## Plebiscite Scheduled On **Broadening Membership Scope**

### Fraternity to Ballot on Elimination Of "Caucasian Only" from Constitution And Opening Rolls to Women

Decision to take a "by-mail" plebiscite of the entire membership of PAD on the question of opening the membership roll to non-caucasions and to women emerged at the 27th bi-annual convention in Los Angeles after a stormy debate in committee and considerable argument on the convention floor.

The committee on constitutional amendments, headed by Past Supreme Justice Rex Hardy of Los Angeles, revealed that 8 of 12 members favored conducting the plebiscite. A minority report signed by three of the committee asked immediate action and one member of the committee did not vote.

For the purpose of acting on the majority and minority reports Supreme Justice Frank M. Ludwig declared the convention a committee of the whole. Following this move the majority report was amended from the floor proposing that the membership rolls be brought up to date within six months and that within three months thereafter the plebiscite be conducted by mail.

The amendment also required that arguments be prepared for and against the proposal and that these arguments be limited to one thousand words and be submitted with the plebiscite ballots.

The arguments will be prepared by committees. Supreme Justice Douglas L. Edmunds said that each committee will consist of two members. One member an active chapter member and the other an alumni member. As this issue of the Reporter went to press the alumni members had not been appointed. Edward T. Defoe of Rapallo Chapter (N.Y. University) has been assigned to the committee preparing arguments against the proposals. Warren Christopher of Holmes Chapter (Stanford) has been assigned to

the committee supporting the proposals.

Upon the completion of the committee appointments by naming the alumni members, the committees will forthwith prepare the arguments accompanying the ballots and the plebiscite will go into the mail.

Chapter clerks must be prompt in mailing in form "D" and form "J", which is the annual report from the chapter giving not only member-ship but other pertinent informa-



## Report of Retiring Supreme Justice

By FRANK M. LUDWICK

The report of the Executive Secretary and the Supreme officers show that your fraternity is in an excellent condition. We are, I am sure, the top legal fraternity of the world. The reports do not, however, adequately show that vast amount of time, thought and work which have been expended to make this condition possible. We have tried to condense our reports in order to utilize time for convention work and activities. I will not elaborate on the reports you have received but will use this time to make a few observations as your retiring Supreme Justice, which I hope will be food for constructive thought.

This is, of course, our most important convention. We stand on the threshold of a great future. Now that the major portion of our reactivation and expansion program has been completed, it is the duty and the privilege of you delegates in convention assembled to lay the plans and policies of the future.

One of the most important prob-One of the most important prob-lems before you is a proposed amendment to that article in the Constitution setting forth the quali-fications for membership. As you have been heretofore advised, we have been prevented from the re-activation of a few of our good chapters because our Constitution restricted members to male stu-dents of the Caucasian race. We have been precluded from estab-lishing new chapters in other law schools for the same reason. The board of Regents of one university, board of Regents of one university, where we have a remarkably good chapter, have ruled that after a period of five years no professional fraternity may maintain a chapter in that university which has any restrictive membership qualifications based on race, color or religion. We are squarely confronted with the necessity of deciding whether we should depart from the fundamental principle upon which our fraternity was founded in 1902 or whether we should continue as in the past.

There are arguments on both sides of this question and it is one which has a tendency to arouse

which has a tendency to arouse emotions. It is my hope that this question will be considered dispassionately by the Constitution Com-

emotions. It is, my hope that this question will be considered dispassionately by the Constitution Committee, that consideration be given to the desires of our many thous and alumni and that the thought of the future of Phi Alpha Deltawill predominate in all of your discussions. It is also my hope that the solution to this perplexing question can be determined in committee and that extended debate upon the floor can be avoided.

The 26th Biennial Convention, held in Kansas City in December, 1946, amended the Constitution and increased the fumber of officers composing the Supreme Executive Board to seven members. A new office, that of Treasurer, was added and the duties of Supreme Secretary were in the main transferred to a paid, full-time executive secretary. ## Lawyers-All Members, Same Fraternity

By REX HARDY, Past Supreme Justice (A paper presented at a meeting of the Los Angeles Bar Association and Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, during the P.A.D. Convention at Los Angeles)

The principles of fraternalism are not new to the legal profession. I hazard the guess that it was an expression of fraternalism that sparked the profession into aggressive action when Henry III of England, late in the 13th Century, issued his decree prohibiting the holding of any schools of law within the City of London. These schools had been under clerical control, and a series of events, symtomatic of certain trends of policy in both Church and State, resulted in the breaking up of these metropolitan seminaries.

One of these events was the romulgation of a Papal Bull foroidding the clergy to teach the common law.—Henry's decree another. But when the old system of egal education was thus turned adrift another set of circumstances contributed to give it new anchorage. The enforcement of a clause in Magna Charta led to the establishment of the Court of Common Pleas at Westminster Hall, and to the concentration in its neighborhood of the judges and of men of law. Thus it came about quite naturally that a colony of lawyers settled down, and a group of hos-tels for the reception and educa-

## **Death Comes to Beloved Member** Carlos S. Hardy

Former Superior Court Judge Carlos S. Hardy of Los Angeles, a member of the legal profession for more than 62 years died July 29th, following an operation. He would have been 82 years old on Septem-ber 23rd. He was born in 1866 in Louisiana and spent his youth on a plantation in that state and on a ranch in Texas. Mr. Hardy attended the primary schools and at the age of 16 secured employment as an office boy for a law office where he worked and studied law for

Later he took a law course at the University of Texas and was admitted to practice in that State in June, 1886 at 20 years of age, youngest man ever admitted to the Texas Bar. He first practiced law in Austin and later moved to in Austin and later moved to Mexia, Texas, where he became city attorney

Judge Hardy was an honorary member of Ross Chapter (U.S.C.) for over 20 years and always took an active interest in the fraternity affairs. The former jurist held the degrees of Bachelor of Law, Master degrees of Bachelor of Law, Master of Law, and Doctor of Civil Law (DCL). He was the father of Rex Hardy, assistant City Attorney of Los Angeles in charge of Colorado River Matters, and a past Supreme Justice, and Oliver Hardy, an Attorney now a Captain in the Army in Germany, both former members of Ross Chapter.

ARTICLE V

Supreme Advisory Board

Sec. 1. Composition. Every Supreme Justice of this fraternity, upon his honorable retirement from office, shall ipso facto become a member of the Supreme Advisory Board.

Sec. 2. Duties. The duties of the Supreme Advisory Board shall be to guard and promote, and to advise Supreme Officers of this fraternity in relation to the traditions, ideals, policies and practices of

Sec. 3. Chairman. Promptly after the holding of a convention of this fraternity, the members of the Supreme Advisory Board shall, by mail, elect a chairman from among the board. The member receiving a plurality of votes shall be elected to serve until his successor is elected. A vacancy caused by death, resignation or otherwise, shall be filled in like manner. Such election shall be conducted by the Supreme Executive Board.

Sec. 4. Powers of the Chairman. The Chairman of the Supreme Advisory Board shall have the power to call a meeting of the board whenever, in his opinion, such meeting is necessary or advisable, and upon request of any three members of the Board, shall call such a meeting. In lieu of any meeting, its actions and recommendations may be determined by a mail solicitation by the Chairman.

### Reporter and Directory Calif. Lt. Governor Committee Report

March 23rd, in Room 3101 of the Hotel Biltmore, with nine of the eleven Committee members present. The Committee immediately rec-
