



Arthur Langlie, Dunbar Chapter, University of Washington, was elected Governor of the State of Washington, in the November 2, 1948 election.

Brother Langlie attended public school in Bremerton, Washington, and later enrolled in the University of Washington, He graduated from the University of Washington Law School in June, 1926 where he was a member of Dunbar Chapter and very active in the fraternal affairs. After nine years of private law practice, he began his career in public service first as a Seattle

public service first as a Seattle city councilman, then as Mayor of Seattle, and finally as Governor of the State of Washington.
