Lincoln On How To Become A Good Lawyer

I am not an accomplished lawyer. I find quite as much material for a lecture in those points wherein I have failed, as in those wherein I have been moderately successful. The leading rule for the lawyer, as for the man of every other calling, is diligence. Leave nothing for tomorrow which can be done today. Never let your correspondence fall behind. Whatever piece of business you have in hand, before stopping, do all the labor pertaining to it which can then be done. When you bring a common-law suit, if you have the facts for doing so, write the declaration at once. If a law point be involved, examine the books, and note the authority you rely on upon the declaration itself, where you are sure to find it when wanted. The same of defenses and pleas. In business not likely to be litigated, — ordinary collection cases, foreclosures, partitions, and the like, — make all examinations of titles, and note them, and even draft orders and decrees in advance. This course has a triple advantage; it avoids omissions and neglect, saves your labor when once done, performs the labor out of court when you have leisure, rather than in court when you have not. Extemporaneous speaking should be practised and cultivated. It is the lawyer's avenue to the public. However able and faithful he may be in other respects, people are slow to bring him business if he cannot make a speech. And yet there is not a more fatal error to young lawyers than relying too much on speech-making. If any one, upon his rare powers of speaking, shall claim an exemption from the drudgery of the law, his case is a failure in advance.

Discourage litigation. Persuade your neighbors to compromise whenever you can. Point out to them how the nominal winner is often a real loser — in fees, expenses, and waste of time. As a peacemaker the lawyer has a superior opportunity of being a good man. There will still be business enough.

Never stir up litigation. A worse man can scarcely be found than one who does this. Who can be more nearly a fiend than he who habitually overhauls the register of deeds in search of defects in titles. whereon to stir up strife, and put money in his pocket? A moral tone ought to be infused into the profession which should drive such men

The matter of fees is important, far beyond the mere question of bread and butter involved. Properly attended to, fuller justice is done to both lawyer and client. An exorbitant fee should never be claimed. As a general rule never take your whole fee in advance, nor any more than a small retainer. When fully paid beforehand, you are more than a common mortal if you can feel the same interest in the case, as if something was still in prospect for you, as well as for your client. And when you lack interest in the case the job will very likely lack skill and diligence in the performance. Settle the amount of fee and take a note in advance. Then you will feel that you are working for something, and you are sure to do your work faithfully and well. Never sell a fee note — at least not before the consideration service is



Phi Alpha Delta was now to enter a period of troubled years. The economic conditions during the great depression — followed almost immediately by the outbreak of World War II — severely tested the mettle of the fraternity.

Later, after these troubles had passed, members were to look back upon this period and appreciate the basic strengths of the fraternity which served to pull the organization through this period of greatest adversity.

Economic conditions of the United States during the depression were so severe that only four new active chapters and six alumni chapters were chartered during the period of 1933 to 1946. Then, the war years devastated the established active chapters, with the vast majority of the chapters becoming inactive because of the sparse enrollments in the nation's law schools.

Because of the biting effects of the depression, the 1932 convention scheduled for Los Angeles was summarily cancelled. In early 1933 a mail ballot vote was taken of chapters to determine if they desired to schedule a convention for 1933. The returns almost unanimously favored further postponement.

Common occurrences were bank failings and dragging with them all of the financial resources of local chapters, as well as the personal resources of the chapter members. These failures included the Bank of Hollywood in which the general funds of the fraternity were deposited. However, there was little loss to the fraternity, "due to the small amounts of money on deposit."

At the 1933 board meeting, the Supreme Executive Board voted that the officers should personally visit each chapter. This was followed by proposals to "work out a plan of reducing the income of the national fraternity and at the same time maintaining good service to the chapters and their members."

Accordingly, the annual dues were reduced from \$7 to \$5, and adjustments were made extending near-delinquent chapter debts. In a 1933 issue of *The Reporter*, the Supreme Secretary issued a call for everyone in the fraternity to observe the 35th birthday of the fraternity by mailing a financial gift to the secretary's office of not less than three cents for every year of the fraternity's existence.

Two fraternity highlights of 1934 were the National Phi Alpha Delta

Night and, one month later, the George E. Fink Night.

Both events were designed to bring brothers together during this period and promote fellowship. Accordingly, National Phi Alpha Delta Night called for every chapter, active and alumni, to hold a meeting of some sort on January 20, 1934. Then, from radio stations throughout the country, messages to Phi Alpha Deltas everywhere would be broadcast. The plan met with success.

In Los Angeles, both actives and alumni metat the Los Angeles University Club and listened to speeches, followed by the university band from the University of Southern California accompanying Lorraine Bridges singing the "Phi Alpha Delta Sweetheart" song. Then, the program was closed by the assembled brothers singing "True To Thee, Phi Alpha Delta." The entire event was broadcast over radio station KMTR.

Further north in San Francisco, area members met, and jointly listened to Phi Alpha Delta radio programs emanating from Seattle. In Salt Lake City, Judge William H. Folland of the Utah Supreme Court spoke over radio station KSL. And chapter members at the University of Idaho, University of North Dakota, University of Oklahoma, and University of Nebraska tuned in


In the South, Morgan Chapter in Birmingham, Alabama, and Martin Chapter in New Orleans reported listening parties "in full swing." In Tallahassee, Florida, Governor David Scholtz and State Treasurer J. Edwin Larson spoke about Phi Alpha Delta and all area chapters

(Brewer, Fletcher, Keener, Fish, and the Atlanta Alumni Chapter)

In Chicago, U.S. District Attorney (and brother) Dwight H. Green told area radio audiences "there never was a time when our courts and other institutions had so much need for support from all sides." The speech carried such an impact that every Chicago newspaper commented editorially upon it the following day.

A month later, members throughout the country joined in publicly honoring a stalwart of the fraternity, Brother George E. Fink. The evening of February 20, 1934, was designated "George E. Fink Night" and brothers around the country toasted Brother Fink's good deeds. The March, 1934, issue of *The Reporter* was dedicated to Brother Fink, praising him as the man who "so loyally served our fraternity."

Additionally, The Reporter atated: "On Tuesday night, February 20, over 100 members of the Chicago Alumni Chapter gathered at the Hamilton Club for the regular monthly meeting. Previous to this meeting, Brother Fink had been invited to talk on the early history of the fraternity to make absolutely certain his attendance. Following the disposition of the business of the meeting, the brother justice announced that the meeting was being held in honor of Brother George Fink. Brother Fink was deeply moved and acknowledged his tribute in words of gratitude to Phi Alpha Delta. He spoke of the early

days of the fraternity and of many of the conventions he had attended."

It was in a weakened financial condition that the twenty-third biennial convention was called to order.

Thirty-two active chapters and 10 alumni chapters were represented. Of course, the financial plight of the fraternity was the prime topic of discussion. And, records indicate, talk about revoking delinquent chapters' charters was popular.

In the end, though, the delegates decided "no immediate steps" should be taken toward revoking any charters, as the end of the depression apparently was in sight, and because it seemed best that the

word 'revocation' be forgotten in favor of the word 'rehabilitation.'

Perhaps the first formal step toward firming up a sound fraternity policy on non-fraternity politics was conceived at this convention. A committee recommended that the fraternity in its group activities remain absolutely free from partisan politics, and that no national policy be adopted to either encourage or discourage active and alumni chapters from supporting a brother engaged in a political contest.

For extracurricular activities, delegates attended the Century of Progress World's Fair then in progress in Chicago. Brother Harry E. Rice, commodore of the fair's fleet, surrendered his fleet to the delegates for a boat trip around the fair area. The day the delegates attended the fair was designed "Phi Alpha Delta Day" and featured a nationwide N.B.C. radio broadcast of the address of the Supreme Justice preceded by the singing of the "Phi Alpha Delta Sweetheart Song."

Soon after the convention, word was received of the death of Brother Roland M. Hollock, the first Supreme Justice of Phi Alpha Delta, who had been living in retirement from the United States Army in Washington, D.C.

A year after the first "Phi Alpha Delta Night" — which had been successful — the second "Phi Alpha Delta Night" was called. The Reporter called the event the "second effort to have the 16,000 members of our fraternity sit down together to review the splendid record of Phi Alpha Delta, to live once again the glorious days of fraternal life, and to draw new inspiration from this meeting, to carry Phi Alpha Delta on to greater heights."

The Reporter stated the second 'Phi Alpha Delta Night' was a greater success than the original occasion. But continuing the move to combat the economic conditions of the country, the Supreme Executive Board meeting in September, 1935 reduced the annual subscription rate of The Reporter from \$2 to \$1.50, and the compulsory life subscription to the official magazine was eliminated. Additionally, alumni dues and alumni fees were suspended for 1935 and 1936, and the annual per capita chapter "tax" was reduced from \$8

As a result of the austerity program of financial belt tightening, the picture was starting to brighten.

Continuing this uphill turn, the twenty-fourth biennial convention meeting in Washington, D.C., in February, 1936, was called outstanding."

Making appearances or mounting the speaker's rostrum during the convention were Chief Justice William Howard Taft of the U.S. Supreme Court, Senator Millard E. Tydings, Senator F. Ryan Duffy, Senator Alben W. Barkley, and General Brien McMahon (later to become a United States Senator).

The following year, with the

fraternity continuing its comeback from the depression, Hamlin Chapter was transferred from the discontinued University of Maine law school to Loyola University School of Law in Los Angeles. Several months later the Capen Chapter charter was transferred from the extinct Illinois Wesleyan University to the University of San Francisco. (Subsequently, Hamlin Chapter was renamed the William Joseph Ford Chapter and Capen Chapter became the Matt I. Sullivan Chapter.)

The twenty-fifth biennial convention opened in Kansas City in 1938 on this continued note of optimism. The country was thought to be recovering from the depression and hopes were up that the fraternity would regain solid economic footing side by side with the national economy's recovery.

War clouds loomed on the horizon, though. And the delegates did not know this convention would be the last for several years or that the officers elected at this convention would serve until 1946.

The storm of war finally broke through in 1940 when Hitler began his intensified march across Europe. The American draft became a reality. And again — as had occurred during World War I — American youth put aside their academic thoughts and began picturing themselves in uniform.

Correspondingly, Phi Alpha Delta was to take a back seat to the war effort.


History had taught Phi Alpha Delta a lesson, though. The national officers anticipated the results and began a "buttoning up" of fraternity loose ends which was to later serve the fraternity well when peace returned.

The twenty-sixth biennial convention (scheduled for 1940) was postponed until 1941, and in 1941 was postponed indefinitely by the Supreme Board. And in its place the national officers worked to keep Phi Alpha Delta in the public eye. The future President of the United States, Senator Harry S. Truman, was honorarily initiated, as were Francis Biddle and Tom C. Clark, attorneys general, and Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Robert H. Jackson.


The New York Alumni Chapter had dinners in honor of William O. Douglas and Wiley B. Rutledge, justices of the Supreme Court. The Chicago Alumni Chapter honored past Supreme Justice Dwight H. Green on the occasion of his election to the governorship of Illinois. Interest was kept alive in other parts of the country through visitations by the national officers.

Other activities engaged in by Phi Alpha Delta during the war years were the establishment of a placement center: celebration of a national Phi Alpha Delta day at the San Francisco exhibition in 1939: preparation and distribution of a historical sketch of the fraternity: holding district conclaves in Kansas City and New York: active

There is a vague popular belief that lawyers are necessarily dishonest. I say vague, because when we consider to what extent confidence and honors are reposed in and conferred upon lawyers by the people, it appears improbable that their impression of dishonesty is very distinct and vivid. Yet the impression is common, almost universal. Let no young man choosing the law for a calling for a moment yield to the popular belief - resolve to be honest at all events; and if in your own judgment you cannot be an honest lawyer, resolve to be honest without being a lawyer. Choose some other occupation, rather than one in the choosing of which you do, in advance, consent to be a knave.

Estate And Trust Law Academy Holds Meeting

Recently the International Academy of Estate and Trust Law held its first annual meeting in London, Lausanne in Paris May 22, through June 6th. The academy has members throughout the United States and nine foreign countries

PAD Superior Court Judge Arthur K. Marshall of Los Angeles California, founder and past President and an officer in the Los Angeles Alumni Chapter, characterizes the academy as a "Searcher Group" composed of outstanding practitioners in the fields under study — probate, trust, estate planning and allied fields.

Its purpose this year was to see how probate proceedings were conducted in England, Switzerland and France and bring back to the United States data on what might be better ways of handling estates. In each country, panels of experts were assembled for lectures, discussion and questions.


Preceding the ceremony, the Fraternity sponsored a reception and a continental breakfast at the Court in honor of the new admittees, and a luncheon followed at the Rayburn House Office Building. The luncheon program included talks by Justice Clark and by Judge C. Raymond Judice of Austin, Texas, Executive Director of the Texas Judicial Council and Supreme Justice of the Fraternity. Toastmaster at the luncheon was Robert E. Redding, Past Supreme Justice.

Other participants and members of the Arrangements Committee included William B. Robertson, Chairman; Judge Donald R. Moore, Supreme Second Vice Justice; Miss Dalphine MacMillan, Supreme Treasurer; Miss Alice L. Read Chapter, installed at Delaware Law School

During this past school year, the George Read Chapter was installed at Delaware Law School as the first chapter of any law fraternity at that school. The Delaware Law School only recently received its provisional accreditation from the American Bar Association.

Installing officer was Supreme Justice C. Raymond Judice who was assisted by Dean Arthur Weeks, Supreme Treasurer Dalphine MacMillan, District Justice Steve Belikoff and Executive Secretary Joseph W. Rippinger.

The Delaware Law School is the only law school in the state of Delaware. It was originally an independent non-profit educational institution and has recently become affiliated with Widner College of Westchester, Pennsylvania.

In September 1971, the Delaware Law School opened as an evening division only and 175 students commenced the study of law. In October, 1972, a day division was begun and the evening division continued.

In July of 1975, the law school completed its affiliation with Widner College. This act paved the way for provisional accreditation by the American Bar Association.

The school itself is located in downtown Bloomington. The student body is made up of approximately 650 students. The library contains over 49,000 volumes, also over 20,000 volumes of Suplicates, suitable for trading. The law school belongs to the duplicate exchange program of the American Association of Law Libraries and has continued its extensive program of trading books with other law schools.



A quarter century of judicial scholarship was commemorated by hundreds of judges, state officials, and members of the bar who united in Olympia on February 13, 1976, to honor Washington State Supreme Court Justice Robert C. Finley. Beneath the jocund chronicling rendered in the sprightly, scintilating banter of Justice Robert F. Brachtenbach, the legal ssembly expressed a glowing, panegyrical homage.

A singularly astute and sagacious force on the State's highest judicial body, Justice Finley has championed the frequent triumph of common sense within a "Temple of Technicalities" (as he is wont to waggishly jibe). His unique achievements as a paramount jurist are harvested from the flame of his pen, and the annals of juridic retrospection trace the recurrence of broiling dissents transformed into United States Supreme Court majority opinions.

In this atmosphere of laudatory reverence, the February 13th aggregation honored Justice Finley's effectiveness in resolving previous antagonism among Bench, Bar and Press; they acclaimed his "no nonsense" "gut-level" seriousness, and his devotion to reaching the heart and substance of each matter brought before the Tribunal, despite those petty obstacles and detours which line the avenue to justice. This was the silver anniversary of untiring

PRESIDENT'S COMMISSION ON WHITE HOUSE FELLOWSHIPS THE WHITE HOUSE

June 2, 1976

ANNOUNCEMENT

The President today announced the start of the thirteenth nationwide search for outstanding young men and women to serve as White House

Established in 1964, the White House Fellowship program is designed to give rising leaders one year of firsthand, high-level experience with the workings of the Federal Government and to increase their sense of participation in national affairs. The program is open to U.S. citizens from all fields who are not less than 23 and not more than 35 years of age. Employees of the Federal Government are not eligible, with the exception of career armed services personnel.

Members of the eleventh group of White House Fellows are now completing their year long assignments. A twelfth group, the 1976-77 White House Fellows, will begin their duties next month

In addition to their educational assignments with the Vice President, Cabinet officers or principal members of the White House staff, the Fellows participate in an extensive seminar program, typically consisting of some 300 off-record sessions with top government officials, scholars, journalists, and leaders from the private sector. The young men and women who have, to date, been selected as White House Fellows have included lawyers, scientists, engineers, corporate business entre-preneurs, scholars and academic administrators, writers and journalists, medical doctors, social workers, architects, and local public officials. Last year 2864 persons applied for the coveted honor.

The Fellowship is designed to be a one-year sabbatical in public service. Fellows are expected to return to their professional careers at the end of their experience in government, with their perspectives of national issues broadened and their qualifications for significant service in their chosen careers and to their communities permanently enriched.

Leadership, intellectual and professional ability, high motivation, and a commitment to community and nation are the broad criteria employed in the selection process.

Requests for applications for next year's program must be postmarked not later than November 1, 1976. Application forms and additional information can be obtained by sending a postal card to the President's Commission on White House Fellowships, Washington, D.C. 20415.

The Glenn Terrell Chapter at Florida State University has recently experienced a renaissance under the leadership of Dennis Farrington, a former chapter Justice.



Many Turn Out For PAD Congressional-Judicial Reception

The Phi Alpha Delta-sponsored Annual Congressional-Judical Reception drew more than 100 judges, Senate and House members, local attorneys and area law students. The March 10th fete was held in the Rayburn building with Justice Byron White and former Justice Stanley Reed (1938-1957) leading the judicial notables. Also attending were Chief Customs and Patent Appeals Justice Howard Markey, Lawrence S. Margolis, United States Magistrate, and local magistrates Harry T. Alexander and Charles W. Halleck. Among Congressional participants were Senator Roman Hruska and House Members Claude Pepper and Trent Lott.

The reception was part of a major commitment of P.A.D. law school alumni to bring the various manifestations of the legal community together to meet with law students.

Georgetown's Taft Chapter has been sponsoring a yearlong program of lectures and seminars by legal professionals employed in a variety of career roles. In December, chief local U.S. Attorney Earl Silbert discussed careers and issues in criminal justice. Later this semester administrative assistants from the Hill are expected to discuss types and quantity of positions on the Congressional staff, including committee positions.

An area-wide lecture series titled the "Inns of Court" has been sponsoring practical discussions on the basics of criminal and civil representation by local attorneys. Chief Justice Warren Burger, a P.A.D. alumnus, has been active in advocating programs offering education on basic litigating skills.

The Georgetown chapter begun in 1909, has numerous alumni activities because of the large number of P.A.D. legal professionals in the District of Columbia area. The society is presently making plans for next year.

Magruder Spring Banquet

Magruder Chapter held its annual spring banquet on March 29 of this year. The keynote speaker was the Honorable Birch E. Morgan. Judge Morgan is well-known as the backbone of justice in that area of Illinois. He has spent some 30 years on the bench and shared many of his experiences with the chapter.

support of the defense program promulgated by Brother Robert H. Jackson, then Solicitor General of the United States: support of and cooperation with the American Bar Association special committee on national defense: and the pledging of assistance and services of Phi Alpha Delta to the U.S. Attorney General's office.

Steps were taken to conserve the fraternity's limited finances. In 1941 the Supreme Executive Board discontinued the salary of the Supreme Secretary and in 1942 the Supreme Secretary discontinued charging regular secretarial expenses.

Such steps were later to pay high dividends when the fraternity was to begin rehabilitation after the
