#### A SPECIAL NOTE...

This note was sent to P.A.D. Brothers and Sisters via our electronic network on September 12, 2001. We extend our sympathies to all of the families affected by the attack on America on September II, 2001.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

As I write this note to you it is now more than 24 hours since a cowardly and heinous attack was perpetrated upon our nation, our principles, ideals and more importantly our families and friends. I am relieved to say, as of this point we do not know of the loss of any member of our P.A.D. family. Unfortunately, it is yet early.

I know that all of you join me in sending our best thoughts, prayers and wishes to anyone caught up in the forces of this despicable act. Like all Americans our sensibilities have been offended and our desire for fairplay has been challenged. Those who have committed this act from the shadows think they have achieved a victory and that their cause will be furthered.

Nothing could be further from the truth. What these people do not understand is that our way of life is built upon the principles liberty, freedom and equality that our Founding Fathers built into the very first "Contract with America." The United States Constitution; that collection of ideals which defines America and the American lifestyle. We readily recognize the commitment of our armed forces to defend it and us. But as students, lawyers, judges and Phi Alpha Delta members we should never forget that we have every bit as great a responsibility to defend those principles.

For our members who are part of the Military their duty is clear. For others of us our duty comes in the form of providing the political and legal leadership to lead our nation through turbulent times. But for all of us it means never shirking our commitment to preserving and furthering the ideals and principles that are America. 

Chapter danger signs & how to fight the fire By Frank Patek, Executive Director

During the 2000-2001 school year, Phi Alpha Delta has been successful in reactivating several chapters. As well as installing two new law school chapters. Along with that success comes a responsibility. A responsibility to maintain the good health and functionality of those new chapters and all of our current and historic chapters.

There is a common aspect shared by chapters that are experiencing weakness. APATHY. Apathy is a dangerous thing in an organization such as ours. As the worlds largest international law organization it would be easy to sit back and assume that our past glories will carry us through. But if we desire to maintain our pre-eminence we must be vigilant in our daily activities. And there are simple

things you can do to prevent and cure apathy. A few ideas are listed here.

I. MOTIVATE: We all share a common bond in fraternalism and a desire to advance, personally and as a whole. Being member should provide an

opportunity for professional development critical to future success. When chapter leaders have a clear sense of this purpose and share it with others it allows all members to find a role in the chapter.

- EDUCATE: Teach your brothers and sisters what P.A.D. does, and is, outside the four walls of your law school or pre-law school. Knowledge breeds pride and pride is the main preventative for apathy. Know who the members of the International Executive Board are, your District Justice, Assistant District Justice and your Faculty Advisor. Attend district conferences, chapter retreats, early bird summits, conferences and conventions.
- COMMUNICATE: This cannot be emphasized enough! The most important duty of any chapter officer is to communicate, effectively and often. Make certain all members know where to find and post notices and messages. Establish a chapter listserv and phone tree, then make sure everyone knows how to find it and use it. Conduct regular meetings at convenient times and locations. Create a chapter calendar of events and publish it as far in advance as possible.

Consider producing a chapter newsletter on a regular basis and do not forget to include your chapter alumni on the distribution list.

Remember that the Executive Office maintains records on all alumni and can supply you with mailing lists. Use your bulletin board on campus. Utilize the school newspaper to publicize your chapter activities and accomplishments. "The Reporter" is a great place to publicly congratulate individual members and to remind alumni of upcoming events.

- 4. ASSIMILATE: Assimilate new into the Chapter members immediately. The Marshal, in particular, should ascertain the interests and abilities of new members to facilitate committee assignments as soon as possible. These are your most energetic members and that energy should not be wasted for one second. Develop a balance of professional, social and fundraising programs. Use a blank Outstanding Chapter application as your roadmap.
  - FRATERNALISM: Always remember that Phi Alpha Delta is a fraternity. A family of sisters and brothers working toward a common goal of high ideals and values. But that does not just happen. You must cultivate those feelings and always respect and value those that surround you. Use and understand the P.A.D. ritual. Our ritual is what sets us apart from other law organizations and mere clubs. The ritual is also one of the finest examples of legal ethics that new members can be exposed to. Recognize and congratulate those members who work hard for your chapter and those that achieve success outside the chapter as well.

If you feel like your chapter is beginning to flounder please do not hesitate to ask for assistance. Call your District Justice, Alumnus/na, and Faculty Advisors. Utilize the Executive Office, they exist to ensure your well being and success and all stand ready to help you at any time. Good luck!

#### Attention Law Students!

As the fall semester begins, I'd like to talk to you about **RUSHING**. Effective rushing is crucial to maintaining membership, insuring growth, expanding programming, and

discovering leadership potential.

The Rale of Five...

- 1. Meet them.
- 2. Make them your friend.
- 3. Introduce them to your Friends.
- 4. Introduce them to P.A.D.
- 5. Invite them to join P.A.D!

Rushing is a year-round event! This does not mean that you need to have a rush table set up every day of the semester. However, it means that with each event, the name and image of Phi Alpha Delta is presented to potential members. Use these opportunities. Know the benefits of joining P.A.D., and talk about your chapter's events. Know why you joined P.A.D. Many times, this is the first question that a potential member may ask you.

Recruiting/information tables are one of the most effective ways to let students know of P.A.D.'s presence at your school. Most schools have an organization fair or picnic during the first few weeks of the semester. This

is one of the best times to set up a rush table. Make sure that you have plenty of materials, and members to staff the table. Have an Interested Students Sheet at the table – this will help with the collection of names, and email addresses so that students are contacted later regarding initiation and other chapter events.

First and foremost, recruitment should always be about personal relationships. You are doing more than finding new members you are making new friendships which will last a lifetime. Don't forget the "Rule of Five." 1. Meet them. 2. Make them your friend. 3. Introduce them to your friends. 4. Introduce them to P.A.D. 5. Invite them to become a member of P.A.D. Most of us will practice law after school. These are the folks you will spend the next 30-40 years of your professional lives with. Wouldn't you rather network with friends than strangers?



#### ALLISON BLOOM


Douglas Chapter • District XX Justice

To edit your record, you will need two pieces of information. 1. your last name and 2. your membership number. You will find your membership number located above your name on this issue of "The Reporter."


Enter your last name and member number and you will be taken to another screen which will enable you to change your personal and professional information. Drop down menus are used for determining

other important information.


Once you hit "submit" your record is updated and your fellow brothers and sisters are able to reach you via e-mail, phone, or even snail mail.

Once you enter your last name and member number, you are able to edit your information and network with others!


the Listserv. Member are able to post anything from job listings and get-togethers to creative ideas for rush events and solutions for chapter dilemmas.





gain, though, with the passing of one life, new life springs into being; the Clarence Darrow Chapter was chartered at the University of Maryland, on May 29, 1958. Later, the Baltimore Alumni Chapter was chartered and charters were given to the Barton Alumni Chapter in St. Petersburg, Florida, the Piedmont Alumni Chapter in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, the Hawkeye Alumni Chapter in Iowa City, Iowa, and the San Diego Alumni Chapter.

The Thirty-Second Biennial Convention, held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania in September, 1958, saw two major Fraternity activities come before the delegates for scrutiny. First, the question of appointing a placement coordinator to further implement the established placement program came up for discussion. This proposal was adopted. Second, the Endowment Fund was examined with an eye toward possibly increasing it and making it more meaningful. The convention adopted a policy to increase the fund, and recommended that alumni members in practice less than five years be required to contribute two dollars per year into the fund, and those in practice more than five years be required to contribute three dollars a year. Further, the convention defeated a proposed amendment that would have allowed more adverse votes in the pledging and initiation of new members. It likewise defeated a proposal to allow Alumni Chapters to initiate new members. It did amend the constitution to grant each district justice a vote on every question



coming before the convention. It adopted an amendment that more clearly defined the duties of the district justices. It defeated a proposal that would have required every chapter to have a chapter faculty advisor. The convention reduced the chapter charter fee from \$100.00 to \$25.00. It defeated a By-Laws change that would have allowed the chartering of chapters outside of the United States. Finally, it adopted a By-Laws change that required each district to hold a district conclave every year unless excused by the Supreme Executive Board for good cause shown.

Champ Clark Chapter at Washington University in St. Louis was again reactivated in 1959. The Samuel Houston Chapter at South Texas College of Law in Houston was chartered on May 30, 1959. The Thomas Cooley Chapter at Wayne State University in Detroit was chartered on May 16, 1959. Likewise, the Houston Alumni Chapter was chartered in 1959.

In February 1960, the Golden Anniversary Dinner of the New York Alumni Chapter honored eight brothers who had been members of the Fraternity for fifty years or more and coincided with the 51st anniversary of the chartering of the Rapallo Chapter. The eight fifty-

vear members included Mortimer B. Burnside, Thomas W. Constable, James E. Farrell, Louis F. Rebori, Harry A. Black, J. Laurens Elmore, Edward E. Fay, and Charles J. Kennedy. The Edward Coke Chapter was formally installed in March 1960, at the University of Toledo. Soon thereafter, the new chapter established a "wives' auxiliary," which according to the chapter members, proved to be "most helpful" to the chapter in its formative years. The Frank B. Willis Chapter at Ohio Northern University in Ada, Ohio was chartered on June 4, 1960 and the Louis D. Brandeis Chapter at American University in Washington, D. C., was chartered on December 17, 1960.

Miami Beach was the scene of the call to order for the Thirty-Third Biennial Convention in August 1960. To ensure that contributions to the Endowment Fund would be tax deductible, the By-Laws were amended to delete the provisions which allowed loans to chapters in time of distress. The new stated purpose of the fund was "to provide a program of scholarships, fellowships, and awards to members." (But until the endowment fund reached sufficient size to warrant such awards, the delegates directed that the fund

should continue the existing policy of using the available funds for "loans" only). The delegates also directed that each active chapter request a Phi Alpha Delta member of the faculty to serve as faculty advisor to the chapter. The directory was ordered up-dated and republished. In addition, proposed revisions to the ritual were approved.

Other actions of the convention included constitutional and by-law changes as follows: the provisions for honorary membership were amended to require that the candidate must have unusual distinction in the legal profession, at least on a state-wide basis; alumni chapters would henceforth be allowed two delegates and two alternates at conventions with no change in their previous voting power; and any four supreme officers would henceforth constitute a quorum to do business at any regularly called meeting of the Supreme Executive Board.

The convention discussed at length expansion possibilities, and ultimately decided to direct each district justice to regularly survey and report to the Supreme Executive Board any law school in their district that was "worthy" of expansion. The convention also directed a study on expansion possibilities beyond the borders of the United States (but refer to the action of the previous

action of the previous convention that defeated a proposal to allow such expansion!). The convention also directed that efforts be made to reactivate chapters where sufficient interest has been

indicated.

The year 1961
saw Phi Alpha Delta
add only one new
chapter to its rolls, the
Chattanooga Alumn

Chapter. But the 1962 expansions compensated for this lag as six new active chapters and three new alumni chapters were chartered. Alumni chapters went to the Orange Coast Alumni Chapter in Santa Ana, California, the Palmetto Alumni Chapter in Columbia, South Carolina, and the Valley of the Sun Alumni Chapter in Phoenix, Arizona. New active chapters chartered were: the Charles R. Grant Chapter at the University of Akron on February 27, 1962; the Campbell E. Beaumont Chapter at California Western University in San Diego on April 13, 1962; the David C. Meck Chapter at Cleveland-Marshall Law School in Cleveland, Ohio on April 29, 1962; the Benjamin M. Cardozo Chapter at Catholic University of America in Washington, D. C. on June 8, 1962; the Paul J. McCormick Chapter at the University of San Diego on May 12, 1962; and the Pierce Butler Chapter at William Mitchell College of Law in St. Paul, Minnesota on May 12, 1962.

The 1962 convention of Phi Alpha Delta - the Thirty-Fourth - was called to order in August 1962 in Denver. Immediately on the agenda was a tribute to three former Supreme Justices who had died in the proceeding two years. A moment of silence honored Brothers John Nangle, Edward J. Hess, and Douglas L. Edmonds.

Next, the convention recognized Reese Chapter at the University of Nebraska, which was recently reactivated; formally adopted the ritual changes proposed by the previous convention; amended the constitution to limit the period of pledgeship to one year; and adopted an amendment allowing expansion outside of the continental United States. Judge Alfred P. Murrah, Chief Judge of the United States Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit, was elected Supreme Justice of the Fraternity.

#### Keynote Address by Judge Alex Hotchkiss

It was at this, the Thirty-Fourth Biennial Convention, on August 30, 1962, that one of the most fraternal and inspiring keynote addresses was delivered by Judge Alex Hotchkiss. Judge Hotchkiss became a member of Benton Chapter at Washburn University in Topeka, Kansas in 1923. He served as chapter clerk and justice of his chapter, as a convention delegate in 1925, and as justice of his alumni chapter in

Topeka. Professionally he served as county attorney, mayor, state senator, and state judge.

This speech is excerpted from the transcript of that convention.

#### Keynote Address at the Thirty-Fourth Biennial Convention By Judge Alex Hotchkiss

"You know, after hearing our Supreme Justice speak of my background in Phi Alpha Delta, I am beginning to feel something like a senior citizen because those who spoke before me today about their connection with our fraternity all came after my time.

"Last night I visited in this room with the Wythe Chapter delegation and a little bit later with some alumni, and I begun to feel like the principal character in a story told by one of our members. It is a story about an old member who was admonished by his doctor to cut down on his drinking. He asked the doctor how much he should cut down and the doctor replied, 'not more than a pint a day.' In reply the old member said, 'Hell. Doc, I spill more than that with each drink!' (Laughter)

"I was impressed by the comments of Brother Johns, who indicated that it was possible to be admitted to practice in this state for one day only,

Judge (Brother) Alex Hotchkiss delivers a stirring keynote address to the 34th Biennial Convention But, if you do, remember the old saying that he who represents himself has a fool for a client — and a half-wit for a lawyer! The brother who represented the City of Denver took a slightly different approach by saying that if you get into trouble we will make the jail as comfortable as possible - by this I take it 'you're on your own!' - Thank you very much. (Laughter)

"It has become the custom in legal circles to indicate, at the outset of any speech, something about the scope of the address. So with that in mind, I should indicate what is in store for you today.

"We meet here today as members of our Fraternity, and as law students and as members of the legal profession. Whenever such men gather to listen to someone who is a 'little' beyond the age of law students, it seems appropriate that some comments should be made of the personal observations of the speaker, by way of counsel and advice, and I have some of that in mind today. But most of all I want to talk about Phi Alpha Delta, our great brotherhood of the legal profession.

"You know the story is told of two friends who were walking down the street one day and they came across another man who was hurrying by, putting on his coat. Who is that, one said to the other and the other replied "That is a member of the International Civic Club on his way to a luncheon meeting." The first man asked "What do they do?"

And the second man replied "they eat and belch and run." (Laughter)

"Don't let this crude illustration apply to us - don't let us ever get to the place where we permit our Fraternity to become nothing more than a mere name and a mere membership with no substance to it.

"So, in talking about Phi Alpha Delta, I will speak of matters that most of you already know. Some of it might be repetitious, but I would be remiss in my duty today, if at a national convention, of all places, I did not recount and recall the principles of our Fraternity. So, in conformity with the duty I have on this program, I hope that I am able to make suggestions that will guide you in your deliberations during this convention and perhaps take home with you. Even though there may be some repetition, I hope in re-telling I may be able to give you some fresh interpretation of why we are together here in this fraternal gathering."

"It seems to me that we are met with two questions. The first is, 'Can we do that which is expected of us in Phi Alpha Delta?' And the second is, Where do we start?' To answer the latter, a simple illustration comes from one of our oldest eastern schools, which was celebrating three hundred years of its existence. In connection with that celebration they had a reunion of all of the classes. They planned a march of all of these classes and asked each to make a banner setting forth their ideas of hope and achievements. So, from the tottering oldest class to the newest, down the street they came, each class carrying their banner, each indicating something of the inspiration and enthusiasm they individually felt. But the one that won the prize, that of the newest class, had on its banner the simple words: 'For 300 years you have been waiting for us.'

"So, I say, that is the way with Phi Alpha Delta. All of the energies and interests and efforts which have gone before are now focused on this very assembly, the very next class, the very next group of initiates, as the most immediate prospects to have the most immediate impact to renew, to strengthen, and to implement the principles and purposes of our fraternity.

"But that is not all. In order to flourish and maintain itself with vigor, it is not enough that we replenish our Fraternity in numbers; it must be replenished in the practice of its precepts and the tenets. And this can only be done by the members who compose it. So, here we have a twofold responsibility, both the old and the new members must become imbued with those things we hold dear as the ideals and the precepts of Phi Alpha Delta.

"I think these ideals and precepts fall into three general categories and I would like to review with you something of the traditions and tenets and convictions that are included.

"The first is historical, an interesting and tremendous history that cannot be too often recalled. First of all, there is an unusual circumstance that led to our founding. In 1897, a group of law students, much like you today, at the law schools in Chicago, were having some difficulties about obtaining admittance to the Bar. So they formed the Law Student League to plea their cause. Out of that unity and commonness of purpose came an organization by the name of Lambda Epsilon, with the Greek letters standing for Law and Equity. Some difficulties beset them, so after four years they met in South Haven Michigan, in July of 1902, and dissolved the organization. But they realized that the unity and brotherhood they had developed should be maintained. And so they appointed a committee - remember these were law students and young lawyers, (Laughter) - to develop an organization to hold together their unity and friendships. After some considerable effort and hard labor, such as this fine group up here seems to be always performing, our present day Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity became a reality.

"In short order there came along Blackstone, Story, Fuller, Webster, and Marshall Chapters. By 1910, there were twenty three chapters. Since that time our Fraternity has withstood all of the vicissitudes and ravages of two world wars, the great depression, and all of those other things that interfere with law schools and the essentials that are

required for the continuation of such an organization as ours.


"So, today we now have ninety chapters and over 40,000 members. From our history, I recall what are two important things. They are first, there is a place and purpose for a law fraternity in the scheme of things in legal education. And, second, to belong to Phi Alpha Delta is no light or trifling matter. When you belong to this fraternity, in addition to that which you have in your local chapter, you belong to something that is important and outstanding on a national scale, and which will be with you throughout your legal career.

"The second thing has to do with the standing, or lack of standing, that lawyers have in the eyes of the public. And, you know, we heard such stories as the one about the lawyer who was very ill and the doctor was called to his bedside - that was when doctors still did such things (Laughter) - and someone said 'He is lying at death's door' and the reply was, 'Just like a lawyer - at death's door and still lying.' (Laughter) Or we heard of such tales as the two contending parties, and one of them said to the other, 'If you don't do as I say, I'll see you in court.' And the other said Well, my lawyer and I will be there.' The first party responded 'If you beat me in the trial court. I'll see you in the appellate court.' And the second party said 'Well, my lawyer and I will be there.' So the first party said 'If you beat me on appeal, I'll see you in hell.' And the second party said 'In that case, my lawyer will be there'. (Loud Laughter).

"Now, it is a poor group of people who cannot withstand the fun and jokes that are pointed at them. Perhaps there are some natural weaknesses within our profession, although I say it isn't so. Collectively we have the esteem and affection of the general public, and that brings me to the manner in which we designate our chapters. I think that it

is a wonderful idea that we name our chapters after distinguished members of the legal community, instead of using Greek letters as the social fraternities do. Recently, I was invited to give a talk at a chapter and I took the opportunity to study the background of the men after whom some of the nearby chapters were named. It gave me the breadth and scope of our Fraternity because while all of them were outstanding members of the legal community, one was outstanding in the private practice of law, one was an outstanding judge, and the third was a recognized law educator. This brings to my mind that in our roster of great lawyers, they have one thing in common. To the general public they represent the law and its interpreters, and in a favorable light. The general public wants to feel that the thing that governs and controls and regulates persons and property and offenses is something good and free from causing them pain. And, to the public, these men, I think, exemplify that aspect. I think that every chapter and every member of Phi Alpha Delta, should know the history and the career and the life of their chapter namesake. In this way, we can emulate them and thus earn the esteem and respect and the confidence of the public that they enjoyed, and thus help to erase what I consider to be an unwarranted blot on the legal profession.




# Get essential hands-on experience

# Applying to Law School can be STRATING...you can change that!

Applying to law school can often be a frustrating experience! There's so much information, so much "wrong" information and so little control over your situation. There seems to be a mystique about this process that adds to the frustration. Perhaps I can help...

While recruiting "on the road" I hear so many potential applicants tell me with great anguish that they're "late" in the process. It's October or November and they're already in a panic. They've been told that they must apply early and if they haven't already sent that application in by early October they're fatally late. Most of the admission "decision makers" are recruiting in September, October and most of November and are rarely in their offices reading files. Applicants believe that by applying very early they are more apt to be offered a seat that they might not qualify for if they were to apply later. Let me assure you that each law school knows how many applicants they normally accept each year and what the range of credentials are for those they admit. So, it's not likely we'll admit someone early who doesn't fit the profile we already have. I'm particularly concerned about those who are not strong applicants for a particular school applying before they are the strongest applicant they can be. Improving your position as an applicant certainly trumps presenting a "weak" application simply to be "early". Trust me...strong applications to nearly any law school are welcome...even at the deadline. All the seats won't be gone for those applying to law school armed with credentials


which place the applicant in a competitive position. So, go ahead an apply to the schools of your choice as early as you like but make certain to indicate if you want the decision held until you retake the LSAT.

How important is the LSAT? Unfortunately,

while we hate to reduce you to a "number", and wish we could overlook it in some cases, we accept the fact that it is the best predictor of success in law school and beyond. Certainly many people test badly but the test "levels the playing field" in that everyone is judged against the same standard. With students relying so heavily on a popular magazine's ranking of law schools in which the LSAT plays a large part in that rank, law schools are being forced to place even more weight on this standardized test. Sad but true. To my great regret potential applicants don't always get (or listen to) advice from those who really know about not taking this important test without adequate preparation. If you are not well on the day of the test don't be a hero and take it anyway unless you plan to cancel the score which then places you in the dilemma of "should I or should't I". Digging a hole and then attempting to dig yourself out isn't a strategy I recommend. Far better to wait and take the test when you are confident of your preparation and can take your very best shot! What is the best preparation for this test? I like to think of this as preparing to run a marathon. It's important to run the course many times to see where the rough spots are, eat right, sleep right...and practice, practice, practice. You will notice when you take the LSAT that the question of how you prepared to take the test is asked. We are informed, as a result of that survey question, that the very best way to prepare for the LSAT is to take as many tests as possible under timed

conditions. I strongly suggest an applicant obtain as many actual old tests as possible from the Law School Admissions Council (LSAC) – see the LSAT Registration booklet or order on line by visiting LSAC.ORG and take these tests timing themselves religiously and then scoring the tests to see where their own difficulties lie. The same survey question tells us the second best way to prepare is a commercial prep course. Give yourself the very best "shot" at law school you can...practice, practice, practice,

Often applicants tell me how strong they are in extracurriculars, community service, and letters of recommendation.....and refuse to hear that these things, while very important, do not supersede or overcome, in most cases, credentials which are not competitive in a particular school's applicant pool. They just don't want to hear that their LSAT and GPA are first and foremost essential to the process. Being president of a fraternity



or sorority just won't overcome poor credentials!

I always get questioned about that pesky personal or narrative statement. If the LSAT is so darned important, does it really matter what I say in that statement? You bet! That statement should be considered in the light of "what would I tell the admissions committee about me if I had the opportunity to present my case." Not a regurgitation of what is already on the resume you've supplied with your application, nor what is already in that application!\_Here is your golden opportunity to tell the admissions committee about yourself....who you are, perhaps what brought you to the decision to attend school....something to bring you to life and have you stand out as someone we want to admit. Remember, human beings are reading your application catch our attention. My personal least favorite narrative is one in the third person from the perspective of their

own obituary. Believe it – I get several of those a year.

One of the things that puzzles me getting "bad" letters recommendation. I always wonder why the applicant didn't think to add one word to his/her request for that letter. That word is - GOOD. As in, "would you feel comfortable in writing me a good letter of recommendation?" For me, discovering a less than favorable letter of recommendation in a file, brings my consideration of an applicant to a screeching halt. I consider the judgment, or lack of, on the part of the applicant in choosing this particular recommendor and, of course, the damning words I'm reading. While a letter of recommendation won't override poor credentials it could be the one thing that differentiates you from another most similar applicant when we're prepared to admit one of the applicants but not both. Such letters should be from people who know you well enough to speak to your abilities in areas important to law schools. We


want to know more about you and your abilities that are essential to your success in law school. Letters that simply tell us how nice you are don't help. We expect that!

Common sense should play an important part in your application process. Admissions professionals like me usually have, in their title, something that pertains to admissions director of admissions, dean of admissions, etc. You will note that we are not directors or deans of rejection. We WANT to find some reason in your application to advocate for your admission. We are reading your application with the view of finding reasons to admit not to reject. Give us ammunition to advocate for you!

It fascinates me, by the way, to constantly discover that applicants are hugely concerned about application deadlines but pay little attention to financial aid deadlines. Most students are responsible for their own expenses but give little thought as to how they're going to pay for school. For schools who consider need in awarding aid financial aid deadlines are critical. Miss the deadline to file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid or a school's own application and the money might well be gone! Every student who wants to be considered for need based aid (federal student loans) must file this form and many schools use the analysis of need to allocate need/merit based grants (free money). Law students are considered to be independent for financial aid purposes and one should contact the schools to which they're applying to ask whether or not their parents' tax returns are required. Some schools (like mine) do not require a parental tax return and considers everyone to be independent for financial aid purposes. It's critically important that you understand how financial aid works! ASK the schools to which you are applying to explain how financial aid works before you make a mistake which might prevent you from attending the school of your choice!

In short, view this process as one that you can affect by presenting the strongest application you can, to a range of schools that you'd consider attending should you be admitted in a timely, organized manner. Pay attention to deadlines both application and financial. Visit law schools on line but preferably in person in a time frame which will allow you to make a deposit at that school you truly might attend rather than make multiple deposits because you've not timed your visits well. Make yourself known to the admissions office if you find yourself on a waiting list - and continue through the summer letting us know you are truly interested in our school.

I suspect, if you're an applicant who is organized and thoughtful about your application, next year at this time will find you occupying a seat in the law school of your choice. Best of luck on the journey.....and don't be a stranger....let us hear from you!

trial teams on a first-come, first-served basis beginning on October 5, 2001.

A registration fee of \$165 per must accompany person registration form. #### YOUTH & TEEN COURTS

Youth Court is a voluntary alternative program to the juvenile justice system that holds youth offenders accountable for their actions. Most Youth/Teen Courts do not determine the guilt or innocence of juveniles; rather they serve as a diversion alternative. Youth offenders must admit their involvement in the incident. Types of offenses include 2<sup>nd</sup> degree assault, disorderly conduct, theft and possession of alcohol.

There are four types of program models.


- (1) The Youth Judge Model, involves a youth who serves as a judge.
- (2) The Youth Tribunal Model. This model involves three youth judges and no jury. Youth attorneys present the cases to the youth judges who determine the appropriate sanctions.
- (3) In the Peer Jury Model, an adult volunteer serves as a judge. A case presenter presents the case and the panel of youth jurors questions the defendant directly.
- (4) The most popular Youth/Teen Court Model involves the use of an adult judge with students serving as "attorneys." Youths are utilized in various roles including bailiffs, clerks, and members of the jury.

The sanctions that a youth offender can receive may involve community service hours, Youth/Teen Court jury duties, apology letters, conflict resolution class, anger management class and essays. In addition, counseling is provided to the youth offender as well as to the family. Youth offenders, who successfully complete the program, can earn service learning hours, which are normally required for completion of

Youth/Teen Court provides positive alternative activities and educational experiences that bring about positive results. In most respects, Youth/Teen Courts have a very high success rate. There are over 650 active Youth/Teen Courts programs nationwide today.

Formed in 1978, this non-profit organization represents the Law Student Societies (LSSs) of all twenty-seven Australian universities conducting Law programs. Each law school has an LSS, and each LSS constitutes ALSA. Therefore, ALSA represents over 25,000 law students, providing many and varied services to these students and student law societies. ALSA also has strong affiliations with many international law student organizations, such as the New Zealand Law Students' Association and the European Law Students Association.

#### **OUR AUSSIE CONNECTION...**

What does ALSA do?

Our products and services for students include a number of publications, such as our national magazine (the ALSA Reporter), our student based Academic Law Journal, our Careers Directory, and our library loose-leaf service, the Australian Law Students Directory (an A-Z of everything you need to know as a law student, including everything from admission requirements, scholarships, international exchange programs, and practical legal training options. Our web site (at www.alsa.asn.au) also provides a wealth of information for students, and is quite heavily relied upon.

## An Introduction to Aussie Law ~ A Local Perspective ~

#### CONTRASTING APPROACHES

Two recent decisions of the United States Supreme Court indicate some of the differences that exist between the legal systems in Australia and the United States.

The first is Bush v. Gore. In that case, the Supreme Court, by a majority, overruled the decision of the Florida court which had instructed counting officials to inspect each contested ballot in districts of Florida in order to determine, so far as possible, the intention of each voter. The Florida court's instruction followed a review of voting papers which had been mechanically rejected for want of complete perforation of the ballots by voting machines. In the view of the majority of the Supreme Court, the Florida decision allowed too much arbitrariness in the evaluation of the individual ballots. It was held that this was incompatible with the equal protection clause of the United States Constitution. Instead of remitting the matter to the Florida courts, to ascertain and declare rigorous guidelines, the Supreme Court held that no recount was possible in Florida because all disputes had to be resolved by the date of the Supreme Court's decision and not a moment later. In the result, the decision of the Supreme Court effectively handed the outcome in Florida, and thus the Presidency, to Mr. George W. Bush. All that Mr. Gore could do was to lick his wounds and take

psychological comfort from the strong dissenting opinion expressed by Justice Stevens. I do not believe that this result would have followed in Australia. although the electoral system is significantly different. In a

Disputed Returns is empowered to order a re-election. From the earliest days of the first federal election, the Court has upheld the principle, derived from English electoral law, that the will of the electors must be ascertained where it is material and contested. Doubtful questions are, as Justice Isaacs declared in 1919, resolved "in favour of the franchise".

Voting in Australia in federal and State elections is compulsory. The elections are conducted by the Commonwealth Electoral Office, a national body with impeccable credentials for neutrality professionalism. Voting machines are not used; simply paper ballots and pencils. The votes of the entire nation are counted within hours, as in Canada. The outcome is rarely contested but where it is, the dispute can be decided swiftly in the Court of Disputed Returns. In Australia, all judges sever completely any political connections which they may have had before appointment. Most have never been connected with any political party. Most Australians watched the outcomes of the United States election and litigation with astonishment.

The second decision is Boy Scouts of America v. Dale. That was a case in which an Eagle Scout, Mr. Dale, had successfully challenged under New Jersey law the right of the Boy Scouts organisation to expel him on the basis of his sexuality, about which he was open. The New Jersey decision in favour of Mr. Dale was reversed by the Supreme Court of the United States, again by a close majority vote.

As in Canada, there is no exclusion of homosexuals from scouting in Australia. It is inconceivable that a Queen's Scout (the equivalent of an Eagle Scout) would be expelled from the movement as "not morally straight" or "clean" simply because of his or her sexuality. But neither is there any provision in the Australian Constitution that would come to the aid of a scout in such a case. Federal legislation in Australia prevents employers from discriminating on various grounds including race, colour, sexual preference, sex or otherwise. This provision was enacted to give effect to a convention of

the International Labor Organization. Typically State anti-discrimination laws in Australia allow exemptions for religious bodies, religious schools and on the grounds of religious beliefs or principles. Some such bodies, schools and their supporting churches continue to practice forms of discrimination against homosexuals in Australia. But otherwise such discrimination is gradually disappearing.

This subject is not a matter of theoretical interest to me. Because I am myself homosexual, and grew up at a time when the law discriminated in Australia against homosexuals, I have felt the injustice that can occur to individuals on irrational grounds. Those irrational grounds include race, colour, sex, age, physical or mental disability, marital status, pregnancy, religion and political opinion. But they also include sexual orientation.

The ways in which the legislatures of Australia gradually removed the criminal offences targeting homosexuals was a tribute to the rationality of the Australian political process, seen at its best. When it failed in Tasmania, international human rights law was invoked. This resulted in stimulation towards the reform of the law. All of this was achieved without constitutional litigation. This does not mean that there are no remaining discriminations. They still exist. Lawyers, and above all judges, must not be complacent about injustice.

The only basis upon which the legal profession, and the judiciary, have a claim to nobility of purpose is as they pursue the end of equal justice under law. That objective is carved into stone on the portals of courthouses throughout the United States. It is not carved into the façade of Australian court buildings, which are usually more modest. Ordinarily, if they carry any emblem at all, it is the Australian Coat of Arms or, in older courthouses, the Royal Coat of Arms. But the ideal is the same. It is shared by most legal systems. It is not always fully achieved. Within the law, judges and lawyers must strive to uphold its objectives.

In my lifetime, I have seen many wrongs in Australian law corrected. Others remain. And the law must constantly renew itself by dedication to the high ideals of justice and the rule of law. They are our banner. Not complacency, self-satisfaction and moneymaking. Happily, in Australia, most lawyers stride confidently under the banner of justice and the rule of law is resilient.

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
