

### A Message from the International Justice

What a terrific Fall Semester we have had. Thanks to our District Justices, Chapter Officers, and Faculty and Alumni Advisors, we are setting a record pace for initiations this year. However, to keep up that pace we need continued leadership and guidance from each of you through the Spring Semester of 2004. The key to this leadership is communication and a focus on programming to provide our members with the promise of a full service fraternity - academic, professional, community service and social programming.

Since the last issue, thanks to our staff, we put on a great Pre-Law Conference in the Washington, DC, area which included many speakers you will read about elsewhere in this issue. In addition, I want to specially thank our brothers Associate Justice Stephen Breyer, who spent well over an hour hosting our conferees at the U.S. Supreme Court, and also former Chief Justice Bob Gammage (Texas Supreme Court, Retired) for being our banquet speaker. These two Brothers, by their actions and words, demonstrate the true meaning of Fraternity, and are truly Doers, Not Viewers.

In August of 2004 we will be hosting our first convention of the Second Century in Los Angeles, California. In addition to making your own plans to attend, please submit nominations for the Tom C. Clark Equal Justice Under Law Award, the Barbara Jordan Outstanding Public Service Award, and the Dean John J. McAulay Outstanding Legal Educator Award to the Executive Office as soon as possible.

Having brought ourselves to a point where we can look aggressively at improving services to our members, we have now also made the commitment to do so in a well reasoned and managed way. On page 20, you will see a brief summary of the higher level parts of that plan. But let me just point out that we decided to pursue active growth over the next ten (10) years, and are planning on increasing our staff as appropriate to ensure the quality delivery of services that such growth

In order to provide the leadership I mentioned earlier, I challenge each of you to do three things:

- 1. Distribute a calendar of programs before the beginning of the Spring Semester which shows a variety of programming to satisfy the needs of our members. It is through programming that we define ourselves as a fraternity to others, and through a calendar that we communicate the depth and breadth of our programming.
- 2. Commit to come to the International Convention in 2004 and help a chapter raise funds to send a second delegate to that convention. At the last convention each delegate made a promise to another delegate that he or she would return to the next convention. Our convention site, Los Angeles, is a great place to meet, to network, to see the sites, and to chart the course for our Second Century.

# Mortgage Burning Predicted at 2004 P.A.D. Convention in L.A.

Thanks to the generosity of many of our sisters, brothers, chapters, friends and affiliates, Capital Campaign Co-Chairs Clifford Schechter and John F. Weitkamp predict that at least one of the mortgages, if not both, secured by the PAD headquarters building will be paid off in full by the time of our 55th Biennial Convention to be held in Los Angeles, California, from August 4-8, 2004 at the Sheraton Gateway Hotel.

During a recent District Conference, Brother Schechter proclaimed, "This is indeed an unbelievably historic and amazing event for our Fraternity. So much so, that rumors have begun to circulate that the 2004 Convention will be even more exciting and fun-filled than was the Centennial Celebration Convention in 2002. Make plans to turn those rumors into facts by participating in both the Capital Campaign now and the resulting mortgage burning festivities at our 2004 Convention in August!"

allows all of our members to participate in the strategic planning and positioning of Phi Alpha Delta for years to come. The Campaign's goal is to raise \$500,000 to: pay of the first and second mortgages secured by the Fraternity's headquarter building (the first it has owned since its founding); create a \$125,000 "sinking fund" for building repairs and maintenance that will cover many of these expenses over the next 20 years; and cover the expenses of the Campaign itself. When the goal is attained, Phi Alpha Delta will experience a savings of approximately \$1,000,000 over the course of the next twenty years!


The Capital Campaign presently stands at \$259,019.18 in pledges of which \$191,687.18 has been received in cash – over halfway to our goal of \$500,000! \$175,000 in paydowns have been made against the mortgages secured by the P.A.D. headquarters building, leaving just \$16,000 to be paid on the first mortgage and \$74,000 to be paid on the second mortgage.



American University Washington College of Law's Comparative Law Program in London (1 week), Paris (2 weeks), and Geneva (1 week) takes place June 5 – July 4, 2004 leaving plenty of time to complete a clerkship upon return to the U.S. The 6 credit ABA approved program is open to JDs, who have completed at least 1 year of law school, LLMs, and attorneys.

Special Feature

The foci of the program are international trade, human rights, and environmental law with particular attention given to the European Union and international organizations. Participants are required to take International Economic Law (3 credits). For the second 3-credit course, students may take either International Human Rights or International Institutions and Sustainable Development (Environmental Law). Students receive private high-level briefings from attorneys and officials from the European Union, the OECD, WTO, the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development, International Chamber of Commerce Court of Arbitration, UN agencies including UNESCO, UNHCR, and WIPO, International Committee of the Red Cross, non-governmental organizations and multinational law firms. Ample time is provided to network and ask questions.

The \$6,402 cost includes: tuition for 6 law credits, shared hotel room, daily breakfast, festive celebration in Paris and Geneva, some transfers, some meals and materials, and international health and accident insurance during the official program dates. \$500 merit based scholarships are available. Preferred deadline is March 15, 2004.

Weekends and evenings are free for students to enjoy activition on their own such as museums, theater, music, outdoor sports etc. For further information on applying and the courses, etc., visit the program website at www.wcl.american.edu/parisgeneva, or send an e-mail to eurolaw@american.edu, or call 202-885-6228

### Campbell's Summer Performance Based Admission Program (PBAP)

Each summer, approximately 60 applicants are admitted to Campbell University School of Law's "performance based admission program" (PBAP). Participants attend a seven week session of summer school and take two law courses: personal property and public land use planning. Pursuant to ABA standards, law school credit is not granted for these courses.

All applicants who are not offered regular admission in the fall class are considered for PBAP. Generally, candidates for the PBAP program are those who: (1) have had one or possibly two bad years in undergraduate school, but who have LSAT scores that evidence potential for success in law school; and/or (2) generally perform poorly on standardized tests such as the LSAT, but who consistently outperform the predictions of these tests in their academic course work.

Participants receiving a B or higher (currently a numerical grade of 84 or above) in both courses are guaranteed admission the entering fall class. Those not achieving guaranteed admission, but whose performance evidences a strong potential for success in law school, may be placed on a waiting list. Historically, between 20 and 30 percent of PBAP participants have gained admission to the entering fall class.

### Summer Program in Barcelona, Spain —

The summer program in Barcelona, coordinated by the University of Puerto Rico School of Law and the University of Barcelona, has an international and comparative approach. The language of instruction is in English and has been approved by the American Bar Association.

The courses offered are taught by an excellent faculty that includes Justices from the Supreme Court of the United States, professors from the University of Barcelona, and other Spanish legal experts. The summer program also offers the opportunity for internships at internationally renowned law firms.

The University of Puerto Rico Summer Law Program in Barcelona opens the last week in June and ends the first week in August. The internship program, The Practice of Law in Europe, starts during the last week in June and lasts five days.

Six courses providing a total of 11 semester credits are offered. The courses ered are: Business Organizations in

Europe, Comparative Constitutional Law, European Human Rights Law, Institutions of the European Union, International Protection of the Environment, The Practice of Law in Europe.

The application deadline is the first week in May. Tuition for the University of Puerto Rico School of Law Summer Program in Barcelona includes private room from the last week in June through the first week of August, receptions, two field trips, health and accident insurance, and visits to legal institutions for \$3,850.

# Almost 101 Tips for Publicizing your chapter and your events!

Every event you hold is part of your recruiting effort. When people see that a chapter is active and holding programs, including members only programs, they will be far more willing to join than if they just hear that there is an organization out there named P.A.D. that holds an event every now and then. Here are some quick and easy ways to make sure that everyone knows what you're doing!

### HOW OFTEN SHOULD YOU PUBLICIZE AN EVENT?

Early and often! The chapters that have the most success publicizing events are the ones that utilize a publicity committee, who publicize each event early, and then follow up the initial notice in a variety of ways. Announcements should be made in an on-going basis leading up to the program!

### THE ABC'S OF PUBLICITY?

#### In-class announcements.

This is one of the best ways to get the word out! In class announcements should last no more than 30 seconds and should be given at the beginning of class (and always with the Professors permission). Most chapters have section reps for each class section (section A, section1 or whatever your school uses), and for each class (1L, 2L, 3L) who make these announcements.

### Notes on classroom chalkboards.

Admit it, we've all been halfway through a class and our mind has started to wander. If we're not currently playing a game of gunner bingo, our eyes start wandering around the classroom and what do we see?

Pictures of past graduates? Flags? Windowless walls? Use the classroom chalkboard to publicize your events to a captive audience.

Use your organization bulletin board. By posting upcoming events on your organization bulletin board, you can keep students informed and also keep them coming back to see what else is going on. The key to the bulletin board is to quickly remove old information. Pictures of past events and members having fun are always a good draw.

### Email blasts.

There are two variations to this.

- 1. The all school email blast. Some schools allow this, some don't. Check with your administration.
- 2. Use an Interested Student and membership email blast. Every time your chapter has an event or sets up a rush table, collect the names of everyone who stops by on the "Interested Student Sheet." After the event or rush table, take the names and emails of each person that signed the "Interested Student Sheet" and put them into an email list. Then, whenever the chapter is holding the next program, simply email the details of the upcoming event to the people that are already in your list!

### Notes in individuals' mailboxes.

Not every school provides a mailbox system or allows a chapter to stuff the boxes with flyers. If your school does, this is a great way to get your chapter calendar out to 1Ls, your members and any other interested students who signed the "Interested Student Sheet" at one of the chapter programs. Also you can put notices of upcoming events in each person's mailbox as the event date approaches.

### Hot Dates for Chapter Clerks!

With the Fall Semester quickly ending, it's time to once again remind chapter clerks (and other officers) of a few key dates!

- 1. Each chapters Spring calendar was due to the Executive Office by November 8th (Founder's Day)! If you haven't turned it in, it's not too late! Email it to us at dco@pad.org ASAP!
- 2. Fall calendars are due to the Executive Office by April 15<sup>th</sup>. Email them to dco@pad.org.
- 3. The names of Chapter Delegates to the Biennial Convention must be selected and submitted to the Executive Office no later than April 10<sup>th</sup>. Each chapter will be receiving the Delegates Credentials form in January.
- 4. All membership applications are initiation fees are due to the Executive Office within 10 days of a person's initiation. If an initiate misses the ceremony, send the application and fees in with a note indicating that they will be initiated at a later date. This way the chapter doesn't run the risk of mis-handling the membership materials.
- 5. Officer elections must be held no later than March 30th (with officer transition to be held within 10 days.)
- 6. Spring Initiations should be held within four weeks of the first day of classes. The applications and materials are due within 10 days of the initiation date.

All chapter meeting minutes (both Executive Board and General Chapter) should be sent to the Executive Offi (dco@pad.org) within 10 days of the meeting.

### PHI ALPHA DELTA 1st Annual

### WRITING COMPETITION

P.A.D. is sponsoring its first annual student writing competition. The purpose of the competition is to encourage and reward student-written articles in the areas of the essential aspects of a lawyer: compassion, courage, integrity and professional service. This competition is open to law school and pre-law students. Winning articles will be selected quarterly. Each winner's paper will be published in "The Reporter." The annual winner will be selected from the quarterly winners, receiving additional recognition along with a monetary award of \$1000.00.

### THE SUBJECTS

Eligible articles address one of the following areas of the essential aspects of a lawyer:

1<sup>st</sup> quarter-Compassion • 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter-Courage 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter-Integrity • 4<sup>th</sup> quarter-Professional Service

### HOW TO APPLY

The piece must be written by a student member (law or pre-law.) Only one piece by a member shall be submitted in a quarter. Eligible pieces include any unpublished essay or written article prepared by the student. All pieces must be the work of an individual student. Joint works are not permitted. Pieces should be no more than 1500 words in length and be submitted in their final published form.

Entries are to be made by submitting four copies of the piece along with a completed Entry Form. The quarterly winners will be announced and published in the Phi Alpha Delta Reporter. An entry form is on page 24 or you can download it from www.pad.org.

### AWARDS

The eash prize for the writing competition is \$250.00 per quarter. A \$1000.00 prize will be awarded to the best submission of the four quarters annually. In addition to the cash prize, the winning article will be published "The Reporter" and P.A.D. Website.

### JUDGING

Eligible pieces will be judged on (1) quality of scholarship; (2) originality; (3) contribution to the understanding and development of the essential aspects of a lawyer, (4) analysis and reasoning; and (5) quality and clarity of writing.

All decisions of the judges, who are appointed by the International Justice and Executive Board, are final. The Francisco reserves the right to screen entries and limit the nutber of papers submitted to the judges for final decision. The papernity also reserves the right to make no award if, in the judges' discretion, a worthy paper is not submitted.

### Murray Chapter - On the Move!




### CONVENTION AMENDMENT NOTICE

Sec. 1. By Whom Proposed

Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed (1) by any law school or alumni chapter, or by the International Executive Board upon a majority vote of members present and voting, and (2) by any law school, alumni, or honorary member of this Fraternity in good standing.

### Sec. 2. Procedures

Every proposed amendment shall be received by the International Executive Board or to the Executive Director not later than One Hundred Fifty (150) days prior to the date of the Convention. Not later than One Hundred Twenty (120) days before the Convention, the Executive Director shall submit such proposed amendment to every law school and alumni chapter of the Fraternity and to the International Executive Board, provided that in case of extreme emergency or extraordinary circumstances, the time requirements may be waived by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the International Executive Board.

- · Maintain sound management practices and be financially secure.



# Competence & Professionalism Go Hand in Hand

During my travels over the years, I have had numerous opportunities to watch attorneys and law firm staff interact with clients. I am surprised at the number of times that I have observed an unprofessional interaction with a client where the attorney or staff person failed to appreciate the significance of the misstep.

Let me provide an example. An attorney works in a small community and is viewed as a community leader. He has had long-lasting attorney/client ationships with a number of individuals in the community. These long-term relationships have resulted in a certain camaraderie and casual way of behaving with those clients. Now, imagine that a potential new client is sitting in the reception area, and one of the established clients steps into the reception area unannounced to ask a brief question. The attorney sees the established client enter. He walks right up to the client. With a warm "Hello!" and a pat on the back, he begins discussing the established client's legal matter - right in the middle of the reception area. The attorney does this because he knows the established client is comfortable with such a public discussion.

Do you see the potential professionalism concerns with the described scenario? I believe there are at least two areas of concern. Certainly, an concerned about the potential breach of confidentiality, or at least an extreme casualness with client confidences. However, I would like to focus on something else.

The potential new client worries me. I have watched similar scenarios on several occasions, and every time the new client has a concerned look on his or her face. Why? It seems that everyone knows that attorneys can be relied upon to keep everything confidential. It is a pillar of our profession. Yet, the prospective client just watched an attorney act in complete disregard of the established client's confidences. It really does not matter whether the conversation was confidential. The potential new client cannot easily discern what is confidential, and is likely to assume that everything should be confidential. The end result is that you have no idea that your new client may have doubts about your professionalism. The client's concern about vour professionalism can become a concern about your competence. These concerns make the client more likely to file a disciplinary complaint or malpractice claim.

Email is another place where being casual can be dangerous. You must check your spelling and your grammar, and make sure your e-mail actually has a signature block at the end.

Imagine a client for whom you are acting as divorce counsel. In all likelihood, given the nature of divorce proceedings, this client will reach the end of your professional relationship feeling emotionally beaten. If during your representation this client received emails that were poorly written and rather cryptic. This client will tend toward what all clients do when their

case doesn't end quite as expected. The client simply will try to put everything in perspective. It may be natural for this client to ask himself, "What went wrong?" Unfortunately, the client received your unprofessional emails, and now is thinking, "Why didn't I see this before? My own fifth grader can write better than my attorney can. She's incompetent and my loss is her fault!" Again, unprofessional behavior leads to the client questioning your competence.

Finally, you should consider the effect created by poor housekeeping. Some of us in the legal profession view a messy and cluttered office almost as a badge of honor, to be worn proudly. These messy attorneys seem to believe that clients view the stacks of files as reflecting the attorney's workload, which implies the attorney is in demand. The reasoning extends to the desired conclusion that the client was lucky to have this particularly busy attorney agree to handle the client's matter. While this may not be true, what is the client's likely response when the matter takes an unexpected turn for the worse? The client is likely to conclude that the unexpected turn resulted from the attorney not devoting adequate time to representing the client. The attorney's messy office only serves to confirm the belief.

Certainly, it will take extra effort to keep offices clean, to enforce a rule concerning appropriate dress, to continue emphasizing the importance of confidentiality, and to insist upon courteous and civil behavior from everyone in the office at all times. In short, it takes a real effort to emphasize professional behaviors and attitudes on a daily basis. Nevertheless, I strongly want to suggest that the effort is worth it. Professionalism really is about making an implied statement about your competence. In professionalism reflects competence. The two necessarily go hand in hand.







### Judge Andreu steps down as Chief Justice

San Juan – September 30, 2003 was the date Judge José A. Andreu-García, choose to retired from the bench after eleven years as Chief Justice of the Puerto Rican Supreme Court. The De Diego Chapter from Catholic U. of PR initiated Andréu into P.A.D. almost immediately after his appointment in a ceremony attended by the man who appointed him and then former Governor Rafael Hernández-Colón (De Diego Honorary, 1969).

In his farewell message posted at the Puerto Rico Judicial Branch web page (http://tribunalpr.org) Judge Andreu said he leaves satisfied of his accomplishments, fulfilling the seven goals he made when appointed to the Supreme Court. His goals and accomplishments were: the reorganization of the judicial system; the strengthen of the judicial independence to limit the intervention from the other government branches; greater access for the people to the courts specially those social economically deprived; simplification of the procedures; the report to the citizens; the careful administration of the resources and the opening of more communication channels with the people; the training and salaries improvement to the judicial branch employees; and the




Judge Andréu (De Diego Honorary 1992) while packing his desk at the PR Supreme Court. ("El Nuevo Día" September 30, 2003)

improvement of the judicial culture through the exchange with judges from the US and other countries.

Under his leadership the new Organic Law for the Judiciary was approved. The current law granted fiscal autonomy to the Courts that guarantee the judicial independence. Also under his administration new programs were implemented as the mediation and alternate dispute resolutions, the Drug Courts, the *pro se* (self representation) and a strategic plan with ideas until 2025.

Judge Andreu was also the most relevant figure in the Commonwealth government to support P.A.D. and the LRE programs. Since his early years as Chief Justice he sponsored annually the Law Day and served as host to hundreds of students

from public and private schools at events held at the Supreme Court. Last two years with the support of Inter American University using the technology of videoconference increases the reach of the event getting to talk live with secondary schools students across the Island about the law and its implications in their daily lives. During te last eleven years were not uncommon to see Judge Andreu as guest speaker at events from any of the Law Schools Chapters and even attend Dis Conference at least twice.

### 2003 National Meeting of State LRE irectors Conference

This year's National Meeting of State LRE (Law-Related Education) Directors Conference was held at the Doubletree Hotel in Crystal City, VA. The Conference began on September 11, 2003 and ended on September 13, 2003. The Phi Alpha Delta Public Service Center along with the Youth for Justice Coordinating Committee helped to ensure that there was a representative to participate in the Conference from almost every state nationwide. Also in attendance were federal

agencies, to discuss new civic education programs and initiatives that could help strengthen the LRE work.

The goals of the Conference were as follows:

- Present Youth for Justice priorities and activities for 2003-2004, including coordination with President Bush's initiatives and priorities for law-related and civic education.
- Discuss current and future Youth for Justice program priorities in light of needs and insights from state LRE centers.
- Analyze recent research findings in civic education and explore strategies



for using those findings to enhance state LRE center programming.

- Discuss and share resources for enhancing teaching about a current issues "The First Amendment" and the "War on terrorism."
- Meet representatives from federal agencies to learn about opportunities for state LRE centers.

The conference agenda provided educational opportunities in two special Washington, DC venues.

On Thursday evening there was a session that was hosted at the Freedom Forum/ First Amendment Center that featured the results of the First Amendment Center Survey of "Americans regarding their attitudes toward the First Amendment

during an age of terrorism." During this session, participants were able to interact with a panel of experts about The First Amendment in an Era of Terrorism surrounding governmental monitoring of religious groups.

### The panel included:

- Charles Haynes, Moderator, Freedom Forum/First Amendment Center
- Sharifa Alkhateeb, President, North America Council of Muslim Women
- Marvin Johnson, Legislative Counsel, American Civil Liberties Union

On Friday, we traveled to the Library of Congress for a seminar on using technology to enhance programming. Since 1995, the Library of Congress has been using technology to deliver programming and provide professional development to teachers, librarians, and other constituencies. Participants were able to observe how such techniques as video conferences, moderated chat rooms, and online professional development courses are developed and administered.

In addition, some participants traveled to the Thurgood Marshal Justice Center. This session provided an opportunity to explore the question of what students and teachers should know about courts and also strategies for developing partnership programs with state and federal courts. Participants learned about various courtbased outreach programs that bring high school students and teachers into courtrooms for interactive programs with judges, lawyers, and others in the legal community.

On Saturday, the focus was network activities, new initiatives from national LRE organizations and from other state centers. There were a series of break out sessions to include youth programs, law schools, institutes, challenges and successes in conducting study groups and intensive professional development.

The conference was a great success. State LRE Coordinators were able to exchange ideas for using different strategies to improve programming and enhance strategic planning for a successful LRE center.



### Former Chief Justice of Puerto Rico and P.A.D. Honorary Member José Trías – Passes.

The P.A.D. District XXVII leadership, our Brothers and Sisters joined the Puerto Rican legal community on the mourn due to the death of José Trías—Monge, Esq., at 83 years old. Trías was, together with Luis Muñoz—Marín, one of the forgers of a non-violent revolution that transform his country since the 1940's on.

Mr. Trías Monge was born on May 5, 1920, in San Juan, P.R. He graduated from the University of Puerto Rico before going to Harvard, where he received master's and law degrees, and then Yale, where his doctorate thesis was on judicial reform in Puerto Rico.

Trías was a true model of the P.A. D. value of "professional service". Before joining the government, he returned to the University of Puerto Rico to teach law. His career in public service included: Assistant General Attorney from 1949 to 1953; delegate to the Constitutional Assembly from 1951 to 1952; Commonwealth Secretary of Justice 1953 to 1957; Member of the Council on Higher Education from 1962 to 1972; and Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Puerto Rico from 1974 to 1985. During his tenure as Chief Justice he was initiated into P.A.D. as an Honorary Member. Also the University of Puerto Rico at Mayaguez pre-law chapter was dedicated on his name, and its known in District XXVII as the "Pre-Law Chapter José Trías - Monge"

A promoter and designer of initiatives of great importance, in the academic and professional fields, Brother Trias was key in the development of the Puerto Rican law. He was a storyteller of the Constitutional History of Puerto Rico and one of the architects of the Commonwealth Judicial System started by the 1952 Constitution.

He wrote on legal subjects, including the five-volume Constitutional History of Puerto Rico, (1980); The Judicial System of Puerto Rico (1978); The Puerto Rican Law Crisis (1979); Society, Law and Justice: Speech and Essays (1986); The Clash of Two Law Cultures in Puerto Rico; The Case for Torts (1991); Puerto Rico: The Trials of the Oldest Colony of the World (1997); Theory of Judgment (2000), to list a few. His commitment and dedication to the public service and the legal system serve as a model for future generations.

Sid Caesar and P.A.D. Brother, dy Friedfeld (Rappallo Chapter): co-authors "Ceasar's Hours My Life in Comedy, with Love and Laughter.


