Sirica Addresses Sup. Ct. Admittees

On June 6, 1983, the 17th annual admissions ceremony for alumni members of PAD was held in Washington, D.C. A total of 29 PAD members from 19 states and Puerto Rico were admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of the United States.

Their admissions were moved by Miss Alice O'Donnell, Director of the Inter-Judicial Affairs and Information Services at the Federal Judicial Center, Past Chairman of the Judicial Administration Division of the American Bar Association, and member of the fraternity's Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Advisory Council.

Preceding the ceremony, the Fraternity sponsored a special reception and continental breakfast at the Court for the admittees and their families. Brother Mark W. Cannon, Administrative Assistant to the Chief Justice, greeted the admittees and described highlights about the Supreme Court.

As momentoes of the occasion, the Fraternity presented to each admittee a group photograph, a copy of the 1982 revised edition of "Equal Justice Under Law," and other publications of the Supreme Court Historical Society. They were invited by Dr. Cannon to become members of the Society, which can be contacted at 1511 K Street, N.W., Washington, D.C.

Included among the admittees were Marni Byrum, District Justice of District XVII and James P. Walle, District Justice of District X. Following the ceremony, the "PAD Day at the Supreme Court" traditional luncheon was held in the Rayburn House Office Building. Two admittees brought a full table each of guests, relatives and friends to celebrate the occasion. Brother Donald R. Moore, Past International Second Vice Justice, delivered the invocation and William B. Robertson served as Toastmaster.

The luncheon was attended by Brother Claude Pepper who has served in Congress for 14 years as a U.S. Senator from Florida and 20 additional years as a Congressman from the Miami area. As stated in a feature story appearing in the April 25 issue of Time Magazine, "He is 82 years old. But Claude Denson Pepper is like a vintage automobile with new parts; he gets better and more powerful with age." When his admirers worry about his advancing years and how long he expects

to be on Capitol Hill, he has admitted that he has retirement plans for the year 2000, "But I reserve the right to change my mind."

The highlight of the luncheon was the remarks by Brother John J. Sirica, senior judge for the Federal District Court in Washington, D.C. He was introduced by Brother Robert E. Redding, Past Supreme Justice of the Fraternity and current Director of its Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Program. A certificate of appreciation was presented to Judge Sirica on behalf of the International Executive Board for his services to the nation during the trying period of the Watergate crisis. In referring to such award, Senator Pepper said to the audience that "Equal justice under law was never better expressed" and "Young PAD's everywhere would find no better representative of the legal profession than John Sirica to be emulated."

In his introduction of Brother Sirica, Mr. Redding reminded the audience of an editorial of the Atlanta Constitution which said: "Judge John Sirica was the man who kept a level head in the most difficult single court case, in some ways, in American history. No one could have handled it much better, with greater judgment or more courage." Quoting Francis J. Larkin, leading judge in Massachusetts, "Taking the long view, the great issue of Watergate may have been the willingness of Judge Sirica to break the fetters which for so long have relegated trial judges to an essentially passive role in the conduct of trials in this country."

Judge Sirica described some of the highlights of the Watergate trial and ended with the words uttered at the conclusion of his book entitled "Setting the Record Straight": "I think I did do something for my country. I think I did my job as best I could. I think I did my duty as a citizen and as someone fortunate enough to hold a position of public responsibility in our system of government."

The PAD Supreme Court Arrangements Committee was chaired by William B. Robertson, a retired Department of Defense official and past Associate Tribune of the Fraternity. This was his tenth year as chairman of the Committee. Also serving on the Committee were five past Justices of the National Capital Area Alumni Chapter (Frank Cacciapaglia, Sheldon

Constitutional Bicentennial Program Develops

At the close of the 1982 International Convention, the announcement was made that the Fraternity had received a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities for the development and implementation of a program to celebrate the bicentennial of the Constitution and Bill of Rights.

Planning is well along the way. National Director of the Program is Professor David Schimmel and Isidore Starr recognized authority on Law-Related Education is Chairman of the National Advisory Council.

International Justice Charles Taylor recently stated that the Fraternity support for the Bicentennial Program goes beyond the NEH Grant and is rooted in the responsibility of all lawyers to help educate the public about the Constitution and Bill of Rights. He stated that one of PAD's goals would be to help reverse the figures of a recent poll which indicated that 76% of our citizens do not know what the 1st Amendment is or what it deals with.

The PAD Program is designed to increase citizen understanding of the historic issues, philosophical principles and juris prudential foundations of the 1st Amendment in its broad constitutional context.

The PAD approach will involve a working partnership of volunteer PAD members of the Bench and Bar, of Humanities teachers and of committed civic leaders from selected communities in every state. They will work together to develop a functional framework for educating local citizens in those 1st Amendment issues which they feel are of special significance to their community.

The ultimate capability of reaching hundreds of communities and organizations is the PAD network of almost 100,000 living alumni members. Through this network the Fraternity will reach and motivate a large number of established judges and lawyers — as well as law school faculty members and students — and will in turn recruit local Humanities teachers and community leaders to provide a linkage with local labor, business, fraternal, professional and religious organizations.

Hofferman, Dennis Kirk, Donald R. Moore, and Robert E. Redding). Alice O'Donnell and Marni Byrum also served on the Committee.

Brother Robertson announced that he was retiring as Chairman after 10 years of service. Donald R. Moore, past International Vice Justice, was appointed to serve as Chairman for the 1984 ceremonies.

PAD Receives Freedoms Foundation Award

On June 15, the Fraternity received a prestigious award from the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge for its highly successful program in law-related education.

PAD was nominated for such an award last October by Brother Mark W. Cannon, Administrative Assistant to the Chief Justice "because of PAD's commitment and service to individuals, to the communities in which they live and to the strengthening of respect for law and those who serve the law."

This nomination was reviewed by a 1982 Foundation National Awards Jury of 15 members which included five Justices of the Supreme Courts of Maine, Iowa, Louisiana, Mississippi and Virginia; the President of the American Association of School Administrators, the President of the National Association of Secondary School Principals, Vice President of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, Past President of Civitan, and others.

The PAD award, approved by the Board of Directors and Trustees of the Freedoms Foundation, was the George Washington Honor Medal for excellence in the category of Community Programs. Presented in the Capitol of the United States on June 15, the following citation was read to the assembled group of award winners at the 34th Annual Award ceremony:

"The Juvenile Justice Office of Phi Alpha Delta has helped provide law-related education to more than 100,000 of the nation's youth and has participated in the training of more than 1,000 classroom teachers. Studies recently completed have shown that young people who receive such education are less likely to use violence, less likely to commit vandalism and be delinquent, and more likely to become useful citizens and active participants in our democracy. Law-related education has been a means for improving the attitude of citizens toward the legal profession."

Dr. Robert W. Miller, President of the Freedoms Foundation (whose father and son are members of Phi Alpha Delta), opened the awards ceremony by stating that "the Annual National Awards were established to recognize constructive words and deeds which support the United States' social, political and economic system, suggest solutions to basic problems, contribute to responsible citizenship, and strengthen an understanding of freedom and the fundamentals of a free society." "In short," he said, "We seek to recognize important contributions to our nation by those who build and do not tear down." Senator John W. Warner, member of the Foundation Council of Trustees, and a Brother in Phi Alpha Delta, also participated in the ceremony.

Attending the ceremony at the invitation of the Freedoms Foundation were Charles H. Taylor, International Justice; Steve Clark, Immediate Past International Justice; Robert E. Redding, Past International Justice and

Director of the PAD Juvenile Justice Office; Alice O'Donnell, PAD member of the Advisory Council for the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Program; Brother Cannon and Frank Cacciapaglia, Past Justice of the National Capital Area Alumni Chapter. Justice Taylor accepted the Honor Medal and expressed the appreciation of the Fraternity for this exceptional honor bestowed by the Freedoms Foundation.

In 1982, Dr. Cannon was the recipient of the Freedoms Foundation Valley Forge Honor Certificate Award for his public address on "Crime and the Decline of Values", an important address to the Judiciary of the United States, which included mention of the importance of law-related education.

The Awards Ceremony of the 15th was preceded by a special luncheon hosted by Brother Cannon at the Supreme Court. Attending such luncheon was International Justice Taylor Juvenile Justice Office Director Redding; Brother Howard T. Markey, Chief Judge, newly established United States Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit; Brother Herbert Ellingwood, past Deputy Counsel to the President and now Chairman, Merit Systems Protection Board; and Terry Donahue, Director of Training, Dissemination and Standards, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention.

Founded in 1949, the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge is a non-political, non-sectarian, non-profit organization which conducts programs that promote an understanding and appreciation of American's political, social, spiritual and economic institutions, and that fosters responsible citizenship. The Foundation is not endowed; its programs are underwritten by tax-deductible contributions from individuals, companies, organizations and foundations.

President Aleman Dies

Miguel Aleman, who became an honorary member of Benton Chapter at the University of Missouri, Kansas City while he was serving as President of the Republic of Mexico, passed away recently at age 79.

Aleman, in 1946, became the first non-military head of state of modern Mexico. He was a warm friend of the United States and an enthusiastic supporter of PAD.

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PAD — A National Force In The Law

As I travel about the nation I am occasionally asked if PAD will become a national force in the law now that it is one of the two largest law related organizations in the nation. PAD is, and will continue to be, a growing national force. I believe our duty is to provide national leadership whenever we feel that we can make a contribution. In the past several months we have expressed that leadership in several ways.

In 1981 PAD was the first legal organization to endorse the nomination of the first woman to be nominated to the U.S. Supreme Court. We endorsed Justice O'Connor because we felt that she was qualified and as the first male legal fraternity to admit women to its membership, we felt it appropriate to have a qualified woman on the U.S. Supreme Court. The endorsement came in July during a time of considerable criticism of O'Connor, and we believe our endorsement was beneficial.

In the Fall of 1982, our Fraternity established an Office of Government Relations in Washington, D.C. The office is directed by former International Justice Robert E. Redding and is designed to combine PAD's broad student & alumni organizations into law related projects that PAD feels will benefit its membership and the community.

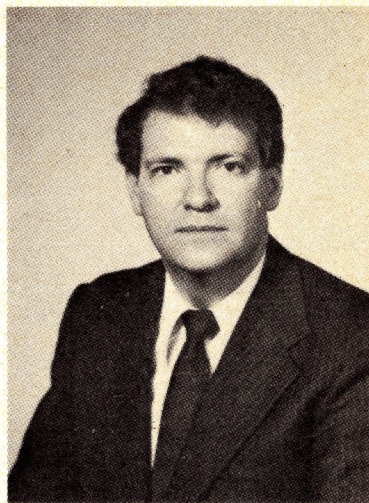
One such program, the PAD Juvenile Justice Program, has touched thousands of young people's lives since its inception in 1979. For its contribution in law related education PAD has received praise from the Chief Justice of the United States, the Vice President of the United States, and has received the George Washington Medal from the Freedoms Foundation. Beyond this national recognition, however, it has helped as Vice President Bush stated in his comments to our International Convention, "stop juvenile delinquency and lawlessness before they take hold of young lives and destroy promise of youth."

Continuing its role as a national force PAD was awarded a planning grant to develop a program for the proper observance of the 200th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution and Bill of Rights. This program will offer PAD's all across the nation an opportunity to see that the celebration of the bicentennial of our Constitution and Bill of Rights is meaningful and an opportunity to educate millions of our fellow citizens.

The Tom C. Clark "Equal Justice Under Law Award" selection committee will be headed by former International Justice Sandy Rae and will consist of several nationally known members including former HEW Secretary Robert Finch and Supreme Court official Alice O'Donnell.

I believe it is our duty to provide national leadership whenever we feel that we can make a contribution. As indicated above, we're attempting to fulfill our duty.

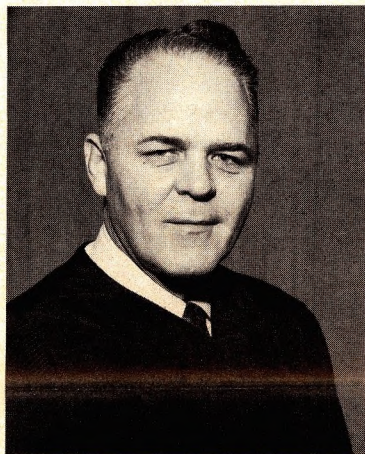
