

Phi Alpha Delta has made a commitment to the legal profession to be the fraternity of integrity, to foster professional responsibility among its chapters and members and has set as a goal in the next biennium the promotion of professional ethics among attorneys and law students. As a member of PAD, and of the legal profession, we are all challenged to accept the responsibility which our title implies, and to commit our professional careers to show that we are worthy of the name "Lawyer."

I express my sincere appreciation to all the delegates at the Convention for electing me to the position of International Justice and pledge to you two years of commitment; commitment to maintain Phi Alpha Delta, as not only the largest fraternity in the world, but also as the best fraternity in the world.

New PAD LRE Program

On September 25, Administrator Verne L. Spiers of the Office of Juvenile an Delinquency Prevention formally signed his approval of another 12-month extension of the PAD law-related education (LRE) grant program, awarding an increased amount to \$135.000. This is the ninth consecutive grant award by OJJDP, bringing the cumulative government funding level since February 1979 to \$1,304,365.

The grant year ending on August 5, 1986, produced several major PAD accomplishments, including the following:

(1) Judicial training was expanded as a result of the new PAD resource manual on state court support of LRE. Such training was carried out in the states of California, Colorado, Ohio and Oregon.

(2) Lawyer-teacher partnership was carried out in Florida and South Carolina.

(3) Four new or reissued PAD publications became available, including the Mark Cannon Monograph on "Crime and the Decline of Values," the Joe Daly Monograph on "Law School Student Benefits from LRE," a new Lawyer-Teacher Partnership Resource Guide, and a case history about Oregon judicial training.

(4) PAD law school chapters inaugurated new LRE programs in Florida, Massachusetts, Missouri, New Jersey and North Carolina.

We wish to alert our alumni and law student members that LRE programming will be prioritized this year in the 25 target states listed be-

Arizona, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Michigan, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Utah, Washington, Wisconsin.

The program highlights planned for the 1986-87 LRE year will include the following:

(1) Strengthened PAD management of the program with modernized office equipment, the addition of Dennis Dean Kirk as Deputy Director, and better trained alumni and law student participants.

(2) Updating of excellent PAD resource manuals, the demand for which have exceeded the supply, including the guide for kindergartenthrough-eighth grade schools. Two new manuals will be offered, one for law enforcement officer training and the other for the most effective use of resource persons by LRE program directors.

(3) A special training session for the PAD Statewide LRE Coordinators serving in the 25 target states now pushing LRE programs.

(4) Expert technical assistance in the following 11 states:

(a) Lawyer-teacher partnership training in Arizona, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, New Hampshire and Washington.

(b) Judicial training in Georgia, Iowa, Kentucky and New York.

(c) Law enforcement training in Arizona, Connecticut, Illinois and New York.

(d) Law school support training in Florida, Kentucky and New Hamp-

(e) Community support training in Iowa and Wisconsin.

Descriptive materials about the LRE programming by PAD alumni and law school chapters were distributed at the August Convention, at the fall District Leadership Conferences and by mail from the LRE headquarters office in Washington. Miller Heads New International Executive Board

Jack L. Miller was unanimously elected International Justice on August 9, 1986. Brother Miller had assumed the position of International Justice on November 24, 1985 upon the untimely death of International Justice Stanley H. Kohn.

One of the youngest International Justices in the history of the fraternity, Brother Miller attained his 35th Birthday just two days before his election by the Convention. He became International Marshal while still a student at the 1974 Convention in Toronto, Canada. He was elected to the office of International Secretary at the 1976 Convention in Kansas City and in 1978 to the office of International Treasurer. He has served also as International Second Vice Justice and as International Vice Justice.

Jack earned his B.S. degree from Southwest Missouri State University in Springfield Missouri and his J.D. from the University of Missouri-Kansas City Law School in December 1975.

He is engaged in a general practice partnership with former International Justice Don Hutson in Lebanon Missouri. He is also the prosecuting attorney for Laclede County Missouri and serves as counsel for various Savings and Loan Associations and nursing home facilities.

Record Attendance At 46th Biennial International Convention

A record number of persons, three hundred and thirty one, attended the 46th Biennial International Convention of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity International this past August. Delegates representing 168 law school chapters and 87 alumni chapters acclaimed the Convention as "outstanding", "inspirational", "educational", and "an unbelievable experience".

Officer's Reception

On Monday, August 4th, all members of the International Executive Board, International Advisory Board, International Tribunal, District Justices and members of the Executive Office staff attended a preconvention reception hosted by International Justice Jack L. Miller. Convention orientation for all officers was held the next day, as was orientation for chapter workshop panelists and convention chairpersons, vice chairperson and resource persons.

Kohn Memorial Reception

The first official Convention event was the Stanley H. Kohn Memorial Reception. The Reception was held in memory of International Justice Stanley H. Kohn who passed away November 24, 1985, midway during

his term as International Justice. The reception was held around the beautiful pool of the Omni International Hotel in Baltimore, Maryland.

Opening Session

At 9:00 a.m. on Wednesday, August 6th, International Justice Jack L. Miller led the procession of International Officers which signaled the official opening of the 46th Biennial Convention.

Extensive letters of greetings to the Convention were received from prominent PAD's throughout the world

One letter of particular note which was received read as follows:

"I am pleased to send greetings to the members of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity gathered for your 46th Biennial International Convention. 
I send you all my best wishes for a successful convention. God bless you. President of the United States, Ronald Reagan."

ceived from the Chief Justice of the United States, Brother Warren Burger, and from Vice President of the United States, George Bush.

A proclamation was also received from the Mayor of Baltimore designating the week as "PAD Week"

Extending the Official Welcome on behalf of the state of Maryland was the Attorney General of Maryland Brother Steve Sachs. He urged PADs to "continue to, and further emphasize, the law's role and lawvers role as teachers of what it means to be an American. Fight constitutional illiteracy. Go back to your communities and preach the doctrine of pluralism and of constitutional government and of limited government with the respect of rights of other people. Preach what it is to respect the views of others. Preach tolerance. Preach in short, respect for process.'

Clark is Keynoter

The keynote speaker was the National President of the Association of Attorney Generals, PAD's own past International Justice, Steve Clark. Brother Clark is a past Justice of Garland Chapter, a past Special Assistant to the International Justice, a former private practitioner, formerly Assistant Dean of the University of Arkansas Law School, formerly Chief of Staff and Legislative Director for Arkansas Governor David Pryor and present Attorney General of the state of Arkansas. He was elected to his present position in 1978 and at that time was the youngest Attorney General in the nation. He has argued three cases before the Supreme Court of the United States and was victorious in all three.

Brother Clark stated that when he thinks of PAD he thinks of three things, "pride, accomplishment, and direction." He admonished those in attendance that what the PAD Convention was all about was "being the best, being Phi Alpha Delta, and being proud of that. That is real important to justice in America. That is real important to this organization."

Chapter Workshops

The most important part of the Convention was held Wednesday afternoon in the form of chapter workshops. The theme was "Back to Basics". Chapter workshops were held on the topics "Chapter Recruiting and Continuity", "Chapter Programming and Finance", "Chapter to Chapter — A Student Dialogue", "The International Fraternity", and "An Effective Alumni Chapter". Experts in the various fields of discussion served on the panels and all in attendance agreed that the workshops were extremely educational.

A model initiation was presented later in the afternoon at which time several students were formally initiated into the law school chapters.

That evening District XVII hosted a Maryland Crab Feast for all persons attending the Convention. The location was the University of Baltimore.




Second Vice Justice

The 1986 Convention took much action through its committee system. Included was the adoption of the following resolutions:


lowing resolutions: AUDIT & FINANCE COMMITTEE

- 6. The IEB consider the feasibility and advisability of actively seeking corporate contributors.
- 7. The IEB consider the feasibility and advisability of soliciting advertisements in appropriate Fraternity publications, including but not limited to a Convention Ad-Journal.
- 8. The IEB consider the feasibility and advisability of entering into agreements with appropriate manufacturers/distributors for the sale of various products, e.g., personal computers to our members.



12. Commend the tireless efforts of Fredrick J. Weitkamp, Executive Director of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International and the 1984-86 International Executive Board for maintaining an outstanding commitment to fiscal responsibility.

Pre-Law Materials Committee

1. The publication entitled "Procedures for Establishing a Pre-Law Chapter" meets with approval with respect to form and content with the suggestion that additional language regarding procedures for contacting area alumni be included when the booklet is reprinted.

2. The publication entitled "Pre-Law Material" be reviewed to include the following recommendations:

a. The financial assistance section be updated immediately and periodically thereafter to insure that information regarding guaranteed student loan programs is correct.

b. That the LSAT score scale chart on page 11 reflect the most recent distribution of scores.

c. That the Pre-Law Materials Manual in particular and all other pre-law publications which originate be reproduced in Spanish for the convenience of our Spanish speaking brother.

d. Included within this section entitled "Pre-Law Reading Suggestions" selected Spanish reading reflecting the philosophy of the Latin American Legal System be listed.

e. To the extent possible, the Pre-Law Advisory Council explore the possibility of having the commercial publications listed in the reading section available in Spanish language.

f. A publication entitled "Deans Required Reading List" be added to the reading suggestion section at the time of reprinting of the Pre-Law Materials Manual.

g. That the subsection entitled "Careers in the Legal Profession" be expanded to the extent possible to cover more areas and to do so in greater detail than is presently available.

h. Additional resources regarding LSAT Preparation and Test Taking including but not limited to existing commercial publications, i.e., Barrons, Arco, Monarch . . . be added to this publication upon reprinting.

i. A paragraph dealing with placement be added to the section entitled "Selecting a Law School" along the lines of the following language:

"As a potential law student, you should also consider what a particular law school will do for you in finding employment both during school and after graduation. All law schools have placement offices to assist their students, but unfortunately some are not as effective as others. Each law school keeps records of its own job placement performance and a copy should be made available upon request. An alternative source of placement information is the State Board of Bar Examiners. They are available for your questions and they have placement information to help you make an informed decision.

3. The publication entitled "LSAT Study Program Manual" be discontinued in its present form but that the Pre-Law Advisory Council or other appropriate body endeavor to provide similar service to our pre-law members either in the form of video tape presentation or additional written materials reflecting the most recent guidelines for following and understanding LSAT instruction and question format.

4. Efforts be made to contact the LSAT in Newton, Pennsylvania, to obtain copies of recently administered LSAT's for possible distribution by the Executive Office.

5. Contact be made with existing commercial LSAT preparation courses . . . Kaplan, et al . . . with an eye toward negotiating an agreement providing for discount enrollment fees for such commercial courses to pre-law members.

6. A pamphlet be developed to explain procedures for setting up and administering a mock LSAT test specifically recommending that proctors of such test be law students and recent law graduates (the sense of the committee was that recent test-takers would be helpful for answering spe-

cific questions, i.e., test format).

7. The publication entitled "History and Purpose of Pre-Law Programs" reflect change of directors by deleting "Nancy S. Bales" and adding appropriate name of existing Director.

8. Pre-Law rush brochure remain unchanged with the exception of deleting if possible rental car discounts as a benefit, at the time of re-

9. If possible, the Pre-Law Benefits sheet delete the paragraph regarding car rental discounts.

10. The agreements regarding car rental discounts be reviewed and where possible modified to allow for rental by members under the age of 21 years.


Reactivated Chapters Recognized

Marni Byrum has been a member of the PAD Day Committee for several years and brings to the committee an in depth knowledge of the popular function.





12. The publication entitled "Pre-Law Programs Manual" be revised and this committee has submitted a copy of said manual with its suggested revisions to the Pre-Law Advisory Council.

Professional Responsibility And Ethics

- 1. All Chapters continue to sponsor at least one program per semester with an emphasis on Professional Responsibility.
- 2. Recommends the establishment of a special committee to oversee and further formulate and implement all aspects of our Professional Responsibility and Ethics Program. This special committee is to be comprised of PAD members in the field, including judges and educators appointed by the International Justice.
- 3. Recommends that the special committee collect and review information about outstanding law school legal ethics curricula, such information to be distributed to PAD chapters and law school administrators.
- 4. Recommends that the special committee submit its first report to the International Executive Board no later than one year from the adoption of this recommendation.
- 5. Recommends that the Fraternity develop a PAD Professional Responsibility and Ethics handbook for use by PAD students and chapters as soon as practicable. At a minimum, this handbook should include (1) a history of the program, (2) a discussion of what makes a chapter professionally responsible, (3) articles and speeches indicating why ethics is important, (4) an overview of state bar ethics exam requirements, (5) discus-

sions of how to avoid malpractice, and lastly ideas for chapter level programs.

- 6. Recommends that the Ritual of the Fraternity be amended at that section which permits an alumnus member to speak so that a new instructional paragraph would be inserted to read as follows:
 - "At this time it would be appropriate to depart from the written text to make remarks to the new initiates. These remarks should focus on the vital import that professional responsibility plays in the life of every lawyer and of the essetial duty of each PAD member to preserve the integrity of the Fraternity and the legal profession.'
- 7. Recommends that the Fraternity adopts the long range goal of pursuading law school faculty and administrators to integrate into each course taught, concepts and practical applications of professional responsibility and ethics programs.
- 8. Recommends that each law school chapter establish a committee to review and evaluate the quality of existing professional responsibility and ethics courses.

PAD Public Service Corporation

1. The International Chapter strongly endorses the participation of all Phi Alpha Delta student and alumni chapters to the fullest extent possible in the celebration of a Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States and the Bill of Rights.

The Executive Office is directed to cause this resolution and the materials for its implementation by the chapters to be transmitted to all of said chapters.

2. That the degree and extent of participation of law school chapters in the celebration of the Bicentennial of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights should be factor considered as part of the evaluation of professional programs for the Outstanding Chapter Competition.

3. The International Chapter expresses appreciation to members of the Bicentennial Advisory Council for being willing to assist the Fraternity in its Bicentennial Program.

4. The International Chapter expresses its appreciation to the Bicentennial Task Force for its efforts in developing programs for the Bicentennial and directs the Bicentennial Task Force to continue its efforts in developing and implementing suitable programs for said celebration.

Professional Programs

1. Recommends the following professional programs be developed for first year students:

- a. "Icebreaker" or "Debriefer" or "Special Orientation" session to enable all new law students to be current PAD chapter members and get practical person to person advice about law school.
- b. Lecture seminars of first year topics by the Am Jur winners in those areas.
- 2. The following professional programs be developed for second
- year and up law students: a. Resume Writing Seminars. b. Mock Interview Seminars.
- 3. The following professional programs be developed for graduating class law students:
 - a. Mini seminars on how to prepare specific types of cases as a newly practicing attorney.
 - b. Special Bar emphasis programs including Psychology of Taking the Bar Exam, Selecting Bar Review Courses, Differing Bar Requirements in Other States.

- 4. The following professional programs be developed for general
 - a. Coordination of activities between PAD and pre-law chap-
 - b. Dispute mediation programs in conjunction with local courts and Bar associations.
 - c. Housing fair program to aid law students in locating suitable housing prior to the start of the law school year.
- 5. Networking programs of two
 - a. How to network among local PAD students and alumni, and
 - b. Regional subscription newsletter to promote the PAD net worth by sharing employment opportunities.
- 6. Suggestions as to how to more efficiently implement professional programs:
 - a. Prepare a master calendar.
 - b. Plan early.
 - c. Create a committee system including senior members training junior class members.
 - Keep a file of documents for future use.
 - e. Evaluate each program each
 - year on its merits.
 - f. Effective publicity. g. Quality above quantity in
 - planning events. h. Follow-up on activities.

The Executive Office to give annually to each chapter officer a two-page copy of the table of contents of the Professional Programs Manual to promote familiarity with the full option of programs.

- 7. Suggestions as to what professional programs should be emphasized during the coming biennium:
 - a. Coordination of activities between PAD and pre-law chap-
 - b. Professional responsibility activities which activities are currently in the formation stage.

Constitution & By-Laws 1. Chapter IV, Section 3 of the

- By-Laws amend the second sentence hereof to read "One member of such council shall be a pre-law chapter member at the time of appointment and one member of such council shall be a pre-law chapter advisor.
- 2. Chapter V, Section 10, correct 'Article IX" to read "Article VII"
- 3. Amend Chapter VII, Section 1 of the By-Laws to delete the words 'Executive Secretaries' and insert the words "International Field Representatives'

The committee also cautioned the IEB that its de facto implementation of such a change prior to due consideration and approval of the International Chapter is not within the powers of the IEB.

Publications

- 1. Recommended that the IEB initiate an investigation of alternative methods of financing The Reporter. Recommended that The Reporter be self-sustaining and that the expenses for the production, publication and circulation be derived from sources other than Fraternity funds.
- 2. Recommends that the Fraternity relinquish the entire publication of The Reporter to an independent contractor. In the event an independent contractor is so selected, the Fraternity shall retain editorial control.
- 3. The section of *The Reporter*entitled "PADs in the News" shall be organized first by geographical area and then alphabetically by members names.
- 4. In any future publication of the PAD Business Directory, the countries be listed alphabetically. References to foreign countries will therefore not be necessary and shall be omitted. In the event that page space becomes scarce, the listing of current officers including District Justices is to be eliminated.
- 5. When the current supply of the publications entitled "Tangible Benefits of PAD" and "PAD Facts" is exhausted, the Board shall update, reconcile and combine these publications into a single publication.
- 6. All chapter officer manuals and documents and/or materials placed within such manuals shall be properly indexed so that the contents can be readily identified. The Executive Board shall consider at all times the international aspects of this fraternity

in all of the Fraternity's publications.

- 7. The Fraternity deemphasized the use of alcohol at PAD sponsored events in its publications and further consider the acquisition of liability insurance protection for its chapters, insofar as literature for pre-law chapters is concerned.

McCown Inducted Into DSC


Frank J. McCown became only the fifteenth member of the fraternity inducted into the Distinguished Service Chapter of the fraternity on August 9, 1986 at the closing banquet of the Convention.

Induction into the Distinguished Service Chapter is the highest honor that can be conferred upon a member other than the election to International Office and McCown is only the 15th person to be so elected.

The newest member of the DSC graduated from Miami University in 1962 and Ohio State University College of Law in 1964 where he served as Justice of McKinley Chapter.

His service to PAD is long and extensive. From 1967 to 1970 he served as an Assistant to the Supreme Justice and travelled extensively throughout the United States and Canada visiting PAD chapters and law schools. From 1970 to 1972 he served as District Justice of District X. At the 1972 Convention he chaired the Merger Committee which oversaw the merger of Phi Delta Delta Women's Legal Fraternity with Phi Alpha Delta. At that Convention he was elected Supreme Treasurer. He thereafter advanced to the chairs until he became International Justice in October of 1978.
