

aw students face a plethora of challenges within the halls of academia, especially the first year. New classes, professors, case briefs, competition. Competition may vary from school to school but the theme of striving for personal achievement and success is a universal one.

In my first year of law school, all of the 1 Ls write a memorandum of law and take a research exam on Bluebook citations and skills for our Legal Methods class. Once the memos were handed in, the studying for the exam began. Each section of Legal Methods received different study tips and sample questions for their respective professors. Students shared these sample questions so that they were able to study not only the materials from their class, but information from several classes. This sharing was permitted and encouraged by the other professors.

After weeks of studying and preparation, the day of the exam arrived. Once I wrote



my name in #2 pencil, turned over the exam and read the first question, I began to relax. How to cite a case from the official United States Supreme Court reporter. I knew the answer to this one! I bubbled in the answer. Second question now. A little trickier, but I think I got it. Third question. My heart sank. I had seen this exact question, and these exact 4 choices before. I shrugged it

I turned the page and went on to the next question set. Again, a few of the questions were familiar. I must have studied really well for this. I continued with the exam, and by the time I reached the end of it I realized what had happened. In reading and preparing all of the sample questions, one of the sheets that I had studied, assuming it was

2ND ANNUAL PHI ALPHA DELTA - WRITING COMPETITION

P.A.D. is sponsoring its SECOND annual student writing competition. The purpose of the competition is to encourage and reward student-written articles in the areas of the essential aspects of a lawyer: compassion, courage, integrity and professional service. This competition is open to law school and pre-law students. Winning articles will be selected quarterly. Each winner's paper will be published in "The Reporter." The annual winner will be selected from the quarterly winners, receiving additional recognition along with a monetary award of \$1000.00.

THE SUBJECTS

Eligible articles address one of the following areas of the essential aspects of a lawyer:



HOW TO APPLY

The piece must be written by a student member (law or pre-law.) Only one piece by a member shall be submitted in a quarter. Eligible pieces include any unpublished essay or written article prepared by the student. All pieces must be the work of an individual student. Joint works are not permitted. Pieces should be no more than 1500 words in length and be submitted in their final published form.

Entries are to be made by submitting four copies of the piece along with a completed Entry Form. The quarterly winners will be announced and published in the Phi Alpha Delta Reporter. An entry form can be downloaded from www.pad.org click on Pre-Law or Law School Downloads.

AWARDS

The cash prize for the writing competition is \$250 per quarter. A \$1000 prize will be awarded to the best submission of the four quarters annually. In addition to the cash prize, the winning article will be published "The Reporter" and P.A.D. Website.

JUDGING

Eligible pieces will be judged on (1) quality of scholarship; (2) originality; (3) contribution to the understanding and development of the essential aspects of a lawyer, (4) analysis and reasoning; and (5) quality and clarity of writing.

All decisions of the judges, who are appointed by the International Justice and Executive Board, are final. The Fraternity reserves the right to screen entries and limit the number of papers submitted to the judges for final decision. The Fraternity also reserves the right to make no award if, in the judges' discretion, a worthy paper is not submitted.

Something By, Brian Jones Grant Chapter NOT LIKELY!

It would be quite the task to find an active chapter of this fraternity lacking in the resources needed for a great organization. Our people are top notch; they are some of the most intelligent persons in the professional world. The ideas they come up with embody what our fraternity is about: service to the school, student, the profession and the community. The drive they possess also embodies that mantra. Unfortunately, great people, ideas and drive are not enough to actually have an effect. Money is frequently the only resource that keeps chapters from attaining the lofty goals they set before themselves, but it need not be an insurmountable obstacle.

The easiest way to get money for the chapter is to take it. No, I am not saying rob people or embezzle funds from your school, but take that which the chapter has earned. Grant chapter charges \$10 chapter dues. For paying the dues, members get a Phi Alpha Delta Grant Chapter t-shirt and all the local benefits of membership such as free access to PAD functions and discounts on our fundraising items. The t-shirts cost us \$5 each, but we are still taking in \$5 per member, which adds up. More importantly, the members feel a need to participate more because they are paying into the local chapter and they gain a sense of solidarity from seeing other members wearing their shirts around the law school and campus. Chapter dues seem to many Justices and Treasurers a good way to get voted out of office, but if the chapter is doing things for its members, they ought not mind the nominal cost.

The next easiest way to get money is to ask for it. At Akron, the university gives student organizations budget allocations each academic year. There are strings attached, but if you jump through the hoops, there are

thousands of dollars available to student organizations from federal grants that each school receives, you just have to request the funding and have a plan to spend it productively (meaning not on an after-finals kegger).

If your school is tight with its funds, look to local businesses and ask them for money or whatever they can provide, but be specific about what you want from them. Local businesses are dying to get exposure, especially to the potentially valuable clientele found at a law school. Most of them will not give out money, but they will provide goods and services for a discounted price, or even free in some instances! It is crucial to be specific as to why you are going to the particular business, ask for specific items, and guarantee exposure and return business.

Finally, large chains have budgets each store is required to spend and give away to the community. Here at Akron, Giant Eagle (a grocery chain) gives us party subs for our monthly meetings because they have to give away a certain amount of stock each month, National City Bank gave us a \$50 gift card for a raffle and paid for our fall bar-b-que, Buffalo Wild Wings holds a charity night on Wednesdays where we receive 20% of their gross sales. The key here is to find out what the corporate offices require them to do and take advantage of it.

If all else fails, you may have to actually get out there and earn money. Weekly fundraisers are a great way to gain organizational exposure and earn money at the same time. Selling food to students is the staple of many student organizations at Akron Law. Law Association for Women sells bagels and coffee one day a week, Black Law Student Association sells pizza at lunch hour and PAD sells Buffalo Wild Wings to evening

students. We rarely make much money, but we use the opportunity to recruit more members and advertise for our bigger fund raisers: parties.



Parties are necessary to make it through law school. Too much stress has caused many a law student to spontaneously combust mere hours before finals when all they needed to do was hang out for a few hours on a couple weekends during the semester. Trust me; I've seen it and it ain't pretty. This is one of a PAD chapter's roles: service to the student after all. But parties cost money don't they? Not really. A free or cheap location is very important. Many bars will allow a group to reserve a room or portion of the bar so long as they buy food and bring in people. Our "No More Memos" party was held for \$50 cost to us. We held a raffle at the party where all the prizes were donated including a MicroMash Bar Review and \$50 National City gift card. The raffle tickets were \$5 a piece or five for \$20. We made over \$200 on the event. For the spring, we are holding a suitcase party. Supposedly invented by our ingenious Director of Chapter Operations Byron Rupp, PAD throws a party and sells raffle tickets that are required for admission. Each person comes with their suitcase packed and at the end of the night, a ticket is drawn and one lucky couple leaves directly from the party for a weekend getaway including hotel, food and entertainment. The available resources of the chapter will determine what type of getaway is provided, but if the raffle tickets are reasonable and there are free beverages at the party, people will come.

Each chapter is rich with intangible resources; unfortunately, tangible resources are sometimes necessary to make the intangible ideas a reality. By making the entire membership of the chapter contribute to the chapter account, there will be initial funds to spend to stock fundraisers. But not all the goods at events have to be from chapter funds, try to get it donated and do not have an ego, ask anywhere and everywhere. Finally, earn money by providing entertainment and other law school necessities. The fundraisers listed here are just two types, there are an infinite number of ways to earn money and the more money the chapter has, the better off it will be in the long run.

P.A.D. Welcomes the Gwendolyn Sawyer Cherry Chapter! By Cynthia Conlin Cherry Chapter Publicity Committee Chair

The new Gwendolyn Sawyer Cherry Chapter at Florida A&M University College of Law in Orlando, FL., initiated its first 34 members at an induction ceremony at the Orange County Bar Association on Jan. 13, 2005. Since then, the fledgling chapter has elected its officers and committee chairs, had fundraisers and begun plans for a volunteer project with Harbor House: Orange County Against Domestic Violence. It also had a meet-and-greet to welcome potential new members on Feb. 18th.

"The quick response from everyone was just overwhelming," said Chapter Justice and founder Yashica McArthur, a first year law student. "I'm just overjoyed that everyone took the initiative to submit their applications and be a part of the initiation process."

Having seen the pre-law chapter of P.A.D. in action at the main campus where she graduated in 2004, McArthur set out founding the Cherry Chapter with an important job: finding a name.

The FAMU College of Law, now in its third year in Orlando, is unique among other new law schools in that it not a "new" school in the traditional sense because it already had a history when the FAMU College of Law existed on the main campus in Tallahassee, FL, from 1949 until it was closed down in 1968. It took more than three decades of hard work for FAMU, a historically black university, to re-open its law school.

Although the FAMU main campus already hosts a pre-law chapter, FAMU law students were unable to form their own chapter until the College of Law received provisional accreditation, which was awarded in August with great celebration by both faculty and students.

Choosing the name for the chapter was an interesting task.

"I first talked to the faculty and staff at the law school, and no one knew anything about graduates I could name the chapter after," McArthur said. "Someone recommended that I read Larry O. Rivers' book about the first FAMU College of Law. I went through that book and pulled out a few names that popped out."

McArthur and P.A.D. officials settled on Gwendolyn Sawyer Cherry, who lived from 1923 to 1979, and graduated from FAMU College of Law in 1965. Cherry was the first black woman to

pass the Florida Bar and the first black woman law professor in Florida. In 1970 she became the first black woman in the Florida House of Representatives.

"Gwen Cherry was an obvious choice because she was so influential—not only with the FAMU Law community, but because of the entire state of Florida," McArthur said.

Alvin Benton, the chapter's Nominations Committee Chair and first-year law student, joined the Cherry Chapter after being a prelaw member of the Gordon Chapter on the FAMU main campus. "I thought it was definitely a good thing to charter a chapter on this campus," he said. "I hope we do well to impact the entire



national organization and represent FAMU."

Other elected Cherry Chapter officers for 2005-06 are Laura Hargrove, vice-justice; Kamliah Jolly, clerk, Brandi Johnson, treasurer; Lateefah Muhammad, marshal.

"I hope that the chapter not only makes an impact within the Orlando community but everywhere as a whole," McArthur said. "I want our members, when they graduate and go off to work in the legal profession, to be able to say that they got their networking foundation from the Cherry Chapter.


Hickman Chapter Hosts "Law Laughs"

And because law students spend days (and nights) studying the law, the committee goal became to devise a project to provide some relief from the pressure... some "comic" relief. "Law Laughs" committee] quickly realized that the project was bigger than the three law fraternities - and invitations were accepted by the Student Bar Association Garcia. Who is the main attraction of Law Laughs, Dustin Diamond? Diamond is one of the most recognizable faces in show

> business today. At the age of eight, he was discovered in a department store imitating a mannequin.

While in the fifth grade, he auditioned for and was selected out of more than 5000 hopefuls for the role of Samuel "Screech" Powers in the DISNEY/NBC television series "Good Morning Miss Bliss". His character was carried over to NBC's Television series "Saved By The Bell" which ran for ten seasons. "Saved By The Bell" is still seen in syndication sixteen times per week in 105 countries. Dustin (not a stranger to the big screen either) has appeared in more than eighteen feature films, including Made (which earned him a nomination for Best Cameo at the 2002 MTV Movie Awards), Jane White Is Sick and Twisted, and Dickie Roberts with David Spade.

from another section of Legal Methods, was actually a copy of some of the questions and answers used on the actual exam. I couldn't remember who I got the questions from, or which students may or may not have had a copy of this. I went to sleep with great difficulty that night.

The next morning at school, I told myself a million times that I had not done anything wrong. I didn't take any exam questions or share any information that I knew to be illegitimately gained. But all of the rationalizing was not going to persuade the sinking feeling inside me that I needed to do something.

After my morning classes I went to my Legal Methods professor's office. I had no idea what I was going to say to her. Or if she was going to believe me. Maybe this was not how I wanted to start my legal career, drawing attention to myself like this. Making allegations of cheating, or worse, being implicated in cheating. I sat down with her and explained the situation. She was shocked that some of the questions had circulated before the exam. My professor told me not to worry, that she would ask the Dean of Students about this and not to worry, she would keep my name out of it. She believed me. And what was better, she thanked me for being so honest and for coming forward about it. Maybe this was exactly how I wanted to start my legal career after all.

A few days later, my professor called me into her office. She told me that one of the professors had purposefully given out those question, which were from an old exam, and, to my great relief, that the professor wound up using the same exam questions again on the exam.



Stetson University College of Law Wins International Competition

Gulfport, Fla. - Stetson University College of Law became the first American law school since 1996 to win the Willem C. Vis International Commercial Arbitration Moot competition, held March 18-24 in Vienna, Austria. Teams from 150 law schools in 47 countries competed.

Stetson received the prestigious Frédéric Eisemann Award for winning. In its 12th year, the competition is the largest gathering of law schools in one place for such an event, as well as the largest involving private international law. The competition provides an opportunity for law students to present arguments on a hypothetical international business dispute to distinguished international arbitrators, scholars and jurists.

The championship team consisted of law students Katherine Hurst, Ryan Jones, Megan Schultz, Burks Smith and Tom Yaegers (*Brewer*), with Kathryn Christian assisting on the memoranda. Professors Jack Graves and

Stephanie Vaughan coached the team.

"The enormity of this accomplishment is difficult to put into words," Graves said. "The best and the brightest in international commercial law and arbitration gather in Vienna for a competition celebrating 25 years of work by the United Nations in international trade law. The opportunity to see our students win it all in this prestigious event was simply incredible. I have never been more proud of a group of young men and women."

Stetson defeated the University of Vienna in the final round. The team defeated Columbia University, the National University of Singapore, Queen's University (Canada), and the University of Notre Dame (Australia) in earlier elimination rounds.

Professor Dr. Gabrielle Kaufmann-Kohler, president of the Swiss Arbitration Association, chaired the arbitration panel in the final round. In announcing Stetson as the winner of the final round, she analogized the award to an Olympic gold medal.

"This team worked together in perfect harmony," said Vaughan, Stetson's moot court adviser. "This group of special and unique students worked together as a cohesive unit for six months and traveled together for two weeks. Bringing home the world championship to the United States, and directly to Stetson, is indescribable. I have never been more excited for my students and Stetson."

The Willem C. Vis International Commercial Arbitration Moot highlights the importance of the United Nations Convention on the International Sale of Goods (governing international sales of goods between businesses from member states) and the UNCITRAL Model Law on International Commercial Arbitration. The goal of the moot is to foster the study of international commercial law and arbitration.

The moot also serves as an opportunity for many of the foremost authorities on international commercial law and arbitration to gather for the week to attend conferences and serve as arbitrators for the student arguments. Each year's moot also highlights one of the many sets of institutional arbitration rules. This year, the hypothetical parties to the moot problem chose the Swiss Rules of International Arbitration.

The team received a generous contribution from the International Law Section of the Florida Bar to help cover the cost of its travel and participation in the moot.

The Hickman Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity at the University of Houston Law Center hosted its second annual Camp C.O.O.L. (Children's Orientation On Law) in 2004. On November 22nd and 23rd, Camp C.O.O.L. treated nearly forty campers ranging from Kindergarteners to 6th graders to a cornucopia of activities. The day camp was held daily from 8:30 am to 2:45 pm and was open to any Houston-area elementary school-age child.

The first two days of Thanksgiving week are holidays for all HISD (Houston Independent School District) and surrounding districts; however, the university has classes. In past years, with local day care facilities over-filled, the younger relatives and children of UH students and faculty are forced to come to campus to sit through classes. Camp C.O.O.L. day camp offers a low-cost alternative [cost per camper is only \$5 for both days and includes breakfast, lunch and snacks and a safe alternative to leaving grade-schoolers home alone. Campers each day look forward to entertaining (and educational) law-related activities taught by

law school and high school volunteers. Camp even had a 2003 camper, Shanda Taylor, to return to volunteer as a junior counselor. Safety is a primary objective and volunteers working at the camp pass an application process with mandatory attendance at a volunteer training session conducted this year by PAD-committee head, Dawn Onusko.

Campers participate in a variety of activities. On both days, they find breakfast waiting (courtesy of The Advocates, a student group at UH Law), are treated to an "Actus Reus: Let's Get Active" activity (with UH Metro transportation and UH Recreation & Wellness Center), complete arts & crafts takehome projects, and never see the snack table empty (compliments of UHLC Student Services). Needless to say, each day of camp is a lot of fun for both the campers and volunteers.

Each day has it's own agenda. There are three tracks running constantly - one for grades K-2, one for 3-4, and one for 5-6. On November 22, the track for 5th and 6th grade includes a Junior Judges



with Asian Law Students Association. Kindergarten to 2nd graders enjoy a "law is fun" activity hosted by the UH Law chapter of Black Law Students Association (BLSA) and "Law Draw" with PILO. K-4th graders also participate in a 'mock' law class on the concept of fairness an equal treatment, led by Hickman member Ray Scheliga. All agendas on Monday include a class on personal safety (sponsored by Harris County Sheriffs) discussing seat belts, bicycle safety, curfews, and safety on the internet. Also, all campers enjoy video instruction during lunch from the State Bar of Texas on "Jury Service in Texas" and "The Trial of Gold E Locks."

Camp concludes on the first day with a camp premiere event. K-4th serve as the jury of 'peers' in a mock Teen Court trial featuring the 5th and 6th graders in the roles of the attorneys and witnesses for the prosecution and defense. The event sponsor is UHLC Criminal Defense Law Students Association. The "student attorneys" and witnesses receive instruction prior to the trial from six highschool members of the City of Hedwig Village Teen Court Advisory Board, Theses high school volunteers regularly prosecute and defend the punishment phase of Class C Misdemeanors for the City of Hedwig Village (Lisa Reed, Teen Court Coordinator). Camp C.O.O.L.'s mock teen court trial involves a sixteen-year-old student and the spraypainting of school property. At the conclusion of the trial, the jury of K-4th deliberate and

sentence the youth to a 'fair' sentence involving community service hours.

The agenda on November 23 starts with a discussion led by Hickman members for 5th and 6th grade (sponsored by Harris County Sheriffs) about gun safety, the trouble with tobacco, and safety on the web. "Law is Fun" activities are conducted for 3rd-4th grade (hosted by Muslim Law Students Association) and K-2nd (hosted by BLSA). Grades K-3rd participate in "Legal Strategies" (hosted by Hispanic Law Students Association), while 4th-6th enjoy a 'mock' law class on Children's Rights (hosted by the Houston Association of Counsel for Children taught by Gail Lutz, Supervising Attorney at the Southwest Regional Juvenile Defender Center). All campers on the second day of camp receive treats as Anthony Robinson (Assistant District Justice/District IX) speaks with the children about "The Basics: Innocent Until Proven Guilty" following the campers' Actus Reus activity of Tai Kwon Do led Hickman-Camp C.O.O.L. committee head (and black belt), Anna Archer. Campers watch videotapes for learning about the law (courtesy of the State Bar of Texas), the career planning video "Outreach: Lawyers Reaching Out to Young Texans" with dialogue after the video with PAD members about the need for law, led by Hickman Justice-Wendy Miller (5th-6th grade) and "Focus on Government: Supreme Court and the Constitution" (all campers).

The second day of camp adds an exciting element – the mock trial. At the closing of the camp, all campers perform for an audience of parents and law students a mock trial on stage in UH Law's Krost Auditorium, "Village of Sheepfold v. Joey Wolfcryer." The trial cast

features local attorney Janet Reinarz as the Honorable Wonka (judge's robe courtesy of The Advocates). Camp concludes with a presentation to all campers of gift bags (courtesy of UH Law's Houston Association of Counsel for Children) and camp completion certificates from PAD-Hickman Chapter.

The event is well advertised, including feature articles in UHLC student publication Legalese and UHLC Alumni magazine Briefcase, and front-page coverage in the University of Houston's daily newspaper, the Daily Cougar. Assistance from the Houston Young Lawyers Association, the Teen Court Advisory Board for the City of Hedwig Village, UHLC staff (including Dean Michael Olivas, Vicky Crain, and Leah Gross), UHLC student organizations, and Harris County Sheriffs Department (Deputy Bumpers) contribute each year to the camp's success.

The camp received campus recognition with a Campus Leadership award for 2003-2004 from the University of Houston Campus Activities for Best Community Service Project. Camp C.O.O.L. 2004 also received a \$1,000 grant from the Houston Young Lawyers Foundation (HYLF) to support it. Hickman was also graciously honored at Phi Alpha Delta's 55th Biennial Convention (held in Los Angeles, CA) for Camp C.O.O.L. 2003 with the Law-Related Education awards, Outstanding Student Service (Wendy Miller) and Chapter of the Year.

Pepper Chapter Produces a LEAP Program Mock Trial

On February 10, 2005, Goldilocks was found liable to the Three Bears for both compensatory and puntitive damages resulting from her trespass into the Bear's home. The trial, presided over by Assistant Professor of Law Michael Domino, was held at Widener University School of Law's Harrisburg campus, and was conducted by seventh and eight graders from Jim Howard's class at Steele Elementary (Harrisburg, PA) who assumed the roles of counsel, court room staff, and jurors.

The event was an extension of the fall portion of the Law Education and Peace for Kids (LEAP-Kids) program. The LEAP-Kids is conducted at Widener Harrisburg by the Claude Pepper Chapter, in association with the Penn'sylvnia Bar Association.


LEAP-Kids provides age-appropriate lessons to elementary students on how the law benefits people who seek justice, punishes those who disobey it, and how students can use the legal system to resolve problems peacefully. The LEAP teachers—Pepper Chapter members—lead interactive instructional classes which are geared toward encouraging critical thinking about the law, the legal process, and citizenship in general.

Mr. Howard's class met weekly with Widener students and experienced LEAP teachers, Jason Lambrino (2L) and Drew Miller (1L). Both Jason and Drew are very dedicated to making a difference in the way civics is perceived in the minds of the Harriburg youths. Jason, filled with pride, said he "admired the students' abilities to see a bright line between what is right and wrong" in spite of the endless gray areas of the law. He added that the most important lesson he took from the experience was "not to lose sight of the simplistic goal of the law—distinguishing between right and wrong."

Pepper Chapter has carried this program into the spring term with five schools in the Harrisburg area currently participating. The end of the spring program will be celebrated with another mock trial, slated to be held in the Pennsylvania Supreme Court, with the Honorable Michael Eakin presiding. In addition to the LEAP-Kids program, the Pepper Chapter will be holding a 5K run/walk on April 2nd to benefit the Pennsyvlania Bar Foundation *Pro Bono* Programs, which includes civic education programs such as LEAP-Kids.



Brother Johnnie Cochran Passes




