 88.74! He received the William Herbert Page Award for the best student note or comment to appear for the year in the Wisconsin Law Review and the Wisconsin Law Review and the Wisconsin Law Alumni Association prize awarded to a student with the highest average in his class. This year Brother Hase is serving as the Editor in Chief of the Wisconsin Law Review and has received the Hagenah Scholarship which is awarded to the Editor in Chief.

Brother Hase has served as House Fellow (resident counsellor) in the University of Wisconsin Resident Halls, summer law clerk for a law firm in Milwaukee and Fellow, National Council on Legal Clinics Program to place law students in correctional institutions.

Brother Thomas Patton was born in Indianapolis, Indiana and received an AB in Political Science from the Catholic University of America in Washington, D. C. where he graduated magna cum laude. His other honors as an undergraduate include Phi Beta Kappa, Pi Gamma Mu, and the Rector's Award for the outstanding undergraduate male. While an undergraduate Brother Patton was president of the student body for two years.

## Judge Irving R. Kaufman Initiated

One of Justice Tom C. Clark's first duties as Supreme Vice Justice was to officiate at the initiation of the Honorable Irving Robert Kaufman into Wormser Chapter as an honorary member of our fraternity.

Judge Kaufman is Judge of the Second Circuit Court of Appeals. He graduated from Fordham University School of Law in 1931 and became Special Assistant to the United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York. Shortly thereafter he became Special Assistant to the Attorney General of the United States in charge of lobbying investigation and set up permanent lobbying unit for the Department of Justice to which he served as head.

Brother Kaufman then left the Department of Justice and became a partner in the firm of Simpson, Brady, Noonan and Kaufman in New York City. In 1949 Brother Kaufman was appointed Judge of the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York.

Brother Kaufman has engaged in many civic activities. He was a member of the National Council of Crime and Delinquency, Trustee of Riverside Country School, member of the American Heritage Foundation, as well as being a member of the National Committee of the Anti - Defamation League of B'nai B'rith and Rector of the Young Men's and Young Women's Hebrew Association.

Because of Brother Kaufman's many activities, he has been awarded the Americanism Citation by the American Legion, the Man of the Year Citation by Tau Epsilon Phi, Certificate of Honor by the Virginia State Association of B'nai B'rith and a citation by the New York State Federation of Women's Clubs.

He has been a hearing examiner for the Federal Trade Commission since 1961 and a member of the Commission Staff since 1946. Brother Moore received his LLB from George Washington University where he became a member of Taft Chapter. He is a former Justice of Taft Chapter and is the present Justice of the Washington Alumni Chapter, as well as being a Past District XII Justice.

Tuesday, August 11, saw the convention hard at work again as committees began their reports to the convention and there was much debate on the recommendations. The convention heard reports from the Rushing and Pledgeship Committee, the Publications Committee, the Scholarship and Awards Committee, the Professional Programs Committee, the Resolutions Committee and the Audit and Finance Committee. The reports of the committees are reprinted elsewhere in this is-

That afternoon the New York Alumni Chapter guided everyone by chartered bus to the East River where Aquafoil boats were waiting to take all to the World's Fair. Tickets were graciously provided by the New York Alumni Chapter for the boatride and the World's Fair.

Wednesday, August 12th, the last day of the convention, was consumed with hard work because of the long agenda yet to be covered. Controversial committee reports on proposed constitution and by-law amendments and Ritual changes were hotly debated with all the fervor of a National Political Convention. One of the most hotly debated recommendations was to strike the word "male" from Section 1, Article III, thereby to permit women to become members of our fraternity. After long debate, the delegates by roll call vote defeated this proposed amendment.

Another issue which was heavily debated was the proposed amendment to change Section 3 and Section 4 of Article III so as to enable a chapter upon two-thirds vote of its active members to adopt a different procedure for the election of members than a unanimous vote. After extended debate, the delegates in convention assembled decided to amend Section 3 and Section 4 of Article III to allow an active chapter on two-thirds vote of its active members to adopt a procedure for election of members other than by unanimous vote, but in no event to allow a person to become a member who receives a blackball from more than 10 per cent of the active members of the chapter present or the vote of two active members present, whichever is greater. The right to a secret ballot was, of course, retained.

The delegates also voted to authorize the National Chapter to pay the airline transportation expense for one delegate from each alumni chapter in good standing to each National Convention.

At the end of the session when the smoke cleared and the shouting was over, all closed ranks and the fraternity emerged the stronger for the full exchange of ideas.

The election of national offi-

cers for the biennium saw Dr. Elden S. Magaw, assistant dean at Temple University S. School of Law, unanimously elected Supreme Justice; Justice Tom C. Clark, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, elected Supreme Vice-Justice; Robert E. Redding, General Counsel of the Transportation Association of America, elected Second Supreme Vice Justice; Henry C. Rohr, a practicing attorney from Los Angeles, elected Supreme Secre-tary; Honorable Dee Brown Walker, Judge of the 162nd Judicial District Court of Texas, elected Supreme Treasurer; T. Julian Skinner, Jr., counsel for the Alabama Bi-Products Company, elected Supreme Historian; and Judge Alex Hotchkiss of Lynden, Kansas, elected Supreme Marshal.


Elected to the Board of Tribunes were Charles DiGangi, Chief Tribune; George T. Nickell and Donald R. Moore, Associate Tribunes.

Following the banquet there was dancing until midnight.




