The total contributions to date amount to \$2,858.50 of which there were approximately 502 contribu-Our circularization of the membership comprised 12,480 letters mailed, and our returns are to date 2,176 cards received; or, about a pessimistic attitude when formu-17% of the total mailing. Military Justice

Culminating a drive instituted at our 26th Biennial Convention in Kansas City in December of last year, to remedy the ills of military courts which cropped up during the war, extensive reforms in Army Court Martial procedure and general administration of military justice were voted recently by the House of Representatives.

Legislation was passed and sent to the Senate which provides greater safeguards to the rights of soldier defendants and more equal treatment of officers and enlisted men.

Major provisions would:

(1) Permit enlisted men to sit as members of courts martial when an enlisted defendant asks for a trial by a mixed court of officers and men.

(2) Remove some of the "influence" a military commander has over a court martial he orders, by taking officers of the Judge Advocate Generals Department partially out of the "line of command."

(3) Make officers as well as enlisted men subject to trial by special courts for minor offenses.

John W. Nixon Named Among Top 10

Congressman Richard M. Nixon (Rutledge) was among ten young men chosen as "outstanding in the United States during 1947."

Names of the ten were an-nounced recently at Chattanooga, Tenn., by the United States Chamber of Commerce. Brother Nixon gained nation-wide recognition for his ability and statesmanship as a Congressman from California during the first session of the 80th Congress.

He was born in Lorba Linda California, on January 5th, 1913. He graduated from Whittier College and Duke University School of Law, having specialized in government and history, constitutional and administrative law. While working his way through school he had the distinct honor of being president of the student bodies of both his college and law school.

Taking a keen interest in public service, he was elected deputy city attorney of Whittier, and later appointed Government Legal Counsel at Washington, D. C., specializing in simplification of complicated war-time regulations.

During World War II he served three and one-half years in the United States Navy, and was awarded a citation for meritorious performance of duty in combat operations at Bougainville and Green Islands. Later the Secretary of the Navy commended him for effective administrative service after VJ Day. Returning from service, he won the Republican nomination for Congress on June 4th, 1946, with the largest primary vote cast for a candidate in ten years.






