

DECLARATION OF PURPOSE

Doers Not Viewers - A Call To Action

As you are well aware by now, my theme for this biennium has been to focus on those brothers and sisters who make things happen - the Doers. Clearly, Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International has more than its fair share of Doers.

Your International Executive Board and International Tribunal have been very active this biennium not just with attending chapter and district events, but with leading our Fraternity into the future. We are focusing our efforts each day to ensure that Phi Alpha Delta is a professional law fraternity advancing integrity, compassion and courage through service to the student, the school, the profession and the community, in order to maintain our vision of being recognized as the preeminent law fraternity promoting the bonds of fraternalism, and of being the leader in the development and advancement of professional ideals.

To that end we established the quarterly writing competition based on our core values, set up committees to look at various aspects of the Fraternity, and committed to paper our goals for the Fraternity over the next ten years. We are reorganizing the legal relationship between the Fraternity, the Public Service Center, and the Endowment Fund to be more current with the times. We have been investigating our international relationships, as well as our relationships with our partners. We are focusing efforts on alumni events, chapter leadership training, and providing the appropriate staff for the future. I think you will like what we are doing.

individual clients, devising a plan to meet those needs, and following through with the devised plan.

In serving society as a whole, attorneys must engage in pro bono work. Pro bono programs augment more than just business development. Mary Ellen Roy, Where do You Stand? Law Firms Recognize that Pro Bono is Good for Business, 47 LA Bar Jnl.. 308, 309 (1999). Pro bono projects can be used to train new associates and promote morale and collegiality, which leads to more enthusiastic and productive attorneys. Id. Also, associates and partners benefit from the rewarding feeling of having accomplished something positive. Id. Pro bono work benefits the public because those with need of legal services but without funds for such services are provided with legal advice and advocacy otherwise not available.

Also, in serving the society as a whole, attorneys must take steps to use their education and serve on committees dealing with the area of law they specialize in. By doing this, attorneys provide a way for others to tap into knowledge and experience that might otherwise not be obtainable. This additional knowledge works to benefit the legal community as a whole by providing an alternate viewpoint on issues and another mind to glean ideas from. Also, the attorney may supplement his knowledge with the knowledge of others in the committee.

Lastly, in serving the society as a whole, attorneys must devote time to offer information to the public at large by writing and speaking publicly. Public speaking even on general terms gives those in attendance a better understanding of what general practice or specific areas of law entail, promotes public interest causes, and helps the attorney hone his speaking skills to his

benefit in the court room or with individual clients. Linda Hamilton Krieger noted that "Lawyers are public speakers. Lawyers are storytellers." Linda Hamilton Krieger, Civil Rights Perestroika: Intergroup Relations after Affirmative Action, 86 Cal. L. Rev. 1251, 1296 (1998). By "telling stories" and speaking to the public about the general practice of law, society as a whole benefits by gaining knowledge and the attorney benefits by furthering his skills. By engaging in pro bono work, serving on committees within the legal community, and writing and speaking publicly, attorneys as professionals are able to serve society as a whole.

The second division of professional service is professionally serving the individual client. This can be done by applying integrity, compassion, education, and other attributes to three critical steps. First, an attorney must honestly and realistically assess the needs of the individual client. Second, the attorney must make a plan to meet the needs of the client. And third, the attorney must follow through with the plan to the best of his ability.

The first step is most important. Making an honest and realistic assessment of the client's needs sets the tone for the present case and for any future encounters between attorney and client. To assess a client's needs, an attorney must use integrity, compassion, and education, among other attributes. When a client approaches an attorney about a case, that attorney must use his integrity to determine where the client would be best served, be it through him or through an attorney in a different area of law. It is that attorney's duty to offer a referral rather than take the case himself for profit sake and end up not being able to competently serve the client's interests.



The attorney must also use compassion for the client in making decisions about the case. An attorney acts as a "confidant and counselor in helping them resolve the dispute." Angela M. Bradstreet, President's Report: Strength and Compassion, 2002 San Francisco Att'y 9. In law school, students obtain a grasp on the basics of the law and a working knowledge of how to access unfamiliar law. Also, through elective courses, students gain a more in-depth knowledge of specific areas of law where they can provide more information then a general practitioner. Most of a legal education, though, is obtained outside the classroom. Experience is central in a legal education and the more experience an attorney gets, the better equipped he is to deal with various legal problems. By utilizing his integrity, compassion and education, an attorney will be well equipped to honestly and realistically assess the needs of his client and will be well on his way to completing his goal of professional service.

The second step in professionally serving clients is making a plan to meet the needs of the client. To devise such a plan, an attorney must use his integrity, courage, education and problem solving skills. Throughout each case, attorneys calculate billable hours. An attorney must use his ethical judgment in computing these hours so as not take advantage of the client. The attorney must also have the courage to approach the client not only with what it wants, but what is best for it in a given case. An attorney must use the knowledge accumulated from his legal education and personal experience to determine the most pressing issues of the case. Once he has found the problem, the attorney must take himself out of the client's shoes and access the knowledge and education the client does not possess to find a fitting solution to the legal problem. Throughout law school and practice, attorneys hone problem solving skills. They work to solve problems "in ways that require practical wisdom as well as legal analytical skill." Linda Hamilton

Krieger, *Civil Rights Perestroika*, 86 Cal. L. Rev. at 1296 (1998). By utilizing integrity, courage, education, and problem solving skills, an attorney will be able to devise a plan tailored to the needs of the client.

The third step in professionally serving a client is to follow through with the developed plan to the best of the attorney's ability by using his education, compassion, integrity and courage. In the proposed plan, whether litigation, settlement, or transactional procedure, the attorney must have a working knowledge that allows him to react quickly to unexpected steps by opposing counsel or changes in the situation. Also, an attorney must zealously represent that client as if he was representing his own interests. Angela M. Bradstreet, President's Report, 2002 San Francisco Att'y at 9. An attorney must use integrity in dealings with other parties, the client, and the court and obey discovery requests, certification rules, and filing procedures of the court. Lastly, the attorney must use courage in his dealings with other parties

and insist that justice be served. By utilizing education, compassion, integrity and courage, an attorney will be able to follow through with the devised plan.


Although the concept professional service is inherent in the practice of law, not everyone is aware of what it entails. Professional service entails serving society as a whole by engaging in pro bono work, serving on committees within legal associations, and further support the overall legal profession by speaking to the general public on important legal issues and taking steps to honestly and realistically assessing the needs of individual clients, devising a plan to meet those needs, and following through with the devised plan.

P.A.D. is sponsoring its **SECOND** annual student writing competition. The purpose of the competition is to encourage and reward student-written articles in the areas of the essential aspects of a lawyer: compassion, courage, integrity and professional service. This competition is open to law school and pre-law students. Winning articles will be selected quarterly. Each winner's paper will be published in "The Reporter." The annual winner will be selected from the quarterly winners, receiving additional recognition along

with a monetary award of \$1000.00.

THE SUBJECTS Eligible articles address one of the following areas of the essential aspects of a lawyer: 1st Compassion 2nd Courage 3rd Integrity 4th Professional Service

HOW TO APPLY

The piece must be written by a student member (law or pre-law.) Only one piece by a member shall be submitted in a quarter. Eligible pieces include any unpublished essay or written article prepared by the student. All pieces must be the work of an individual student. Joint works are not permitted. Pieces should be no more than 1500 words in length and be submitted in their final published form.

Entries are to be made by submitting four copies of the piece along with a completed Entry Form. The quarterly winners will be announced and published in the Phi Alpha Delta Reporter. An entry form can be downloaded from www.pad.org click on Pre-Law or Law School Downloads.

AWARDS

The cash prize for the writing competition is \$250 per quarter. A \$1000 prize will be awarded to the best submission of the four quarters annually. In addition to the cash prize, the winning article will be published "The Reporter" and P.A.D. Website.

JUDGING

Eligible pieces will be judged on (1) quality of scholarship; (2) originality; (3) contribution to the understanding and development of the essential aspects of a lawyer, (4) analysis and reasoning; and (5) quality and clarity of writing.

All decisions of the judges, who are appointed by the International Justice and Executive Board, are final. The Fraternity reserves the right to screen entries and limit the number of papers submitted to the judges for final decision. The Fraternity also reserves the right to make no award if, in the judges' discretion, a worthy paper is not submitted.

Summer Recruiting – How to Double Your Chapter Membership before School Starts!

Wouldn't it be nice to come back to school next fall and have 5, 10, 15 or even more incoming 1Ls already having filled out membership applications and ready to join your chapter? For chapters that hold "Summer Recruiting," this scenario is a reality!

Each year, the Executive Office receives membership applications from incoming 1Ls who have been recruited to join law school chapters even though they haven't arrived on campus or attended a recruiting event. It's always a pleasure to inform the chapter officers that the chapter already has new members who just need to be initiated!!!

So, how do you do it? There are a variety of ways to conduct a successful summer recruiting effort.

1. LETTERS TO INCOMING 1LS

One of the easiest ways to recruit incoming 1Ls is to send them a letter welcoming them to law school. However, you need to get going on this NOW! Most admissions offices will allow a chapter to include a one page letter with the

information packet sent to each admitted student. The key to the letter is to:

- Include a description of what P.A.D. does at your school;
- Provide a listing of events that are occurring during the first month or semester of school (including which are open to all students and which are members only);
- Include the names and contact information (email) of at least two chapter officers;
- AND PHOTOCOPY THE MEMBERSHIP APPLICATION ON THE BACK OF THE LETTER!

This last point is one of the most important. Why not take advantage of the publicity you're giving yourself and take the final step of asking them to join? One of the top reasons people don't join an organization is that no one asked them to. By including that request in your letter, and providing them with a membership application, you will be well on your way to welcoming another member into your chapter and the fraternity.

2. SUMMER EVENTS

There are a variety of programs that chapters' hold during the summer that assist in their recruitment effort. The following is a brief description of one of my favorites.

- · Residence search.
 - The chapter coordinates a tour of local apartment complexes for incoming students on a specific day; a month or two before school starts.
 - The day of the tour, all the students meet at the law school to begin the tour. At the end of the day, the chapter holds an early welcome to school social for the incoming students and chapter members that are around. Quite often, incoming students not only find a place to live, but also find roommates! Plus it's a great opportunity to get to know the members of P.A.D.!
- If you want to also make it a fundraiser:
 - Charge a fee!
 - Arrange for discounts (for the new students) and finders fees (for the chapter) with the complexes if people sign their leases that day.
- Another version involves the chapter waiving the tour fee if the incoming student submits a paid application to join P.A.D. when they reserve their space on the tour.



court of common pleas, where he served until 1896. Hare was also a professor of law at the University of Pennsylvania from 1868-88.



Internships... A Great Start!

As a college student who has made the commitment to attend law school and to ultimately become an attorney, you should now be thinking about a legal internship. Working in an internship — the **right** internship — is essential to being accepted to the law school of your choice and to being hired at a law firm at the end of your first year of law school.

My experience as an attorney and the former Assistant Director of Admissions at New York Law School has convinced me that outside of the LSAT score and GPA, the single biggest factor that can distinguish the weight-listed student from the accepted student is a superior personal statement Your experience as a legal intern doing research and helping clients can and should be used to highlight your desire and ability to successfully practice law. The admissions counselor can focus on your accomplishments rather than trying to imagine your potential.

Internships can also provide you with an excellent professional recommendation that your competition may lack. Which would look better: A letter of recommendation from an attorney at a prestigious law firm or from the night manager at T.G.I.Friday's? Most students begin looking for summer employment after their first semester of law school. Without relevant legal experience, a student who is not in the top 20% of his or her class will have a frustrating time finding that perfect summer position. Employers evaluate candidates based on their skills and contacts. The internship will provide you with both. In fact, many law firms will extend full-time employment offers to their summer interns because of the considerable training and money that the firm has invested.

Assuming you're now convinced of the benefits of the right internship, the next question is: How do you find it? There are several options available. The least painful and quickest option is to hire a professional internship placement service. My own company, Drew Educational Services, works to ensure that the student's resume is specifically tailored for legal employment. We have developed relationships with numerous law firms by matching their needs with the needs and abilities of students. Chapter Reminders

- 4. Officer elections need to have been held by March 30th and all new officer information should be sent into the Executive Office by April 10th. Send all updates to dco@pad.org.
- 5. Fall chapter calendars need to be sent to the Executive Office by April 15th. Calendars should be sent to dco@pad.org and your District Justices.

Challenges faced by the Australian legal Profession

Introduction

Australian lawyers, like all lawyers, are today facing the challenges of a rapidly changing world. Not only are clients demanding new types of service, but the technology they use and the laws they interpret are evolving at an increasing pace. The Australian Government, through its commitment to a national legal profession and the liberalisation of trans-national trade in legal services, is helping the Australian legal profession meet the challenges of a global future. However, the profession itself will actively need to anticipate, respond and adapt to these challenges to ensure they benefit from the opportunities globalisation offers.

Global Trends

In recent decades, technological advances in communications and transport have revolutionised the activities of businesses and individuals. Commercial transactions are now being conducted at high speed around the clock via the internet and email. Ideas, proposals and finance are crossing interstate and international borders quickly and easily.

Naturally, these changes have had an impact on the legal profession and affected the traditional client-lawyer relationship. As global communications allow professionals to consult with organisations across the world, a firm's client base is no longer limited to the same city, to the same State or even the same country. Commercial clients expect legal services to transcend State and international borders and to be delivered in the same speedy manner as their transactions. Some clients are also requesting a bundle of services and advice that extends beyond the law and



overlaps with other areas of expertise.

Consistent Regulation

While clients are becoming more demanding, different regulatory regimes in each Australian State

and Territory continue to impose restrictions and administrative burdens on legal practitioners and their firms. For example, each State and Territory has separate requirements for admission, practising certificates, and complaints and discipline. The Australian Government is leading the way to overcome these types of barriers.

The Australian Government has worked to achieve a uniform regulatory regime for the legal profession in Australia. Through the Standing Committee of Attorneys General (constituted by the Australian Government, State and Territory Attorneys-General), the Australian Government has spearheaded the creation of a model Bill that will form the basis for consistent regulation of the legal profession across all Australian jurisdictions.

A legal practitioner will only need to be admitted in one Australian State or Territory and will only need one practising certificate to practice anywhere in Australia. A law firm working across States will not have to duplicate administrative services or meet different regulatory requirements in each jurisdiction. Consumers will benefit from an increase in choice and competition in the legal services sector. Consistent regulation will facilitate the free and open flow of legal services while eliminating cross-border obstacles to service delivery.

International Trade in Legal Services

The model provisions will also help meet client needs for legal advice that crosses international borders. This will be achieved through the creation of a nationally uniform system governing the entitlement of foreign lawyers to practise the law of their home country in Australia. Foreign lawyers will be able to practice the law of their own country in Australia, without the burden of having to meet the Australian admission criteria. It will also allow foreign lawyers the freedom to voluntarily enter into commercial associations with Australian lawyers and law firms.

Australia is at the forefront of promoting the liberalisation of trans-national trade in legal services. As part of its participation in the current WTO/GATS negotiations, Australia initiated and chairs a 'Friends of Legal Services' group. This group consists of 14 WTO members including the United States of America, our largest legal services export market. The group discusses issues relating to the liberalisation of transnational trade in legal services. It allows for the more complex and legal servicesspecific issues to be discussed in detail. It also addresses any issues or concerns that WTO members may have about liberalising legal services.

Other Challenges

Technological advances have not only required legal practitioners to change their way of providing legal services, they have also required law-makers to rethink parts of the law itself. The rapid proliferation of electronic information has required a range of responses, particularly - as is the case in Australia - where many of those laws are different in each jurisdiction. The need to recognise electronic transactions in a uniform manner is one example, met by the Australian Government enacting the Electronic Transactions Act and all States and Territories then enacting similar legislation.

Defamation law is another example. The Australian Government is keen to ensure that defamation laws are harmonised across Australia to ensure the increasing ease of communication is not subjected to different rights in different domestic jurisdictions and does not thereby simply provide for increased litigation.



Conclusion

Technological advances and changes in the law will continue to impact on lawyers. The key is for the profession to remain dynamic, flexible and outward-looking. By anticipating and being responsive to change, the profession will be able to overcome any setbacks, take advantage of opportunities and meet the challenges of a rapidly changing world. As Australia's Attorney-General, I look forward to working with both Australian and international legal professionals to ensure the legal profession is able to meet these challenges and flourish in doing so.





Inaugural Pennsylvania Law Student Law-Related Education (LRE) Conference Held In Harrisburg:

Phi Alpha Delta Claude Pepper chapter continues its commitment to LRE for kids

Phi Alpha Delta Claude Pepper Chapter joined the Pennsylvania Bar Association in hosting the inaugural statewide Pennsylvania Law Student Law-Related Education (LRE) Conference on Saturday, January 31, 2004 at Widener University School of Law, Harrisburg campus. The Phi Alpha Delta (P.A.D.) and Pennsylvania Bar Association (PBA) conference, the first of its kind in Pennsylvania to target law students from across the state, showed law students how they might fulfill their public service commitment by going into elementary, middle, and high school classrooms and teaching kids about the law and civic




responsibility. The sessions throughout the day were set up to help law students and the local teachers in attendance select lessons to teach and explore interactive and exciting ways to get these lessons across to kids.

The P.A.D./PBA conference weekend was kicked off Friday night at a local restaurant where conference attendees came to enjoy refreshments, appetizers, and conversation with each other. It was well attended by a mix of more than 20 law students, local teachers and law and justice professionals. All had an enjoyable time as stories abounded about the wonderful work done by


Widener students teaching LRE to area school children.

The next day began early with coffee, donuts, and an opportunity for conference goers-a mix of more than 40 law students, educators and law and justice professionals— to get to know each other before the formal conference began. Students from Penn State University's Dickinson School of Law Burr P.A.D. Chapter joined the Widener law students for the program. Welcoming remarks from the host school, the Claude Pepper Chapter and P.A.D. Public Service Center Director Carole Collins, who traveled up from Baltimore to lend national P.A.D. support to the event, kicked off the exciting day.

The first session was taught by two former police officers and dealt with drunk driving in Pennsylvania, exploring the recently revised state statute using a lesson modeled on the classic LRE lesson, "No Vehicles in the Park." The lesson began

On January 17th, in Philadelphia, PA, at the ABA's 2004 National Law-Related Education Leadership Conference, a team of committed volunteers from the U.S. Attorney's Office from the Northern District of New York was recognized for their significant contribution to improving the lives of children and young adults through their ten-year commitment to advancing the Youth Court concept.

Dr. Mabel McKinney-Browning, Director of Division for Public Education, American Bar Association,

presented the award. The "team" were singled out for their commitment to educating young adults about the rule of law, strengthening the quality of local youth court programs, their writing of numerous award winning youth court programmatic and training materials, and for their steadfast commitment to promoting the Youth Court for more than ten years in dozens of states, in addition to the local communities within the Northern District of New York State.


with participants from the audience pretending to pull over a car containing two people who had just come from an office party. The instructors let the simulated DUI stop proceed and then picked out all of the ways that the stop could have been completed better. After the simulated stop was over the instructors explored whether a simple law-"No one may drive drunk"-would be enough to stop the dangerous behavior of the simulation. Various adjustments to the scenario, from having the driver under the influence of drugs to having the drunk riding a horse, provided a glimpse of the complexity of drafting a law and led into a review of Pennsylvania's revised drunk driving laws. Following the actual lesson, the group discussed how law students and teachers might apply this type of lesson to different ages of kids.

The next portion of the program consisted of the mock trial of Jackie Bean, charged with stealing a golden egg laying hen from Mr. Biggs. The trial is part of the VOICE (Violence prevention Outcomes in Civic Education) curriculum developed by the Constitutional Rights Foundation-Chicago that served as the core of the 2002-2003 P.A.D./PBA LRE initiative which first brought Widener, law students into Harrisburg area schools. Pennsylvania Supreme Court Justice J. Michael Eakin presided over this trial, a trial he first heard last spring when it was presented by Harrisburg school children and their Widener law students at the Pennsylvania Supreme Court. This time the law students, not their young charges, were assigned the mock trial roles. With only the time that a class might have to prepare this case, less than an hour, the law students went before Justice Eakin as the court was called to order by bailiff and Claude Pepper Vice Justice Jim Johnson. The law students with roles were a little

nervous and concerned about presenting a case, even a mock case, before a Supreme Court Justice, but the trial proceeded smoothly.

At the conclusion of the trial, Justice Eakin charged the jury and sent the jurors off to deliberate. Those deliberations were held in front of the conference participants and everyone had the chance to listen in on the jury deliberations. This was a very informative portion of the experience, both for the future lawyers and for the educators. Not often do lawyers

have a chance to listen to a jury, hearing what each juror thinks was important and what he or she picked out as important from the trial. Since the jury had a single holdout against convicting Jackie Bean, this part of the lesson also underscored the importance of jury service. In our democracy, this is one of the most important places for a citizen's voice to be heard. In discussions after the lesson, participants of the conference noted that they saw both how a whole mock trial could be prepared in a very short amount of time for the students and learned that the lessons of such mock trials are valuable, whether or not a Justice of the Supreme Court comes to class.

After a networking lunch, the second half of the conference day focused on lessons on Brown v. Board of Education, utilizing the Center for Civic Education's. We the People materials and original lessons created for the law student event by the PBA and LEAP-Kids (Legal Education and Peace for Kids). The PBA and LEAP-Kids are the prime sponsors of LRE programs across Pennsylvania and they have a close partnership with the P.A.D. Public Service Center. With 2004 marking the 50th anniversary of the Brown decision and with the Brown sisters coming to Harrisburg on May 7th for the PBA's Law Day celebration, the Brown focus was of great interest to the area educators in attendance at the conference. The teachers said they planned to have the law students teach Brown lessons to their students this spring and next fall. As an added bonus for all conference attendees, two sets of Brown Law Day luncheon tickets to hear the Brown sisters speak in person were raffled away during the conference.

Everyone in attendance felt that the conference was a great success. Participants stated that the event showed how committed Pepper P.A.D. is to seeing LRE programs in the local schools. The P.A.D. students from Dickinson left excited about develoing their own outreach effort in the Carlisle area schools. Widener's P.A.D. leadership offered its support and the PBA and the P.A.D. Public Service Center both stand ready to help the new law student program while continuing to provide technical assistance to the Claude Pepper Chapter at Widener.

The Claude Pepper Chapter was involved in the PBA/LEAP-Kids program last year and this spring semester they are gearing up to go into the schools once again. The law students are excited about going into the local schools this semester and helping to teach public school students about the law and civic responsibility. Last year the law students' lessons were well received by the Harrisburg students and teachers and all involved expect that the program this spring will be equally well received.

PAD First in Puerto Rico: First Woman Chief Justice Appointed

The Hon. Miriam Naveira-Merly (Muñoz Honorary '87) made history when at the end of 2003 she took the oath of office as the first female Chief Justice of the Puerto Rico Supreme Court. Judge Naveira is an excellent symbol of our Fraternity of Firsts, as she is a leader for women and members of her generation.

Sister Naveira-Merly has a great sense of humor. As described by the press, "She has an impressive professional trajectory." She was the first woman to be Director of the Office of Monopolistic Affairs of the Commonwealth Department of Justice; the first female to be Puerto Rico's General Attorney and the first woman to be appointed Associate Judge of the Supreme Court and now the first to become Chief Justice, after nineteen years as Associate Judge.

Judge Naveira, was the chairperson of a gender discrimination study in the judiciary. She wrote the decision that set the precedent on Privacy Rights issues in the workplace (*Arroyo vs. Rattan Specialties*, 117 DPR 35 (1986)). She has



been an active participant of other professional organizations as the Women Judges International Organization, where she is the board member who represents Latin America, Mexico, the Caribbean, and the US Conference of Chief Justices. She has received numerous awards including the "Orden del Mérito Civil" from the Spanish Crown.

She is a graduate of the College of Mount Saint Vincent, NY; her JD is from the University of Puerto Rico with an LL.M from Columbia University. She did postgraduate work at Leiden University in Deutschland. Her plans for the Puerto Rican Judiciary includes reorganizing some of the Judicial Regions to speed up the processes; and, to pay special attention to the Clerks Office to up-date the case list in order to verify the true accumulation of case loads.

In P.A.D. alumnae related news the Hon. Liana Fiol-Matta (De Diego, Faculty, 1985) took the oath of office as the new Associate Judge of the Puerto Rico Supreme Court on February 19, 2004. Judge Fiol's professional career includes eleven years as Appellate Judge of the Commonwealth Court of Appeals where she was the Administrator Judge for the last few years. While a Law Professor at the Pontifical Catholic U. of PR the De Diego Chapter initiated her as Faculty Member in the mid 1980's.

And, on a final note, Past District XXVII Justice, Hon. Nereida Cortes (De Diego '86) was confirmed by Judge Naveira as the Administrator Judge for the Judicial Region of Ponce. The Region over which Sister Cortes oversees is at the south of Puerto Rico's main island and includes eight Municipalities. Judge Cortes supervises a payroll of 33 Superior and Municipal judges and 400 other employees, including clerks, marshals, social workers, law clerks and housekeeping technicians.

Bush Nominates Former Judge Schiavelli to U.S. District Court for Central District

Former Los Angeles Superior Court Judge George P. Schiavelli was nominated by President Bush yesterday to the U.S. District Court for the Central District of California.

Schiavelli, who was recommended by the bipartisan committee that reviews potential district judges throughout the state just two months after applying, would succeed Judge Lourdes Baird. Baird is taking senior status in May.

"I'm very excited and very gratified," Schiavelli, 55, told the MetNews. "I look forward to working with the Senate throughout the confirmation process."

Following standard White House advice to judicial nominees, he declined to comment further.

Schiavelli served on the Superior Court from 1994—when he was appointed by then-Gov. Pete Wilson—until July 2000, when he joined the firm of Crosby Heafey Roach & May.

Headed Appellate Divison

When he left the court, he was in his second year as presiding judge of the Appellate Division, to which he was assigned in 1997 by Chief Justice Ronald M. George. He said at the time that he was sad to leave the bench, but was compelled to do so because of an illness in the family.

Schiavelli was born in Florida but his family moved to the Los Angeles area when he was about five years old. He attended Grant High School in the San Fernando Valley, earned his undergraduate degree at Stanford University and received his law degree in 1974 from UCLA.

He played football at Stanford, where he was a teammate of Heisman Trophy winner Jim Plunkett, graduating in 1970. In law school, he gave up a seat on the law review to participate in the moot court honors program.

Appellate Practice

Much of his legal career has been devoted to appellate work. After a stint at O'Melveny & Myers, he became a partner at Ervin, Cohen & Jessup and later at Horvitz & Levy, where he was working at the time Wilson tapped him for the bench.



Judge George P. Schiavelli attended UCLA School of Law and joined the McKenna chapter in 1971 and is the Justice of the Los Angeles Alumni Chapter.

He is a past president of the Italian American Lawyers Association and served from 1980 to 1982 on the Board of Governors of the Association of Business Trial Lawyers.

The president made three other judicial nominations yesterday.

Department of Health and Human Services Department official Claude A. Allen, whose nomination to the Fourth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals drew fire from Democrats and was returned when Congress adjourned before Christmas, was re-nominated.

Paul S. Diamond of Pennsylvania was nominated to the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of that state and Robert Bryan Harwell was nominated to the U.S. District Court for the District of South Carolina.

Her journey to the top has been an unlikely one

Friday December 26, 2003; 10:00 AMSix years and a lifetime ago, Christy Morris was a single mom and lawyer in Barbour County, where she was "raising children and vegetables and a few eyebrows." Today, she's Gov. Bob Wise's secretary for Military Affairs and Public Safety. That makes her the boss of 11 state agencies, including the National Guard, State Police and Office of Emergency Services.

The head of the men in uniform is, well, a woman. Talk about shattering the glass ceiling."She has a wonderful calming effect on any kind of tense situation," said Regional Jail Authority Director Steve Canterbury, one of the 11 division heads now working under Morris. "In our departments, tense situations are a daily method of operation. That's kind of the way it is."

Morris, a former prosecutor, is praised for her legal acumen and strong decision-making abilities. That makes her a natural for the job of running a department of 10,500 when National Guard troops are factored in. Morris took over the mantle of Military Affairs and Public Safety last month when Joe Martin became Wise's legislative director. Her journey to the top has been an unlikely one.A divorced mother of two, Morris was a lawyer in Barbour County in the mid-1990s. She had served three years as assistant prosecutor there, in addition to a one-year stint as assistant prosecutor in Preston County. In some ways, she fit right into to rural West Virginia. She owned a farm and had a small garden. In others, she was more Ally McBeal than country

mother. "I was that lady lawyer," Morris, 51, said. "I was a single mom — that's not too common in rural West Virginia." But, you know, I lived a country life and I was a country lawyer. There was a time when I was a stay-at-home, bake-cookies, do-crafts kind of mom. Being a single mom, I don't have an opportunity to do that anymore."

In 1997, her father, former Delegate Joe Farris, died. Morris uprooted to Charleston to live with her mother. She took a job serving as chief legal counsel to the minor committees in the House of Delegates. "She's one of those unique people, she really has a passion for public service," said House Speaker Bob Kiss. "She wants to make things better." Morris served as counsel until October 2001 — a month after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks — when she was appointed deputy secretary under Martin.

On her first day on the job, Morris was given a baptism by fire. She was briefed on a frightening scenario: How West Virginia would respond if terrorists struck even closer to home."Things have kind of moved at a breakneck speed ever since," she said. Morris caught a glimpse of running the department this summer when Martin was out of the office for more than a month after sustaining

serious injuries in a car accident. And not much has changed since she's officially become the boss, a job for which she is paid \$78,000 a year. Her name is on the door now. She's got a roomier office, but she hasn't even had time to move in. First, she has to wade through the dozens of Post-it notes attached to her computer. Morris said her transition into the traditionally all-boys club of military management has been seamless.

When she first started as a lawyer, Morris said, "It was a male-dominated career path. It's pretty much 50-50 now in law schools." The same is true in Military Affairs and Public Safety. "Woman are rising in numbers in uniform positions all over the nation, and it's true in West Virginia," said Canterbury, the regional jail director. "Christy is a little unique in West Virginia, but she's part of a national trend."Those close to Morris say she might not be all that different from her male counterparts. They say she has the authoritative leadership traits familiar to uniform services. Delegate Corey Palumbo, Morris' cousin, said she never found an argument she couldn't win."She definitely has some authoritative qualities that make her an effective leader in any regard," Palumbo, D-Kanawha, said. "In this capacity, she's perfect."




