

1976 International Convention Will Begin 75th Anniversary Observance

"Seventy Five Years Of Professional Service" will be the theme of the 41st Biennial Convention of the Fraternity which will convene July 30, 1976 at the Alameda Plaza Hotel in Kansas City, Missouri. The Convention will signal the beginning of the observance of the 75th anniversary of the founding of Phi Alpha Delta.

Delegates and members from the 210 chartered law school and alumni chapters throughout the United States, Puerto Rico and Canada are making plans to attend the meeting which should draw the largest attendance in the history of the Fraternity. An outstanding schedule of professional and social activities has been arranged.

First official function of the Convention will be the Convention Reception which will be held the evening of July 29 in the Garden and Pool area of the beautiful Alameda Plaza Hotel. The Convention will be gavelled to order the next morning by Supreme Justice C. Raymond Judice and delegates will have the opportunity of viewing a newly produced film strip on the History of the Fraternity.

Clark To Be Keynoter

One of the highlights of the entire Convention will be the keynote address delivered by our Brother and former Supreme Executive Board Member, the Honorable Tom C. Clark, Associate Justice of the

Supreme Court of the United States (Retired).

That afternoon will feature workshops in such areas as Placement, Chapter Organization, Programming and Financing, Building Chapter Strength, Executive Office Services and Alumni Chapters. Members of the Fraternity, expert in each field, will serve on the

Friday evening all will board buses to be transported to Trail Town where they will enjoy a western barbequed dinner, a country band and an authentic western rodeo staged by some of the top rodeo performers in the United States.

Saturday will be taken up with a model initiation and Committee meetings. Subjects which will be considered will include Audit and Finance, Consitution and By-Laws, Credentials, Publications, Resolutions and Rules, Loans, Scholarships, Fellowships and Awards, Professional Service and

Development, Ritual and Rushing

Saturday night the Convention attendees will be transported to The River Quay, an area of Kansas City on the river which features different types of food, discotheques and other forms of entertainment.

The formal business of the Convention will begin on Sunday at noon when Committee Reports

begin to be received.

Sunday evening everyone will be treated to a buffet dinner (all you can eat) at the Waldo-Astoria Dinner Theater.

After dinner, the comedy play, You Can't Take It With You" will be staged fearing the Mr. Whipple of "Please don't squeeze the Charmin' fame.

Monday, August 2nd, will be an extremely busy day, as committee reports and convention business moves into high gear. Heavy debate is expected on various Constitution and By-Law proposed amendments and other committee

The election of International Officers will be held later in the day and the closing event of the Convention will be the formal installation of new Officers.

Each active and alumni chapter is entitled to have two delegates and two alternates at the Convention and as many additional persons as desired.

All chapters are reminded that the International Fraternity provides the actual cost of round trip airline coach fare to Kansas City, hotel accommodations and a subsistence allowance for each day of travel to and from the Convention and each day while at the Convention for one delegate from each active and alumni chapter in good standing.

As this issue of the Reporter goes to presss, the Executive Office is in the process of notifying each active and alumni chapter as to its present status. In order for an active chapter to be in good standing and to qualify for the monetary allowance, all fees and forms must be filed prior to the Convention.

In order for alumni chapters to be in good standing, it must meet the following requirements:

1. The annual alumni chapter tax of \$15.00 per year must be paid for the two fiscal years commencing August 1, 1974 and ending June

2. Each alumni chapter must hold at least two meetings during the period from August 1, 1974 through June 30, 1976 with an attendance of at least ten persons at each meeting.

3. Each alumni chapter must have elected officers and report the same to the Executive Office.

Placement Workshop

Pursuant to the Placement Committee Report adopted at the 1974 Convention, a Placement Workshop or the 1976 Convention will be held. In September, a letter was written to all active and alumni chapters to ascertain hopes as to what would be included in the Workshop discussion. Regrettably, only 19 active chapters responded to our questionnaire. Therefore, the purpose of our column this issue is to review the comments of our chapters and solicit further response.

Proposals for the Workshop included the following: 1) a seminar on how the Placement Program has worked, its shortcomings and successes. 2) Employment opportunities in government, 3) Employment opportunities with corporations, 4) Employment opportunities with small firms, 5) Sole practitioner opportunities & 6) Communications with alumni. Only 40% of our chapters responding desire discussion regarding No. 1; sixteen chapters selected Nos. 2, 3 and 4; fourteen chapters chose No. 5 and 6. However, keep in mind that, for the most part, chapters responding selected all

Pearson New **District Justice**

Fredric Pearson, a former Justice of Chase Chapter at the University of Cincinnati College of Law, is the newly appointed District Justice for District XV.

Pearson obtained his AB Degree from Transylvania University in Lexington, Kentucky and also attended the University of North Carolina.

While in law school, he was president of the Law School Center for Student Affairs and served on the law school honor counsel.

In addition to serving as Justice of Chase Chapter, he was Conclave Justice for the 1974 District X Conclave and a member of the Rules Committee and a representative on the nominating committee for the 1972 International Convention held in San Diego, California.

He is presently an Assistant Appeals Officer conducting hearings and adjudicating appeals of federal employees in grievance cases, disciplinary actions and discrimination cases in New York.

Thompson to U. S. **District Court**

Ralph G. Thompson, of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, was recently appointed to the United States District Court for the western District of Oklahoma.

A native of Oklahoma City, Brother Thompson graduated from the University of Oklahoma in 1956 ministration and from the University of Oklahoma Law School in 1961. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

In 1967, he was named Oklahoma City's 'Outstanding Young man and was later named one of three outstanding Oklahomans for

At the time of his appointment to the United States District Court, he was the nation's fifth youngest United States Judge then serving. Prior to his appointment he was in private law practice in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

He served as President of the Oklahoma City Lawyers Club in 1969 and as a special Justice of the Supreme Court of Oklahoma in 1970.

In 1966 he was elected to the Oklahoma House of Representatives and later served as Assistant Minority Floor Leader. He did not seek re-election in 1970 to be the nominee for Lt. Governor of Oklahoma, as the running mate of Governor, (now Senator) Dewey F. Bartlett.

Fletcher Chapter was represented by Vice Justice Mike Saunders, Treasurer-Elect Beth Wilson and Marshal Mike Eden-


Placement Workshop

Additional request included discussing the role that a national law school can play in obtaining placement information and the receipt of job inquiries; "how to" booklets, i.e. interviewing; obtaining lists of PAD alumni in various cities; acquiring clerking positions with the ultimate purpose to become a member of the firm; the possibility of sponsoring a nationwide or regional seminar on the subject of employment at which prospective employers of all types could interview members for the job. The thought of this last request was that such a meeting might make the process of job hunting a little less haphazard for both the applicants and the employers.

One must keep in mind that the placement workshop itself will be restricted to a certain time period, probably an hour or hour and onehalf. Because of the many activities and committee efforts which are necessary at the Convention, a great deal of time cannot be spent in the workshops. The format of the workshop is, of course, an educational one. Many of the comments at the workshop will be carried through by the Placement Committee who will propose a resolution to be adopted by the Convention

Those of you who are considering attending the Convention as delegates, alternates or representatives of your chapter, please feel free to contact the International Placement Director regarding your desires for the upcoming meeting, whether they be as set forth in this article or new suggestions. We have many things to discuss but would appreciate more guidance regarding our priorities for the Placement Workshop itself. Our time will be limited, yet we wish to make the most of it.

PHI ALPHA DELTA: A HISTORY

by C. Raymond Judice, Supreme Justice

(In November 1977, Phi Alpha Delta will celebrate its 75th anniversary. So that all members will have a better understanding of Phi Alpha Delta, the History of the Fraternity is being published in serial form. This is the third installment.)

Part III of IX The War Years And Recovery

The March, 1917, issue of *The Quarterly* continued the first indication of the rocky road soon to loom in front of Phi Alpha Delta. Here, Supreme Justice George L. Stewart forecast the entrance of the United States into the World War, pointed out the duty of the fraternity to the country, and suggested several approaches by which brothers might best serve the country.

Indirectly, Supreme Justice Stewart hinted at the resultant problems likely to befall Phi Alpha Delta

Perhaps Brother Stewart's warnings were predicated on the U.S. Army's calling of National Recorder C. G. Roads to serve on the Mexican border. In Brother Road's absence, Supreme Justice Stewart appointed George S. Myer acting National Recorder.

Soon thereafter Brother Stewart's fears and prognostications materialized. The United States declared war on the Central powers. And, Phi Alpha Delta was immediately plunged into chaos.

For many chapters, entire memberships quickly donned uniforms. Thoughts of the law and Phi Alpha Delta became secondary to thoughts of the war effort.

The November, 1917 issue of *The Quarterly* reported, "Just as we go to press, we receive official notice of the death of Brother Stanley H. Smith (Clay), the first Phi Alpha Delta to lose his life in the service of his nation in the present war, so far as official information discloses. The government reports that Brother Smith was 'lost overboard a submarine chaser somewhere near France.' Brother Smith enlisted last April, and at that time was Clerk of Clay Chapter."

On the national fraternity level, funds became scarce. The Quarterly was reduced to pamphlet size. The 1916, 1917, and 1918 conventions were not held. National officers elected in 1915 were destined to serve until a post-war convention could convene. (Supreme Financial Secretary Glenn E. Miller resigned in 1917 and was succeeded by Frank E. Rutledge, who in turn was succeeded by George K. Brasher).

Then, in early 1919, with the cessation of hostilities, those who had entered military service and who had not made the "supreme sacrifice" began returning from Europe and from camps in the United States. Chapters began to reorganize and the few remaining national officers — elected originally in 1915 — began resuming their activities.

A concerted effort toward reorganization materialized in the seventeenth convention of Phi Alpha Delta, held in Chicago in December, 1919. Reports state that the convention took several giant strides toward repairing the war injuries, perhaps the most prominent being adoption of a new constitu-

The new constitution was considered by many to contain radical changes. Specifically, it substantially reduced the number of national officers and the size of the Supreme Executive Board.

In the early days of the fraternity, as new chapters were added, new offices on the national level were created so that a member from each chapter might hold a national office. Soon, the fraternity became top-heavy with national officers. Constitutional revisions of the seventeenth convention eliminated the extra offices, abolishing the extra vice-justices and combining the offices of Supreme Financial Secretary, Supreme Recorder, and Supreme Treasurer into the office of General Secretary. Then, this office was later renamed Supreme Secretary to conform to the names of the other offices

Delegates to the convention directed that an honor roll of the brothers killed in the war be prepared. Final action of the conven-

tion included investigation into establishing a standard fraternity pin, writing fraternity songs, and adoption of a new ritual.

As later outgrowths of the convention, the newly elected national officers adopted a post-war policy of extreme leniency toward chapters which previously would have been considered delinquent. Additionally, the national officers began a program of visits to the various chapters, providing firsthand encouragement in the rebuilding process.

The year 1920 opened with 18 active chapters and a national treasury of \$132 and unpaid bills aggregating \$440. But the rebuilding process was to be effective.

A startling comeback was obvious when the gavel fell calling to order the eighteenth national convention in December, 1921, in Kansas City, Missouri. Phi Alpha Delta at this time could count on its rolls 41 active chapters and 16 alumni chapters. Financial reports were good. The official pin was designated and a new official pledge pin adopted. A standing committee on ritual was appointed and instructed to prepare a pledge ceremony.

The General Secretary was instructed to prepare a uniform system of reports, and a national uniform system of accounting. Fraternity songs were adopted and prizes awarded to their composers. Preparation and printing of a new directory was ordered.

The summer of 1922 featured the honorary initiation of a special person: the President of the United States.

President Warren G. Harding

had been pledged to Phi Alpha Delta during the Fall of 1921. His formal initiation into the fraternity then followed, attended by approximately 50 members of the fraternity, and conducted by Supreme Justice Frank Fawcett, immediate past Supreme Justice August A. Rendigs, Jr., former Supreme Justice John D. Carmody, and Editor-In-Chief Harry W. Humble. With William Howard Taft, Chief Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court, and General John J. Pershing, included among the brothers attending, President Harding was administered the oath of membership in his office in the White House.

Particular attention was given fraternity publications during this period. Seven issues of *The Quarterly* were published, and alumni subscriptions solicited. A complete and accurate fraternity directory was published and for the first time, an attempt was made to publish the fraternity's history. Also during this period the fraternity assisted substantially in the defeat of antifraternity legislation submitted in several states.

The nineteenth convention of Phi Alpha Delta convened in December, 1923 at the Wardman Park Hotel in Washington, D.C. In attendance were Chief Justice Taft, Major Gen. Hanson E. Ely, and Honorable Arthur J. Tuttle, judge of the U.S. District Court in Detroit. Representatives were also present from 42 active chapters and from seven alumni chapters.

Prior to adjournment of the convention, delegates saw the creation of a Board of Trustees, charged with administering a national endowment fund which was to be

used to assist chapters in purchasing or remodeling chapter houses. The convention delegates also voted to abolish the district conventions, expressing thoughts that the widely separated district assemblies placed needless expense on the active chapters.

The twentieth biennial convention was held at the Chase Hotel in St. Louis, Missouri. The delegates were greeted with words that the fraternity was in sound condition, financially and otherwise. Active chapters numbered 48, complemented by 18 alumni chapters.

The convention featured a model initiation, a "first," and the convention also saw the adoption of a new ritual, and the rejection of a proposal that compulsory life subscriptions to *The Quarterly* be required of each initiate.

The adoption of the new ritual climaxed a move begun sometime prior to the nineteenth convention. A committee had been appointed prior to the nineteenth convention to propose changes, and when the proposed ritual was presented to delegates at the nineteenth convention, it was considered "so radical" that it was referred to a new committee. This new committee presented its proposals to the subsequent meeting of the Supreme Executive Board which objected to the "... great length and amount of detail as well as to 'radical changes' from the old ritual." The Board then summarily issued its ideas for revision with orders to the committee to again re-draft accordingly. The ritual adopted by twentieth convention was the final result.

Cincinnati, Ohio was the scene of the twenty-first biennial convention. The gathering featured a change in convention timing: requiring the national convention to meet on even-numbered years, with the attendant provision that the conventions would meet in the summers.

The convention delegates also heard a glowing report on financial increases in the fraternity's endowment fund, and the delegates voted for the fraternity to affiliate with the Conference of Law Fraternities. Also, the previously defeated proposal to require lifetime subscription fees to *The Quarterly* from new initiates was again defeated, but this time by only one vote.

During this period, the first fraternity songbook, prepared under the editorial direction of Brother Frank E. Aschemeyer of St. Louis, was published. It was 51 pages long and contained 34 different songs, 16 of which were exclusively Phi Alpha Delta songs.

August, 1930 was the date of the twenty-second biennial conven-(Continued on Page 7)

This is your International Executive Office

From time to time, many of our members ask the questions, "What is the Executive Office? Where is it? What does it do? The purpose of this article is to answer those questions and to acquaint the membership with the fraternity headquarters and its staff.

The Executive Office is the nerve center of PAD and around it evolve the entire operation of the fraternity. Such an operation involves a great deal of time, effort and money. It is obvious that an organization as large and as effective as PAD requires a focal point to give the Fraternity continuity and stability.

PAD's focal point is located in Granada Hills, California which is one of the many communities contained within the city of Los Angeles and which is located in the San Fernando Valley. The Executive Office has been located in Granada Hills since 1955 and occupies modern quarters which have been recently remodeled to suit its particular needs.

Not too long ago the president of a computer service company which services the majority of the professional fraternities, stated that the Executive Office of PAD was the most efficient of any that he has observed. The staff of the Executive Office is understandably quite proud of such a compliment and continously strives to live up to that compliment.

The personnel of the Executive Office consists of nine full-time employees and one part-time

Heading up the Executive Office as Executive Director for the past 23 years has been Fredrick J. Weitkamp, a member of Ross Chapter at the University of Southern California. Fred is responsible for the overall operation of the Executive Office and the administration and direction of fraternity activities in general. Under his watchful eye, the number of active and alumni chapters has doubled and the total membership of the Fraternity has more than doubled. There are now 149 chartered active chapters, 61 chartered alumni chapters and a total membership of 79,000. The annual budget of the Fraternity has increased from \$46,000 to \$349,000.

PAD is the only law fraternity which employes full-time Executive Secretaries whose primary responsibility is that of visitation and consultation with active chapters. The Fraternity has two outstanding persons serving in this capacity at the present time. They are Joseph W. Rippinger and James E. Freeman. Joe Rippinger is a graduate of California Western University School of Law where he was a member of Beaumont Chapter. His undergraduate work was

completed at UCLA where he was a member of the UCLA Championship Track and Field Team. His duties with the Fraternity have included visitations to almost all of the 149 active chapters throughout the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico and the chartering of new chapters. He recently returned from a tour of visitations to Canadian law schools. He also assists the Executive Director in the field of publications and serves as Editor and publisher of the PAD Notes, the monthly newsletter to all active chapters.

James E. Freeman is a graduate of William Jewell College in Missouri and of California Western University School of Law where he was also a member of Beaumont Chapter. His duties have also included visitations to all active chapters and exploration of expansion possibilities. In addition, he serves as International Placement Director.

One of the greatest steps forward the Fraternity has ever taken has been in the appointment of Executive Secretaries to service the active chapters on a visitation basis and the Fraternity is indeed fortunate to have had two outstanding persons in this capacity for the past biennium.

Cynthia Cooper, better know as "CC" has served as the Office Manager of the Fraternity since 1971 and prior to that time was a part-time secretary. Her experience with the Fraternity dates back some ten years. Hers is the responsibility for the efficient operation of the office and the overseeing of the office staff.

Betsey Peck has been with the Fraternity since 1960 and serves as multigraph operator and is in charge of production of publications. She produces PAD Notes, all chapter forms of communication, special brochures, the Ritual, Chapter Officer Handbooks, District Justice Manuals and other similar publications. During 1975 she processed over 450,000 sheets of multigraph paper in the production of such publications.

Erna Sneff has also been with the Executive Office staff since 1960. Originally her responsibilities were as an addressograph operator but with the computerization of the address records of the Fraternity, she has become the Fraternity's expert in the computer field as it relates to PAD. She works closely with Data Science Corporation in St. Louis, Missouri, our computer service Company.

Patty Franklin was employed by the Executive Office almost directly out of high school and has now served as shipping clerk for the past five years. Hers is the responsibility of filling all chapter supply orders and mailing of all types of supplies, forms, etc. to all chapters.

Kathy Agricola has been employed by the Executive Office for the past two years and fills the position of secretary and receptionist. She transcribes the correspondence of the Executive Director and the two Executive Secretaries, and also works closely with the production of membership certificates and in the field of Endowment Loans.

The most recent fulltime addition to the Executive Office staff is in the person of Mercedes Burns. She is the Fraternity's "Lost and Found Department." PAD members change their address an average of once every four years and far too often, the Executive Office is not advised of the change of address. When this occurs the person becomes a "lost" member. With some 65,000 alumni it is easily seen that there are over 16,000 address



changes each year and a great many of these become lost members. Since her employment on April 1, 1975, Mercedes Burns has located 13,000 members and of course the alumni dues paid by the lost members has far more than justified her salary.

Colleen Head serves as Placement Secretary for the International Placement Director and works on a part-time basis for the Fraternity. Her experience with PAD goes back some four years.

In addition to the permanent Executive Office staff, two high school students are employed on an hourly basis to produce membership certificates, outstanding active, outstanding alumni, honorary member and other types of certificates. Unlike most fraternities, PAD produces its own membership certificates in the Executive Office. Such has proved to be not only a considerable savings in expense, but also certificates can be produced much more efficiently and with a greater savings of time than if ordered through the official ieweler.

PAD, with 149 chartered active chapters, is 50% larger than its closest competitor. As can be expected, the operation of such an organization is big business. It is, of course, difficult for any individual member to realize the varied functions and activities which are carried on by the Executive Office. Probably the best way to illustrate this is to set forth a brief resume of the major activities of the Executive Office during 1975. Such a resume follows:

1. Published four issues of the Reporter, our official publication. This involved acting as reporter, editor, re-write, proofreader, layout, etc. 256,000 copies were printed and mailed.

2. Collected \$170,000 in alumni dues. This involved preparation and mailing of dues statements to all alumni, a follow-up mailing to those who failed to pay on the first mailing and maintaining payment records for each member as well as the mailing of alumni membership cards to each member.

3. Collected \$18,000 in life membership fees. This involved the promotion of the newly instituted program for life memberships, preparation of life membership cards, preparation of life membership certificates and mailing the same together with a copy of the PAD History to each new life member.

4. Processed \$70,000 in initiation fees.


5. Enrolled over 2,300 new members on the books and records of the Fraternity. This involved placing membership data on computer tape, maintaining various membership records, etc.

6. Printed over 2,500 membership certificates and replacement certificates for members.

7. Prepared mailing lists for insurance mailings for approximately 180,000 names.

8. Prepared additional address lists or mailing labels for 65,000

9. Wrote an average of 490 personal letters per month.

10. Prepared and mailed in excess of 80,000 letters or notices for active and alumni chapters.

11. Supervised the Outstanding Active Chapter Competition.

12. Supervised the Outstanding

Alumni Chapter Competition.

13. Supervised the Minority Fellowship Competition and the

awarding of \$5,000 in cash. 14. Supervised the Service Scholarship Competition.

15. Organized two meetings of the Supreme Executive Board.

16. Organized meeting of District Justices.

17. Did preliminary planning for the 1976 International Convention. 18. Organized and held training

seminars for new District Justices.
19. Make approximately 18,000 address changes for alumni and ac-

tive members.

20. Received and processed approximately 30,000 pieces of first class mail.

21. Handled approximately 600 incoming and outgoing telephone calls per month.

22. Furnished active and alumni chapters with various supplies as needed.

23. Revised several of the forms utilized by active chapters.

24. Assisted in planning and organizing district conclaves.

25. Prepared and mailed various district justice newsletters.

26. Prepared and mailed PAD Notes to all active chapter officers.

27. Assisted the Fraternity insurance administrator in promotion of various insurance programs resulting in substantial income to the Fraternity.

28. Oversaw the colonization and chartering of seven new active chapters and two new alumni chapters.

29. Established a History and Memorabilia Room in the Executive Office. This room includes photographs of all past Supreme Justices, all members of the Distinguished Service Chapter, all past Presidents of Phi Delta Delta Legal Fraternity, the transcript of proceedings of all past conventions, copies of all Directories, copies of all Reporters, copies of all other publications, and literally hundreds of other items of historical value to the Fraternity.

The foregoing constitutes only a small portion of the tremendous volume of details and duties of the International Executive Office. However, it is hoped that such an enumeration serves to at least give the reader an idea of the scope of this operation.

If any members are in the vicinity of the Executive Office, they are cordially invited to stop by and receive a personally escorted tour.



tion, the first under the previously enacted even-years rule. Delegates heard continued reports of strong financial assets and details on a national employment bureau. Again, the proposal of requiring new initiates to subscribe for lifetime to The Quarterly came before the delegates — and this time met with success.

As far back as March, 1920, comments were prevalent suggesting a name change for The Quarterly. The editor of the publication in 1920 suggested The Inner Temple, a term he described as "a term of great ritualistic connotations.' Later, the November, 1920 issue indicated the editor had decided to rename the publication The Shield and Balance, however nothing apparently became of this plan.

Then, in 1930 with the election of Brother Earl H. Hatcher to the office of Supreme Editor, the name of the publication was changed with a short announcement in the October, 1930 issue, stating: "It is the idea of your editor that the publication should have a short, descriptive name. We discussed the matter with perhaps a dozen brothers and got 24 suggested names. We chose the name, The Reporter and await with considerable interest your reaction in the matter." Chicago Holds Mass Initiation



Young, Founder of Taft Chapter, Dies

Brother A. Stuard Young died after a long illness on July 20, 1975. He was born in Washington, D.C. on December 4, 1887 and lived there most of his life until his health declined in 1972, at which time he and his wife moved to Richboro, Pennsylvania. Brother Young was educated at Central High School and Georgetown University in Washington, receiving his J.D. degree from that University in 1913 and LL.M. from the same institution one year later. While at the Law School, he was one of the founding members of Taft Chapter of our law fraternity.

Following his graduation, he was employed by American Security & Trust Company in Washington and then entered service in the Army of the United States in World War I, achieving the grade of 1st Lieutenant of Field Artillery prior to his release from active duty following the armistice. After service with the Interstate Commerce Commission, he practiced law first in Washington, D.C. and then for a period of time with a law firm in Cleveland, Ohio. He served for a while on the staff of the General Counsel of Koppers Company in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and returned to Washington in the early 1930's as a staff attorney with the NRA prior to again entering private practice in that city. For the last 25 years of his professional life, he was with the Real Estate and Columbia Title Insurance Companies of Washington, D.C. and retired from that employment in 1968.

In addition to his interest in the affairs of Phi Alpha Delta, Brother Young was also active in the affairs of various of the Masonic bodies in the Washington area of which he was a lifetime member. Both Brother Young and his widow, the former Gertrude Louise Parsons to whom he was married in 1920, were members of St. Alban's Episcopal Parish in Washington.

His only child, A. Stuard Young, Jr., became a member of Taft Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta in 1947 and during his undergraduate career at Georgetown University Law Center was Justice of his Chapter; since his graduation younger Brother Young has been a practicing attorney in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.
