Convention Acclaimed As "The Finest"

The 41st Biennial Convention of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity International, which was held in Kansas City, Missouri this past summer, proved to live up to its pre-convention publicity as one of the finest conventions the Fraternity has ever held.

An excellent turnout was expected and in the final count, representatives from 118 active and 32 alumni chapters registered with a total attendance of 350 persons.

In a break with recent tradition, the Convention was held over a weekend from July 30 to August 2. Our present International Justice Don Hutson, performed the duties of the local chairman for the convention and helped to develop many of the social activities that took place during the evenings.

Registration was held on Thursday afternoon prior to Friday's opening session. On that Thursday evening, a reception for all members and their families was held at poolside. A band, the Barristers. made up of local attorneys and led by a PAD, added entertainment. The function served as an excellent icebreaker so that the delegates could get to know each other before the convention officially began. A rainstorm threatened to mar the function, but fortunately, fair skies prevailed and good fellowship flowed freely.

Friday morning, July 30th, everyone gathered for coffee, sweet rolls and donuts just outside the official convention meeting hall. There they enjoyed large blowups of various pictures of Fraternity historical events. A number of displays were also available for viewing.

The convention opened at 9:00 AM with the processional of Supreme Officers and immediately thereafter, the lights were dimmed and a newly developed filmstrip entitled, "Phi Alpha Delta - A History" was shown. This pictorial history was produced by Bruce Kerner of Sammis Chapter and John Weitkamp of Ford Chapter. The narration was done by then Supreme Vice Justice Don Hutson. The filmstrip began by telling the story of the early origin of Phi Alpha Delta and traced its history over the years to and including the establishment of our 150th chapter at Inter-American University in San Juan, Puerto Rico and ended with a challenge for the future. The filmstrip ran some 21 minutes in length and was well received.

Supreme Justice C. Raymond Judice then gaveled the convention

to order and immediately thereafter, the invocation was delivered by Bishop George J. Fitzsimmons, Diocese of Kansas City — St. Joseph. Brother Charles B. Wheeler, mayor of the city of Kansas City and an alumnus of Benton Chapter extended words of welcome to the conventioneers and presented to the Supreme Justice the key to the city. This was followed by the introduction of all International Officers of the Fraternity.

A special presentation highlighted the first day of activities when the Hon. Tom C. Clark, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States (retired), and an alumnus of Taney Chapter, gave the Keynote Address. Brother Justice Clark captivated the delegates with a speech addressing itself to the problems and failings of a modern legal education. As might be expected, the student delegates applauded good naturedly at each criticism that Justice Clark made. Justice Clark also drew upon a personal experience he had which concerned a small town physician whose highest ambition was to be of service to his community. Justice Clark stated that this had been his philosophy over the years and challenged both the alumni and students present to work to make their local communities a better place to

those chapters which were reactivated during the past biennium including: MacLean Chapter, New England School of Law; and Burr Chpater Dickinson School of Law, both former Phi Delta Delta chapters, in addition to Cooley Chapter. Wayne State University; Hay Chapter, Western Reserve University; and Murphy Chapter, University of Detroit.

The Effective Chapter

Perhaps one of the most important and valuable portions of the Convention occurred on Friday afternoon following the opening session, with the holding of Chapter Workshops. The theme of the workshops was "The Effective Chapter." The programming covered a wide range of topics and was divided into four sessions, each conducted simultaneously. All active chapter delegates and alternates were divided into four groups and each workshop was given four times which enabled each delegate or alternate to attend each work-

The workshops included the following: Chapter Organization, Programming and Financing chairman, Supreme Vice Justice Don Hutson; panelists, Supreme Second Vice Justice Donald R.

Hutson Elected To Top Post New Officers Are Installed

By unanimous vote of the 41st Biennial Convention, Don Hutson, one of Missouri's most outstanding trial attorneys was elected International Justice of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International on August 2, 1977.

Our new International Justice was born in Kansas City on November 4, 1931 and graduated with honors from Central College, Fayette, Missouri, in 1953. He took graduate study work at the University of Missouri. Don has an outstanding voice which has stood him in good stead in his active trial practice. He was Missouri State Oratory Champion for two years and later was named the National Intercollegiate Oratory Champion.

He graduated with honors from George Washington University School of Law in 1958 where he received his Juris Doctor Degree. While attending law school he served as Justice of Jay Chapter and Student District Justice for the Washington, D.C. Area.

During his law school career, he also worked as Staff Assistant to United States Senator Stuart Symington.

After graduation, he became Assistant Prosecuting Attorney for Jackson County Missouri and since 1963 has been in private practice.

His extensive service to PAD includes: Supreme Marshal (1966-1968) Supreme Treasurer (1968-1970), Supreme Secretary (1970-1972), Supreme Advocate (1972-1974), and Supreme Vice Justice (1974-1976). Don also served as District Justice for the Missouri area from 1964 to 1966 and as the 1966 General Convention Chairman for the 36th Biennial which was held in . Kansas City, Missouri. He is the author of the PAD Social Activities Guide, the PAD Chapter Activities Guide, the PAD Rushing Guide, the PAD Alumni Chapter Officers Manual and has served as Chairman of numerous committees including those on Conclaves, alumni activities, active chapter activities, student admission to practice, student advocacy, the Phi Delta Delta Merger, Effective Chapter and Professional Activities and Develop-

Brother Hutson has the distinction of being the first International Justice of the Fraternity. Prior to the 41st Biennial Convention, the name given to the highest elected official of the Fraternity was that of Supreme Justice. The name change from Supreme to International became effective at our recent convention in Kansas City, Missouri.

He has twice been named in Who's Who in American Universities and Colleges, and his pre-

sently listed in Who's Who in the Midwest, Who's Who in the United States, and Personalities in the West and Midwest.

Don is married to the former Betty Switzer and has four chil-

Kohn New Vice Justice

Stanley H. Kohn, a practicing attorney in Columbia, South Carolina, was elected International Vice Justice at the 41st Biennial Convention in Kansas City, Missouri. Prior to his election he had served as Justice of District XIX encompassing the states of South Carolina and Georgia.

Brother Kohn was born in Charleston, South Carolina on April 25, 1935 and obtained his BS degree from Clemson University and his JD Degree from the University of South Carolina School of Law.



Some people see things as they are and ask, "Why"? Let us dream of things that never were, and ask, "Why not"?

George Bernard Shaw

For several thousand years, two distinct philosophies of government have existed. One is the belief that those who govern exercise that right by virtue of strength, "divine right," or historical imperative. Usually, this philosophy has resulted in one person (usually a man) or at most, a very few people, imposing their will and desires upon the rest of the population.

The second philosophy of government is that the decision as to whom should lead ought to rest with the general public and that they should have the right to choose not only who will govern but also how and under what terms and conditions.

Without question, the first philosophy of government has been the one followed by most people and most countries. Dictators, kings and other strong men fill the pages of history with their deeds and misdeeds.

The second philosophy has been infrequently practiced and, rarely, for more than brief periods.

For two hundred years, a comparatively brief time historically speaking, we in this country have attempted to practice the second philosophy of government. Have we been successful in that attempt? Sometimes. Sometimes not.

There is no guarantee that the collective wisdom of a people of a nation will prove to be historically correct or beneficial.

However, it is a dead certainty that if the people do not utilize the right to choose their leaders, then the system will fail by default.

As members of a professional legal organization, we tell ourselves and the people with and for whom we work that one of the great things about American citizenship is the right to participate in our government. The words sound good and true, but when less than 50% of our eligible population has the interest or takes the time to vote, who's kidding whom?

PHI ALPHA DELTA: A HISTORY

(In November 1977, Phi Alpha Delta will celebrate its 75th anniversary. So that all members will have a better understanding of Phi Alpha Delta, the History of the Fraternity is being published in serial form. This is the fifth installment.)

Postwar Recovery And Growth

World War II was over. But it left behind deep scars on mankind in general and Phi Alpha Delta in particular. At war's end the fraternity had six active chapters remaining.

But the Supreme Justice issued words of optimistic encouragement: "Fortunately, your Supreme Chapter is in a better financial condition than that which marked its position after the last war. By rigid economy your Supreme Chapter has managed to carry on its activities and still maintains, and adds to, a nest egg which will provide the financial nucleus for a resurgence of Phi Alpha Delta which will demonstrate its leadership in law fraternity circles . . .

The fraternity then embarked on a concentrated drive to reactivate chapters which had become inactive during the war years. The Supreme Executive Board, in resuming publication of The Reporter, decided to continue using the same newspaper format that had been in use temporarily during the war years, reasoning that its lower cost would allow mailing copies of the paper to all members and thereby help to re-kindle interest.

These efforts met with immediate results. Benson Chapter at Washburn University was reactivated April 16, 1946, Benton Chapter at the University of Missouri at Kansas City had remained active during the war years but bounced back with new life. Blackstone Chapter at Chicago-Kent had also remained active, but quickly experienced a resurgence. Capen Chapter (later to be renamed Matt I. Sullivan Chapter) at the University of San Francisco was reactivated May 23, 1946, Chase Chapter at the University of Cincinnati likewise was quickly reactivated April 3, 1946.

Clay Chapter at the University of Kentucky was guided back to full active status through the organizational talents of Brother George W. Evans, the only member to return from military service. Simultaneously, reactivation occurred for Corliss Chapter at the University of North Dakota, and Dunbar Chapter at the University Washington.

Fletcher Chapter at the University of Florida was reactivated in March, 1945, by Brother Harry P. Edwards, the first member to return from military service. Ford Chapter at Loyola University of s survived the war with flying colors, maintaining an average chapter roster of 25 members throughout the war years. Garland Chapter at the University of Arkansas likewise survived the war in good fashion, as did Green Chapter at the University of Kansas.

Reactivation was necessary for Fuller Chapter at Northwestern University, Gunter Chapter at the University of Colorado, Hammond Chapter at the University of Iowa, Harlan Chapter at the University of Oklahoma, Hay Chapter at Western Reserve University, Holmes Chapter at Stanford University, Hughes Chapter at Denver University, Jefferson Chapter at the University of Virginia, and Kent Chapter at the University of Idaho.

Reactivation was also the order of business for Knox Chapter at the University of Arizona, Lamar Chapter at the University of Mississippi, Magruder Chapter at the University of Illinois, Martin Chapter at Tulane University, and Morgan Chapter at the University of Alabama.

Lurton Chapter at the University of Louisville, Rapallo Chapter at New York University, and Reese Chapter at the University of Nebraska remained active throughout the war years.

Also reactivated were Ross Chapter at the University of Southern California, Ryan Chapter at the University of Wisconsin, Sutherland Chapter at the University of Utah, Taft Chapter at Georgetown University, Temple Chapter at Hastings College of Law, Watson Chapter at Cornell University, and Willey Chapter at the University of West Virginia.

Additionally, many other chapters had plans underway for reactivation soon after the war's end. And, new chapters were installed at Duke University (Rutledge Chapter) and the University of Miami (Rasco Chapter).

National officers were therefore justly proud when delegates from approximately 50 chapters registered for the twenty-sixth biennial convention, meeting at the President Hotel in Kansas City, Missouri, in 1946.

(Coincidentally, the gathering was eight years to the day from the last (pre-war) convention, in the same city, same hotel, and same meeting room.)

The delegates rolled up their sleeves and plunged into the work at hand, the records report. First, the new newspaper format of The Reporter was formally approved. Plans for a new directory were pushed.

The delegates went on record directing the Supreme Executive Board to submit to the appropriate committees in Congress a plan calling for divorcing courts martial from the control of the commanding officers of the armed forces of the U.S., and simultaneously establishing an independent staff of professionally trained men under the Judge Advocate's office.

The Supreme Executive Board was realigned to include the Supreme Justice, Supreme Vice-Justice, Supreme Second Vice-Justice, Supreme Secretary, Supreme Treasurer, Supreme Historian, and Supreme Marshal. The Supreme Executive Board was required to thereafter meet at least

The twenty-seventh biennial convention of Phi Alpha Delta convened in March, 1948, in Los Angeles. Delegates were in attendance from 56 active and eight alumni chapters.

At the direction of the twentysixth convention the Supreme Treasurer had considered the question of incorporation of the fraternity. At this convention he recommended that the fraternity be in- Dunbar, Supreme Marshal.

corporated in the state of Illinois. However, after extensive discussion, the convention declined to order such incorporation, but rather referred the matter to each individual chapter for confirmation or rejection.

This convention considered what was probably the most controversial constitutional amendment at the time ever presented to a fraternity convention. amendment, submitted by Holmes Chapter proposed to eliminate the words "of the Caucasian race" from the Constitutional provisions for membership.

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee, chaired by Past Supreme Justice Rex Hardy, considered this proposal at some length and reported its recommendations to the convention as follows: of the twelve members of the committee, eight signed the majority report which recommended that this provision be submitted to a plebiscite of all members of the fraternity; the minority report, signed by three members requested immediate convention consideration of this proposed constitutional change; one member of the committee abstained from signing either re-

Both reports, majority and minority, were debated at great length in the open session. After a luncheon recess, the convention resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider this matter. After reconvening as a convention, the majority report was adopted and the Supreme Executive Board was directed to conduct a plebiscite of all members of the fraternity. A summary of the arguments as expressed at this convention was to accompany the ballots. The results of this plebiscite, as reported in the March, 1949, issue of The Reporter were: As to the first proposition, Shall the words 'male' and 'Caucasian' be eliminated from the constitution where such words appear as a qualifying factor for membership in Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity?" Yes — 747; No -2,068. As to the second proposition, "Shall the word 'male' be eliminated from the constitution where such word appears as a qualifying factor of membership?" Yes -719; No -2,005. As to the third proposition, "Shall the word 'Caucasian' be eliminated from the constitution wherever such word appears as a qualifying factor of membership in Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity?" Yes — 1,198; No

The total number of votes cast out of a mailing of 15,580 was 3,298 or about 20%. (It is interesting to note that the subsequent convention in 1950 did in fact remove the Caucasian clause from the constitution.)

Election of officers at this convention saw Douglas L. Edmonds elected Supreme Justice; E. A. Taylor, Supreme Vice-Justice: Charles Tom Henderson, Supreme Second Vice-Justice; A. A. McDowell, Supreme Secretary; Anthony P. Savarese, Supreme Treasurer; Giles E. Miller, Supreme Historian; and Nicholas L.

Following the Los Angeles convention, the Washington office of the fraternity was closed and moved to Los Angeles.

Growth was to continue for Phi Alpha Delta. Field Chapter at the University of California at Berkeley was reactivated in 1949, Sullivan Chapter was installed at St. Louis University, Hull Chapter was installed at Cumberland University in Lebanon, Tennessee, and R. E. B. Baylor Chapter was installed at Baylor University in Waco, Texas, all in 1949.

Also, the Martin Chapter at Tulane University was reactivated, and the Tall Corn Alumni Chapter in Des Moines, Iowa, and the Pinckney Chapter at the University of South Carolina were installed.

The following year was equally active. Champ Clark and McKinley Chapters, at Washington University in St. Louis and at Ohio State University, respectively, were reactivated. Two new active charters were granted to More Chapter at Creighton University in Omaha. Nebraska, and to Brantly Chapter at the University of Montana. Three new alumni chapters were installed in Atlanta, Denver, and Milwaukee.

The twenty-eighth biennial convention opened on a crisp Autumn day in the Fall of 1950 at French Liek, Indiana. Sparking the convention was an address by Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court Tom C. Clark in which he announced the establishment of a Phi Alpha Delta clerkship program in the Supreme Court.

Among action taken by this convention was a resolution to allow advertising in The Reporter.

Next, the convention undertook the question of removal of the racial restriction on eligibility for membership. After lengthy debate and discussion — in which it became quickly obvious in many cases that delegates were acting in conformity with instructions from their chapter membership — a vote was called.

Of the total of 138 votes cast, 97 voted to remove the restriction and 41 voted to retain it — the amendment was declared passed.

Phi Alpha Delta was once again the leader. It was the first major law fraternity to remove racial restriction as to membership. It was again to lead the way, when in 1970 at the New Orleans Convention, it removed the sex restrictions and became the first major law fraternity

Phi Alpha Delta had survived the ravages of the depression of the 1930's and the effects of World War

to admit women into membership.

Building upon the foundation of its founders and their successors, it had met the challenge of its "years of adversity." It had met the challenge and prevailed.

Emerging from World War II with but six surviving active chapters and a depleted treasury, the basic strengths of the fraternity had served to pull the organization through this period of greatest adversity.

Now, in 1951, its active chapters numbered 72, and it could look forward with assurance and selfconfidence to gain its predestined place of prominence with the legal community.










Model Initiation



However, the special committee appointed to study the revised Ritual met at this time and approved the new Ritual as presented the previous day at the model initiation. The remainder of the day was taken up by a general business session at which time the first reports of Convention Committees were presented and discussion and action were taken.

After recess of the business session at 5:00 p.m., the delegates prepared to depart for the "Waldo Astoria" Dinner Theater to see a presentation of "You Can't Take It With You." After the convention had formally adjourned, the International Executive Board met on Tuesday and Wednesday to implement the action directed by the 1976 Convention.



- 16. Directed that the next edition of the Directory be dedicated to the 75th anniversary of the Fraternity with appropriate inserts as determined by the Supreme Executive Board concerning the 75 years of Professional Service of the Fraternity to the student, the law school and the profession.
- 17. Directed the Supreme Executive Board to encourage the participation of all members of the Fraternity to observe the occasion by appropriate measures as suggested by the Board.
- 18. Directed that the above activities not be inclusive, but that all members and chapters be urged to develop additional activities to commemorate the occasion with such apprpriate activities as are deemed advisable.
- Commended the Hon. John J. Sirica, a member of this fraternity, for his outstanding professional and public service to our nation, our profession and our fraternity.
- 20. Commended the Hon. William O. Douglas, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States for 26 years for his outstanding professional and public service to our nation, our profession and our fraternity.
- 21. Defeated a resolution which would have required that the convention take a vote as to its opinion regarding the validity of the law school admission test (LSAT) as a true and accurate measure of ones ability to succeed in law school.
- 22. Adopted a resolution supporting the active participation of the membership of the Fraternity in the formation of public interest law research projects combining the energies and skills of law students and practitioners; further provided that the Professional Development Committee be authorized to investigate such projects and advise the International Executive Board as to proposals or recommendations which

- may be brought forward from time to time in furthernace of such projects.
- 23. Adopted a resolution supporting the conference of women in law and recommended that every chapter be encouraged to donate money as each chapter sees fit.
- 24. Adopted a resolution encouraging each law school and alumni chapter to participate in an annual charitable fund raising endeavor to be supported and promoted by the Supreme Executive Board.
- 25. Adopted the following:

BE IT THEREFORE RESOL-VED, that Phi Alpha Delta urges the repeal of all laws which make the use and possession of limited quantities of Marijuana for personal use by adults a criminal offense,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Phi Alpha Delta supports swift and certain punishment for the distribution and sale of all dangerous narcotics as defined by the Treasury Department, FDA and other related governmental agencies.

INTERNATIONAL EXPANSION

- Directed the International Executive Board to actively solicit and seek new international alumni chapters.
- 2. Directed the International Executive Board to communicate with all chapters and members regarding the feasibility of encouraging PAD members attending foreign summer sessions to implement the fraternity's program of foreign expansion and further requesting PAD members who have attended such sessions to report on the possibilities and other factors pertinent to the establishment of chapters in those respective schools and countries.
- Directed the International Executive Board to further expand in the United States and International expansion in the following countries according to the following priorities:

 - Mexico and Dominican Republic





continued and that certain information found in the present handbook including a directory of chapters by district and illustration and modern description of the Coat of Arms be incorporated with the Constitution and By-Laws and that this new booklet be printed in sufficient number so that a copy may be given to each new member at initiation.

- Recommended that a rush flyer, together with such other information as may be found appropriate, be printed in French for use in rushing in Quebec.
- 4. Recommended that a flyer similar to the letter recently sent each chapter showing how the fraternity spends its money be printed in sufficient quantity so that it may be used as a rush flyer.
- Approved the Directory in its present form and schedule of reprinting.
- 6. Recommended that a synopsis of actions taken at meetings of the International Executive Board as well as permanent and temporary committees be published in the Reporter and to the extent possible the agenda of upcoming meetings be published in the Reporter or in PAD Notes provided nothing therein shall be construed as to require the publication of the private deliberation of any body
- 7. Recommended that the Reporter contain:
 - a. notice of deadlines for submitting news items
 - b. change of address forms suitable for clipping and returning to the Exec. Ofc.
- 8. Recommended that the Reporter inaugurate a letter to the editor column to promote dialogue on topics of interest to the Fraternity and to the profession and that the column contain a statement inviting readers to write letters explaining the purpose of the column.



- 10. Recommended that the International Executive Board explore and implement if practical, the use of video tapes as rushing education and professional development aids.
- 11. Recommended that the International Executive Board and the Executive Office be commended for the efforts on behalf of the Fraternity in general and on publications in general.

CONSTITUTION AND BY LAWS

- 1. Clarified the provisions for forfeiture of membership in this fraternity by anyone who accepts membership in any other law fraternity and in any categ-
- 2. Disapproved a proposed change to delete associate status in the Fraternity.
- Change the word, "Supreme" to the word, "International" in all titles so that, for example, the Supreme Justice hereafter will be called the International Justice, the Supreme Executive Board will be called the International Executive Board, etc.
- 4. Changed the title of a board position from Supreme Parliamentarian to the Supreme
- Adopted a provision providing for the disposition of assets of the Fraternity upon dissolu-
- 6. Provided that all past International Presidents of Phi Delta Delta Law Fraternity become members of the International Advisory Board.
- Amended the by-laws to provide that delegates to convention would be paid travel expense based on the least expense commercial air fare departing at a reasonable time.
- Directed the Supreme Executive Board to submit a proposal for the amendment of the International By-Laws to establish a separate life membership fund containing the substance of the recommendations of the financial affairs committee presented to the Supreme Executive Board to all chapters by mail ballot in accordance with the provisions of Section IV of Chapter 13 of the International By-Laws on or before October 15, 1976, and submit with such mail ballot (1) a formal opinion of tax counsel as to the provision, (2) relevant portions of the financial committee report and (3) minority report of any member of the Supreme Executive Board.
- Defeated a proposal to change the name of the Fraternity to Phi Alpha Delta Law Society, International.

SCHOLARSHIPS, LOANS, FELLOWSHIPS AND OTHER AWARDS

- Continued the \$50.00 Service Scholarship Awards.
- Discontinued the Minority Fellowship program effective June 30, 1978.
- 3. Deleted the requirement of \$10,000 net worth of co-signers for borrowers of Endowment Funds.
- Directed the International Executive Board to vigorously study and pursue additional sources of funds for the Endowment Fund, accepting the Bond program.
- Directed the International Executive Board to study the Pomona Plan with a view towards implementation within the Fraternity.
- Provided that in the event of default on an Endowment Fund Loan, the interest rate of any Endowment Fund Loan made after the date of adoption of this resolution should increase by the terms of said loan to the maximum allowable interest rate as prescribed by local laws from the date of default.
- Recommended that the Award program as presently consti-

tuted and awards for service and professional programs for the student, the chapter and the fraternity as discussed by the professional development committee be further studied by said committee and the International Executive Board and the interveneing biennium.

AUDIT AND FINANCE

- 1. Recommended that a notice be sent to each third year law student, approximately 30 days prior to graduation setting forth the benefits of alumni membership and encouraging dues paying alumni membership together with a return address card to be submitted to the International Office by the student showing his new working address.
- Recommended that participation in this effort be encouraged by and through local alumni chapters.
- Recommended that the Board study the possibility of limiting participation in any and all alumni programs to include the insurance program to those members whose dues are paid.
- Recommended that professional fund raisers or development officers be contacted with the view toward studying other appropriate areas wherein fund raising activities could be engaged in by this organization.
- Approved the audited financial statements of the general fund, endowment fund and conclave fund.

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

- 1. Encouraged the Executive Board to have available for all chapters a list of available speakers on a nationwide
- Directed the Executive Director to prepare and furnish to all active chapters an updated list of films available on legal topics complete with information on how to order such films.
- Directed that a committee be established by the Executive Board to study and make recommendations regarding the proposals of Justice Clark on or before the next convention.
- Directed that the Executive Office make available to requesting chapters the LSAT review course for their consideration.
- 5. Directed that active and alumni chapters cooperate in establishing seminars on areas of special interest which may not be covered in law school.
- Directed that all chapters utilize the Reporter as a forum for communicating their professional activities.
- Directed that workshops on programming at future conventions devote time to the consideration and professional activities equal to the time devoted to other topics.
- Directed that a committee be established to study and implement means for establishing clerkships with PAD alumni in federal courts.

RUSHING AIDS

- 1. Created a form to be known as the Marshal's Annual Rushing Report which would be forwarded each year to the Marshal of each active chapter to be completed and returned to the Executive Office by the Chapter Marshal on or before July 1 of each year; that each chapter Marshal should indicate on such form which rushing activities the chapter will undertake in the next school year;
- Directed that all new banners should have the new logo of PAD.
- Suggested that PAD Facts be rearranged so that the things most relevent to law students will be nearest the top of the page and things such as insurance etc. be further down the page.
- 4. Directed discontinuance of the inclusion of "What the Legal Profession Thinks about PAD," in rushing materials.

He was a charter Justice of the Tri-State Alumni Chapter and is a Past President of the Lawrence County Bar Association. Further, Frank teaches Business Law at Ohio University and he teaches a course in Real Estate Law at Shawnee State University.

Frank is also active on the Ohio State Bar Committee on Negligence Law and is a member of the Ohio Academy of Law Instructors.

Frank was first elected to the Supreme Executive Board at the 1972 Convention where he assumed the post of Supreme Treasurer which he held until elected Supreme Advocate at the 1974 Convention in Toronto, Canada. - 10. Directed that the ruler, when the present supply is exhausted, be imprinted with metric measurements on the bottom part of the ruler and inches along the top.
- 11. Directed the International Executive Board to investigate the feasibility of producing a humorous type of audio visual presentation to be made available to the chapters on a deposit basis.
- Directed the Executive Office to prepare rushing folders for use by the chapters and to be made available to chapters at the lowest possible cost.
- 3. Recommended that the Executive Office prepare for distrubition one per chapter at no cost, a stencil of the logo of the fraternity to be a size suitable for a poster, approximately 24 inches by 36 inches in size.








Rippinger and Freeman Receive New Assignments





Suzanne Williams Nichols is the new Justice of District VII which is composed of the states of Oklahoma and Arkansas.



DENNIS FARRINGTON


