

# Supreme Board and District Justices Meet in New Orleans

A combined meeting of members of the Supreme Executive Board and District Justices was held February 10, 11 and 12 in New Orleans, Louisiana, at the Roosevelt Hotel. The meeting, held at the call of Supreme Justice Elden S. Magaw, provided an opportunity for the two groups to meet together jointly, and also independently in the annual Supreme Executive Board meeting and a Workshop for District Justices. Many of the wives of officers attended, allowing a pleasant combination of fraternity business and vacation atmosphere.

Preceding the actual convening of the meeting was a luncheon meeting of New Orleans Alumni interested in forming an Alumni Chapter. Representing the National Fraternity were Supreme Secretary Henry C. Rohr, Executive Secretary Frederick J. Weitkamp, and Assistant to the Supreme Justice C. Raymond Judice. Selected as honorary chairman of the committee which was formed to petition National for an Alumni Chapter was the Honorable John Fournet, Chief Justice of the Louisiana Supreme Court, who was in attendance at the meeting. General Committee Chairman is J. D. Johnson.

The meeting of fraternity officers commenced promptly at 8:30 on Friday morning, February 10, with a joint breakfast meeting. Each District Justice presented a comprehensive report on the condition of chapters in his District. Expansion and reactivation possibilities were also discussed.

At noon the District Justices went into a District Justice Workshop moderated by District VII Justice Don Hutson, while the Supreme Executive Board went into its annual meeting. The Board adopted various resolutions calculated to assure the growth and advancement of the fraternity throughout the coming years.

Probably one of the most meaningful to the student members of the fraternity was the adoption of a new policy with respect to Endowment Fund loans whereby loans will now be made available to both second and third year student members.

A major portion of the discussion by the Supreme Executive Board evolved around the 1966 National Convention, to be held in Kansas City, Missouri. It was (Continued on Page 6)

## Dean Frank E. Maloney Appointed Dist. X Justice

Dean Frank E. Maloney, an alumnus member of Fletcher Chapter, recently accepted the position of District X Justice.

Brother Maloney is dean of the University of Florida College of Law, the school from which he graduated in 1942.

Dean Maloney is a native of Niagara Falls, New York and has been on the University faculty since 1946.

During World War II he served in the India-Burma Theatre and is curently a Lt. Colonel in the Air Force Reserve.

He has been admitted to practice before the Florida Supreme Court, the Supreme Court of the United States, and the United States Court of Military Appeals. He has served as chairman of the Equity Round Table; is a member of the Council of the Association of American Law Schools; he is an advisor to several Florida Bar Committees and was instrumental in various legal institutes and short courses. He has also served as chairman of the subcommittee on Water Resources and the continuing law reform Committee of the Folrida Bar Association.

Brother Maloney is married and has three children.

### Carver Appointed **Under Secretary** of Interior

President Lyndon B. Johnson made a recess appointment of John A. Carver, Jr., an alumnus member of Taft Chapter, to be Under Secretary of the Interior on December 30, 1964. His subsequent nomination was confirmed by the United States Senate on January 15, 1965.

As second ranking official of the Department, the Under Secretary acts for the Secretary in his absence, and exercises secretarial authority on all matters assigned to him. Coordination of Department-wide functions and supervision of administrative and service responsibilities are assigned to the Under Secretary.

Prior to his promotion, Mr. Carver was Assitant Secretary of the Interior for Public Land Management, a post to which he was appointed on January 30, 1961. In that capacity he supervised the activities of the Bureau of Land Management, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the National Park Service, the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, the Office of Territories and the Alaska Railroad.

He was Administrative Assistant to Senator Frank Church of Idaho from January 1957 until appointed Assistant Secretary. In 1947-48 he served as Assistant Attorney General of Idaho, and from 1948-57 he was in private law practice in Boise. He also has had considerable experience as a career Federal Civil Service personnel executive from 1940. 1947, with the National Roster of Scientific and Specialized Personnel and the Civilian Personnel Division, Office of the Secretary of War where he directed field activities successively in Ogden, Utah, Baltimore, Maryland, and New York City.

# LA Alumni Hold Judges Night

The Justice of the Los Angeles Alumni Chapter, the Honorable Herbert V. Walker, Judge of the Los Angeles Superior Court, briefly introduced the following special Honorees: Judge Joseph W. Vickers, Los Angeles Superior Court; Judge William P. Haughton. Los Angeles Superior Court; Judge Joseph Marchetti, Los Angeles Superior Court; Judge Clyde E. Triplett, Los Angeles Superior Court; and Judge C. Newell Carns, Los Angeles Municipal Court. The members in a moment of silent prayer and tribute paid honor to Justice Albert Lee Stephens, Ninth Circuit, United States Court of Appeals, who died at the age of 90 while an active member of the Bench and whose funeral had been held on the day of the meeting. The induction ceremony was conducted by Supreme Justice Magaw who is the Assistant Dean at Temple Law School.


The initiation was witnessed by officers and actives of Roberts Chapter as well as Phi Alpha Delta Alumni from the area.

(Continued from Page 1) determined that the convention will be expanded to be a four day meeting and will be held August 31, September 1, September 2 and September 3, 1966. The Supreme Executive Board will meet in session for two days preceding the convention and the District Justices will meet in workshop session the day preceding the commencement of the convention proper. Programming for the convention has been altered from recent conventions to provide for more diversification. In addition to the usual Convention Committees, Chapter Workshops will be conducted. Some of the topics suggested were Chapter Organization, Chapter Financing, Rushing, Pledging and Orientation, Chapter Clerks, Professional Activities and Alumni Activities. A model initiation will also be held to exemplify the revised ritual. Chapters which may desire counseling and conferences with members of the Supreme Executive Board will have an opportunity for such meetings. On the last day of the Convention a speaker of professional prominence will appear before the Convention to talk on a "bread and butter" topic.

The Board also determined to retain the services of Irene Baillie as official convention reporter for the 1966 Convention. Irene has reported every convention of PAD since 1948.

For the first time in the history of the fraternity, the National Chapter will pay the round trip airline expenses of one delegate from each alumni chapter. To qualify for this each alumni chapter will have to fulfil each of the following minimum requirements:

- 1. Pay its annual alumni chapter tax for the two fiscal years subsequent to the 1964 Conventtion.
- 2. Have had at least two meetings during the fiscal year 1965-1966, with an attendance of at least ten persons at each meeting.
- 3. Have regularly elected offi-

In addition to printed notices, all local alumni members should be personally contacted by the active chapter. This will insure active participation on the local level.

In other areas when 2 or 3 chapters are in a close proximity they hold a combined banquet. This makes available the finances necessary to hold a successful event.

The presentation of awards and recognitions should not be prolonged as this event can be somewhat dull for non-participants. One method of making everyone present participate is to recognize graduating classes and, in order to prevent prolonging this event, past graduating classes may be recognized in groups of 10 years.

The speaker is the most important single factor in securing a good attendance. The speaker should be a well-known and outstanding member of the bar. Members of our fraternity occupy positions in almost every level of government and the judiciary branch. Many of these men are willing to give their valuable time and talent for Phi Alpha Delta. For example, members of the national organization may be called on to speak at such events.

When the chapter has a distinguished speaker, local television and newspaper coverage should be given to the banquet, as this provides excellent public relations for Phi Alpha Delta in the locality.

Why doesn't your chapter try a Founder's Day Banquet? You will certainly find it enjoyable and may even find it profitable.

### THE LAW LIBRARY OF CONGRESS IS THE LARGEST

The Law Library of Congress is the largest and has the most comprehensive collection of legal material ever assembled. It is the principal legal research library of the government. Its collection covers all known systems of substantive law and procedure; ancient and modern, civil and religious, including international law, jurisprudence and the philosophy of law and legal history. Material for the Law Library is acquired through purchase, copyright deposit, gift, international and institutional exchange, transfer of surplus books from other Government agencies, and material acquired through PL 480. Legal materials are obtained from all parts of the world. As a matter of fact, it is the objective of the Law Library to have available for Government use the most comprehensive and up-to-date collections of legal publications which exist outside of the countries of origin, and, insofar as possible, to have a professional staff, trained in the legal systems of the various areas, with sufficient knowledge of American law and the English language to provide authentic interpretations of this material in terms understandable to American lawyers, legislators and administrators.

The Law Library began with 2,011 volumes of which 639 came from Thomas Jefferson's library. They were separated from the general collections and moved to Capitol Building, under the authority of an Act of July 14, 1832, creating a law department to be administered by the Library of Congress under the direction of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. At the present time the Law Library has a collection exceeding 1,000,000 volumes.

Encouragement and suggestions for the development of the services of the Law Library is provided by the Standing Committee on the Facilities of the Law Library of Congress of the American Bar Association, which serves as an unofficial advisory committee to the Librarian of Congress in the field of law.

Reader service is provided in the Anglo-American Law Reading Room on the second floor of the Main Building of the Library of Congress.

A branch called the Law Library in the Capitol is maintained for the exclusive use of the Members, Committees, and Officers of the Congress, and their staffs in the quarters of the Senate Library on the Gallery Floor of the Senate Wing of the Capitol.

The Law Library, one of the six Departments of the Library of Congress, is organized into a Law Librarian's Office and five Divisions. Each of the five divisions is responsible for the maintenance and development of, and reference service on the Library's legal collections for its assigned political jurisdictions. The political jurisdictions are as follows:

The American-British Law Division, which encompasses the United States, its territories and possessions, Great Britain, its colonies and the nations which have formed and now form the British Commonwealth of Nations; the European Law Division, for the countries of Europe and their colonies; the Far Eastern Law Division, which includes Nationalist and Communist China, Manchuria, Japan, Korea and Thailand; the Hispanic Law Division for Spain, Portugal and Puerto Rico; the Near Eastern and African Law Division, covering the countries of the Near East and for all of Africa except the Spanish and Portugese jurisdictions.
