HALL OF FAME

Brother Houston Thompson, Chairman, Federal Trade Commission.

It is a common characteristic of biographies and biographical sketches that they begin by recording the date, place of birth, and partners of the subject. Therefore, we will first record that Houston Thompson was born at Louisburg, Pa., on November 1st, 1875, and that his father and mother were Samuel and Martha Jane Thompson.

It at once becomes obvious that Mr. Thompson should rise to the eminent position which he now holds. It is merely in the natural course of events that anyone born within the territorial limits of the illustrious sovereignty of Pennsylvania shall rise to eminent heights in whatever walk of life he may adopt. It is of great interest to us, however, to trace that rise, and therefore we next record that in 1897 Mr. Thompson received the degree of Bachelor of Arts from Princeton University, and thereafter studied law in the New York School of Law. He removed shortly thereafter to Colorado and began to practice in Denver in the year 1899.

That this beginning was any more startling and brilliant than that of any other young lawyer we do not need to assume. It is enough for us to know that Mr. Thompson undoubtedly "knew his stuff," since he lectured at the University of Denver Law School from 1903 to 1906. He served as Assistant Attorney General of Colorado for two years; again engaged in private practice from 1909 to 1913, and became Assistant Attorney General of the United States on April 26th, 1913, which position he occupied until 1918. At that time he was appointed a member of the Federal Trade Commission, of which commission he became chairman in 1920.

It is now in order to add a few touches and so a little further to round out the

picture. Mr. Thompson was president of the District of Columbia Council, Boy Scouts of America, and also chairman of the Regional District Commission, covering Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia. It may also be mentioned that he is a member of the American and Colorado Bar Associations and of the following clubs: Chevy Chase and Cosmos, Washington, D. C., and Cactus and Mile High of Denver. Last, but not least—oh, no, brothers by no means least—he is an Honorary Member of John Jay Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta.

The foregoing would undoubtedly give to the observant reader a sufficiently accurate idea of the man and what he is. The members of the chapter, however, are able from their own personal knowledge to add a great deal more. They know that Mr. Thompson is a man who has taken the greatest personal interest in themselves. He has not merely accepted honorary membership as a compliment, but has made of it an opportunity, something which honorary members are not always apt to do. It is one thing to come to one or two entertainments and let the gracious sun of your presence shine upon lesser mortals. It is another and vastly different matter to come to those meetings prepared and willing to give something to them. The quality and character of that "something" also differs with different honorary members. In this regard the chapter has been more than fortunate in our Brother Thompson, for that something is, in his case, of never-failing information and inspiration to the chapter, and perhaps that is the best epitome of what he stands for.

Authority of Fiduciaries over Disposition of Property.

(1200) **Sale by executor, administrator and guardian.**—In this state, the executor, administrator and guardian are governed by the provisions of the probate code in the disposition of the property of the estate with the administration of which they are charged. Neither the executor, administrator, nor guardian may dispose of any of the property of the estate in his charge without the authority of the county court previously obtained from formal application except that the executor may sell any property of the estate without the order of the county court, and at either private or public sale, and with or without notice, as he may determine when the will directs the sale of property or gives authority to sell, but return of such sales must be made by the executor as in other cases. In any event no title passes unless the sale is confirmed (§§8707, 8764-8796, incl.; 8891-8896,

incl.; C. L. 1913; Magoffin v. Watros, 45 N. D., 406, 178 N. W., 406). When a sale is authorized the executor, administrator, or guardian must give a bond in a sum equal to the probable amount to be realized, unless, in the case of the executor, a bond shall have been waived by the will (§8686, C. L., 1913).

There are special provisions for the sale of perishable property, personal property and real estate, particularly when only part of the real estate is to be sold or if the real estate is encumbered; and special proceedings are prescribed in cases where specific performance of a contract to convey real estate is desired (§§8764-8796, incl., C. L., 1913). Strange as it may seem, the authority of an executor or administrator to compel specific performance on the part of the vendee is rather vague.

(1201) **Lease by fiduciary.**—The executor or administrator may lease the real property under his control until ordered to surrender the same (§8710, C. L., 1913).

A guardian cannot, as such, make a contract which will bind his ward or the latter's estate (§4465, C. L., 1913; *Thorpe et al. v. Hanson*, 9 N. D., 249, 252, 83 N. W., 20).

(1202) **Duty of Guardian.**—A guardian is charged with the duty of applying the proceeds or income from the estate in support of the ward and his family, if any, and if such income or proceeds are insufficient for that purpose he may sell the real estate upon obtaining a decree of the county court therefor, and apply the proceeds of such sale to the same purpose, settling an account with the county court semi-annually or annually depending upon the value of the estate (§§8891-8896, incl., C. L., 1913). Unless otherwise specially provided (see §§8899-8912, incl., C. L., 1913), the procedure applicable to the estates of decedents must be followed by guardians (§8909, C. L., 1913). See *Christenson v. Grandy*, 46 N. D., 418, 180 N. W., 18, re limitation of action.

(1203) **Distribution by fiduciary.**—Special provision is made for the setting aside of exempt personal property to the surviving wife, or husband, or minor children, and for the disposition of estates of small value (§§8725, 8729, C. L., 1913. See *Charlson v. Charlson*, 187 N. W., 418; *Herr v. Herr*, 45 N. D., 492, 178 N. W., 433; *Fisher v. Dolwig*, 39 N. D., 161, 66 N. W., 793; *Krumenacker v. Andis*, 38 N. D., 500, 165 N. W., 524). The debts of the decedent should be paid only after a decree of the county court for the payment thereof upon the settlement of the account by an executor or administrator (§8760, C. L., 1913). The order of payment is prescribed (§§8755-8761, incl., C. L., 1913). The payment of legacies and distribution of the estate among the heirs and legatees or other persons entitled thereto must be directed by the court (§§8762, 8846-8853, incl., C. L., 1913). Partial distribution before final settlement may be obtained at any time after the lapse of the time limit for the filing of claims on petition of any heir, devisee or legatee, after notice to all parties interested in the estate, in a proper case (§§8841-8844, incl., C. L., 1913).

(1204) **Foreign estates.**—An executor or administrator of the estate of a non-resident decedent has like powers, duties and obligations respecting the property of the decedent within this state as other executors or administrators (§8673, C. L., 1913). There are, however, a few special provisions in the Probate Code relating to the administration of such estates (§§8861, C. L., 1913).

(1205) **Authority of trustee.**—The authority of a trustee is that conferred upon him by the declaration of trust and by Chapter 71 of the Civil Code. His acts within the scope of his authority bind the trust property to the same extent as the acts of the general agent bind his principal (§6305, C. L., 1913; see §6295, C. L., 1913). See *Elton v. Lamb*, 33 N. D., 388, 157 N. W., 288.

When a trust in relation to real property is expressed in the instrument creating the estate, every transfer or other act of the trustees in contravention of the trust is absolutely void (§5379, C. L., 1913).

As to the authority of a surviving partner to make a contract for the sale of real estate of the partnership for purposes of liquidation, see *The Gardner Hotel Company v. Hagaman*, 47 N. D., 434, 439, 182 N. W., 685.

The exercise of a discretionary power conferred upon a trustee only may be controlled by the district court (§6307, C. L., 1913); although that court may remove any trustee who has violated or who is unfit to execute the trust and appoint a successor, if the declaration of trust does not provide a particular method of appointment (§§6314-6316, incl., C. L., 1913).

(1206) **Co-fiduciaries.**—When there are two executors or administrators, the act of one alone shall be effectual, if the other is absent from the state, or laboring under any legal disability from serving, or if he has given his co-executor or co-administrator authority in writing to act for both; and when there are more than two executors or administrators, the act of a majority of them is valid (§8651, C. L., 1913). When there are several trustees all must unite in any act to bind the trust property unless the declaration of trust otherwise provides (§6306, C. L., 1913); and

a trustee is responsible for the wrongful acts of a co-trustee to which he consented or which by his negligence he permitted the latter to perform, but for no other (§629, C. L., 1913). On the death, or renunciation, or discharge of one of several trustees the trust passes to the others (§631, C. L., 1913).

(1296) **Summary.**—An order for sale is required for every transfer by an executor,

administrator or guardian, except in the case of an executor acting under a power of sale contained in a will.

An order is required on distribution by an executor or administrator.

A trustee is governed by the terms of the trust instrument.

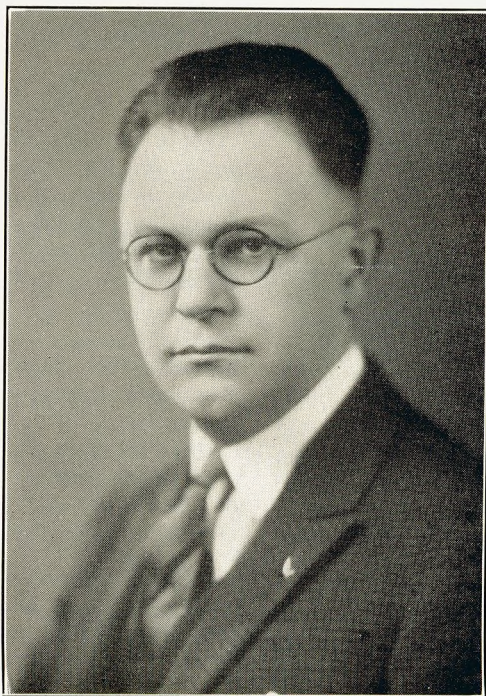
A majority of executors or administrators may act, but all the trustees must unite in order to render a contract binding.

He is now President of the San Francisco Lawyers Club, and was recently a candidate for the office of Public Defender of the City and County of San Francisco, in which he received a very flattering vote. We predict further distinction for Brother Peckham, and at no very distant date.

Some Aspects of Oxford Life

To an American, the methods and manners of Oxford are quite different from those of our universities, and it takes some time to become accustomed to the ways of both the undergraduates and the general methods of college life.

Oxford is composed of twenty-seven separate colleges or halls, and it is necessary to be a member of one of these in order to be registered in the university. Each college, however, is a separate unit, having its own buildings and professorial staffs. Students attend lectures in their own as well as other colleges. Oxford is thus an association of colleges—the oldest of which was founded in 1263, although for a century before that time it was known as the seat of many exiled Continental students.

While the B.A. degree is obtainable in about the same length of time as at home, the higher degrees require a much longer term of residence. Every student is under the supervision of a tutor who assigns and supervises all the work. These tutors are generally called "Dons." Instead of having examinations at the end of each quarter as at home, there is one for entrance called "responsions," and another for the degree, known as "collections." These are much more difficult than our regular examinations, and cover several years work each.

The three terms of the college year, Michlemas (Fall), Hilary (Winter), and Trinity (Spring) are each of eight weeks' duration, and there are two six weeks' vacations besides the regular summer holiday. The Americans usually spend their vacations traveling about the Continent, but it is during these that the English do most of their work. They come to Oxford more for the life and the sports, and pass their vacations studying, either here or at their own homes.

One of the first things that impresses Americans coming to Oxford is the large number of rules which must be obeyed. Upon matriculation the vice-chancellor presents each person with a three hundred ninety-eight page book of regulations. Of course many of these do not apply to every one, but there are a number of things about

which one must be careful. The commoner's, or undergraduate, gown must be worn to all classes and after eight in the evening. It is all well enough to enter "pubs" (saloons), or ~~various places~~ These are just a few of the many, and the university has a number of monitors who wander about the city every morning looking for offenders. The usual punishment is a stiff fine, or dismissal. For returning to your room later than ten o'clock you have to pay a fine, and if later than twelve, dismissal is the penalty. No student is allowed to leave the city without special permission, but it can be accomplished without much risk.

Breakfast and lunch are served in your rooms, and dinner is the only meal eaten in the dining halls. There, if one enters late, mentions a lady's name, uses a quotation, tells a joke, or eats improperly, the head exhibitioner of the table sconces the offender. This means that he must order a scone of ale or shandy (the latter is a mixture of lemonade and beer and quite vile). When this arrives he takes a drink, holding it in one hand, and then passes it around, each one at the table taking a drink. If several people at the same table are sconced during one meal the whole bunch are quite happy by the time the meal is finished.

The English take their sports much more seriously than the Americans, and practically every man in the university is out for some sport. Rugby, hockey, rowing, tennis, track, and wrestling are the main sports—football and baseball as we play them being unknown. The best way to really know the English is by going out for some sport, and over ninety per cent. of the Americans are out for various teams.

Tea, which usually causes a smile when mentioned in college at home, is a firmly established custom. Practically every afternoon you either have an invitation to a tea, or are giving one yourself. The English usually have a very heavy tea, and it takes some time to become accustomed to consuming so much nutriment in the late afternoon. At present it is becoming quite the fad to go out for coffee about eleven in the morning.

There are no fraternities in Oxford and the nearest approach to them are the unions and clubs, which are little more than formula and political clubs. It is really a difference in the manner of living of the English which causes this difference in social life. The English have a different air in their social relations which is foreign to the spirit in American or Indian college, and which, I think, accounts for the lack of clubs which would be similar to American fraternities. There is an American Club here where every Saturday night there is a real "bull-session," and which helps bring Americans into closer contact with one another.

Jesus College, the one in which I am registered, was founded in 1571, primarily for Welsh students. At present, though, more than half of the students are English, with about one-third Welsh, three Americans, and the remainder British Colonials, Indians, and Africans. The Welsh are quite different from the English, and many of them cling to their native language which is entirely unlike English. The enrollment in Jesus College is 175. Christ Church, the largest college in Oxford, has about 325, and the total enrollment of the university is about 4,500.—By Wade H. Atkinson, Jr., in the Carnation of Delta Sigma Phi.

An Incident In Court

Complying with your suggestion I submit the following report of court proceedings which may be of interest:

A beautiful, attractive woman, of about 35 years of age, sued a client of ours for \$10,000 damages for breach of promise of marriage. The Floating University

Dean James E. Lough of the New York University has announced the first tentative plans for an ocean-going college. The proposal, though it is still a bit vague in spots, embraces a round-the-world cruise, to start next September, for about 450 boys. The liner *President Arthur* would be bought and refitted as a university, complete with everything from a gymnasium to a teaching staff; arrangements would be made whereby the year at sea would count as credit in the land colleges from which the students would be drawn, and there would at last be a serious effort to see whether the educational advantages of travel can be successfully combined with the other and more formal sort.

It is an engaging idea, even if it is not a new one. There is a passion for travel in the breast of every undergraduate (as the employment agencies of the steamship companies know to their dismay), and the

possibility of actually showing the world to their students cannot fail to excite those teachers who experience so much difficulty in arousing the intellectual interest in any other way. In the days when a university education was less accessible than it is now the "Grand Tour," conducted with letters of introduction and a private tutor, was almost an essential part of the training. The tutor and the letters of introduction appear to have vanished into the aristocratic past, but here is an effort to regain their advantages on the principle of mass organization. There is opportunity for philosophizing on the changing times—but the plan remains a good one.

Brother George Morris.

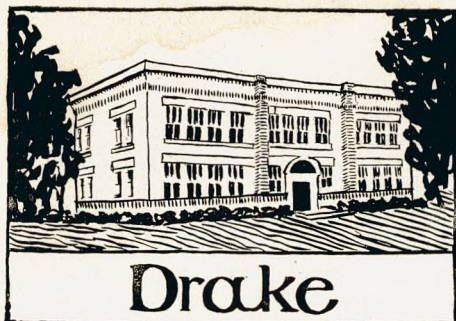

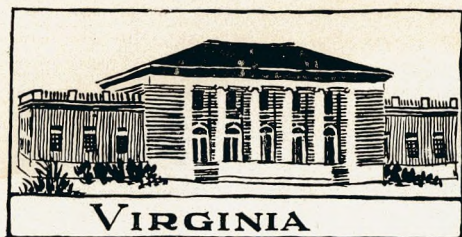
Although we lose many of the brothers by graduation we will have a good nucleus to start the new year on.

George Washington University is an ideal place for the study of law. It is located in a city unique in its legal machinery. The United States Supreme Court, Court of Claims and Court of Customs Appeals, and the Court of Appeals, Supreme Court and Municipal Court of the District of Columbia, are located within a few minutes ride of the Law School. The sessions of the United States Supreme Court are of special interest to students of Constitutional Law. Every branch of the Federal Government has its legal department where prospective lawyers may observe the intricate and elaborate systems of the administrative departments of our government, while in the sessions of Congress may be seen the workings of the national legislative machinery.

The library facilities are unexcelled. In addition to the Law School library of ten thousand volumes, there are the Library of Congress with over one hundred and fifty thousand volumes of Law Books, and the Supreme Court library, to which students have access. Added to all these facilities, there is the advantage of living in the national capital which is fast becoming the world centre of culture. Here gather the leaders in government, diplomacy, politics, science and education, in which local interests and provincialism give way to a broader spirit—national, and in many respects, international.

The Law School is the oldest in the City of Washington, being a part of the University which was founded in 1821. It is a charter member of the Association of American Law Schools, which requires that high standards be met and maintained, and in September, 1925, will automatically become a Class A school under the require-

ments of the American Bar Association, being placed in Class B until the requirement of two years pre-legal work is met.

The first unit of a new building for a Greater George Washington University is now under construction, and will be ready for occupancy this fall. When completed, it will cover an entire city block, and will accommodate approximately seven thousand five hundred students in all departments. It is located within four blocks of the White House and other departments of the Federal Government. A new Athletic Field is being prepared on the banks of the beautiful Potomac River just west of the University buildings.

Following the action taken at the recent Convention relative to chapter publications, John Jay Chapter decided to edit and publish a quarterly magazine called Jay's Digest three times during the school year, viz., November, February and May. A special addition was sent out in March which met with great enthusiasm in the alumni ranks. A chapter Hand-Book is also being prepared, containing the chapter constitution and by-laws, and a chapter alumni directory.

Practical problems in Income Tax practice was the subject of discussion at the second monthly dinner of John Jay Chapter at the Garden T House on April 3rd. Practically the entire chapter turned out for this dinner, which was the last of these meetings to be held this year. 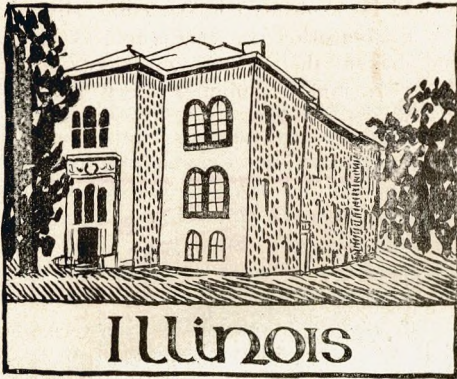

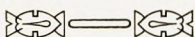
