

CORDELL HULL CHAPTER INSTALLED

Supreme Justice Douglas L. Edmonds on July 29, 1949 installed Cordell Hull Chapter at Cumberland University, Leban-on, Tennessee with the initiation of 16 members in attendance at the University.

The initiation and installation of the Chapter was held in the Practice Court at the Law School followed by an initiation banquet in a downtown restaurant.

Supreme Justice Edmonds was the principal speaker at the banquet and he praised Cordell Hull in whose honor the Cumberland Chapter was named. "He is a great Tennessean and a great American" the speaker said, "We of Phi Alpha Delta are proud to add his name to our roster of chapters and pay trib-ute to his record."

Brother Albert Weeks, Morgan Chapter (University of Alabama) Dean of the Cumberland Law School and Toastmaster at the banquet, praised the installation of the chapter as "another step to better establish the purposes in the progress of Cumberland and aims of Phi Alpha Delta University.'



Brother and Justice Tom C. Clark

At the opening of the Fall session of the Supreme Court of the United States, Brother Tom Clark sat with his Brothers Burton, Douglas and Jackson and the other members of the court for the first time. Brother Clark not only has distinguished himself in the legal profession but has also distinguished himself in the activities of Phi Alpha Delta. The Chapter at the University of Texas, upon petitioning for a chapter, designated the name of its distignuished alumnus, Tom C. Clark, as its choice for a Chapter name. At this time Brother Clark was Attorney Gen-eral of the United States but the eyes of Texas were upon him and the petitioning group knew that in the not too distant future he would be elevated to the exalted position that he now

On August 8, 1947, when the Tom C. Clark Chapter was installed, the principal address was given by Brother Clark. He returned to the school from which he had graduated 25 years ago and was greeted by a delegation from the newly organized Chapter and Supreme Vice-Justice E. A. (Bert) Taylor, of Kansas City, who was the installing officer. Brother Clark's address was carried over a state-wide radio hook-up and was devoted almost exclusively to the fine doctrines, traditions and principles of Phi Alpha Delta and the influence which they bear upon a world-wide crusade in education for world citizenship.

Brother Clark, in his activities in Phi Alpha Delta, has exemplified that principle which is a part of our purpose "To Aid the Development of Fraternal Broth-erly Sentiments." During all of the time that Brother Clark has been in Washington, D. C., first in the Anti-Trust Division and then as Attorney-General, he has attended the functions of the Washington Alumni Chaper and has aided and assisted Taft and Jay Chapters in their rush-

Board Names Freer Justice District 12

Robert Elliott Freet, Chase Chapter, (University of Cincinnati), Washington, D.C., attorney and formerly chairman of the Federal Trade Commission, has been appointed by Supreme Justice Douglas L. Edmonds, with the consent of the Supreme Executive Board, as Justice of District 12, which encompasses the state of North Carolina, Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, New Jersey and the District of Columbia.

Brother Freer has been extremely active in PAD activities in Ohio and the District of Columbia for many years. A past-Justice of the Washington Alumni Chapter, he has worked closewith the Active Chapters in Washington, D.C., and Virginia and has assisted them on numerous occasions in securing speakers of national prominence for their programs. In October, 1948, the Charter initiates of Henry Chapter at the University of Richmond invited Brother Freer to deliver the principal address at their installation ceremonies as a mark of recognition for his long and faithful service to the fraternity.

Until Brother Freer retired as chairman of the Federal Trade Commission on January 1, 1949, to re-enter private legal practice, he served as a member of that commission since his appointment in 1935. A native of Ohio, Brother Freer received his A.B. degree from George Washington University, his LL.B. degree from the University of Cincinnati, and his LL.M. degree from the Washington College of Law, He was ad mitted to practice before the Ohio bar in 1917, and he is also admitted to practice before the bars of Virginia, the District of Columbia, and the U.S. Supreme

Wm. Copeland Appointed No. 9 Justice

Supreme Justice Douglas L. Edmonds, with the consent of the Supreme Executive Board, has appointed Wiliam J. Copeland, Watson Chapter (University of Pittsburgh), as District Justice of District 9

District Justice Copeland is an Assistant Trust Officer with the Peoples First National Bank & Trust Company, Pittsburgh, Pa., attached to the Estate Planning Department. He graduated from Penn State and then attended the University of Pittsburgh Law School. During the war he was with the United States Air Corps as Administrative Officer. While he was in attendance at the University of Pittsburgh he was active in fraternity affairs and was also a member of the Order of Coif. At the close of the war he assisted in the reactivation of Watson Chapter and also assisted in the reactivation of Pittsburgh Alumni Chapter. He became its first Alumni Justice after its reactivation.

Brother Copeland has devoted much of his time to the purposes and ideals of Phi Alpha Delta. As the Justice of the Pittsburgh Alumni Chapter he planned and carried out social and educational projects. The Pittsburgh Chapter had closely cooperated with Watson Chapter in its reactivation. The Alumni Chapter, under his supervision, took up the immediate project of an active Placement Bureau directed primarily to helping the graduates from the University of Pittsburgh and Watson Chapter.

On May 27, 1949, under his supervision, the Pittsburgh Alumni Chapter and Watson Chapter of Supreme Justice Douglas Edmonds who was visiting Pittsburgh at that time.

The untimely death of Brother Justice Wiley B. Rutledge of the United States Supreme Court on the evening of Saturday, September 10, 1949, brought to a close an outstanding and brilliant career in the legal profession and also terminated a life of devotion and service to Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity which began with his initiation into Gunter Chapter (University of Colorado) in 1920.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

The March, 1934 issue of the Climaxes California 'Reporter" was dedicated to Past Supreme Justice George E. Fink. The article carried in that issue of the "Reporter" about Brother Fink titled him "The Grand Old Man of the Fraternity."

History records that Brother Fink secured his preliminary education in Illinois and completed a 3-year law course in the Illinois College of Law and attended the University of Michigan Law Schol in 1899 and 1900, and was admitted to the Illinois Bar in 1900. He is a member of Story Chapter at DePaul University in Chicago and Campbell Chapter at the University of Michigan. He was a delegate to the Conventions held in 1907, 1908, 1912 and 1921, and had missed only one National Convention between 1907 and 1934. He was Supreme Treasurer in 1907 and 1908 and Tribunes in 1921. He was Supreme Justice in 1923, Chief Trib une in 1926, and member of the the Supreme Advisory Board of the Fraternity.

He secured the charter for the Chicago Alumni Chapter of which he was president in 1911 and 1912. He did preliminary work for the establishment of the Chapters at Illinois Western University, University of Maine, Yale University and the University of Colorado. He installed Martin Chapter at Tulane University, Wiley Chapter at the University of West Virginia, Watson Chapter at Pittsburgh University and Wilson Chapter at Cornell University.

The editor in the 1934 issue stated that "while it is comparatively easy to list the offices he has held, it is impossible to recite the good deeds he has done in his constant, loyal and tireless service. As he has sown, he now reaps the wealth of admiration, love and affection from the entire Fraternity."

At the George E. Fink night of the Chicago Alumni Chapter held on February 20, 1934, over a hundred members gathered to honor Brother Fink. In addition to those present, telegrams and letters were received from his Brothers throughout the country.

Today, as of 15 years ago, Past Supreme Justice Fink is held high in the esteem of his Fraternity Brothers, accentuated by the additional years of service in the fraternity. More appropriate words are not available than those used in the 1934 article to describe Brother Fink.
