



# C. RAYMOND JUDICE IS **ELECTED SUPREME JUSTICE**

The Honorable C. Raymond Judice, better known as "Ray" Judice to thousands of PADs, was unanimously elected Supreme Justice of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International on August 9, 1974, at the conclusion of the 40th Biennial Convention held in Toronto, Canada. His election climaxes dedication and service to the Fraternity of the highest caliber. It was in 1959 that Brother Judice first came into contact with PAD. At that time he was a student at South Texas College of Law and developed an interest in establishing a chapter at that law school. His correspondence with Executive Director Fred Weitkamp resulted in the chartering of a chapter in 1960 and Ray served as Charter Justice of that chapter which was named the Samuel Houston Chapter.

He attended the 1962 Denver Convention and at that time was retained on a part-time basis as Assistant to the Supreme Justice. During this period of service he made 127 individual chapter visitations to 84 active chapters in addition to visiting many alumni chapters and law schools where active chapters were not then chartered. A number of new chapters were chartered as a result of these visita-

From 1962 to 1964 he maintained a law practice and later served as ton, Texas. He later was named

to the District Court for Texas and served in the Domestic Relations Division. He is presently the Executive Director of the Texas Judicial Council with offices in the State Capitol of Austin, Texas.

He served as alumni advisor of Houston Chapter from 1961 to 1963 and also as alumni advisor of Hickman Chapter at the University of Houston. He served several years as District Justice and was the delegate of the Houston Alumni Chapter at the 1962 and 1964 Bienof the Houston Alumni Chapter in 1968-1969.

He has served eight years as a member of the Supreme Executive Board, including Supreme Historian, (1966-1968), Supreme Secretary (1968-1970), Supreme Advocate (1970-1972), and Supreme Vice Justice (1972-1974).

He is the author of the official History of Phi Alpha Delta, the International Handbook, the Chapter Officers Manual and numerous other Fraternity publications and papers. He is also the author of a number of legal papers which have been published in several professional periodicals.

Our new Supreme Justice is presently a member of the Board of Governors of the American Judges Association and a member of the Board of Directors of the American Judicature Society. A past President of the Alumni Association of South Texas College of Law, he has also served as Chairman of the Committee on Courts of Limited Jurisdiction of the State Bar of

# **New District Justices Appointed**

A number of new appointments to positions of district justice have been made by the Supreme Executive Board. The new appointees have already been hard at work, having attended a training session in Kansas City recently and also having made a number of chapter visitations already this year. Stories on several of the appointments follow. Due to space limitations the remainder of the stories on the new appointments will appear in the December issue of The Reporter.

#### DISTRICT II

Newly appointed to the position of District II Justice is Jeff Gunther, a Deputy Attorney General in the office of the California Attorney General in Sacramento, California. District II includes Nevada and that portion of California lying north of the Tehachapi mountains.

Jeff attended Loyola Law School in Los Angeles and while there, served as clerk and then justice of Ford Chapter. During his tenure as Justice, the Chapter was awarded third place in the Outstanding Chapter Competition. He was also a winner of the PAD Scholarship Competition and the recipient of a scholarship from the Los Angeles Alumni Chapter of PAD.

Ken Haber, a private practitioner in Tucson, Arizona, is the new District IV Justice.

Prior to private practice, he was employed by the Central National Bank of Cleveland, the Cleveland Trust Company and the First National Bank of Madison, Wisconsin.


#### DISTRICT VIII



He graduated in the top twenty five per cent of his class from the University of Texas at Arlington where he obtained his Bachelor of Arts Degree in Government.



of Arts Degree in political science in 1969. He is presently attending Tulane University where he is a member of Martin Chapter and served this past year as Chapter Treasurer.


District XV - Joseph F. Morahan - Joseph F. Morahan is a member of Paterson Chapter at Seton Hall University School of



## Summary of **Convention Action**

The 40th Biennial Convention of the Fraternity was a hard working convention as is amply evidenced by the tremendous amount of work which was accomplished.

The convention determined as fol-

#### International Expansion

- 1. In addition to further expansion in the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico, international expansion shall be undertaken as the Supreme Executive Board finds feasible in the following countries and the following priorities before the next convention of the Supreme Chapter: (a) Mexico and the Caribbean and (b) the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ire-
- 2. The Supreme Executive Board was directed to communicate with all chapters regarding the feasibility of encouraging PAD members attending foreign summer sessions to implement the fraternity's program of foreign expansion and further requesting PAD members who have attended such sessions to report on the possibilities and other factors pertinent to the establishment of Chapters in those respective schools and countries.
- 3. The Supreme Executive Board is directed to actively solicit and seek new alumni chapters.

#### **Placement**

- 1. Local chapters should be responsible for acquiring placement information from within their immediate area, for supplying this information and any requested to the International Placement Director and for coordinating their overall placement activities for the District Justice.
- 2. The Supreme Executive Board shall appoint within 80 days from the date of adjournment of the 1974 convention and maintain an International Placement Director and Secretary to accomplish the purpose of his office as needs dictate.
- 3. The duties of the International Placement Director shall include but not be limited to:
  - (a) the collection of national and regional job placement information from PAD alumni organizations, national legal aid and defense associations, national district attorney associations, state bar associations, state governmental agencies, federal governmental agencies, PAD District Justices and any other available source including Fortune 500 and any other International corporations that employ attorneys as in House council or for other executive positions. (b) The distribution of any and all information received and acquired to all local active chapters, (c) the furnishing of a list of local alumni to local chapters as requested but not more than twice during any academic year, (d) continuing solicitation of job placement information for local chapters and to request responses within such time limits as he shall prescribe. 4. Each District Justice shall be
- responsible for all placement activities within his district.
- 5. The duties of the District Justice shall include but not be
- (a) The overall coordination of the local chapters in their placement activities, (b) the liaison between the local chapters and the International Placement Director in placement activities, (c) the telephoning or meeting with each local chapter placement officer within 90 days from the adjournment of the 1974 International convention, (d) the telephoning or meeting with each local chapter placement officers not less than once per month during each academic year, and (e) the providing of a district status report of local chapter activities within his district in their placement

- efforts to the International Placement Director by December 31 and May 31 of each year.
- 6 Each local chapter shall establish by election or appointment, a local placement officer.

7. The duties of the local place-

ment officer shall include but not

be limited to:

- (a) the communication of his address and telephone number for the district justice within 30 days after the first day of classes of the Fall term, (b) the obtaining of any and all placement information which has been requested by the International Placement Director or District Justice, (c) the submitting of any and all information requested by the International Placement Director or District Justice within the time period prescribed, (d) the collection of information in addition to that requested by the International Placement Director or District Justice pertaining to job placement from local sources such as but not limited to law school placement offices, local bar associations, PAD alumni,
- 8. The Supreme Executive Board shall appropriate such funds as are necessary to enable the International Placement Director to effectively implement the placement program.

local attorneys, law firms and

mental agencies, (e) the submit-

tal of such information indicated

in the preceeding paragraph to

the International Placement Di-

rector as obtained.

- 9. A copy of the Placement Committee's report shall be sent to each local chapter justice.
- 10. The Placement Committee's report shall be communicated by each first delegate to this convention to the members of this local chapter.
- 11. The Supreme Executive Board shall take suggestions as it deems necessary to fully implement and carry out the placement program.
- 12. To provide continuity and education at succeeding conventions and to provide an opportunity to analyze the successes and shortcomings of the placement program, a workshop on job placement shall be established for the next International Convention.

#### Constitution and By-Laws

- 1. Amended the Constitution to provide that no person can be an associate for more than 8 months.
- 2. Adopted an amendment to the By-Laws to provide that the fiscal year should be such annual period as may be determined by the Supreme Executive Board.
- 3. Amended the By-Laws to provide that alumni dues shall be \$10.00 per year for the first three years after a member has graduated or left law school, \$15.00 per year for the next two years and thereafter the sum of \$20.00 per
- 4. Amended the By-Laws to provide that the sum of \$2.50 from each alumni dues payment shall be added to the Endowment Fund.
- 5. Amended the By-Laws to provide that 12½% of each life membership fee shall be added to the Endowment Fund.
- 6. Tabled a proposal to change the frequency of the holding of International Conventions from biennial to annual.
- 7. Amended the Constitution to change the number of positions on the Supreme Executive Board from seven to nine, adding the positions of Supreme Second Vice Justice and Supreme Parliamentarian.
- 8. Adopted a resolution calling for a department of a temporary committee to study the questions of alumni dues and services and support of alumni and alumni chapters and to study the feasibility of various alternatives to increasing the number of alumni who regularly participate in the affairs of the

#### Scholarships, Fellowships, Loans and Awards

- 1. Directed the Executive Director to organize an annual fund drive by direct mail. Solicitation of all alumni and that the funds so collected less reasonable expenses, be applied to the Endowment Fund.
- 2. Directed that the Supreme Executive Board appropriate an acceptable amount from the general fund to the Endowment Fund, not to be less than \$5,000 annually.
- 3. Directed that the student scholarship program be continued as presently administered with the exception that scholarship amounts awarded be reduced from \$500 per district to \$50 per district and an appropriate amount of funds be allocated for plaques and certificates in conjunction with scholarship awards and that the monies saved from the reduction of scholarship amounts be reallocated into the general endowment fund for loans or fellowships consistent with the constitution and by-laws.

## Conventions — Frequency and Terms of Office

1. Directed that future convention sites be selected with strong considerations for cost of accommodations and food, transportation and accessability to the center core of the city to the delegates.

#### Professional Service

- 1. Recommended that among the activities to be conducted by alumni chapters, the following be considered:
- (a) Judicial reception programs, (b) awards to deserving members of the area bench, (c) breakfast programs, (d) programs which allow students to accompany attorneys through a working day, (e) practical seminars and speaker programs.
- 2. Directed that a revised catalog on law related films be obtained which indicates the availability of films, location thereof, rental cost and a description of such films.
- 3. Directed that the Executive Office support and encourage the development of chapter Inns of Court Programs and that active chapters avail themselves of the pertinent information available in the PAD Library.
- 4. Directed that the Executive Office develop and administer a survey on student participation and law school administration and standards for administration of para-legal programs.

#### Audit and Finance

1. Recommended that the accounting firm making a certified audit of the funds of the Fraternity take a statistical sampling of individual endowment loan receivable accounts.

- 2. Continued the existing policy of charging 8% per annum on student loans accruing from the date of funding of the loan.
- 3. Recommended that the Supreme Executive Board study the feasibility of several possible sources of additional revenue for the Endowment Fund including the making of direct appropriations from the general fund, the establishment of a bond program for PADs, the establishment of bank lines of credit, the establishment of scholarships, fellowships or loans in the name of the donor or contributors of a certain amount, the administration of the small loan funds and the utilization of any other method deemed desirable.
- 4. Approve the financial statements submitted by the fraternity's certified public accountants.

#### Publications

- 1. Approved the format of **The Reporter** as it presently exists with the addition of a classified section for placement and an alumnicolumn.
- 2. Recommended that more current photographs and copy be used in the rush booklet to place more emphasis on women, minorities and International members.
- 3. Directed that no further printing of the handbook be made until the 1976 convention in order that the Publications Committee of that Convention may consider the elimination or revision of said publication.
- 4. Directed that a new rushing flyer be prepared similar to the new rushing flyer but directed towards international members deemphasizing the United States members. Further directed that said flyer be printed in French, English and Spanish.
- 5. Directed that a form of rushing booklet be prepared and provided in mimeograph form in the Spanish language, with the assistance and consultation of the deDiego Chapter.

He is listed in Who's Who in the South and Southwest, Personalities of the South, and the Dictionary of International Biography.

#### Hutson Is Supreme Vice Justice

Our new Supreme Vice Justice is Don Hutson, one of the leading trial attorneys in Missouri.

Don Graduated with honors from Central College in Missouri in 1953. He took graduate study work at the University of Missouri and graduated with honors from George Washington University in 1958 where he received his Juris Doctor Degree.

He is a teacher and ordained minister.

He served as Staff Assistant to United States Senator Stuart Symington from 1955 to 1959 and was Assistant Prosecuting Attorney for Jackson County, Missouri, from 1959 to 1963.

He was Missouri's State Oratory Champion for two years and later was named the National Intercollegiate Oratory Champion.

His service to PAD includes: Jay Chapter Justice, past District XII Student District Justice, past District Justice for the Missouri Area, Supreme Marshal, Supreme Treasurer, Supreme Secretary, Supreme Advocate, 1966 General Convention Chairman, author of the PAD Social Activities Guide, the PAD Chapter Activities Guide, PAD Rushing Guide, PAD Alumni Chapter Officer's Manual and in addition, he has served as chairman of various committees including those on Conclaves, Alumni activities, Active Chapter activities, Student Admission to Practice, Student Advocacy and the Phi Delta Delta Merger.

He is listed in Who's Who in the Midwest and has twice been named in Who's Who in American Universities and Colleges.

#### Moore Is Second Vice Justice

The 1974 International Convention created a new position on the Board to be designated Supreme Second Vice Justice. Elected to fill this position was Judge Donald R. Moore of Washington, D.C., a newspaper man turned lawyer. He now serves as an Administrative Law Judge for the Federal Trade Commission.

Active in numerous professional and civic organizations, he was formerly President (1972-1973) of the Federal Administrative Law Judges Conference, the national professional organization that represents some 800 federal adminis- as Supreme Treasurer. trative law judges.

Judge Moore has been a member of the Federal Trade Commission's Staff since 1946. For ten years before his appointment in 1961 as an FTC trial judge, he had been a trial attorney specializing in antimonopoly cases. An ex-newspaperman, he had previously served at the FTC as Director of Public Information and Assistant to the Chairman.

During World War II, he served as an intelligence and administrative officer in the Army Air Force. including overseas duty with the Thirteenth Air Force in the South Pacific. He was discharged with the rank of major.

He is an alumnus of Washington and Lee University and of Georgetown University Law School.

He has been active in PAD since his law school days when he was Justice of Taft Chapter. He helped reorganize the Washington Alumni Chapter and later became its Justice. While he was District Justice of the former District XII, he was instrumental in the chartering of three new active chapters and of three new alumni chapters as well as the activation of a fourth active chapter.

He was elected to the Supreme Tribunal in 1962 and served as an Associate Tribune until his election to the Supreme Executive Board in 1968. Since then he has served as Supreme Historian, Supreme Treasurer and Supreme Secretary.

He has attended every National Convention since 1956 and has been chairman or advisor of various convention committees.

#### Supreme Advocate Is McCown

The legal officer of the Fraternity is known as the Supreme Advocate, and the new Supreme Advocate is Frank J. McCown, a man well qualified for the position.

He is in active private practice in Ironton, Ohio, where he also serves as City Attorney and as Assistant Ohio Attorney-General for 3 counties.


He graduated from Miami University in 1962 and Ohio State University College of Law in 1964. In law school, he served as McKinley Chapter Justice and was very active in law school activities.

#### Supreme Secretary Is Taylor

Dalphine, a former member of Phi Delta Delta Legal Fraternity which was merged into Phi Alpha Delta in 1972, serves in the office of Judge Advocate General Navy Department as head of the income tax branch.

She graduated from George Washington University Law School in 1960 and thereafter enlisted in the United States Navy and advanced through the ranks to Commander.

In Phi Delta Delta, she served as President of the Zeta Chapter, and International Treasurer of Phi Delta Delta. She has served on the Supreme Executive Board of PAD for the past two years as Supreme Assistant Treasurer.

#### Supreme Historian Hart

Newly elected to the Supreme Executive Board is Judge Ladson Hart of North Carolina.

Another office on the Supreme Executive Board created by the 1974 Convention is that of Supreme Parliamentarian. Elected to fill this position was Enid Williams Ross, a former member of Phi Delta Delta Legal Fraternity.

Enid has served two years on the Supreme Executive Board as Supreme Second Vice Justice and was the President-Elect of Phi Delta Delta at the time of the merger with PAD. She served on the joint merger committee between Phi Delta Delta and PAD.

She is the only Canadian who serves on the Supreme Executive Board. Enid received her B.A. at age 19 and later began the practice of law in her father's law firm. She presently practices law with her husband Howard in Vancouver, British Columbia.

She has a strong interest in education and is presently serving her 12th year as a school trustee for West Vancouver. In the past five years, she has been a council member of Capilano Community College. She is also a member of the West Vancouver Advisory Town Planning Commission, and the West Vancouver Parks and Recreation Commission.

#### Supreme Tribunal Elected





He is presently serving as Professor of Law at the University of Georgia. Immediately prior to that, he served as Director of the Commission on the Bankruptcy Laws of the United States in Washington, recently concluded its work.
