



Honorary Initiation at Alden Chapter

John Lord O'Brian Hall on the Amherst campus of University at Buffalo was the setting for a presentation entitled: "Race, Law and Politics in America: Have We Become a PostRacial Society?". The presenter was John A. Payton, President and Director Counsel of the NAACP Legal Defense and Education Fund. The audience was made up of law students, professors and attorneys with an interest in what this engaging gentleman had to say about the lingering questions of race in our society

Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity was on hand as well to bestow one of its highest honors upon Mr. Payton - Honorary Membership, which is reserved for those among us who attain an "unusual distinction" in the field of law on at least a "statewide basis." The process begins with a Petition for Honorary membership filed with the Executive Office on behalf of the honoree. The Executive Office then distributes a ballot to the Fraternity's nine members of the International Executive Board for its determination of the candidate's achievements and the Petition's merit A majority vote of the IEB is required to bestow Honorary membership. Carlos C. Alden Chapter at University at Buffalo Law School submitted such a petition in the weeks leading up to Mr. Payton's appearance at UB.

International Vice Justice Ronald J. Winter, himself a 1981 graduate of the law school, was on hand to provide the an Honorary Key and membership certificate to Mr. Payton on October 22, 2009. He was joined for the presentation by Alden Chapter Justice Dan Lesniewski and Clerk Mike Donlon.


for Success" fashion show.






Story Chapter 5th Annual Founder's Day Auction

- 2. Find Common Peers: Now that you have created your profile, it is very easy for you to find other students that you have a commonality, whether it is the institutions you've attended or courses you are currently taking. For instance, let's say you are a law student and you want to find other students in your law school. Simply click on your law school and the database will automatically find those other students that attend your law school. This is beneficial for creating public and private study groups.
- 3. Create a Study Group: Now that you are able to locate other students that you have something in common with you may now want to begin networking, in more of a serious way, with those students. How about creating your own private study group with a few students? To do so perform the following: click Groups-Create

- a Group. Then enter the group name, description, designation and invitees. It's that simple. Now that you have created your study group you are able to share content with your study group members. One of the most beneficial ways of sharing content is through My Library.
- **4. My Library:** Allow your study group members to see your Library. The eCasebriefs.com site allows you to create a complete library of all content important for your classes. Once you are logged into your account access any content within the site a brief, outline, exam prep, etc. To do this, notice at the top of the item are the words Add to My Library in blue and click it. Now, in your profile under My Library you will see that course added and if you click it you will notice the item that you saved. When prospective LSAT takers first encounter the Logic Games section, they are often baffled by the complexity of the rules and the unusual nature of the questions. Even after taking several sections and practicing for a few weeks, the typical student still runs out of time and cannot complete all of the questions, let alone answer each question correctly. Not surprisingly, this situation can cause test takers to dread the Logic Games section. Unfortunately, many students carry that feeling with them to the actual LSAT, and the resulting stress and anxiety can hinder their performance, ultimately creating the very result they feared most: poor LSAT performance.

The good news is that while the Logic Games section may initially be daunting, you can learn techniques and methods that will dramatically improve your performance. Why is this true? Because in order to preserve a basic level of test consistency over time, the Games section repeats the same types of game structures and rules. If you learn how to best represent those elements and how to make the inferences that typically follow from certain situations, you can quickly and consistently set up games and solve the questions. Most importantly, you can attack the Games with confidence and a feeling of power and control. Let's look at an example drawn from the *PowerScore LSAT Logic Games Bible*, which details a comprehensive methodology for solving any type of Logic Game. The example discusses a type of inference that the LSAT frequently requires test takers to make.

Please take a moment to review this scenario and answer the corresponding question:

Sample game scenario:

Five variables—A, B, C, D, and E—are divided into two groups: a group of three and a group of two.

Rules: A and B cannot be in the same group. C and D must be in the same group.

Question: Which one of the following cannot be false?

- (A) A must be in the group of two.
- (B) B must be in the group of two.
- (C) C must be in the group of two.
- (D) D must be in the group of two.
- (E) E must be in the group of two.

Solution:

Because A and B cannot be in the same group, we know that one member of this pair must be in the group of three and the other must be in the group of two. But, we cannot be certain exactly which group includes A, and which includes B. The best way to handle this uncertainty is to "reserve" a space in each group for the choice of A or B. This should be shown as an A/B dual-option:

A/B B/A

3

2

This leaves only one remaining space in the group of two, and it follows that the CD block must then be placed into the group of three. Since this fills all the available spaces in the group of three, E must then fill the remaining space in the group of two:

D C E A/B B/A 3 2

Again, although it cannot be determined exactly in which group A or B is placed, the fact that a space must be reserved in each group affects the other variables, and in spite of the A/B uncertainty we can conclude that C and D must be in the group of three and E must be in the group of two. Consequently, because E must be in the group of two, answer choice (E) cannot be false (which means the same thing as "must be true"), and (E) is correct. Note that even the "cannot be false" wording of the answer choice is designed to slow you down, but that you can learn to move faster through such language with practice.

This powerful technique can be used in many different games, and it attacks a concept frequently used by the test makers. In games, during the placement of variables, in many situations you cannot determine the exact variables being selected, but you can "leap" that uncertainty to determine the placement or selection of other variables.

Although this is a simplified example, it shows the type of reasoning required to perform well on certain games. Once you have seen a few examples of this type, when you encounter them on a real game, your ability to quickly solve the problem increases dramatically. 





As classes start and chapters resume their usual activity, I would like to address our three most commonly asked questions.

Why do we have Open Membership? Phi Alpha Delta is very proud to be the first law fraternity to:

- Welcome members of all religions;
- Welcome members of all races;
- Welcome members of both genders; and
- Create an undergraduate program and welcome them as members.

The very founding of Phi Alpha Delta was a result of a ruling by the Supreme Court of Illinois seeking to exclude individuals.

During the 2008 International Convention, a change was made to the International Constitution and By-Laws that removed the ability for Law, Pre-Law and Alumni chapters to restrict membership. To join P.A.D. a person must:

1. Submit their membership application;

- 2. Submit their International Initiation Fee, and pay any applicable local chapter dues;
- 3. Be a student in good standing (as defined by the school's policy)at a school where a P.A.D. Chapter is installed;
- 4. Be initiated by participating in the Membership Initiation Ceremony.

The second most asked question is what type of programming should we have?

The purpose of our Pre-Law Program is to provide our members with the opportunity to use our materials and chapter programming to make an informed decision about what a Juris Doctor degree will enable them to do. For those who decide that they wish to pursue that degree, our materials and programming should also help prepare them for the LSAT and law school and their future career.

We expect our chapters to hold programs that are heavily geared towards academic and professional development.





It's easy to become very confused and frustrated when reading the articles that are EVERYWHERE regarding personal finance: whether to refinance your mortgage, whether to consolidate debt, whether to use index funds or exchange traded funds, whether to put your money in plastic wrap before burying it in the backyard, or whether you should get in before the boom in silver (gold is so last quarter). These are all valid considerations when examining your financial "health." But when you're just trying to get a handle on things for the first time, or perhaps for the 50th time, and you just need some broad perspective, it is hard to know where to turn.

I want to talk about a high-level view of personal finance; a view into which all of the good advice fits, but one that can help you reorient yourself when you've lost the forest for the trees.

There was a Far Side comic written in the '80s with a picture of Einstein standing in front of a board full of equations, with the caption "Einstein discovers that time is actually money." This comic highlights the two most important resources we have: time and money. I had a professor at Duquesne University who said that our objective in life is to sell as little time for as much money as we can. I would refine that a bit to say that our goal should be to have as much of both as we desire, by selling as much or as little time for as much money as possible.

So we are faced with one fundamental question: how do we make

both our time and our money work for us? You've already got a handle on how you can make your time more valuable, as you're in law school (no comments from the peanut gallery, please). But it is very important not to lose sight of this objective after we graduate. There will always be opportunities for us to augment our skills, either through CLE or other professional designations.

So my first point is this: actively seek ways to make your time more valuable to others. Your time is your inventory. Take all reasonable, and some unreasonable, steps to protect it and make it as valuable as you can. In the end, it really is your most important asset.

Our second consideration is one that is hard to remember when we are so broke we are deciding how much gas we can buy and still afford razor blades to shave before the interview we have in a few days (a past personal example). That consideration is the best use of the money that we have on hand. What is the best lever, for lack of a better term, to use to put our money to work for us to augment our work efforts? Most of the financial advisors you meet have that title next to their names because of their job, and not because of some professional designation. Most have a vested interest in keeping you focused on equity investing believing that the best use of your cash is to invest it. This is for two reasons: first, they make their money this way, and second, it is what they focus on all the time. To quote an old stockbroker adage, asking some financial advisors about an investment strategy that does not make them money can be like asking your wife if your girlfriend is attractive.

My broad point is this — opportunities to grow your money are all around you. With the turmoil in the markets, everyone is thinking that their way is the best way for you to have the kind of wealth you want. Don't put blinders on and think that if you don't invest in the market you'll never meet your financial objectives. Investing in your education and your profession may yield even more than the stock market for you. So could buying a business or starting your own practice. The idea is to keep your eyes open for all opportunities.

The financial services industry has made investing an emotional endeavor. It should not be. Get emotional about being disciplined and pursuing your goals, but do not get emotional about the nuts and bolts of your strategy, and don't get caught up in the moodswings of the market. This can be difficult: when you're up to your armpits in alligators, it's difficult to remember that your first objective is to drain the swamp.

Next time: who should be your advisor?

Your chapter programs should provide members with an understanding about:

- LSDAS/LSAC;
- the LSAT;
- Writing effective personal statements;
- Getting letters of recommendation
 - Law school;
- Traditional and non-traditional careers in the law by bringing in speakers from the P.A.D. Network!

Please remember that a chapter can and should plan to hold many of the same events, or at least same types of events, multiple times during the year. Why? Well, you'll be bringing in new members over the course of the year and they'll be interested in learning more about these areas. Plus you're likely to have some current members who missed a program due to scheduling conflicts, illness or the like.

Chapters also need to hold at least one initiation each semester at the bare minimum. Each time you bring in new a member, remember to add him or her to a committee. You'll have additional help and possibly someone who will become a future chapter leader!

We're very proud of our chapters' community service efforts as well (our combined chapters donated over one million dollars to their respective local and national charities last year!) and expect each chapter to hold at least one community service event each semester as such.

Our Pre-Law Program has hundreds of great examples of unique and exciting programs and we would love to have you share what you're doing. If your chapter is holding a program that you want to tell us about, please email us at info@pad.org and tell us about it!

The third most asked question is: *How do we recruit new members?*

Whether you realize it or not, everything your chapter does is a recruitment event. However, there are some basics that make up every event that will help your recruiting efforts.

Publicity – As mentioned, every event you hold is part of your recruiting

effort. When people see that a chapter is active and holding programs, including **members only programs**, they will be far more willing to join. Lack of publicity subsequently leads to the perception of the chapter as a low profile, do-little organization with minimal name recognition that also leads to low recruiting results.

An Interested Student and membership email blast is an integral part of your recruitment process. Every time your chapter has an event or sets up a recruitment table, the chapter should collect the names of everyone who stops by on the "Interested Student Sheet" which can be found in the chapter recruitment box and online at www.pad.org under the Pre-Law Chapters and Downloads section. After the event or recruitment table, take the names and emails of each person that signed the interest sheet and put them into an email list. Then, whenever the chapter is holding the next program, simply email the details of the upcoming event to the people that are already in your list.

Ask the students who have shown interest in P.A.D. to join! The number one reason that individuals do not join an organization or fraternity is because NO ONE ASKED THEM! There are several methods to ask someone to join, and each chapter should utilize them in order to maximize its recruiting success.

Use the personal approach. During events, chapter officers and members should take the time to get to know the students who have indicated an interest in P.A.D. As the initiation deadline approaches, have each officer or member contact the interested students and ask them to personally join. One of the nicest things a chapter can do is to give a formal invitation to each student who has indicated an interest in P.A.D. Chapters that use this method will experience a significant increase in the number of new initiates. In addition, this method is greatly appreciated by students and instantly increases the sense of fraternalism that we aim for in all our actions in P.A.D.

Judge Leighton thereafter moved to Chicago and has risen to the top of the legal profession as a Illinois Circuit Court, Appellate Court, and U.S. District Court Judge. He continues, at age 97, to work every day at Neal & Leroy, LLC, where he is Of Counsel.

Brother Franchini received his BBA degree from the University of New Mexico, and his JD from Georgetown University, where he joined the Taft Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta. He was admitted to practice in 1960 in New Mexico. Brother Franchini spent 32 years as a trial lawyer, six years as a District Judge and 12 years on the New Mexico Supreme Court. Brother Franchini retired from the high court in 2002. His immediate survivors include his wife of 40 years, Gylnnnie, and four children.
