PAD In The Nineties: Breaking New Ground

With the theme of "Pad in the Nineties: Breaking New Ground," the 48th Biennial International Convention of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International convened at the Marriott Marina Hotel in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, August 1-4, 1990.

The largest attendance in the history of the fraternity (352 persons) saw representatives of 172 law school chapters and 89 alumni chapters convene for four days of hard fraternity work and outstanding social events.

Officers Reception

All members of the International Board, International Advisory Board, International Tribunal, District Justices and members of the Executive Office staff attended a pre-

convention reception hosted by International Justice Larry J. Crigler. As has been the custom for many years, Brother Crigler, as the outgoing International Justice was duly and properly roasted and toasted.

The next morning, all officers convened for convention orientation, as well as for orientation for chapter workshop panelists and convention committee chairperson, vice chairpersons and resource persons.

Convention Reception

The kickoff convention event for delegates was the reception held the evening of Tuesday, July 31. The reception served as an icebreaker and provided delegates an opportunity to meet officers and other delegates on an informal basis.

Convention Convenes

At 9:00 a.m. on Wednesday, August 1, International Justice Larry J. Crigler led the processional of officers, signalling the official beginning of the 48th biennial convention of the fraternity.

Opening ceremonies included the showing of a video presentation of the history of the fraternty, film clips of the presentation of the Tom C. Clark award to brother and former President of the United States Jimmy Carter, videotaped welcoming remarks from President George Bush and extensive letters of greetings from dignataries throughout the United States.

The city of Fort Lauderdale proclaimed the week "Phi Alpha Delta Week" and in so doing, recited that PAD had distinguished itself during its long history for its countless contributions to the law student, the law school, the profession and the community, has made major contributions in the field of law related education, and has adopted a strong commitment to the advancement of professional responsibilty and ethics.

In addition to the videotape presentation, President George Bush also wrote to the convention as follows:

"I am pleased to send my greetings to all those gathered in Fort Lauderdale for the 48th Biennial Convention of the Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International.

For nearly nine decades, your members have demonstrated a genuine commitment to improving legal services and to upholding the rule of law throughout North America. Bringing together experienced attorneys and judges, as well as law students, for the exchange of ideas and information, your fraternity has helped to enhance the knowledge, skill, and enthusiasm of aspiring legal professionals. Your seminars, publications, and other programs have not only given generations of law students a greater understanding of their professional responsibilities but also increased their appreciation for their role in defending the ideals of democratic government.

I applaud your efforts to enlist law students in voluntary community service, particularly in programs designed to help young people steer away from the dangers of alcohol and illegal drug use. This country's war against substance abuse cannot be won without the active participation of all our citizens, and I commend your members for their determination to help.

Workshops were conducted on "Recruiting Effectively and Maintaining Continuity," "Interrelationship with International," and "Professional Responsibilty and Ethics."

'Happy Birthday. The award for the district in the fraternity with the largest increase in membership over the preceeding year went to District III which increased from 1,000 members to 1,185 members. District III Justice Marci Bolter accepted the award.

The award for the greatest percentage of members out of the entire law school enrollment went to Kennedy Chapter of Hofstra University School of Law which has a membership of 338 members out of a law school enrollment of 802 (42%).

Homer S. Taft becomes International Justice

Homer S. Taft, a practicing attorney with Taft, Farah and Associates in the suburbs of Cleveland, Ohio, was elected International Justice of Phi Alpha Delta at the close of convention business on Saturday, August 4, 1990.

Brother Taft was initiated into Hay Chapter at Case Western Reserve University in February, 1968, and served as Chapter Treasurer and Chapter Justice prior to his graduation in 1970.

Following graduation, he served as a law clerk to the United States Court of Appeals for the Sixth District in Cincinnati and Akron, Ohio, returning to Cleveland in 1971 to establish a solo law practice. He served as an alumni advisor to both Hay and Meck Chapters in Cleveland, as Cleveland Alumni Chapter Justice and as District Justice for Ohio from 1976 to 1978.

Brother Taft was elected to the position of Associate Tribune at the Cleveland Convention in 1978 and which he also served as Convention Arrangement Chairman. In 1980, he was elected International Advocate and served in that capacity for two terms. He was then elected as International Second Vice Justice and has served as International Vice Justice for the past five years.

During his service on the International Executive Board, he has been particularly involved in alumni affairs, International expansion and the formation and operation of the PAD Public Service Center, as well as many other projects.

Brother Taft has served on numerous international committees including alumni affairs, financial affairs and Constitution and By-Laws revision. He authored the Phi Alpha Delta handbook entitled, "Establishing a Legal Practice" and co-authored the alumni chapter manual.

In addition to fraternal service, Brother Taft has been active in political, civic and business affairs. He is a member of the Cuyahoga County Republican Executive and Central Committees and is a vice-chairman of the executive committee. He has been a candidate for public office including Common Pleas judge in 1986 and the United States Congress in 1978. He has been active on many committees of the Greater Cleveland Citizens League, including the Cuyahoga County Charter Drafting Committee. He is an avid scuba diver and currently serves as a trustee of his dive club and the Erie Diver's Muse-

Owen Becomes First Vice Justice

Brother Norman Owen of Santa Rosa, California, was elected to the office of International Vice Justice.

Norm attended California Western School of Law where he joined Beaumont Chapter of PAD. He served his chapter as Vice Justice and Justice and was a delegate to the 38th Biennial Convention in New Orleans.

As an alumnus, he was vice-chairman of the convention committee which hosted the 1972 International Convention. In that same year, he became District Justice of District III and served in that capacity until elected Associate Tribune at the 40th

Biennial Convention in Toronto, Canada in 1974.

At the 41st Biennial Convention, he was elected Chief Tribune and served in that capacity until January, 1978 when he was elevated to the position of International Proctor by election of the International Executive Board to fill a vacancy which had occurred. He has served continuously on the International Executive Board since that time.

He began his legal career in general private practice in San Diego, California. He then became western area counsel for Commonwealth Land Title Insurance Company. He thereafter accepted a position with American Abstract and Escrow Company in Honolulu, Hawaii, as vice-president and counsel. He later became house counsel to several development and investment corporations and business entities in Santa Rosa, California. His practice in Santa Rosa is now limited to general corporate business and real estate matters

Pearson new Second Vice Justice

Rick Pearson of Union, New Jersey, a practicing attorney specializing in litigation of civil matters was elected to the office of International Second Vice Justice.

Rick completed his undergraduate work at colleges in North Carolina and Kentucky and attended law school at the University of Cincinnati where he served as reactivation justice of Chase Chapter, District X Conclave Justice, president of the law school senate, law school delegate to the university's financial advisory board, and member of the honor council. For his contributions, he was selected to be the commencing speaker at the law school graduation exercises.

He became District XV Justice in 1975 and was elected to the Interna-



fice of International Treasurer.


Mike graduated from Arkansas


MEMBERS OF THE MODEL INITIATION TEAM.

Summary of Convention Action

The following is a summary of convention action taken by the 1990 convention:

AUDIT AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

- Recommended that the International Executive Board consider revision of current accounting procedures to provide for annual depreciation of office equipment.
- Recommended that the International Executive Board consider furnishing all law school chapters with a color photograph each year of available PAD paraphernalia with a dated price list.
- 3. Recommended that the International Executive Board consider having the Executive Office staff research and negotiate the sale and distribution of Phi Alpha Delta paraphernalia by consignment with law school book stores, or any other entity involved in the sale of law books and supplies, located in or near active law school chapters.

PAD IN THE NINETIES COMMITTEE


- 1. Recommended that the International Executive Board immediately consider improving and expanding methods for communicating with all PAD alumni members including, but not limited to, increased use of alumni related information in *The Reporter*, the updating of the alumni chapter manual, and the publication of a PAD directory listing all alumnimembers.
- . Recommended that the International Executive Board immediately consider the adoption of and implementation of a procedure by which chapter clerks will record and submit to the Executive Office, the post graduate addresses as known of all graduating PAD members which should be distributed to all District Justices and active alumni chapters.
- 3. Recommended that the International Executive Board consider preparing a list of benefits available to PAD alumni or if one exists, update the current list of alumni benefits.
- 4. Recommended that the International Executive Board consider distribution of a roster of names and addresses of all active alumni chapter officers to each law school chapter.
- 5. Recommended that the International Executive Board consider the future sponsorship and implementation of continuing legal education programs and other professional programs which will benefit alumni on a national and/or local basis.
- 6. Recommended that the International Executive Board strongly consider the employment of an alumni director and/or alumni field representative to facilitate and improve communication with alumni members, to assist in organizing new alumni chapters, and to develop a methodology for keeping track of all alumni and locating lost alumni.



ately consider reestablishing a key person list to contain the names of those certain PAD members demonstrating excellence in service to PAD in the past, which list should be maintained by the Executive Office and made available to all PAD members upon request.

Recommended that the International Executive Board immediately consider the establishment of an alumni relations standing committee to handle alumni relations issues.

Recommended that the International Executive Board establish a standing fund raising committee to explore fundraising alternatives for the purposes of expanding the Endowment Fund, developing and building fund, raising funds for other fraternity activities as they arise, and to consider the utilization of professional fundraising services for these purposes.

10. Recommended that the International Executive Board strongly consider avoiding scheduling conflicts with conventions of other major organizations such as the American Bar Association when scheduling future PAD conven-

11. Recommended that the International Executive Board continue the support of existing law related education and drug and alcohol substance abuse programs and support and encourage the establishment of other law related education programs through the solicitation of additional federal and state grants.

PRE-LAW COMMITTEE

Recommended that the International Executive Board authorize the Pre-Law Director to investigate the feasibility of the installation of a pre-law hotline and that if feasible, the board take appropriate action to implement the program.

Recommended that the International Executive Board study the feasibility of mailing applications for law school chapter membership to all pre-law members after their graduation and before commencement of the first semester of law school.

Recommended that the responsibility of the Adopt-A-Chapter program be added to the duties of one of the law school chapter officers.

Recommended that to the extent possible, statistics quoted in prelaw publications be footnoted as to the date of the statistics.

Recommended that upon reprinting of pre-law publications, all references to the Delaware Law School be eliminated and Widener University School of Law be substituted therefore.

Recommended that the International Executive Board create a committee to study the feasibility of having a pre-law convention or the incorporation of pre-law chapters into the biennial convention and that the board shall report the results of that study to the next biennial convention.

Recommended that the committee studying the pre-law convention be charged with the additional responsibility of exploring the establishment of pre-law district conferences and pre-law coordi-

cluded in the professional programming manual.

- 3. Recommended that the International Executive Board encourage alumni chapters to consider instituting continuing legal education programs in their respective states where feasible.
- 4. Recommended that the International Executive Board use its best efforts to attempt to provide a continuing legal education program at or about the biennial convention location for all alumni delegates.
- Recommended that CLE programs be offered at reasonable and limited costs and be opened to the general public.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

- 1. Increased law school member initiation fee to \$60 effective November 1, 1990.
- 2. Increased alumni dues for members out of law school three years or less to \$25.00.
- 3. Increased the alumni member initiation fee to \$100.00.
- 4. Established an international building fund.
- 5. Allocated a portion of each law school initiation fee to be set aside into the international building fund.
- Allocated a portion of each alumni initiation fee to be set aside into the international building fund.
- Allocated a portion of each annual alumni dues payment to be set aside into the international building fund.
- Increased the amount of each law school initiation fee to be placed into the fund for financing district conferences.
- Designated the pre-law committee to be a standing committee for conventions.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE1. Adopted the following resolution

and preambles thereto: WHEREAS, The International Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International has assembled in its Forty-eighth Biennial Convention at Fort Lauderdale, Florida on August 1 through August 4, 1990;

WHEREAS, the purpose of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International includes the obligation to serve the law student, the law school, and the legal profession; and

WHEREAS, Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International had its inception from a controversy just prior to the turn of the twentieth century affecting the admission to the practice of law by law students; and

WHEREAS, Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International has Chartered Chapters in 172 law schools accredited by the American Bar Association and American Association of Law Schools or other accrediting agencies internationally in the United States, Canada, Puerto Rico and Mexico; and

WHEREAS, approximately one out of every six attorneys admitted to the practice of law in the United States and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico are members of the Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International; and

WHEREAS, the Multi-state Bar Examination is currently utilized by a vast majority of the states, commonwealths and territories of the United States of America as a criteria in determining admission to the practice of law; and

WHEREAS, a large percentage of said states, commonwealths, and territories refuse to allow for the transfer of scores on the Multi-state Bar Examination from other jurisdictions and/or refuse to apply the score obtained to subsequent attempts to pass a bar examination; and

WHEREAS, it is the consensus of the forty-eighth Biennial Convention of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International that the practice of law has become increasingly uniform across state, commonwealth, and national boundaries and that many of the skills required for "good lawyering" are nationally and internationally recognized:

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RE-SOLVED, that Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International does hereby advocate and strongly urge that the score obtained by any law graduate on a Multi-state Bar Examination taken in any jurisdiction shall be transferable to any other jurisdiction utilizing the Multi-state Bar Examination as a criteria for admission to the bar of that jurisdiction; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon taking the Multi-state Bar Examination, a person may utilize the score obtained on any subsequent attempts to pass the bar examination of that same jurisdiction; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International, urges that any problems of non-uniformity in the method of administering the Multistate Bar Examination from any jurisdiction to another jurisdiction should be resolved by the Conference of State Bar Examiners and other so that the Multi-state Bar Examination may be used as an easily transferable examination; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity International, recognizes that each state, commonwealth and territory has the right to establish its own unique portion of the bar examination; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International, supports and encourages the development of a uniform system of admission to all federal courts of general trial or appellate jurisdiction within the same circuit; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the International Executive Board of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International is urged to promote the discussion and advancement of a more uniform system of bar admission and a more open system of multi-state practice of law and the implementation of a resolution set forth herein through all means that the International Executive Board may determine to be appropriate; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the International Chapter urges the International Executive Board to engage in a continuing dialogue with the American Association of Law Schools, the American Bar Association Section on Legal Education and Bar Admissions, The American Corporate Counsel Association, the National Conference of State Bar Examiners, the governing authorities of the Bars of the respective jurisdictions, the Administrative Office of the United States Judicial Conference, the bar associations of the respective states, commonwealths
