# Supreme Court Justices for Massachusetts, Maine and New Hampshire Initiated As Honorary Members

Associate Justice Tom C. Clark of the United States Supreme Court, Supreme Vice Justice of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, presided at ceremonies in Boston, Massachusetts on April 11, 1966, at which the entire membership of the Supreme Judicial Courts of Massachusetts and Maine, and the Supreme Court of New Hampshire were

brought into the Fraternity.

With Supreme Justice Elden S. Magaw supervising the ceremonies, a public initiation was held in the Supreme Judicial Courtroom of Massachusetts, with a reception and dinner following at the Union Club of Boston. Attending the ceremonies and dinner were the members of the three chapters in Boston: Burton, Frankfurter and the Boston Alumni Chapter. As special guests of the chapters, the pledges of Burton and Frankfurter chapters were invited to the reception and dinner, as well as the initiation ceremonies in the courtroom.

The initiation ceremony commenced at 5:30 p.m. on Monday, April 11. A court officer called the court to order and the assembled brothers of Phi Alpha Delta and their guests rose to their feet. The velvet curtains behind the wide bench parted and the Justices stepped forward, with Massachusetts Chief Justice Raymond S. Wilkins, the host, in the him was Brother lead. Flan Clark and behind them stepped Supreme Justice Magaw and Chief Justice Frank R. Kenison. Thereafter ame Chief Justice Robert B. liamson of Maine and the other Justices, in column of twos. They stood for a moment at their places behind the bench while a formal photograph was taken, and then they were seat-

Supreme Justice Magaw opened the ceremony and spoke of the purposes of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity and of the significance of the occasion. Brother Clark presented each of the honorary initiates with a magnificent plaque testifying to his membership in either Burton or Frankfurter chapters. Each Judge also received a beautiful key inscribed with his initials.

In lieu of administering an oath to the Justices, Mr. Justice Clark described the oath and its purposes and noted that each of the Justices had not only taken an oath to uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States, but by his conduct exemplified the goals of Phi Alpha Delta, thus obviating the need for administering a further oath.

The reception, held in the beautifully appointed drawing room of the Union Club, was nothing short of a magnificient success. A full array of refreshments was available, with trays of hors d'oeuvres circulated throughout the crowd. The Judges, most of whom had brought their wives. mingled with the brethren and pledges of the local chapters. The friendly atmosphere, the warmth and informality with which the initiates met the brothers and thei: ladies, was evident to everyone. It was a rare opportunity for the brothers of the three chapters, and the pledges, at first somewhat over-awed by the august body of judges present, soon relaxed and became ready participants in the cocktail conversation

Dinner was served in the delightful dining room of the Union Club. The Judges and their wives were so seated that there was at least one judge, if not

two, at every table. With the dinner which included filet mignon, a rich Bordeaux wine was served. Thereafter, champagne was brought forth for the series of toasts offered by Brother Clark.

No formal program was planned. Indeed, there was not even a head table. However, at one large round table centrally located in the dining room, were seated Mr. Justice Clark, the three Chief Justices and their ladies, Supreme Justice Magaw and District Justice James H. Kendall. After dinner, Brother Clark offered a brief talk, noting the high quality of the three courts, but injecting an occasional humorous note or ancedote concerning the Chief Justices of each court. Following Brother Clark's remarks, each of the

Over 70 persons were in attendance to witness the Honorary Initiation of Senator Byrd, sponsored by Brandeis Chapter on March 19, 1966, at The American University, Washington College of Law.

Among those in attendance were: Honorable Sam Ervin, U. S. Senator from North Carolina; Robert E. Redding, Supreme Vice-Justice; Donald Moore, Associate Tribune; Dan Halpin, District XIII Justice; Joe Steen, Student District Justice for Districts XIII and XIV; Quentin Ertel, Student District Clerk for Districts XIII and XIV; Dr. Edwin A. Mooers, Professor Emeritus of the American University, Washington College of Law; and Dan Connell, Justice of Cardozo Chapter.

William P. Hise, Justice of Brandeis Chapter, presided at the ceremony. The minutes of the meeting at which Senator Byrd was nominated as an Honorary Member of our fraternity, were read and Supreme Vice Justice Robert Redding presented a scrap book of the event on behalf of Phi Alpha Delta.

Following the ceremony, Professor Louis Clay James, Professor of Law at the American University and faculty advisor for Brandeis Chapter, spoke about Senator Byrd as a student at the American University, Washington College of Law, while a member of the House of Representatives in the United States Senate. He presented the scroll to Senator Byrd.

John Harper, for er Justice of Brandeis Chapte ind present Executive Secretary of the Washington Alumni Chapter, spoke of Senator Byrd as a classmate and presented him the Honorary Membership Key uring Broth-er Harper's speet he referred to the fact that it was at their graduation, that the late President Kennedy made his famous American University Speech on Nuclear Disarmament and that just before the formal speech began, the late President, directing his remarks to Senator Byrd, facetiously said that he was very proud of the fact that it was only going to take him 30 minutes to earn his law degree while it took Senator Byrd 6 academic and 10 calendar years to earn his degree.

After the initiation, a reception was held, at which Senator Byrd and Senator Ervin spoke. Senator Byrd said, "I consider it a high honor to be admitted to membership in this fraternity, the purpose of which is service to law students, to law school and the legal profession." The reception gave the brothers and guests an opportunity to meet with the two Senators and the other Honorable guests in attendance.

Millin, Awards and Recognition Chairman; and Don Hutson, General Convention Chairman, as well as the members of the Kansas City Alumni Chapter.

Brother Hutson's wife, Betty Hutson, has given much of her time as chairman of the women's activities to insure that the wives of those in attendance will have a memorable time while their husbands are making the decisions which will govern the operation of our fraternity for the next two years.

# EDMONDS CHAPTER INSTALLED DURIND DISTRICT II AND III CONCLAVE

The 15th annual Conclave of Districts II and III on April 16, 1966 held in San Francisco marked the occasion for the installation of the 101st Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta La Fraternity, Douglas L. Edmonds Chapter at Santa Clara University School of Law. The new Chapter was named after Justice Douglas L. Edmonds, Justice of the California Supreme Court and Past Supreme Justice of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, who is now deceased.

Mrs. Douglas L. Edmonds, widow of the late Justice, was present to wish the new Chapter well and to present to its Charter Justice, D. Gerald Brown, a portrait of Judge Edmonds as well as a certificate presented to the Justice by Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity and a biography of him.

Delegates from Field Chapter, Matt I. Sullivan Chapter, Temple Chapter, Ford Chapter, McKenna Chapter, Beaumont Chapter, and Edmonds Chapter were present at the Conclave to witness the installation of the new Chapter.

The Conclave commenced promptly at 9:00 A.M. at the San dents and faculty members. The advantage of these outlines lies in the Mills Tower.

During the morning, Chapter Workshops were conducted on rushing, finances, social activities, professional activities and alumni relations. In the finance workshop, Temple Chapter reported the success of its Zerox program, which netted over \$700.00 for the chapter. Temple Chapter has leased a xerox machine and charges nine cents per copy for the use of the machine and seven cents for each page of moot court briefs. The student who operates the machines receives an income of one cent per copy. The success of the program is shown by the fact that over 40.000 copies were made in an eight month period. Temple Chapter reported that in order to make this program a success, regular business hours must be kept.

The delegates from McKenna Chapter reported on their fund raising project, which is selling study outlines to the students. They stated that during the first few years, most of the profits are directed toward building an inventory of outlines. The outlines used by McKenna Chapter are purchased from the students who have prepared them and are reviewed by law review stu-

dents and faculty members. The advantage of these outlines lies in the fact that they include a summary of classroom lectures as well as an outline of the text. Last year McKenna Chapter netted \$800.00 from the sale of these outlines. Next year they contemplate selling these outlines to students in the neighboring law schools of USC and Loyola. The outlines are sold at a reduced price to members of McKenna, Ross and Ford Chapters.

Field Chapter reported its fund raising activity, which is the sale of theater tickets. The tickets are obtained by the chapter at a reduced price and then sold to the students at a profit.

# Justice Clark Speaks at District X Conclave

He said he also felt it is the duty of bar associations to integrate. "I have always been in favor of an integrated bar," he said. "We have had an integrated bar in Texas for many years."

In addition, Brother Clark spoke on the lack of emphasis on instruction in criminal law and trial techniques. "Some law schools are doing a terrible job on criminal law," he said. "I was surprised to learn recently that many schools only require students to take a one-quarter course in this area. Criminal law is still regarded as the backbone of the legal profession."

# **GENERAL CURTIS DIES**

Retired Marine Brigadier General Brother Merritt B. Curtis, an alumnus member of Temple and Field Chapters, recently passed away, in Winston Salem, North Carolina.

Brother Curtis was a veteran of 32 years in the Marine Corps, a former insurance company executive and a United States Presidential Nominee of the conservative Constitution party in

Until recently, General Curtis served as Vice President and Treasurer of General Services Life Insurance Company. He has also been president and a director of the company and an executive with the Military Services Insurance Underwriters.

He was nominated as the Constitution Party's Presidential Candidate at the Party's Indianapolis Convention in April, 1960. The party is a conservative group of southern origin which stresses States Rights.

A native of San Bernardino, California, General Curtis was graduated from the University of California in 1915. He received a law degree from George Washington University twelve years later, while assigned to the office of Marine Corps Paymaster.

Brother Curtis was a member of the District of Columbia and California Bar Associations and was admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of the United States.

He was a former President, Secretary-Treasurer and Editor of the National Sojourners, a military masonic organization, and had served as Director of Public Relations, membership and special projects for the Retired Officers Association. He was also a member of the Army-Navy Club and the University Club.







Brother Williams was born in 1920 in Connecticut and attended Holy Cross College in Worcester, Massachusetts where he was a leading debater and served as president of the Philosophical Society. He received his B.A. degree summa cum laude, and enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Force in 1941.

Upon returning to civilian life, after having received a medical discharge after two years when he sustained a back injury,

Williams enrolled at Georgetown University Law School in Washington, D. C. where he became a member of Taft Chapter. Brother Williams belongs to

the President's Lawyers Committee on Civil Rights, and is a member of the American College of Trial Lawyers, the International Academy of Trial Lawyers, the Barristers, the American Bar Association, and the District of Columbia Bar Association.

# Judges Sponsor Inter-Disciplinary Training Conference

In a unique move to strengthen continuing education the National Council of Juvenile Court Judges sponsored an inter-disciplinary conference on May 22-25 for the directors of leading in-service training programs. The Conference, at the Illinois Beach State Park Lodge, rep resented an effort to share the experience of a curren four year judge training program with those who are training doctors, clergymen, business executives and other highly specialized adults.

The National Council learned at the Conference the latest training methods and techniques used in other disciplines. In discussing such topics as trainee selection, program structure and evaluation, the Conference heard from PAD Assistant U.S. Attorney General, Ernest C. Friesen, Jr., former dean of the College of State Trial Judges. Also on the program were Daniel L. Skoler, Associate Director, Office of Law Enforcement Assistance of the U.S. Department of Justice; James E. Barron, Consultant, Business Education, General Electric Company; Reverend Connolly C. Gamble, Jr., Director, Department of Continuing Education, Union Theological Seminary, Richmond, Virginia; and Thomas O'Farrell. Director, Hospital Research and Educational Trust.

"Continuing education is more advanced in other professions," John F. X. Irving, Executive Director, National Council of Juvenile Court Judges, said "but our efforts have been highly innovative and pervasive. The National Council has provided training sessions for more than one thousand juvenile court judges and five hundred court staff in the last four years.

"We believe we can offer the Conference participants valuable training experience in areas of common interest. We know we can learn a great deal from what they are doing. This Conference provides the opportunity for exchange of ideas and experiences in the rapidly growing field of adult education.'

The fifteen organizations represented at the Conference included the American Academy of Pediatrics, American Nurses Association, National Council of Churches, Continuing Legal Education programs of the Illinois and Minnesota Bar Associations, Council on Social Work Education and the Western Interstate Commission For Higher Educa-

The National Council of Juvenile Court Judges comprises 1,500 judges with jurisdiction over children and youth. With headquarters at the American Bar Center, the National Council expects to be heavily involved in continuing education especially as federal court decisions may require interpretation to the local judges. The National Council is dedicated to improving the administration of justice for juveniles through training, original research and cooperation with other organizations who have similar objectives.

During his three years as head of Philadelphia's Police Depart-Commissioner Leary ment. earned widespread praise for curtailing crime in the subways. modernizing police communications, thwarting holdups with anticipatory stakeouts, initiating 5-man specially equipped patrol cars, and raising the department's morale. Brother Leary introduced police dogs for patrol in the subways as a crime deterrent. He also originated a computer system to quickly identify high-crime areas.

As a special project to enhance police personnel, Philadelphia's former Commissioner launched a recruiting drive with a "recruit-mobile," a trailer containing police exhibits and a basic testing center. Commissioner Leary has encouraged college education for policemen and permitted them to work "4 to 12" shifts to enable them to attend college

# Griffin Appointed io u.s. senaie



Robert C. Stetson, General Attorways. Brother Stetson stated that the biggest advantage of corporate practice is that a young lawyer is afforded the time necessary to properly handle a matter, irrespective of the amount of money involved or magnitude of the decision. He pointed out that attorneys working for corporations are not puppets of the executives but rather are sought out for advice on business as well as legal matters. Brother Stetson pointed out that an attorney is well equipped to provide business advice because of "1. his vocational training, 2. the articulate manner in which he had learned to express himself, and 3. his ability to analyze situations."

Following Brother Stetson, Nathan Cohen spoke to those in attendance on "representing celebrities' and had many interesting stories to relate concerning his experiences.
