Professionally Speaking

(Most complaints against lawyers by clients are grievances which could often be avoided if lawyers would understand some of the more common client complaints, how they arise, and some of the things which could be done to prevent dissatisfied clients; thus avoiding the grievance. This article is one of a series of articles dealing with the most common causes of client complaints and the

more often used remedies.) HE PROMISED ME THE MOON

Every once in a while a lawyer, listening to a client's smooth recital of the "facts" in a case, loses sight of the fact that he's hearing only one side of a story, the true facts haven't yet been fully developed, and often the result will depend on the whim and fancy of a jury. The lawyer, eager to reinforce the client's need for confirmation of his action, promises the exact result that the client is expecting. He promises "the moon."

When the matter is concluded and the result doesn't fully match the client's expectations, the lawyer finds a complaint filed against him by a frustrated client.

You should know, better than anyone, that your client is unsophisticated as regards our complex legal system, and that any type of optimistic promises you may make regarding the soundness of your client's cause or the success to be found in your result create great expectations in your client's mind. It is tough enough living up to your client's expectations after your client's neighbor tells her about the half-million dollars her lawyer got her for her slip and fall case. Every divorce client you have probably has a neighbor who has managed to tell her about the \$200.00 a week alimony she receives. You should say nothing to raise any hopes in any client.

The better rule to follow in attempting to avoid complaints of this nature is to form a habit of being pessimistic about most matters. The best approach, particularly in criminal cases, is to condition your client to expect the worst. I always remind my criminal clients, at every conference, of the maximum sentence they face. At an early conference I even locate the Statute that provides the sentence and read it to the client, thereafter attaching a photocopy of the Statute to the file.

Another protection you might use in almost every case is to ask your client to prepare a written narrative about their case for delivery to you. Often, they will write out

Jefferson Chapter Is Reactivated

The Thomas Jefferson Chapter, originally established at the University of Virginia School of Law in 1910, was officially reactivated on April 6, 1977.

Past International Justice Robert E. Redding served as Installing Officer and was assisted by Lee Berger Anderson, President of the National Association of Women Lawyers, Sarah Perrin, Past International President of Phi Delta Delta Women's Legal Fraternity which merged with PAD in 1972, and Judge Donald R. Moore, Past International Vice Justice.

PADs Emerson Spies (the law school Dean) and Professor Charles M. Davison spoke after the ceremonies.

The Reactivation Justice, Susan Biggs, a third year student had previously been initiated into PAD while a law student at the University of Southern California.

Justice Douglas Honored

PAD Brother and retired Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas (Livingston) was honored on May 17th for his contributions to the preservation of Washington, D. C.'s historic Chesapeake and Ohio Canal. Present with Douglas for the unveiling of a bust of the former Associate Justice at the canal site were several hundred people, including Brother Warren Burger (Jay), 7 currently sitting Supreme (Lawson), and Senator Henry M. Jackson. The festivities featured music, greetings from National leaders, and brief remarks delivered by Douglas, who spoke from his wheelchair.

Brother Douglas, who retired from the high court in late 1975, following a disabling stroke in 1974, was well-known in Washington circles for his long hikes along the Potomac and other district areas and he once challenged Washington newsmen to make the lengthy trek with him, and the resulting publicity helped to preserve the canal as a park, instead of a parkway as was proposed in the late 1950's.

"There are 7 other Justices back in the shade because they couldn't take the sun," Burger remarked.

Douglas replied, "That's more than a quorum. I never was able to entice any of them the whole distance (of the canal) anyway, but I promise when I'm well we'll take the hike.

F. Bradford Morse of United **Nations Becomes Honorary Member**

On April 29, 1977, in the private section of the delegate's dining room of the United Nations, F. Bradford Morse Administrator of the United Nations Development Program was honorarily inducted into I. Maurice Wormser Chapter of PAD.

Mr. Morse served in the U.S. Army during World War II. He was a member of the Law Faculty of Boston University from 1949 until 1953. He first entered public service as a member of the Lowell City Council in 1951. Later, he served as Counsel to the United States Armed Services Committee and as Chief Assistant to Senator Leverett Saltonstall. In 1948, President Eisenhower named him Deputy Administrator of Veterans Affairs for the United States.

He has long been involved in International affairs, serving as Congressional Advisor to the United States delegation to the 18-nation Disarmament Committee Geneva and as a member of the United States delegations to both the Mexico-United States and the Canada-United States Interparliamentary meetings. He has been a United States delegate to the Interparliamentary meetings. He has been a United States delegate to the Interparliamentary Union and a official United States Observer at the Council of Europe and the Latin American Parliament. He also served as United States Chairman of the Anglo-American Study Group on African Affairs. During the 91st Cogress for Peace Through

Before joining the United Nations Secretariat, Mr. Morse represented the Fifth Massachusetts District in the United States Congress from January, 1961 to May, 1972. During that period, he served as a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

On May 2, 1972, Mr. Morse joined the UN N. as Under-Secretary General for Political and General Assembly Affairs. On November 28, 1975, he was appointed the Administrator of the United Nations Development Program and currently serves in that post.

Mr. Morse is a Member of the Council of Foreign Relations, a Director of the Pan American Development Foundation, a Director of the World Affairs Council of Boston, and a Director of the United States Capitol Historical Soci-

ety. He serves as a member of the Board of Trustees of the United Nations International School (UNIS) and is also a member of the Board of Visitors of the School of Foreign Service of Georgetown University, a member of the Board of Trustees of Boston University, Chairman of the Minute Man National Historical Park Advisory Commission, and Chairman of the Advisory Committee of the Washington International School of Washington, D. C. In addition, Mr. Morse is a member of the Senior Executives Council of the Conference Board and the Board of Directors of the Save the Children's Federation, Inc./ Community Development Founda-

The ceremony and reception which followed was well-attended by New York and New Jersey members of PAD — both student and alumni. Approximately 30 New York alumni were on hand, along with more than 40 students representing Wormser, Paterson, Kennedy, Tilden, and Rapallo Chapters.

Mitch Landron, Past Justice of Wormser Chapter, served as the Installing Officer for Mr. Morse, who was presented to the gathering by Brother Wilbur Ziehl, Past Justice of John Jay Chapter and currently Acting Comptroller of the U.

A suprise highlight of the affair was the presentation of a Certificate of Outstanding Service to Brother Ziehl for his contributions to PAD in New York City and the U.N.

The PADs of District XV and of Wormser Chapter, in particular, are justifiably proud to claim a person of Mr. Morse's stature in the International community as its newest member and look forward to working with him in the future.

The evening concluded with a cocktail party and hors d'oeuvres reception in the delegate's dining room, during which time good spirits were both consumed (by the drinkers) and exuded by the atten-

In recent years we have been bombarded with news and magazine articles and commentaries informing us that today people are living longer, and as a result, we have a growing number of older persons in our society. As a result, a large percentage of the edlerly feel left out, useless, and are without purpose. Is it any wonder that such people become depressed and noncontributors to

I suspect that a principal cause of such depression is the feeling by the elderly that "nobody cares anymore." For a variety of reasons, we ought to care. It seems to me that the elderly are as important as the young. Both groups need the association with and concern of mature adults.

It is often said that Christmas is for kids. I would modify that to say that Christmas is for the very young and the very old.

Why?

Because only the very young and the very old are really capable of believing what most of us treat as only a great myth. The mgaic of Christmas is to really believe the stories, songs and traditions. The rest is largely commercialism and tinsel.

It is with this thought in mind that I urge all chapters and members of the Fraternity, to find some way to personally participate in bringing Christmas to a parentless youth organization, residents of a home for the aged or other such "non family" groups.

Your participation could take the form of delivery of food or gifts, caroling, a visit from Santa or a religious dramatization.

Whatever the form, the key is your personal involvement.

By so doing, the Christmas magic may again be a reality for you for the first time in many years.

I always advise them that although both are allowed in my State, most judges are not prone to award either except in exceptional circumstances. Thus, when I'm fortunate enough to secure alimony, even in a minimal amount, my clients always consider that a




