

Law Ops Review By Jon Bassford, Director of Law Operations

First of all, thank you for your hard work this past semester. We had an incredible fall semester! It could not have happened without the efforts of our Chapter Officers, District Justices, and other Key Volunteers.

As spring semester is rolling in, it's time to plan for officer elections and transitions. Chapters need to start their officer transitions *now* before elections even occur.

In the fall, I discussed getting the most out of your membership by giving your members "something to do." This is especially true for individuals that are looking to step into leadership roles within your Chapter. If the membership already has an idea of who will be running for officer positions, the Chapter needs to get them involved and put them in a leadership role. Some of the most common ways to do this is to have them chair a committee, oversee a program or event, and attend meetings. The current Executive Board could even open up portions of their Executive Board meetings to these interested members.

The same applies if YOU are looking to become an officer. Become an active part in the Chapter. Make sure that you reach out to the Executive Board and see what you can do to aid in Chapter Operations. You will find that the Executive Board will welcome the support.

The best way to jump start this process is to have an "Officer Interest Meeting" at the beginning of the semester where the Executive Board:

- Invites members who are interested in becoming leaders
- Has all current officers in attendance
- Discusses their positions
- Answers members' questions
- Assigns projects

Prior to the meeting, the Executive Board should discuss projects in which they need assistance. Have the members indicate which project(s) they would like to work on and make assignments. Give each individual or group realistic goals and a time frame in which to complete their task. The Executive Board should assign a current officer to oversee the project and help as a resource person.

By jump-starting the transition process, your Chapter will have elections with informed and active candidates. This allows the new Executive Board to takeover with minimal interruption.


All in all the District X Event was a great success!

The close of the fall semester does not mean that recruitment activity in your Chapter ceases for the year. Quite the contrary; you need to gear up now—as the spring semester approaches—to capture those students who declined to join P.A.D. in the fall.

Our chapters are built and strengthened through new membership. The greater the number of students you have in your chapter, the greater the number of ideas for programming, the greater the number of student volunteers you have to carry them out, and the lesser the burden you have on your existing members to "do everything." Seeking new members, and thus new energy, should be at the top of your priority list each semester, month and week of the year.

We had an outstanding fall recruitment period, thanks to your strong efforts across the country. It is tempting to sit back now and assume that everyone who wanted to join P.A.D. this year has done so. That would likely be an incorrect assumption.

This year, we need to focus on recruiting not one-third of

what we did in the fall, but fully one-half of our fall effort. That means that the numbers will shift to a 2/3 Fall vs. 1/3 Spring ratio. We can do it. And if we do, we will eclipse the 6,000 mark this year at the law school level for the first time ever! We have already enrolled over 4,500 law students into P.A.D. during the Fall 2010 academic semester. If we can reach half of that number again in the spring, we will have our new recruiting record.

How to do this, you ask? I have several pieces of advice for you:

- (1) Go back to the list of "interested" students who signed up in the fall to learn more about Phi Alpha Delta. Did all of them join your chapter in the fall? I didn't think so. That is your first place to look for spring recruits.
- (2) How about those students you spoke to in the fall who declined to sign the list because they knew they wouldn't join, for one of several reasons (first law school semester; no money; no interest in a fraternity, etc.)? Why not reach out to them now to remind them that:
 - (a) they survived the first semester of school,
 - (b) they've had nearly 20 weeks to scrape together the initiation fee, and
 - (c) the chapter has done some outstanding things during the fall which should encourage them to join and be a part of it?
- (3) At your first general membership meeting of the spring semester, encourage your members to recruit their friends, study partners, classmates, etc. to join Phi Alpha Delta. Utilize existing members and the fall programming calendar to make an argument for why others should consider reaping the benefits of P.A.D. membership.
- (4) If your community does not have an alumni chapter, or it has gone inactive, recruit some of your members to form an alumni committee to contact members of the legal community about starting up an
 - alumni chapter. This is another incentive for students to become involved in P.A.D.: the prospect of meeting real lawyers who can help them obtain employment/assimilate into the legal community/ give them an outlet for social networking in the area, post-graduation.

We have said it before, and you've heard it many times: Recruitment is a year-round activity. Now go out there and do it!

Just my advice.

Wormser Holds Concert to Fight Breast Cancer







Leadership Symposia Attendance: This past fall over two hundred officers and future Chapter leaders attended first eight Leadership Symposia. The final four Leadership Symposia will be held from the end of January through February. The Spring Leadership Symposia will be held in Houston, TX; Chapel Hill, NC; Tucson, AZ; and Atlanta, GA. If you are an officer at a Chapter within four hours driving distance of any of those locations you are expected to attend. If you are interested in becoming an officer next year, plan on attending as well!

Recruitment: Chapters need to be prepared to resume holding Chapter meetings and recruiting new members the within a week of the beginning of the new semester. the required number is twenty-five.) The chapter is required to meet a minimum of two times per year, conduct annual elections, and pay an annual chapter tax to the fraternity of \$100. Past International Justice J. Derek Hill (Hull) Promoted to Brigadier General

Clive resident Col. J. Derek Hill, Chief of Staff for the Iowa Air National Guard, was promoted to Brigadier General on Nov. 5 at Joint Forces Headquarters, Iowa National Guard, Johnston, Iowa.

Hill began his military career in May 1985 when he received a direct appointment as an officer in the United States Air Force. After completing the Judge Advocate Staff Officer Course in September 1985, he was assigned to Little Rock Air Force Base ("AFB"), Arkansas, where he served as Chief of Civil Law, Chief of Military Justice and Deputy Staff Judge Advocate.

In January 1988, Hill was assigned to the Trial Judiciary and attached to Lowry AFB, Colorado where he served as a Circuit Trial Counsel through July 1990. Hill was one of 21

Circuit Trial Counsel personnel worldwide and in the course of that assignment, trained more than 200 Air Force attorneys in litigation skills while achieving a 95% success rate as lead counsel in the prosecution of complex litigation. He prosecuted more than 150 trials and adversarial hearings in a 12-state, 17-base area.

In July 1990, Hill joined the Air Force Reserve where he continued to serve as Circuit Trial Counsel until relocating in 1995 to St. Croix in the U.S. Virgin Islands. While there, he was attached to Headquarters, U.S. Special Operations Command, MacDill AFB, Florida. Hill served in this capacity until November 1997 when he was appointed Staff Judge Advocate for the U.S. Virgin Islands National Guard.

In 2003, he transferred to the Iowa Air National Guard as Special Projects Officer for The Adjutant General. Hill was selected as the Director of Staff for the Iowa Air National Guard in 2005 and has also served in various positions on the Iowa National Guard Joint Staff, most recently as the Chief of the Joint Staff.

Hill's military awards and decorations include: the Meritorious Service Medal (four awards), Joint Service Commendation Medal, Air Force Commendation Medal, Army Commendation Medal, Joint Meritorious Unit Award, Air Force Outstanding Unit Award, National Defense Service Medal with service star (two awards), Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Air Force Longevity Service Award (five awards), and Armed Forces Reserve Medal with Silver Hourglass (more than 20 years' service).

Hill is a native of Childersburg, Ala. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in Finance from the University of South Alabama, earned a Doctor of Jurisprudence from the Cumberland School of Law in Birmingham, Ala., and also attended the University of Florida Graduate Tax School. Hill is admitted to practice law in Alabama and Colorado and before numerous federal courts. He is a graduate of Squadron Officer School, Air War College and Joint and Combined Warfighting School.

He has been a proud and decicated member of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International, since his intitiation into the Hull Chapter in 1979. Brother Hill has held a variety of positions in that organization, including International Justice from 2006-2008. Hill also serves as a member of the board of directors of the Iowa Health Foundation.

Hill and his wife, Rhonda, reside in Clive with their West Highland Terrier, Kasha.






Fall 2010 Initiation at the University of Cincinnati



The Research Process for Law Study

Back when I attended law school the law research process was quite simple. Basically the process worked as follows; go to the books. Well, a lot has happened since then. Now all of the books are on line. 


