## San Diego PADs Host 39th Biennial International Convention 146 Chapters Are Represented

Delegates from 114 active chapters and 32 alumni chapters from all parts of the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico gathered at the Town and Country Hotel in San Diego, California, for the 39th Biennial International Convention, August 9-12, this year. The delegates representing the largest number of chapters ever to attend a PAD Convention were treated to a Convention with an excellent blend of fellowship, fraternal spirit, hard work, professional dedication and good times.

PADs from McCormick Chapter at the University of San Diego, Beaumont Chapter at California Western University, and the San Diego Alumni Chapter proved themselves to be excellent hosts because they were able to somehow convince the weather man to allow the temperature to remain in the mid '70s during the entire meeting.

The Convention opened on a social note on Tuesday evening, August 8 with a reception for all members and their families in the North Foyer of the \$5,000,000 convention center of the Town and Country Hotel. Elaborate hors d'oeuvres, an open bar and a Mariachi band combined to assure a good time for all.

The Convention was formally called to order by Supreme Justice Alex Hotchkiss at 10:00 o'clock the next morning in the Town and Country Hotel. (Continued on Page 5)

## Phi Delta Delta Merges With PAD

PAD added another "first" to its lists of accomplishments at the 39th Biennial Convention when the delegates in Convention assembled overwhelmingly approved a merger with Phi Delta Delta Women's Legal Fraternity.

Phi Delta Delta was founded at the University of Southern California College of Law November 11, 1911. It was organized to promote a high standard of scholarship, professional ethics and culture among women in law schools and in the legal profession.

The Fraternity has over 5,000 members with 57 law school chapters, many of which have become inactive as a result of the men's legal fraternities accepting women into membership for the past two years.

One of the conditions of the merger was expansion of the Supreme Executive Board from seven to nine members for a period of two years. The two added positions will be occupied by two members of Phi Delta Delta. They are Enid Williams Ross, Vice President of Phi Delta Delta, who will serve as our Supreme Second Vice Justice, and Daphne MacMillan, Treasurer of Phi Delta Delta who will serve as our Supreme Assistant Treasurer.

Phi Delta Delta held its International Convention at the Town and Country Hotel concurrently with that of PAD, thus joint committees met during convention to work out the myriad of practical and technical details. The merger was effected on the closing day of the Convention and was celebrated at the convention banquet.

Matthew S. (Sandy) Rae, Jr., of Manhattan Beach, California was elected Supreme Justice of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International at its 70th Anniversary Convention held in San Diego, California, August 9-12, 1972.

Our new Supreme Justice has served the Fraternity in various capacities for some 26 years and his election was the well deserved recognition of his outstanding service. He was initiated into Rutledge Chapter at Duke University and served that chapter as its justice. During his tenure as active chapter Justice, he initiated a rising young congressman, Richard M. Nixon.

Dear Judge Hotchkiss:

To you and to all the members of Phi Alpha Delta in Convention assembled, fraternal greetings and all good wishes for a pleasant and productive meeting. You gave me the honor of being your convention keynote speaker in Washington in 1968, and I know that PAD will continue its constructive programs of improvement of justice. I keenly regret that my schedule makes it impossible to join with you at this convention.

I would be remiss, both as Chief Justice and as a member of Phi Alpha Delta, if I failed to take this opportunity to reiterate the importance of a professional law fraternity such as ours. By sponsoring educational and professional programs for both students and alumni, it provides a continuing valuable service to the legal profession as well as to law schools and to law students.

I have spoken to you in the past on the PAD Inns of Court program, which is designed to encourage within the profession a proper regard for legal ethics and for legal etiquette, and I hope more of our chapters will sponsor that program and others like it to improve the quality of our profession. This is also true of the valuable program of sending speakers into the schools to teach pupils something of the crucial role of the lawyer in modern society.

I have followed with interest the pioneering steps taken by some of our chapters in developing a more clinical approach to legal education, and I commend our Brother Justice Tom Clark, a past Supreme Vice Justice of this Fraternity, for his leadership in this area. Few men in America have ever contributed so much to our common calling. PAD rightly regards him as its outstanding Brother.

I urge the delegates to exchange ideas for the improvement and the expansion of these ongoing programs. I am sure that their imagination and ingenuity will also suggest other areas of activities in which Phi Alpha Delta may continue to provide its well-recognized professional service to the law student, to the law school, and to the legal profession.

In today's changing world, we have need for lawyers with integrity and courage, with vision and imagination. May Phi Alpha Delta continue to nurture and develop these qualities.

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

NORMAN M. OWEN


During his law school career he served as law clerk for the San Diego Gas and Electric Company. He presently is engaged in private practice in the firm of Owen and Smith.

## Message from the Supreme Justice

I approach this, my first message as Supreme Justice, with appreciation for the honor which has been bestowed upon me by the members, with a feeling of responsibility to carry on in the great tradition of those who preceded me in this office, and with anticipation of the opportunities to work with all of you in expanding the services of Phi Alpha Delta.

Just as the law schools of our nation are entering a new era in teaching concepts and as the profession itself is changing in outlook and emphasis, so too Phi Alpha Delta is embarking upon new programs to meet the changing needs of the law students, the law schools, and the profession. Our future success will depend as it has in the past upon the interest and activity of our members. The most important of our members are those who are students in the law schools. Our programs are designed primarily to be of service to them and it is to them we look for new projects.

We commence this biennium with a major change of far-reaching significance in our fraternal structure. Phi Delta Delta, with its rich traditions of professional service and distinguished membership, and Phi Alpha Delta merged at the conclusion of their respective conventions in San Diego. The Supreme Executive Board of the merged organization has the benefits in its deliberations of the viewpoint of two lady attorneys. One of these two brings to the board for the first time direct representation of our Canadian members. These changes completed the transformation which began two years earlier in the pioneering step taken by Phi Alpha Delta to admit ladies to membership. The elimination of the former discrimination on the basis of sex gave belated recognition to the professional fact of life that the ladies are entering the profession in ever increasing numbers, have proven their capabilities many times over and are entitled to full equality of treatment. The very fact that Phi Alpha Delta pioneered the change in attitude of the professional legal fraternities makes it incumbent upon us now to develop the programs to enable our new members to achieve the full professional equality to which they are entitled. An obvious first step is to complete on the local level the merger which has been accomplished at the international level. Already the programs of the formerly separate organizations have been combined in Los Angeles and Washington, D.C.

It is important for the members of Phi Delta Delta and Phi Alpha Delta to take the initiative on the local level to contact each other. In some areas, particularly in Canada, Phi Delta Delta has much the stronger alumni organization. Where this is true the Phi Delta Delta group should encourage local PADs to participate in its activities and thus expand the base of professional service locally. In those areas where Phi Alpha Delta has been dominant, its members should seek out the local PDD leadership and bring them into the existing programs.

Neither group should hold back waiting for an invitation from the other. You are all lawyers. Now you are all PADs. The merger has given you greatly expanded opportunities for service. When you find each other, you will discover that the programs each has been conducting are well worthy of expansion by the newly enlarged group.

As is obvious from the contents of this issue of The Reporter, those of us who were privileged to attend the international convention came away with a renewed appreciation for the professional preeminence of our fraternity. Even through the recent difficult past, Phi Alpha Delta has maintained on most campuses a professional program which complemented the academic program and afforded the

student opportunities to meet members of the bench and bar which would not otherwise have been afforded. Every indication is that the campus difficulties of the recent past have subsided and that this year there is a return to attaining objectives through established organizations. This is bringing a renewed interest in professional fraternities. It is vital that this interest be justified by providing a professional program which will warrant student participation.

Phi Alpha Delta has a particular opportunity to be of service on some campuses where unrest in the recent past was unfortunately more severe than on most campuses. An interesting phenomenon on campuses so afflicted seems to have been a serious erosion of leadership. Now there is an opportunity for those willing to assume responsibility to fill this gap. Phi Alpha Delta can and should come forward with personnel to restore other law school organizations and activities such as the student government, the school newspaper and the law school directory.

To those of you who were at the convention, thank you for the inspiration which came from your dedication, hard work and spirited debate. To all of our new members from Phi Delta Delta, welcome. We look forward to working with you at every level of the fraternity. We anticipate an expansion of our activities because of the inspiration which you will bring to us. To all of our other members who were not able to attend the convention, may I say that you would have been proud, as those of us present were, to watch the law student of today meet and dispose of serious problems across a wide spectrum of philosophical, economic, educational and political considerations. Our profession will be greatly enriched when these young men and women join it. Hopefully, their lives were enriched by this opportunity to engage in the serious business of directing the future of the greatest of all legal fraternities for the next two years. It is a privilege for me and every member of the Supreme Executive Board to serve an organization which can attract such capable and responsible student members.

## Redding Elected to Distinguished Service Chapter

The highest honor in PAD was bestowed upon Past Supreme Justice Robert E. Redding at the 1972 Convention when he was elected to membership in the Distinguished Service Chapter. The presentation was made by Supreme Secretary-elect Donald R. Moore. His remarks follow.

"It is a rare privilege that is mine tonight. I have been asked, on behalf of the Supreme Executive Board, to confer an honor that has been bestowed upon only a few members of Phi Alpha Delta. I refer to the designation of a Fraternity member as a member of our Distinguished Service Chapter. This is an honor that has been jealously guarded. Election to the Distinguished Service Chapter has been and is intended to recognize unusual and outstanding service to the Fraternity.

Membership in the Distinguished Service Chapter is accordingly small and selective. Here is one area where exclusivity is not questioned.

It is obvious that over the years countless members have devoted countless hours of voluntary, uncompensated service to the Fraternity. And they have been honored in various ways, including election as Supreme Officers. However, the honor conferred by membership in the Distinguished Service Chapter is reserved for those select few whose service has been truly exceptional. This is best illustrated by the fact that since the Chapter was established in 1966, only seven individuals have been elected thereto. The living members are: Past Supreme Vice-Justice Tom C. Clark, Past Supreme Secretary Frank E. Gray, Past Supreme Vice-Justice Charles Tom Henderson, Past Associate Tribune William B. Robertson; and former Supreme Court Justice Charles E. Whittaker. Past Supreme Justice Harry (Hap) La Brum and Past Associate Tribune Carl Dietze, both now deceased, were also DSC members.

Now, by the unanimous vote of the Supreme Executive Board, another name is to be added to this luminous roll of honor.

We honor this evening a man who has stood tall in our councils for more than a quarter of a century. You heard on Wednesday of the low estate to which we had fallen during World War II. Here is one of those who helped start PAD on the road back after its near dissolution. While still in uniform, he was instrumental in reactivating one of our oldest chapters — the William Howard Taft Chapter at Georgetown University Law School in Washington, D.C. And thereafter he played a similar role in the revitalization of the Washington, D.C. Alumni Chapter, becoming its justice during the early post-war years.

Thus began a career of service to PAD that is virtually unmatched. His credentials are impeccable. He has held office at all levels of this

served, this man brought not only a selfless devotion to duty, but imaginative and innovative ideas as well.

Limitations of time permit me only to highlight his contributions:

Beginning with an Effective Speaking Program modeled after Toastmasters, International, he was the primary moving force in setting our course as a truly professional law fraternity. It was the emphasis on professional programming developed under his leadership that accounted for our phenomenal progress in the Fifties and Sixties.

As Treasurer for two terms, he instituted accounting and financial reporting procedures that helped the Supreme Board and the membership at large to understand better our financial positions and to spotlight areas of need. He sponsored a financial stability survey of our active chapters that materially assisted each of them to operate on a sound financial basis.

He played a vital role in bringing into our council men of stature in the judiciary, in the practicing Bar, and in legal education. He was largely instrumental in enlisting the active participation in PAD of Tom Clark and of Judge Alfred P. Murrah. As Supreme Justice, he instituted a program of committee utilization that not only permitted in-depth consideration of numerous programs and problems but also served to bring into active participation at the international level, outstanding and dedicated members, both active and alumni.

He was the moving spirit in such programs as PAD Day at the Supreme Court.

His contributions have not ceased with his retirement as Supreme Justice. As Chairman of the Supreme Advisory Board during 1968-1970, he gave valuable counsel to the Supreme Executive Board. He has continued to play an active role in PAD Day at the Supreme Court. He has been Chairman of a Distinguished Membership Committee designed not only to encourage honorary memberships but also to enlist the active participation of such persons in Fraternity affairs.

He was the keynote speaker at the 1970 Convention in New Orleans, agreeing to pinch-hit at the last minute for Counselor to the President Robert Finch.

My emphasis has properly been on the PAD career of our honoree. But you should know that although it might appear that he worked

full-time for PAD without remuneration, he has carved out a noteworthy career in the law and in public service at county, state, and federal levels. After five years of Federal Government service, he was engaged in private practice for nearly a decade, specializing in aviation and taxation, and he served as Chief Judge of the Appeal Tax Court of Montgomery County, Maryland.

For the next ten years, he was Vice President and General Counsel of the Transportation Association of America, a sort of a super trade association, embracing all facets of the transportation industry. In that capacity, he spearheaded the campaign that led to the passage of the Uniform Time Act, thereby acquiring the sobriquet of "Father Time," a nickname belied by his youthful appearance and by his youthful actions, but nevertheless appropriate because his accomplishments indicate that he has discovered more than twenty-four hours in the day. He found time in the midst of this busy professional career, for example, for leadership in community organizations and for significant contributions to state and local government. He is a man of many talents, and a catholicity of interest that is truly remarkable. For instance, he blows a hot trumpet and has done so more than once in Preservation Hall, down New Orleans way.

He now holds a key position in the new Department of Transportation with the formidable title of Director of the Office of Facilitation. His challenging assignment is to facilitate the movement of people and goods, not only in the United States but throughout the world. And those of us who have served with him know that if any movement can be achieved, if any movement can be accomplished, he will do it. In fact, he quickly won an official commendation from DOT Secretary Volpe for his outstanding work.

With this professional background as lawyer, judge, and government administrator, and in view of his history as a dedicated leader in this Fraternity, it is altogether fitting that we should honor him to-

## Summary of Action of 1972 Convention

The 39th Biennial International Convention of the Fraternity was a hard working Convention and a summary of the multitude of actions taken follows:

### MERGER

1. Overwhelmingly approved a merger with Phi Delta Delta Legal Fraternity.

2. Provided that the name of Phi Delta Delta should be preserved on all publications and materials of Phi Alpha Delta for a period of ten years.

3. Provided that the membership of the Supreme Executive Board should be increased from seven to nine for a period of two years and that the two added positions should be occupied by members of Phi Delta Delta. The positions added were Supreme Second Vice Justice and Supreme Assistant Treasurer.

4. Provided that all active and alumni chapters are merged into the one organization.

5. Provided that all members of Phi Delta Delta automatically become members of the merged organization and are entitled to all privileges of membership in Phi Alpha Delta.

### ALUMNI RELATIONS

1. Approved the furnishing of computer print-out lists to all active and alumni chapters on at least an annual basis.



Country Room. An unexpected person in attendance was Brother Robert H. Finch (Ross Chapter), former Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare and Consultant to the President, who was especially designated by President Richard M. Nixon (Rutledge Chapter) to extend words of welcome to his fellow PADs. The complete text of Brother Finch's remarks and reprint of a letter from the President appear elsewhere in this issue.

Weitkamp, Moderator, Supreme Treasurer Donald R. Moore and District Justice Richard P. McCully panelists; Chapter Programming — Supreme Vice Justice Matthew S. Rae, Moderator, Supreme Historian Frank E. Maloney, Executive Secretary Michael B. Harwin and Tom Kummer of Timberlake Chapter, panelists; Alumni Chapters — Past Supreme Justice Henry C. 









He attended his first convention as a delegate from Rutledge Chapter in 1946. From 1949 to 1951 he was national field representative under Supreme Justice Douglas L. Edmonds, Associate Justice of the California Supreme Court. As such he was instrumental in reactivating and establishing countless chapters both active and alumni.

He has served as a District Justice on both the east and west coasts, and also served as Justice of the Los Angeles Alumni Chapter.

His previous service on the Supreme Executive Board has been for six years which has included terms as Supreme Treasurer, Supreme Advocate, and Supreme Vice Justice.

"Sandy" as he is affectionally known to literally thousands of PADs throughout the world, is a partner in the Los Angeles law firm of Darling, Hall, Rae and Gute. He is a member of the Board of Governors of Town Hall of California, a past President of Legion Lex, and a past Commander of Allied Post of the American Legion.

He has been active in Republican politics and is a past President of the California Republican League. He presently serves on the Republican State Central Committee and on various other political committees.

Sandy and his wife Janet (whose father was also a PAD) are residents of Manhattan Beach, California, where they reside with their three daughters, Mary-Anna, Peggy and Janet.

The Supreme Vice Justice of the Fraternity is the Hon. C. Raymond Justice, a Judge of the Municipal Court of the City of Houston.

Brother Justice served as Charter Justice of Houston Chapter at South Texas College of Law and so impressed the then members of the Supreme Executive Board that he served for two terms as Assistant to the Supreme Justice. During that time, he made 127 individual Chapter visitations covering 84 of our active Chapters and also visited many alumni Chapters and law schools where expansion was a possibility.

In recognition of his outstanding service, the 1966 Convention elected him to the office of Supreme Historian. He is the author of the official History of the Fraternity, the International Handbook, the Chapter Officer's Manual and numerous other manuals and Fraternity publications and papers.

He is a past President of the Texas Association of Municipal Judges and is on the Board of Directors of the North American Judges Association.

The first woman to ever serve as a member of the Supreme Executive Board is Enid Williams Ross who was elected to the newly created position of Supreme Second Vice Justice. She previously served as First Vice President of Phi Delta Delta Legal Fraternity and was a hard working member of Phi Delta Delta's Merger Committee. She is engaged in private practice with her husband in Vancouver, British Columbia.

Our Supreme Advocate is Don Hutson, one of the most outstanding trial attorneys in the State of Missouri. He is a native of Kansas City, Missouri and obtained his LL.B. from George Washington University in Washington, D.C., where he became a member of Jay Chapter and served as student District Justice.

He was Missouri's State Oratory Champion for two years and later became National Intercollegiate Oratory Champion.

He served as staff assistant to the United States Senator Stuart Symington from 1955 to 1959 and was Assistant Prosecuting Attorney for Jackson County, Missouri,

from 1959 to 1963. He was General Chairman for the 1966 Convention in Kansas City and at that time was elected to the Supreme Executive Board. He has previously served as Supreme Marshal, Supreme Treasurer and Supreme Secretary. Brother Hutson is a teacher and ordained Minister as well as an attorney at law.

The new Supreme Secretary is Donald R. Moore of Washington, D.C., an Administrative Judge with the Federal Trade Commission since 1961. He has been a member of the Commission staff since 1946. An ex-newspaperman, Brother Moore previously served as Director of Public Information for the Federal Trade Commission.

He received his LL.B. from Georgetown University in 1950 where he became a member of Taft Chapter. He is a former Justice of his active Chapter, past Justice of the Washington, D.C., Alumni Chapter, a past District XIII Justice and served as an Associate Tribune for six years. He has previously served two terms on the Supreme Executive Board as Supreme Historian and Supreme Treasurer.

The new Supreme Treasurer is Frank J. McCown, a member of McKinley Chapter at Ohio State University. Brother McCown has served for many years as Special Assistant to the Supreme Justice. In that capacity he has visited numerous Chapters and has assisted the Supreme Executive Board and the Executive Director in many matters. He is Justice of the Tri-State Alumni Chapter and is a practicing attorney in Ironton, Ohio.

The newly created post of Supreme Assistant Treasurer has been filled by Commander Dalphine MacMillan of Washington, D.C. She has previously served as treasurer of Phi Delta Delta Legal Fraternity and is extremely well known for her outstanding competence in the field of taxation.

Our new Supreme Historian is Charles H. Taylor, a member of Timberlake Chapter at Wake Forest University. Until recently he served as the Minority Leader in the North Carolina State House of Representatives. In the recent elections he was overwhelmingly elected to the State Senate.

He is a former Justice of Timberlake Chapter and served for many years as Justice of District XVI.

The new Chief Tribune of the Fraternity is William Frank Worthington, a member of Temple Chapter at Hastings College of Law. "Pancho" as he is often called was admitted to practice in 1932 and is a senior partner in the firm of Worthington & Worthington in San Francisco.

He has served one term as an Associate Tribune and for many years was District Justice of District II. His memberships include the State Bar of California, the American Bar Association, the San Francisco Bar Association and the San Francisco Lawyer's Club.

Ken Enenbach, former District VI Justice, was elected to the position of Associate Tribune.

Brother Enenbach obtained his B.A. in Political Science at Wichita State University. He graduated with a J.D. degree in 1968 from the University of Missouri. Since that time he has been employed as an Assistant Prosecuting Attorney for Jackson County, Missouri.

While attending law school he served as Justice of Vaught Chapter and as both District Student Treasurer and District Student Clerk.


He also presently teaches in the Law Enforcement/Criminology Department of Metropolitan Junior College and is a member of the National District Attorneys Association.











the Convention which have a financial impact upon the Fraternity's finances.

**PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE**

1. Recommended the inclusion of the following items in The Reporter in a consistent format:

- A. A descriptive outline of a model chapter operation with emphasis on successful programming.
- B. Articles on special projects of interest to active chapters.
- C. An alumni section.
- D. Articles relating to particular specialized areas of practice.
- E. Reprint of articles from legal periodicals.
- F. A section on District and Active Chapter affairs.

2. That the editorial staff of The Reporter consider inclusion of a classified section.

3. Directed retention of the following materials:

- A. Message from the Supreme Justice.
- B. Letters to the Editor.
- C. Directory of Active Chapters with listing of officers, annually only.
- D. Special presentations such as speech of Chief Justice Warren Burger contained in the October 1969 issue.

4. Suggested the inclusion of an index on the front cover.

5. Requested that the report of the publications committee be made available to the publications committee at the 1974 Convention.

**PLACEMENT**

1. Recommended the creation of an International Placement Committee consisting of four alumni and four student members to be appointed by the collective action of the District Justices at each International Convention.

2. Recommended the creation of the position of an International Placement Director whose duties and responsibilities would be directed exclusively to placement services and should be a full time employee receiving adequate compensation and expense reimbursement.


3. Recommended that the Placement Director file a report of his activities and accomplishments as often as requested by the Committee but not less than semi-annually.

4. Recommended that such programs shall be available to Fraternity members no later than January 1, 1973.

**CONVENTIONS AND CONCLAVES**

1. Directed that the Executive Director prepare a detailed study of Convention and Conclave costs to be presented to the 1974 Convention for the purpose of determining the desirability of annual conventions and the discontinuance of district conclaves.

2. Directed that the Executive Office include in the PAD Library a booklet containing detailed information on how to conduct a successful District Conclave drawing upon information obtained from past successful conclaves.
3. Disapproved a resolution that future international conventions be held in the so-called "central corridor of the United States."
4. Directed that the Supreme Board with the assistance of the Executive Director undertake a study for the purpose of determining means of strengthening district conclaves, specifically investigating problem areas of inadequate funding of district conclaves, inadequate communication of information about conclaves, inadequate information of all available services from the International Executive Office at conclaves, and inconvenient geographical configuration of districts.

**SCHOLARSHIPS, FELLOWSHIPS AND LOANS**

1. Authorized the continued granting of not less than ten \$500 minority fellowships each year.
2. Directed the reduction of the number of scholarship awards from forty to seventeen \$500 scholarships, one per district, with any excess funds to go to the loan program.
3. Directed that emphasis be placed upon scholarship, fellowship, loan and award programs to provide substantial aid to the greatest number of students while at the same time increasing the total monies available to assist students now and in the future.
4. Deleted the requirements of a co-signer on PAD loans.

5. Approved the Fraternity's acting as guarantor on loans for alumni members.

**PAD TERMINOLOGY**

1. Declined to define the term "minority" for purpose of fellowship awards.
2. Declined to change the name of the organization from "Fraternity" to "Association."
3. Retained all other present PAD terms with the exception of the following:
  - A. Changed "rush" to "membership drive."
  - B. Changed "rush activities" to "membership activities."
  - C. Changed "Rush Manual" to "Membership Manual"
  - D. Changed "The Reporter of Phi Alpha Delta" to "The Reporter of Phi Alpha Delta International."

**CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS**

1. Defeated an amendment to provide for three Supreme Marshals which positions would be filled by student members.
2. Defeated a proposal to change the word "Fraternity" to "Society."
3. Adopted an amendment to define associate, field of law, and legal profession extending the possibility of allowing non-lawyers to be elected to honorary membership of the Fraternity.
4. Approved an amendment to provide that the Supreme Tribunal shall have the power to interpret provisions of the Constitution and By-Laws.
5. Approved the deletion of the power of the Supreme Tribunal to provide advisory opinions.
6. Extended the maximum service of members on the Supreme Executive Board from eight years to twelve years.
7. Adopted various technical changes.

**PAD IN THE 70's**

1. Recommended that the Fraternity make an effort to determine what programs are available for minority and disadvantaged students in the Fraternity, work through the use of available programs to aid such students; further recommended the Fraternity consider supplementary programs only if it determines that available programs are not adequate.
2. Recommended that no action be taken to actively recruit outstanding pre-legal students as recommended by a special committee on goals of the Fraternity for the reason that diligent efforts are already being expended by law schools in this area. Directed that each active chapter give consideration to devising better means of guaranteeing continuity of operation in its organization.
3. Directed that alumni be encouraged to take an interest in the programs of active chapters by:
  - A. Appointing liaison officers between each active and alumni chapter.
  - B. Using active chapter liaison officers to promote alumni chapters where none presently exist.
  - C. Placing of alumni and active chapters on each others mailing lists.
  - D. Using active chapters to encourage their graduates to join alumni chapters.
4. Recommended the development of the individual alumni advisor program under which one alumnus serves as an advisor to one student.
5. Recommended that active chapters take an active role to promote closer student-alumni relationships under the summer internship program.
6. Recommended that the Supreme Justice implement a program to compile a list and description of all clinical educational programs, in law schools which main-

tain active chapters and disseminate such information to all active and alumni chapters of the fraternity.


**PROFESSIONAL SERVICES**

1. Disapproved the sponsorship of a moot court competition on a local chapter level.
2. Directed the Executive Office to develop a form for use by active chapters to summarize the steps taken and the problems faced during the creation of any particular professional program and that such form be filed in the PAD Library.
3. Directed the Executive Office to assemble a descriptive list of all professional programs submitted as part of the Outstanding Chapter Competition and file the same in the PAD Library.
4. Directed that a copy of the PAD Library be mailed to each new chapter Justice and Vice Justice upon receipt of Form C in the Executive Office.
5. Directed that the Fraternity encourage each individual chapter to develop programs specifically oriented toward meeting the needs of the disadvantaged in their community.

**DR. EDWIN MOOERS DIES**

Dr. Edwin A. Mooers, Sr., professor of law at American University in Washington, D.C., passed away recently. He was a good and devoted friend of Brandeis Chapter and of many others. He served as a full time professor of law from 1938 until his retirement in September, 1971.

His was a life that was dedicated to the profession and to the teaching of the law. He was the original incorporator, director, general counsel, secretary and chairman of the Executive Committee of Morris Plan Bank of Washington from 1920 to 1938. He served as counsel for the Morris Plan System throughout the country until 1938. He

served as chairman of the United States Board of Arbitration from 1941 to 1945.

He codified the laws of the District of Columbia completing his work in 1924, and several years later compiled the first official District of Columbia Code. He also compiled the Welfare Laws of the District of Columbia.

When asked to comment on the passing of Dr. Mooers, one of his closest friends, a PAD professor, Louis C. James of American University, stated as follows:

"The comments of our Brandeis Chapter of PAD speak of the ability and leadership of the late Dr. Edwin A. Mooers, Sr., as a teacher, administrator, attorney and leader in the affairs of a very busy life:

I brought the Brandeis Chapter to our College of Law in 1960 with the aid and advice of the late Dr. Mooers and the late Dean John Sherman Myers, both of whom became members of our chapter and aided me as faculty advisor since 1960 in many admirable suggestions.

I speak of Dr. Mooers as one of my very best friends throughout my own busy life of 65 years.

Friendship is, indeed, a rare essence that even an Emerson would have difficulty in defining. You number, if you so as I do, your true friends on the fingers of two hands; sometimes on the fingers of one hand. Lucky, indeed, is a man who can truthfully call another his friend. A friend will tell you why and when you are wrong. A friend is one who will do for another what he would do for any member of his family including himself. A friend rejoices at the advancement of his friend, and, in some manner, aids and counsels in hope to help a dependent friend. The most intimate relations in life can be discussed with a friend with no fear of disclosures or damage. A friend is, indeed, a God on earth to man.

All of these qualities I found in the late Dr. Edwin A. Mooers, Sr. — need I say more than that he was my friend."

## Judge Ralph E. Hamill Dies

Hamill Chapter was deeply saddened by the untimely passing of our namesake, Judge Ralph E. Hamill on April 8, 1972. Judge Hamill suffered a heart attack while visiting the Indiana University campus in Bloomington, Indiana, where he had gone to hear his daughter perform with the Singing Hoosiers.

Judge Hamill was born in Mt. Vernon, Ill., on November 13, 1908. He did his undergraduate work at Butler University and received his law degree from Indiana University in 1932.

Judge Hamill served as Judge of Marion County Superior Court, Room 5, from 1942-1951. He was often heard to remark that he considered the custody of children "the most important litigation performed in the courts today."

After retiring as a Superior Court Judge, he specialized in civil practice in the firm of Hollowell, Hamill and Price. The firm later became Hamill, Price and Carroll. Judge Hamill served on the Judicial Council of the Supreme Court of Indiana, as a lecturer at Indiana University Law School, and last year was appointed to the State Board of Law Examiners. He was a member of the Indianapolis, Indiana, and American Bar Associations and the American College of Trial Lawyers.

In 1959, Judge Hamill was considered for the Republican nomination for Mayor of Indianapolis, but chose not to run stating that he preferred the private practice of law.

Judge Hamill was the namesake of Hamill Chapter of Phi Alpha

Delta at Indiana University Indianapolis Law School, which was founded on May 8, 1948. He was initiated into Phi Alpha Delta by Hamill Chapter.

Not only was Judge Hamill actively involved with the law, but he was active in Masonic work as well. He was a 33rd degree Mason, Past Master of Cumberland Masonic Lodge, Thrice Potent Master of Scottish Rite, and a member of the Murat Shrine.


Judge Hamill was very concerned with youth and devoted much time to DeMolay. He served as Grand Master of the International Order of DeMolay and provided the inspiration that led to the establishment of a statewide DeMolay camp and retreat in Indiana.

The Judge annually presented **Burns Indiana Statutes, Annotated** and **Harvey on Indiana Practice** to two outstanding members of Hamill Chapter. These awards were awarded on the basis of Honesty, character, common sense and knowledge of law. He also presented each graduating member of Hamill Chapter with a copy of Learned Hand's **The Bill of Rights**.

Judge Hamill was an inspiration, good friend and advisor to Hamill Chapter. He will be deeply missed.
