Engle Chapter Installed

On May 9, 1969, sixty-three men representing the largest charter initiation class in the history of Phi Alpha Delta were initiated during impressive ceremonies in a Sacramento, California Superior Courtroom to establish the Fraternity's 110th Active chapter, at McGeorge School of Law at the University of the Pacific.

The installation of the chapter marked the culmination of several weeks of organizational work by Faculty Advisor and Associate Dean Charles W. Luther (Temple

The new chapter was named for the late United States Senator Clair Engle. At the age of 24 Clair Engle was the youngest man ever to be District Attorney of Tehama County. PAD Chapter in Puerto Rico

The Commonwealth of Puerto Rico now proudly boasts a chapter of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity! Jose de Diego Chapter was installed April 25, 1969 at the Catholic University of Puerto Rico School in ceremonies at the District Court Building in Ponce and was followed with the initiation of 33 students and 7 faculty members including the Dean.

At the banquet held subsequent to the installation ceremonies the following were initiated as Honorary Members of PAD: Hon. Luis Negron-Fernandez, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Puerto Rico: Hon. Carlos Santana Becerra, Justice of the Supreme Court of Puerto Rico; Hon. Rafael Hernandez Colon, President of the Senate of Puerto Rico; His Excellency Freimot Torres Oliver, Bishop of Ponce and Great Chancellor of the Catholic University of Puerto Rico; and Hon. Juan Blaimayor Ferrara, Administrative Judge of the Ponce District Court.

The Catholic University of Puerto Rico began courses at Ponce in 1948 and affiliation with the Catholic University of America was secured that year. The Catholic University of Puerto Rico is accredited by the Council of Higher Education of Puerto Rico, by the Middle States Association of Colleges and shall, Rick McClendon, William B. Secondary Schools, the Board of Regents of the State of New York

and the Department of Education of Puerto Rico. The School of Law, founded in 1961, earned accreditation by the Council of Higher Education of Puerto Rico and the American Bar Association.

Jose de Diego, the Chapter's namesake, a lawyer, politician, poet and journalist was one of the greatest Puerto Rican patriots of all times. He served as Attorney General in Arecibo and as a Justice of the Supreme Court of the Island? Jose de Diego became Sub-Secretary of Justice during the "autonomous government of 1898." After acquisition of Puerto Rico by the the United States he served as Attorney General of Mayaguez. In 1900 President McKinley named him as a member of the Executive Council, but soon he resigned and devoted himself to politics. In 1902 he was elected as a member of the House of Delegates and its president in 1907 until 1917. In that year, Jose de Diego became the first

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News From

The 92nd annual meeting of the American Bar Association in Dallas could take its place in history as the birthplace of the Code of Professional Responsibility, a revised statement of ethical standards to govern the legal profession.

The code, which would replace the present 60-year-old Canons of Professional Ethics, will be considered by the ABA House of Delegates at its sessions Aug. 11-14 in the Dallas Memorial Auditorium. Other ABA and related organization meetings will take place between Aug. 1 and 14.

Designed to update and clarify the present canons, the new ethics code has been undergoing bar scrutiny since a 136-page draft was distributed in January. It will be the forerunner of a parallel ABA program to encourage a tightening of the bar's disciplinary enforcement procedures which is still in progress.

Another feature of the meeting of the meeting will be the plenary Assembly in the auditorium Aug. 11-14. Speakers for these sessions will include U.S. Attorney General John N. Mitchell and Whitney M. Young. Jr., executive director of the National Urban League.

The final session on Thursday, Aug. 14. will see Bernard G. Segal of Philadelphia installed as the 92nd president of the Association. and Edward L. Wright of Little Rock as president-elect.

Prominent Leaders to Address ABA Sections at Annual Meeting

Many prominent leaders in government, science, business and the law will address sessions of the 21 Sections of the American Bar Association at the Dallas annual meeting. Section speaker include: Assistant Attorney General Will Wilformer Attorney General Ramsey Clark; retired Supreme Court Justice Tom C. Clark; Chairman of the Administrative Conference of the United States Jerre Williams: Civil Aeronautics Board Chairman John H. Crooker, Jr.

Also, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury for Tax Policy Edwin S. Cohen; Internal Revenue Service Commissioner Randolph W. Thrower; Chancellor of the University of California at Los Angeles James Young; Illinois Central Railroad President Allan S. Boyd, and Ling-Temco-Vought Chairman James J. Ling.

Section programs will embrace such national and world problems as the Mideast crisis, campus uprisings, anatomical transplants, highway safety, undersea resources, airport congestion and skyjacking. Many of the sessions will be highlighted as "Showcase Programs" in the Dallas Memorial Auditorium to enable a maximum number of registrants to participate.

Probate Code to be Considered

A proposed Uniform Probate Code, designed to simplify and speed up probate procedures, will be considered for approval by the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws at its meeting in Dallas Aug. 2-8.

The probate code is the product of seven years of effort by the Commissioners and the ABA Section of Real Property, Probate and Trust Law. Should it be adopted, it will go to the ABA House of Delegates at its sessions Aug. 11-14 for endorsement.

The Commissioners also will consider drafts of a Uniform Consumer Sales Practices Act and a Uniform Adoption Act. Reports will be received from committees working on proposals affecting antitrust, trade secrets, abortion, eminent domain, real property, compensation for riot damage, and narcotic and hallucinogenic drugs.

Timberlake Honorary Initiation

Timberlake Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, Wake Forest University initiated a new honorary member March 15, 1969. The new brother is Judge Raymond B. Mallardi Chief Judge of the North Carolina Court of Appeals. Judge Mallard's initiation was the highlight of the Chapter's annual Spring Banquet. John Snow, Justice of Timberlake Chapter, presented Judge Mallard with a gold key and certificate of membership.

Following the banquet on the Wake Forest University campus, a cocktail party and dance was given in honor of the Chapter's first honorary initiate in the State Room of the Hotel Robert E. Lee.

Judge Mallard attended Wake Forest College, where he also received his law degree in 1931. He practiced law until 1955 when he was appointed to the Superior Court Bench by former Governor Luther H. Hodges. He remained in this position until his appointment by Governor Dan K. Moore to the newly created North Carolina Court of Appeals. According to the statutory provisions of the new court act, Chief Justice R. Hunt Parker of the

Supreme Court of North Carolina designated Mallard as the first Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals, in wihch he is now serving.

After the ceremony, Judge Mallard addressed the Brothers on the 'Validity Of Student Dissent On Todays College Campuses." The Judge also presented Timberlake Chapter with Volume I of the North Carolina Court of Appeals Reports. This first volume and those to follow will be added to the Chapter's extensive library. Timberlake Chapter received "The Continuing Excellence Award" in 1968 after being selected for first place in the 1967 "Outstanding Chapter Competition."

On Monday evening, April 14, 1969, the PAD Distinguished Service Chapter Award was conferred on Brother Tom C. Clark, Associate Justice of the U.S. Sppreme Court(ret.), by Past Supreme Justice Robert E. Redding. The Justice thus becomes the sixth PAD to be so honored for his outstanding service to Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity.

Election to the Distinguished Service Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta is the highest award which can be conferred on a member of the Fraternity other than the office of the Supreme Justice. The unanimous vote of all members of the Supreme Executive Board is required for election.


Other recipients of the award have been Carl E. Dietze (Ryan '15), former Chairman of the Board of Trustees and Board of Tribunes; Frank E. Gray (Ford '43) former Executive Secretary and Supreme Secretary: Charles Tom Henderson (Brewer '28), former Supreme Vice Justice; Gen. J. Harry LaBrum (Taft '23), former Supreme Justice; and Mr. Justice Charles E. Whittaker (Benton '23), of the U.S. Supreme Court (ret.).

Mr. Justice Clark previously served two terms as Supreme Vice Justice of PAD and continues to serve the Fraternity in countless capacities. During the Distinguished Service Chapter recognition ceremony the Justice also received Kingston, Ontario. In 1835 he a presentation binder which included congratulatory letters from those attending the ceremony and other Brothers throughout the country.

Brother Clark, who retired from the United States Supreme Court in 1967 upon the appointment of his son, Ramsey Clark, as Attorney General of the United States, is now serving in a full-time capacity as Director of the Federal Judicial Center in Washington, D.C.



Canadian Chapter Installed

March 14, 1969 was a historic date in the minds and hearts of PADs everywhere for it marked the occasion of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity's acquisition of International Status via the installation of Sir John Alexander Macdonald Chapter at the University of Windsor Faculty of Law in Ontario, Canada. Hundreds of PAD Alumni reside in virtually every corner of the globe but this is the first PAD Active Chapter Charter granted outside of the continental limits of the United States.

Macdonald Chaper was named after the late Sir John Alexander Macdonald, who was the first Prime Minister of the Dominion of Canada. Biographical data on the chapter's namesake as contained in the petition is as follows:

"Born in 1815, Sir John was articled by George MacKenzie of opened his own practice there, and in 1836 was admitted to the Bar. Before running for a local government office eight years later, Sir John acquired a considerable professional reputation and established himself as a respected and popular citizen of the Kingston community. In 1867 Sir John was elected as Canada's first Prime Minister. He was opposed to oligarchial rule and religious privilege; though he was in favor of the cultural duality of Canada. He was fully prepared to consider new commercial policies rather than follow annexation programmes proposed by his opponents. Sir John's contribution to Canadian nation-building was nothing less than the bringing together of all divergent factions in Canada the result being the union of the whole of British North America into a general confederation called Canada. He died in 1891.''

Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity's Macdonald Chapter had its beginning in the fall of 1968 which also was the first semester commenced for the new Faculty of Law. Nineteen charter members, including Judge Thomas G. Zuber of the Faculty, were initiated during ceremonies held at the Essex County Courthouse in Windsor. The active brothers initiated were: John E. Kingsmill, William B. Stead, Nicholas P. G. Kapelos, Paul H. Mack, lin, Avrom W. Brown, Roger L. Clark, Paul M. Champagne, David A. Crowe, Gregory T. Evans, Jr., Gordon T. Gardner, William E. Representing the Fraternity were: Supreme Justice Henry C Rohr, Associate Tribune Kenneth C. Segal, District IX Justice Lawrence S. Turner and Special Assistant to the Supreme Justice Frank J. Mc-Cown. A delegation of brothers from neighboring law schools in Michigan included: Philip Dulmage, Justice of Detroit Alumni Chapter; Victor Cohn, Vice Justice of Murphy Chapter; Edward Wick, Clerk of Cooley Chapter; Julian Levant, Justice of Murphy Chapter: Julius McKanders, Treasurer of Cooley Chapter; Steve Myers, Justice of Cooley Chapter; Fred Foster, Charter Justice of Murphy Chapter; Don Shelton, Justice of Campbell Chapter and Dick Erickson, Vice Justice of Campbell Chapter.

The Faculty of Law of the University of Windsor was established in 1967 with the appointment of Dr. Mark R. MacGuigan as Dean of the Faculty. He was succeeded in August of 1968, following his election to the Federal Parliament, by Dean Walter S. Tarnopolsky. The first class of students was admitted in September, 1968, and the first law degrees at the University of Windsor will be conferred in 1971. A new law building which will have accommodations for a student body of 400, a faculty of 25, and a library of 150,000 volumes will be completed by the winter of 1969.

Following the installation and initiation ceremonies a reception was held at the Seaway Inn and was well attended by the new brothers, Supreme Officers, visiting brothers, wives, dates and guests. Macdonald Chapter officers were installed during the reception and are: John E. Kingsmill, Justice; Wm. Brian Stead. Vice Justice: Hugh Charles Mitchell, Clerk; Nicholas G. P. Kapelos, Treasurer; and Paul H. Macklin, Marshal, Judge Thomas G. Zuber will serve as Faculty Advisor. Following the reception a Midnight Dinner-Dance was hosted by the entire Faculty of Law student body.

(Continued from Page 1) President of the House of Representatives.

As a politician, Jose de Diego had a clear vision of the future. He was a defender of the independence of Puerto Rico from the United States and a believer of the establishment of the Confederation of the Greater Antilles. Because of his great battle in defense of the Spanish language and of Puerto Rican citizenship, the Spanish press gave him the honorable title "Gentleman of the language and of the race." Jose de Diego died in New York City in 1918 and the 16th of April, his birthday, is an official holiday in Puerto Rico.





Dr. Emery Publishes

Walter B. Emery (Harlan '33), formerly Professor of Television and Radio at Michigan State University and now a professor in the College of Social and Behavioral Sciences at Ohio State University has released his latest book National and International Systems of Broadcasting: Their History, Operation and Control. In addition, it explains the operation and control of more than 20 organizations concerned with broadcasting across national boundaries-the International Telecommunications Union, European Broadcasting Union and Eurovision, the International Television and Radio Organization and Inatervision, the Communications Satellite Corporation, the Voice of America. Radio Moscow. Radio Free Europe. Radio Peking. Radio Vatican, World Association of Christian Broadcasters, to mention only a

Willis Law Day **Project**

On May 1, 1969, after three months of preparation, forty Brothers of Willis Chapter - Ohio Northern University - went into twelve high schools in six counties to present their third annual Law Day program. The program which was expanded this year through the efforts of Justice Austin Wildman and the Brotherhood, included asking questions taken from The American Bar Association's Rule of Law Quiz. The questions chosen were ones that would provoke discussion in areas of concern to teenagers. The students were very receptive and were anxious to offer their opinions and understandings on capital punishment, narcotics offenders, campus disorders and amnesty, rape, joy riding in stolen cars, and many other subjects.

In addition, Willis Chapter preseented an assembly to Srawnee High School in Lima, Ohio. Over two-hundred students watched members of Phi Alpha Delta put on a mock trial of a narcotics offender. The assembly was a pilot project for Willis Chapter and such a success that it will be expanded next year.

The programs were very informative for students and a satisfying experience for the brothers of Phi Alpha Delta as reported by Ronald A. Marks, Chairman of the Willis Chapter Public Relations Committee.

Washington Named Dean

James A. Washington, Jr. (Brandeis '41), who was appointed acting dean of Howard University's Law School after the resignation of Dean Patricia Harris, was named Dean of the school on March 3, 1969 by the Board of Trustees.

Brother Washington received his A.B. and LL.B. (magna cum laude) from Howard University and an LL.M. from the Harvard Law School. He served as a professor at the Howard Law School from 1946 to 1958 and was the school's Vice Dean from 1958 to 1961. He has served as a visiting professor at the Georgetown Law Center and the Washington College of Law at American University. From 1961 until 1966 he was Chairman of the Public Service Commission of the District of Columbia and also a Board Member of the D.C. National Capital Housing Authority. In 1966 Dean Washington returned to the school as a Langston Professor of Law.

Brother Washington has rendered several articles for various law reviews and other legal publications. In 1968 he was appointed by Chief Judge David Bazelon of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals as a member of a committee to assist the implementation of the Report of the President's Commission of Crime in the District of Columbia.

PAD Official History Is Now Available!


