





~ Successful Programming Ideas ~

Talk to law students at this time of year, and most seem to be focused on one thing. What will they being doing in May when classes are finished? What direction do they want to take with their career? Preparing for the "real" world can be pretty intimidating. Luckily, Phi Alpha Delta has 200,000 members who are already there. Utilizing this resource will enable you to provide some helpful information to your members with a strong calendar of professional programs. Here are a few programs that have been successful at several chapters:

Brown Bag Lunches

Invite local attorneys within various areas of practice to speak during your school's lunch hour. Pick a practice area that seems to be popular amongst the student body. For those of you worried about keeping costs down, approach your Career Services office about a jointly sponsored event.

CAREER NIGHTS

Pick a topic to focus on (ie: Public Interest, Criminal Law, Non-Traditional Legal Jobs), and invite local attorneys, judges, and professionals to speak. Have them discuss how they started out and offer suggestions to students who may want to follow a similar career path. An event like this could be open to the entire student body for the general discussion, then hold a closed members-only reception immediately following the forum. This will be a benefit to your current members, as well as providing non-members an incentive to join P.A.D.

Mock Interviews

Set aside a couple of evenings when members can sign up to be "interviewed" by alumni volunteers. Encourage the interviewers to offer suggestions at the end of the interview regarding improvements that could be made to ensure a successful interview later.

MENTORSHIP PROGRAM

Set up a program where members are paired with local alumni who then act as an advisor on an individual basis. Members can select the attorney they wish to be paired with, or your chapter can form a committee to handle the pairings based on the area of law the particular students are interested in pursuing. Kick off the program with an alumni-student gathering, such as a breakfast or evening reception.

MEMBERSHIP HAS IT PRIVILEGES

So You Want A Successful Rush?

Effective programming is one of the keys to a successful rush. The first step is meeting with the officer board/membership early in the semester to establish a "calendar" of events to include a discussion of the 5 W's: who, what, when, where, and how. Appoint and/or ask for members to volunteer to "chair/coordinate" the projected programs. Delegation ensures a "chapter effort."

"How To" Series ...

First-year students can easily feel "lost" and "alone" during the first semester. They eagerly look for guidance and advice, especially from fellow law school peers, about what they are "supposed to be doing" to survive and succeed during the first year. An effective program strategy to get first-years out in record numbers, is for the chapters to sponsor a series of "How To" workshops that focus on the needs of first-year law students. This series should be open to anyone, without a membership requirement.

How to #1: Within the first two weeks, organize a "How to Brief" workshop, going over basics of outlining a case. Provide a few take-home examples.

How to #2: During the middle of the semester a "How to Outline" session will be a lifesaver as the first years begin to wonder what to do with all those endless notes. If your chapter has an outline bank, point out that one of the key benefits of "membership" is access to great outlines. Also, bring some examples of the various study aids that are available such as tapes, flashcards, commercial outlines and discuss the pros and cons of them. If your chapter has a study aid library, emphasize "members" can check-out study aids.

How to #3: During early to mid November, present a "How to Take a Final" session. Provide opportunity for students to ask questions about specific professor's finals (have several chapter members be available to field these questions). Emphasize that one of the most effective methods of study is analyzing and practicing old finals. Be prepared to advice the students on where to obtain their specific professor's old finals (have a list of the professor's who have old finals available; old finals may be online).

General Tips: Ask professors to come and share their insight on what they expect on a final or brief. Target professors who teach first-year topics. Provide some sort of snack food following the sessions such as pizza. Check with representatives of the various Bar Reviews such as Micromash, Bar Bri, and PMBR or Lexis/Westlaw student associates for sponsorship of the program. These company reps generally have an interest in gaining a high visibility with first-years, and are often willing to provide partial or total financial funding for related costs such as food.

Pre-Law "Sponsorship"

Pre-Law P.A.D.'s are key candidates for law school, and thus future potential members and leaders. You can contact the Executive Office to find out if there are any active P.A.D. Pre-Law Chapters near you. If so, make contact with the Pre-Law Advisor/President, and offer to "sponsor" the chapter. Sponsorship programs could range from pairing a law school chapter member with a pre-law member to serve as a "mentor," dinner/social with prelaw/law school chapter, or arranging for the Pre-Law Chapter to visit the law school/sit-in on class. General Tips: Discuss with law school administration your chapter's willingness to assist with "potential student" orientation activities such as tours/accompany visiting students to sit-in on class.

Professional Programming

Fall is on-campus interview season. Sponsor a "How to Ace Your First Interview" workshop. It is never too early to plan for your rush! Locate a few P.A.D. area alumni who would be willing to discuss what they look for during interviews. Note that one of the many benefits of P.A.D. is the extensive network of legal professionals available to members.

Communication is Key!

Effective publicity and dissemination of chapter programming events is vital. A variety of communication mediums will ensure widespread student body awareness of chapter programs.

- 1. Chapter Web-Site: A home-page is a great place to post officer contacts and program dates. Often, space is available for student organizations through the school. Also, your chapter page can be linked to the International page (email padpr@aol.com).
- 2. Bulletin Board: Post officer contacts, calendar of events, photos on the board.
- 3. Chapter email/distribution lists can be utilized to send out "last minute" reminders and meeting minutes. Gather names/emails of "interested" students at programming events and add them to the distribution list. You can easily create a separate "chapter" email account/distribution list. through yahoo or hotmail i.e.chaptername@yahoo.com (HarlanChapter@yahoo.com).
- 4. A mass mailing of flyers to student boxes 2 to 3 days prior to the event is another method. Use bright colored flyers with the P.A.D. logo (can download from the International home-page).
- 5. Student/alumni magazine: Submit articles/new releases concerning a significant chapter activity to local student publications.

Surviving The Bar Exam

1. Be a Boy Scout...even if you're a girl!

Make sure you know any rules your state has about testing procedure and what is allowed in the exam area. For example, many states require test takers to place any items brought into the Exam in a transparent bag. Not all rules are quite as easy to follow. One examinee we know waited until the night before the Bar Exam to finally look at the rules provided by the Examiners. Much to her dismay, she discovered that hats were absolutely prohibited in the testing area. Being the loyal (and superstitious) New Yorker that she is, she had not taken a test since 7th grade without her Yankees hat, and she panicked. Needless to say, this was about the worst time to find something new to panic about. This may seem like a trivial example (particularly to you Red Sox fans), but it easily could have been something quite significant. The point is, just like a Boy Scout, be prepared.

2. Get by with a little help from your friends

Maybe you think you don't need a bar review course. Maybe you think you can do it on your own. Maybe you're right. To find out, take this little quiz, giving yourself one point each time you answer "true."

- I took every subject offered in law school; and
- · I aced every exam; and
- I did both of the above without ever opening a textbook.

If you scored above a zero, take the test again, and this time be honest.

Seriously, we are not saying this because we run a bar review course. We are saying this because we have both taken (and passed) the Bar Exam, and we know what is involved. A review course provides you with the materials you need, saving you the hassle of trying to figure out what to study (and what to ignore). If you consider the amount of law tested that is unique to the bar exam (see #6), a review course can save you a lot of time and trouble. Choose a review course that best suits your study habits and attacks your weaknesses, but choose one soon. Certainly, you can pass without a course, but the risk (and headache) hardly seems worth it.

3. Pon't study what you know

Ok, we don't mean that literally. Don't neglect a topic just because you think you know it. The point is, don't over-study what you already know. Once you feel relatively confident with a topic, move on to one with which you feel less confident. Revisit the topics you know periodically, but focus on the ones that make you feel uncomfortable. Face your fears. We know someone who went into the bar exam feeling very confident because he really KNEW the topics he had studied. The problem was that the Exam tested other topics as well, and he failed. Don't get the wrong idea. It was not that he had studied only a few topics, as much as it was that he over-studied the topics he knew, thus creating a false sense of security. The second time he took the Bar, he faced his fears, studied the topics he didn't like or know, and passed with one of the highest scores in his state. The moral of the story is: it is better to know a little bit about everything. than everything about a little bit.

4. Never mind the opinions of fools...

Trust your own study methods. You've made it through law school, so you've had at least 19 years of schooling to figure out what works best for you. Now is not the time to experiment with new study techniques, or to question the old ones. As tempting as it may be to compare your progress with others, little good can come of hearing how

everyone else studies. We remember one person who studied outlines intensely until all hours of the night for the three months preceding the Exam, while another did nothing more than practice questions while working the graveyard shift at a gas station for the four weeks preceding the Exam. To each his own. The pressure of learning the breadth of material necessary to pass the Bar is overwhelming enough without trying to introduce a new way to learn it as well.

5. Don't be a know-it-all


This may be the most important lesson here. You must accept the fact that you can not and will not learn everything before the Exam. So don't even try. There's a reason we have libraries; it's because your brain can only hold so much information. Even when you're practicing law, you won't be expected to know every answer off the top of your head. You only need to know how to find the answers. The same concept applies to studying for the Exam. There will be some topics that you will not fully learn. Your goal should be to be able to recognize general



At the very least, you'll be able to write something. Now, obviously, you don't want this to be the case for every essay question. But the point is, know your limits and accept them early. Once you have let go of the burden of trying to know it all, you'll be amazed at how much better you'll feel. Which, in turn, makes the learning you can do seem much less overwhelming.

6. Forget what you know

Or at least forget what you think you know about state-specific law. This is one time when experience may actually hurt you. For the Multistate Exams and for many, but not all, state portions of the Bar Exam, the law tested is generic. The questions are based on generally applicable legal concepts and theories. Therefore, many things you may have learned from the real world while practicing law or clerking during law school will be inapplicable (and thus wrong!) on the Bar Exam. So suspend your knowledge of the "real" law, and open your mind to "bar exam" law.





7. There's more to life (Part I)

One of the worst things you can do is to lose yourself in studying. Your brain (and your family) can only handle so much. Allow yourself (or, if necessary, force yourself) to enjoy some type of physical activity, or, at the very least, something mindless. In our experience, the best way to learn any given subject is to study intensely for a short period of time and then take a break. Without the break, your mind has no opportunity to absorb the information you have just studied. And, we all know that physical activity is one of the best stress relievers ever (remember all that endorphin stuff?). So, study Torts, then play tennis. Study Corporations, then take walk. Study Property, then cry. Whatever works for you. If you don't think you'll do this naturally, schedule it into your routine.

8. Do what you're told

When taking the Exam, read instructions carefully and follow them. We repeat. READ instructions. FOLLOW them. This may sound elementary. We know what you're thinking. "I've made it this far, I obviously am capable of following directions." And we agree. However, there is a big difference between being able to do something and actually doing it. Trust us. Our time running a bar review course has brought us into contact with more law students and attorneys in need of this lesson than you might imagine. Bar Examiners know this and they will test how closely you have read the call of the question.

For example, a recent essay question detailed a man protecting his property with a spring-loaded gun. Now, we all know what Torts issues are triggered (pardon the pun) with such a scenario. A careful reading, however, revealed that the question called for a discussion of the Criminal implications. Had one failed to read carefully, she would not have correctly answered the question. Therefore, our advice is this: Read the question. Then read the question again. Do what you're told.

9. Be a slave!


To time, that is. Know how long you should spend on each question and do not stray. One of the most preventable mistakes is to not answer a question for lack of time. Take a watch to the Exam and keep it on the table in front of you. Check it often. Answer each question as thoroughly, yet quickly, as possible. If you see that you are running out of time, quickly finish the question you are answering and MOVE ON. It is better to write a little bit for each question than to write a novel for one question and one sentence for another. Even if you think you won't have time to finish an answer, at least try. Putting something on the page, like a quick outline or a couple of applicable rules, has better odds of earning you points than putting nothing there at all.

10. There's more to life (Part II)

Once you have taken the Bar Exam, let it go. Forget about it. Move on with your life. If there is one time in your life when you should be absolutely free of any worry, it is the period of time from "Pencils down!" to "You passed!" After all, when it's over there is nothing (at least nothing legal) you can do about your score. Worrying about it will not change that. Now is the time to take a vacation, re-connect with your family, make amends with all the people you may have been abusive towards while studying, and take time for yourself. Keep in mind that this is not life or death. Whether you passed or failed, it's only the Bar Exam.

Tulane's Passport to Comparison

There's nothing like a change of scenery and what a change for American students participating in Tulane Law School's international summer school programs. In the Greek city of Thessoliniki, byzantine architecture, mosaics, and Roman monuments surround you as you listen to a United States Supreme Court Justice describe one of the law's most intriguing processes - the decision making methods of our nation's highest court. For Shannon Wright, a Tulane 3L, the lecture by Associate Justice Antonin Scalia was the most memorable moment of a summer filled with highlights. "The opportunity to see how other legal systems work makes you realize how unique the concept of American democracy is and that the establishment of our judicial branch was truly revolutionary," said Wright.

This year, Tulane will offer fifteen separate summer sessions at ten sites in eight different countries. Students have their choice of studying in Montreal, Cambridge, Paris, Berlin, Greece, Jerusalem, Siena or Amsterdam. Associate Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg will teach a course on human rights in the Tuscan hill town of Siena, where its medieval and renaissance heritage is still present.

Should I... Make my Way to London?

University of Miami School of Law

The University of Miami School of Law offers two highly popular seven-week summer study abroad programs in international and comparative law. Both programs are renowned not only for their intellectual content, but also for being great fun. They include tours of legal and governmental institutions and visits to cultural sites.

The nation's most successful summer study-abroad law program, Miami's London Summer Program, begun in 1990, is centrally located in London and offers an ideal living and learning experience for the study of law abroad. Courses are taught by law faculty from the University of Miami and other distinguished universities in the U.S. and U.K. The program, for which students enroll in two three-credit courses (out of six courses offered), also incorporates visits to Parliament and Middle Temple Inn, a fourday weekend excursion to Paris, and a three-day weekend in the English courntryside.

Taught by faculty from the University of Miami and the Universitat Pompeu Fabra, Tour de España encompasses three cities in Spain, beginning with nine days in Madrid, proceeding on to nine days in Fuengirola on the Costa del Sol, and ending with 24 days in Barcelona, with classes taught in all three locations. Courses are taught in English, and all students must enroll in a two-part course (with part one in Madrid and part two in Fuengirola), then they move on to Barcelona, where they choose two of four courses offered.



Should L...Travel to Central Mexico? Guanajuato Summer Law Institute

Attending the Guanajuato Summer Law Institute provides students the opportunity to earn law credit while living in one of the most beautiful and historic cities of Mexico. Chandria Slaughter, a third-year last student, says, "The people in Guanajuato immediately made me feel at home. The opportunity to learn Mexican Law from both Mexican law professors and practicing Mexican lawyers was a truly unique and unforgettable experience."

Situated in the silver-mining highlands of central Mexico, Guanajuato is known for its climate, scenery, mummies, subterranean roads and Cervantes festival. Students can also take excursions to Teotihuacan and San Miguel de Allende.

The Institute will offer the following courses: Overview of Mexican Business Law, International Human Rights, NAFTA, and Mexican Legal Institutions The 2002 Institute dates are Sunday, June 2 to Sunday, June 30. In addition, program participants may attend a two-week judicial or law office externship program from Monday, July 1 to Saturday July 13.

Its London program features an intensive introduction to the English legal system and practice followed by a two week, full-time supervised internship in a barrister's chambers. The Lisbon program combines comparative study of Information

Law and Policy with two weeks

studying European law issues in

classes with students from leading European law faculties.

The three semester credit hour London Program in Comparative Advocacy runs June 17 through July 5. Robert M.C. Webster, an English barrister and lecturer in law, directs, coordinates and teaches in the program. The first week consists of classes on the English legal system and practice taught at the Inns of by barristers, judges and solicitors. During the next two weeks, students experience traditional English pupillage training in the chambers and under the direct supervision of a barrister. Students are not mere observers, but conduct research and prepare memoranda on pending matters, attend client meetings, and accompany their barrister in court.

The four semester credit hour July 8-26 Lisbon program is the only American law school summer program in Portugal. It is coordinated in the second two weeks with the ELPIS Summer Academy, a program of a consortium of European universities. ELPIS students come to Lisbon from throughout Europe for a two week program taught in four subject modules, two each week.


Cracow, Poland June 8 to July 20, 2002


54th Biennial Convention Plans Expand

Kimm Walton was born in London, England.

She split childhood between England and the United States. She went to college at Case Western Reserve in Cleveland, Ohio, where she majored in Accounting. When she graduated, the only thing she knew for




sure was that accounting was not the career for her.

She went on to law school at Case Western. After graduating without a job, she jumped at the first offer she got, which was to write a book about investing in biotechnology. When that book went on to earn the publisher three million dollars, she decided that perhaps writing was the career for her after all. She created a series of legal study aids that she believed would help law students learn better by making them laugh. Every publisher she approached rejected her idea, saying that law students have no sense of humor. Determined to see her ideas in print, she wrote a business plan, raised a million dollars, and started a publishing company of her own. She lived in her parents' basement, wrote study aids, and got rejected by every law school bookstore in the country. After three years of constant rejection, bookstores finally agreed to give her products a try. Since then, law students nationwide have spent more than twenty-five millions dollars on the study aids she created. You may know it it's Law In A Flash, the flash cards in the yellow boxes.

After selling Law In A Flash, Kimm turned her attention to other writing projects. She has written three books -"Guerrilla Tactics for Getting the Legal Job of Your Dreams," "America's Greatest Places to Work with a Law Degree," and "The Best of the Job Goddess," a collection of her favorite "Dear Job Goddess" columns, which you will find on-line at www. gilbertlaw.com. She has authored travel articles about Australia and the Caribbean, as well as fourteen feature-length screenplays. 





According to the Association of American Law Schools, over a dozen American law schools require all students to perform some law-related pro-bono work as a condition of graduation. By contrast, nine American law schools, and perhaps more, have no pro-bono programs of any kind. At these schools, students do no volunteer law-related work at all of which their dean was aware. Many schools with extensive volunteer programs coordinated by a staff member are largely run by students as well as many schools with modest volunteer programs that have little coordination and only a few dozen participants each year. Through the Phi Alpha Delta Public Service Center, law students can volunteer for Law-Related Education (LRE) and Youth Court programs that will help them complete their new probono credit requirements.

All work that students do for the benefit of others has important values. At many schools responding to our request for volunteers, most student volunteer projects involved as little as 30 minutes out of the day. LRE and

MENTORING PROGRAM

~ Big Brothers Big Sisters of America (BBBSA)~

Under the guidance of the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency (OJJDP), the PSC is working to recruit PAD members to volunteer with Big Brothers Big Sisters of America. While the recruitment effort is geared toward all PAD members, the focus is on recruiting PAD Pre-Law members as well. Big Brothers Big Sisters of America is the nation's oldest and largest youth mentoring organization. Since 1904, caring adult volunteers have been helping millions of children reach their full potential and fulfill their dreams. Youth Courts programs are valuable for both students and the people served. We believe that law schools should support student groups that help develop such programs. But we also believe that whatever law schools do to foster such general good works, they should also seek to involve each student in a programs that makes use of the special skills and knowledge that only lawyers hold. It is this distinctive lesson about "Service to the Community" that students need to carry with them into practice.

However, at the same time, schools need not adopt a narrow view of what counts as a program that draws on lawyers' special skills and knowledge. Most students probably find most satisfying the opportunity of helping a person in distress with a legal problem that they cannot deal with adequately on their own. At the same time, some of the most satisfying law-related projects currently in place do not involve individual legal representation at all. At many schools, students teach courses on law to high school students or work with high school students to put on a mock trial. At a few schools, students work on a pro-bono basis on legislative proposals. Such projects draw on the students' developing knowledge and skills as an attorney and merit consideration.

Youth Court Feature Baltimore City Teen Court

Building a Better Community, One Teen at a Time

The Baltimore City Teen Court focuses on youth offenders under the age of 17 who represent the leading edge of juvenile crime. The program



serves non-violent offenders who currently receive little or no intervention due to the limited resources of the juvenile justice system. Early intervention for disruptive youth will engage them in pro-active interventions and prevent them from committing more serious crimes in the future.

Within the past year, over two hundred students have actively participated in the program. Student volunteers have earned more than 3300 service learning hours to date. The Baltimore City Teen Court is currently recruiting youth volunteers that have been active participants in the Baltimore City Law Links program and members of the Youth Congress. In addition to student volunteers, the Baltimore City Teen Court enjoys a dedicated pool of adult volunteers. For example, 65 adult attorneys, bailiffs, clerks and law students volunteer for the program. Twelve district and circuit court judges have volunteered to preside at Teen Court hearings.

The Teen Court Staff reviews cases received from the Department of Juvenile Justice and the Baltimore City School Police. Once the cases are reviewed, the staff will then contact the youth offender and his or her family to schedule a home visit. During the visit, staff explains the program and answers any questions. A vouth offender must admit his or her involvement in order to be eligible for the program. The acknowledgment of involvement on the part of the youth offender is the first important step toward taking responsibility for his or her actions.

On the evening of the Teen Court hearing, a volunteer counselor meets with the youth offender and his or her family prior to the hearing to determine any school, family, and/or psychological issues that may inhibit the youth offender's success. After the hearing, the Teen Court Coordinator and /or the Community Liaison follow-up with the youth offender, the school, the community service placement, and the family. Some of the issues that emerged include grief, custody, substance abuse, and education.

The Baltimore City Teen Court sessions are real court - sanctioned sentencing hearings held in real courtrooms. District and Circuit judges preside at the hearings. Student "bailiffs" and "clerks" assist during the trials. Student "attorneys" serve as defense and prosecuting attorneys. Student "jurors" hear arguments for sentencing and

deliberate on the appropriate sanctions for the offender. Volunteer adult attorneys volunteer to counsel and mentor student "attorneys" as they prepare their cases. Youth offenders may receive a referral to a Baltimore City Police Athletic League (PAL) Center, as well as sanctions that may include participation as a juror in future teen court hearings, and completion of appropriate community service hours. Additional sanctions include but are not limited to apology letters, essays, classes, (anger management, conflict resolution, victim awareness) etc.

In the first year of Baltimore City Teen Court, seventeen youth offenders were adjudicated in Teen Court. Of those seventeen, fourteen (82%), successfully completed the program and were diverted from the State Juvenile Justice System. In year two, 2000-2001, the program serviced twenty-nine youth offenders, of which twenty-five (86%), were successfully diverted. Baltimore City Teen Court has adjudicated twenty-six youth offenders thus far in fiscal year 2001-2002, with fifteen successful completions, one unsuccessful termination and ten youth currently working to earn a successful completion. Baltimore City teen Court has established a goal of servicing one hundred youth offenders in 2001-2002. Baltimore Teen Court is confident that the success ratio of youth participating in Teen Court will continue to grow as the program continues to expand.

The majority of the youth that are referred to Teen Court receive additional services that include but are not limited to; social services, respite care, wraparound services, and mentoring programs. Additionally, the Teen Court Program has a professional counselor that meets with the offender and his/her family to assesses the situation and recognize underlying issues that may require additional services, whether individual or Resolution class, Peer Mediation and Victim Awareness class.

The Baltimore City Teen Court has recently added a public awareness/ marketing device to its outreach services. Along with the implementation of the Youth Advisory Council, a few youth are serving as an executive board for all volunteers. These youth applied for grants, spoken with city officials and continue to look for various fundraising opportunities. The youth, along with the Teen Court Liaison (MSW student), have established and began publication of a quarterly newsletter entitled, "Teen Court Spotlight".

The Baltimore City Teen Court and the Citizenship Law-related Education program will continue to strive toward fulfilling the mission of "Building a Better Community, One Teen at a Time". Scott Quinlivan had requested this article to be written to inform Phi Alpha Delta members of Australian Immigration policy and it's position on Refugees. P.A.D. continues to explore its relationship with Australia... more details to follow in upcoming editions of "The Reporter."

espite Australia's clear commitment to its Convention obligations and its contributions to the international protection framework, some argue that Australia's recent actions are an unfortunate precedent that dilutes the spirit and intent of the Refugees Convention.

The question can be asked in another way: did the founders of the Convention envisage that it would become the enabling tool of organized crime?

There are some who state that Australia's action constitutes a precedent that undermines the international protection regime and the institution of asylum. There is concern that it will be used by other states to justify the closure of borders between a country of origin and a country of asylum, thereby denying the capacity of a refugee to flee and seek and obtain asylum.

These people need to differentiate between those directly fleeing and those making secondary movements for migration reasons. The Convention itself contemplates that difference in the reference to direct flight in Article 31. Failure to think clearly about the difference can lead to unsubstantiated criticism and plays into the smugglers' hands.

Does the abuse mean that a new way of thinking about the asylum system is needed?

Australia's actions are not in contravention of its protection obligations. Australia is neither directly nor indirectly refouling persons to persecution.

Nor is Australia denying access to refugee status determination — all asylum seekers who enter Australian territory in this manner continue to have access to full and effective procedures through the arrangements in place. We believe that UNHCR procedures are adequate.

Australia is however managing its absolute commitment to refugee protection in ways that also robustly fight people smuggling and that deny migration outcomes to those making unnecessary secondary movements.

The Australian Government's stance is deliberately tough but necessary in order to protect the capacity of Australia:

- to continue to meet its protection obligations
- to maintain a managed and active commitment to resettlement focused on assisting those most in need, whilst at the same time
- attacking smuggling practices and sending the strongest possible message to smugglers and their clients.

Australia's obligations under the Refugees Convention are not to *refoule*, either directly or indirectly, to a country where the person has a well-founded fear of persecution for a Convention ground.

If a vessel approaching Australian territorial waters is boarded and warned that the passengers cannot enter these waters without proper authorization and the vessel returns to Indonesia, this does not constitute *refoulement* on the part of Australia.

Francois Fouinat, the then head of UNHCR's Asia Bureau, at UNHCR's Regional Consultations at Macau this year, conceded that it is valid for states to make differential responses to unnecessary secondary movements. This does not mean States may *refoule* in these circumstances but that a different response to secondary movers is entirely appropriate in the context of refugee protection.


The arrangements now in place with New Zealand, Nauru and Papua New Guinea, will ensure Australia's protection obligations are met whilst also sending extremely strong anti-people smuggling messages.

The Australian approach to subsequent attempted unlawful arrivals is also consistent with our international obligations. In accordance with the *Migration Act 1958*, unauthorized vessels detected approaching Australian territorial waters are warned that they cannot enter these waters without proper authorization.

When considering this approach, due regard needs to be given to Australia's geographic position and the facts concerning the particular vessels. The vessels are almost universally Indonesian flag ships, are crewed by Indonesians, and are most likely to have left from an Indonesian port. It is a reasonable supposition on our part therefore to consider that, if escorted back to the edge of the contiguous zone, vessels would return to Indonesia.

If a vessel chooses to return to Indonesia, we are confident that such action does not constitute refoulement by Australia, either directly or indirectly, because:

- Indonesia is part of a cooperative arrangement whereby people without legal status in Indonesia who are intercepted on their way to Australia are interviewed by IOM, who refer any who raise protection claims to UNHCR (funded by Australia);
- UNHCR has the capacity to undertake refugee status determination in Indonesia (funded by Australia);
- resettlement arrangements are in train for persons determined to be refugees by UNHCR in Indonesia;
- Indonesia meets its non-refoulement obligations and has announced its intention to ratify the Refugees Convention and other international human rights instruments.



In addition, any action to deter arrival in Australia is discretionary and may take into account the seaworthiness of the vessel, the weather conditions and the country of origin of the persons being smuggled. Should a situation arise that suggests refoulement may occur or the safety of passengers may be jeopardized if a vessel were to be deterred, Australia has the capacity and would act differently and to allow arrival on Australian territory to ensure our protection obligations continue to be met.

Any people on vessels that proceed despite warnings and enter Australian territorial waters come under the coverage of Australia's protection obligations. None of these persons have been, or will be, denied access to fair and effective refugee determination procedures. But there is nothing in the Convention that directs where those procedures take place.

Under the new legislation, a person who arrives in an excised offshore place [e.g. Ashmore Reef] may be taken to a 'declared place'. The legislation includes safeguards to ensure that any declared place must not *refoule* and must meet basic human rights standards with respect to any persons taken there under these provisions of the Act.

Should status determination be undertaken on an excised offshore place [eg Christmas Island], procedures will meet the standards as followed by UNHCR. That is, refugee status decisions will be taken by trained officers in a manner consistent with the UNHCR Handbook and a review by an officer different from the one who made the initial decision will be available.

Access to Australia's visa regime will be available only to those where the Minister considers it to be in the public interest to allow their making a valid visa application. Thus the mechanism to provide right to stay to refugees is available, but the costly access to tiers of review is denied to those without protection need.
