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Message from the International Justice

For as long as I can remember, I have heard Phi Alpha Delta referred to as a "Fraternity of Firsts". It was, you will recall, an innovator in many ways: the first law fraternity to remove the Caucasian-only clause; first to admit women, culminating in a merger with Phi Delta Delta, the largest women's law fraternity; first to expand

beyond the borders of the continental United States with Chapters in Canada and Mexico; first to partner with the federal government in a program aimed at providing law-related education to K-12 students; and the first to include undergraduate students through its Pre-Law Program initiative.

We have continued to be a leader in other ways. Phi Alpha Delta was the first law fraternity to permit on-line applications. Law student membership has surged in recent years partly because of that technological innovation.

Technology has allowed us to be innovative in other ways, including digital "attendance" at recent district leadership conferences in Florida and Arizona. We intend to do an entire such conference in Indiana in the near future, saving cost and time in permitting attendees to remain in their location while we bring the conference - and its attendant leadership and other skills - to the participants.

Our Pre-Law Program was witness to another "fraternity first" in late August: the first "virtual" Chapter was chartered at American Public University. Now a whole new population of potential law students can learn about law school, its application process and the practice of law via web-based technology.

Webster's defines innovation as "the introduction of something new; a new idea, method or device". Hasn't P.A.D. been innovative for all of its nearly 111 years of existence? Haven't we trotted out new and exciting ways to do things during our entire history? Why stop now?

P.A.D. is on the cutting edge of new technology in its website development that will provide education-driven learning portals for our student and alumni members to access with the push of a button. Skill-sets necessary to successfully traverse the legal landscape will be available for those seeking answers. Interviewing skills, time and stress management, courtroom techniques, debt avoidance and leadership dynamics are but a few of the topics being explored for delivery to our members. The future is now, the innovations are here.

It is a great time to be a P.A.D. member. Have your friends and colleagues join us! We will soon unveil our newest technological advances. As we enter the second year of this biennium we do so as the world's foremost law fraternity, and our innovative approach will keep us steps ahead of the competition for decades to come.

A History of Innovation

When I think of the term 'innovation' I think of fresh ideas and unprecedented ways of doing things. This issue details many experiences from P.A.D.s on innovative Fraternity operations. When starting this issue, I thought not only how Chapters are using innovation regularly but how alumni are using it in their legal practice.

Lawyers from thousands of years ago were obviously practicing under different conditions and laws. Some may say innovation should not be part of legal practice; the two together render an oxymoron.

However, use your historical, lawyer predecessors as a reminder that innovation has brought legal practice to where it is today. If it weren't for a history of innovation, we as legal professionals may still be scribing deeds.

In 1897, the Law Student League was formed whose members sought exemption from the provisions of "Rule 39" which required all

candidates for admission to the Bar to be graduates of high school, followed by three years of legal study and to successfully pass the bar exam. With innovative minds, they sought modification to exclude those who began the study of law before the adoption of this rule. The following year, Lambda Epsilon Law Fraternity was born. From there, Phi Alpha Delta was formed

in 1902 when innovation was established as one of our core values.

Discussed in later articles in this issue, the term 'innovation' is not necessarily interchangeable with technology. It is a common perception that law firms investing in technology and new approaches to daily tasks will make

work less time consuming, thus fewer billable hours resulting in raised rates and fewer clients. Keep in mind that this efficiency creates more time, which is positive. This new time creates room for more clients, which negates the 'fewer billable hours' rationalization for not being innovative.

However, innovation in your profession shouldn't solely be the way you're doing the work. It should be the way you market yourself (or your practice), gain clients and work effectively with others. Marketing and innovation suggestions are throughout this issue next to images of a purple light bulb.

Innovation and the legal profession work together; the proof is in our history as lawyers. Doing business today is about new ideas and improving efficiency. Sometimes this may be a challenge for law firms as they are steeped in tradition. Challenge tradition and open your mind to a world of new ideas.

Space Law Takes Off

The University of Mississippi School of Law launched an LL.M. program in Air and Space Law this fall, joining the University of Nebraska as the only other Space Law program in the U.S. University of Nebraska, meanwhile, announced a doctorate of judicial sciences degree (J.S.D.) in Space Law.

The University of Mississippi, which bills itself as a world leader in air and space law education, research,

and public service, will offer the only LL.M. program in the U.S. that covers both air and space law. The University of Nebraska program focuses on Space, Cyber and Telecommunications Law.

Like its Nebraska counterpart, the University of Mississippi program will be offered online as well as on campus. It is designed for both U.S. and foreign-trained law school graduates and is available on a part-time and full-time basis. Mississippi has been home to the National Center for Remote Sensing, Air, and Space Law since 1999 and the Journal of Space Law since 2003.

Students will be required to complete six core courses:
Comparative National Space Law, International Space
Law, Private International Air Law, Public International
Air Law, U.S. Aviation Law, and U.S. Space Law. Electives
are available in International Telecommunication Law
and Space Security Law. The School publishes the Journal
of Space Law and has a comprehensive collection of air and
space law materials.

The University of Nebraska's J.S.D. program will break new ground as the only doctoral-level space law program in the U.S, said Matthew Schaefer, professor of law and director of the college's Space, Cyber and Telecommunications Law program.

"This additional degree offering, much like the launch of the online LL.M., is going to widen opportunities for experienced lawyers and legal scholars to delve into very intricate and complex issues facing the regulation of outer space activities in an in-depth manner," Schaefer said.


Nebraska has offered its LL.M. for five years, with graduates of the one-year program moving into careers for private companies like SpaceX; for civilian agencies like the State Department and NASA Jet Propulsion Lab; for military operations such as the U.S. Cyber Command and Space Operations at Vandenberg Air Force Base; as well as for think tanks, consultants and law firms.

Research-focused and dissertation-based, the J.S.D. program in essence will require students to write a book about an aspect of space law, such as regulation of satellite communications or liability issues relating to commerce in space. Students will play a pioneering role in developing the field of space law.

Schaefer said he expects one or two students to join the J.S.D. program each year. It likely will take two to three years to complete the degree. Professor Frans von der Dunk will supervise the J.S.D. students with support from Schaefer and assistant professor Jack Beard.



He further speaks on how perspective is a key to not only



SCRIP Fundraising

The Twin City Alumni Chapter (TCAC) initiated innovative operations this year, one of which includes the use of SCRIP, an innovative fundraising tool. SCRIP is an online fundraising group (shopwithscrip.com) that allows the Chapter to sell gift cards to places such as grocery stores, gas stations, retailers, and restaurants. The Chapter receives a percentage of the gift card sales that our members may use to fund their trip to the 2014 Convention, or to build their operating fund. The program is available only to nonprofit groups, has no up-front costs for the Chapter, and creates great potential for fundraising.

Square **Payments**

Houston Chapter started using Square which creates the opportunity to collect credit card payments immediately through a smart phone. Keeping sign-up forms on hand and using the Square virtually eliminates the need for potential new member meetings and creates a streamlined approach that is more

convenient.

Innovation Through Delegation

This year, our executive board worked with our six committee chairpersons by using a chain of command system. Traditionally, our Chapter President would meet individually with each board member and committee chairperson. The problem with this model is that it was time consuming. With our new system, it's easier to produce ideas and responsibilities are fulfilled efficiently. In this new tiered model, the chairpersons report to specific officers who then report to the President. The e-board meets once a month and communicate daily via GroupMe and email. This system has increased productivity and helped triple initiates.

Delegation

Delegation is the transfer of tasks from a leader to a follower that enables the follower to act. Appointing "good men" as committee chairpersons has been vital to productivity and innovation in our Chapter. Delegation includes outlining specific expectations, providing chairpersons with resources and allowing them to decide how they want to implement those tasks. We have learned from several talks with Director of Pre-Law Operations, Byron Rupp, the power of the question: "Can you do one thing for me?" It opens the door for followership and begins to establish trust and reliability.

Self-Restraint

Roosevelt's approach to self-restraint is synonymous with delegation. In my term as Historian, I learned and encouraged board members to know that the goal of leadership is not to make you look good. Helping others figure out their strengths and allowing them to explore

their ideas are more important to leadership. If you are struggling with this and end up being the leader that does all the work, the following tips may work for you.

- Remind each member of what they are expected to do in specific, quantifiable guidelines. For example, be present at all Chapter meetings but notify officers at least 2 hours before if you can't be present; hold others accountable with clear, specific and written guidelines.
- 2. Find out what your followers are good at and what they want to do in P.A.D. I learned that my service chairs had experience planning events so I asked them both to write down three things they wanted to do. There will be a higher level of dedication to the project if the members are doing what they are interested in.
- 3. Keep your distance and encourage them to explore new ideas.

If you must interfere, ask questions that are resource based such as "Do you have everything that you will need to plan this?" When I had the urge to interfere, I would remind myself that students are just as intelligent as I am and that they can do it just as well as me. This has helped me delegate tasks and promote innovation.




Book Reviews




Innovation Online





Is Technology the Answer?

By Byron Rupp (Director of Pre-Law Operations, Benson Chapter) As I enter my 20th year as a P.A.D. member, and my 15th as an employee of the Fraternity, it is hard to believe the changes and innovations that have occurred in a short time. The ability to communicate between Chapters and the Executive Office, the opportunities to network, and the quality and quantity of programs available to all members due to technological innovations is simply amazing! The key to successful innovation though remains that it be a valuable, thought-out addition, instead of just change for change sake.

Too often these days we mistake 'new' and 'easy' for 'better' which is not always the case. Innovation the right way

The reason P.A.D. is strong today is that we have not been afraid to innovate while incorporating what has made us successful. Student Chapters initiate around 9,000 new members annually and the number of active Alumni and Law Chapters continues to grow! Why? Chapters and members have been able to incorporate the newest technologies available to us while still utilizing the tried and true methods.

An example of Chapters innovating without technology is incorporating the initiation ceremony to include an initial committee meeting. Since there is a place in the ceremony for this already, Chapters have identified a great opportunity to immediately engage new members! Chapters doing this have the initiate sign the Chapter Roll, receive their membership certificate and pin, handshake and then



sign up for the committee they will be serving on. Why? The simple answer is, 'you get out of P.A.D. what you put into it.'

A member who joins P.A.D. for a line on their resume gets exactly that, three letters and nothing more. Alumni and law schools are not impressed that you belong to P.A.D.

unless you can also demonstrate that you took an active role in your Chapter. A member who signs up and serves on a committee, leads a committee or serves as an officer not only has this unmatched opportunity to develop their leadership, organizational and timemanagement skills, but get to do so in a way that helps others (and the Fraternity) at the same time!

Innovating without changing who we are

As we discuss during New Officer Orientation Calls, the Pre-Law Conference and Leadership Symposia, the most successful Chapters are also the most introspective. Whenever a Chapter program is held, regardless of how much of how successful or not the event was, the officers and committee members involved need to meet quickly. During that meeting they must analyze what worked, what didn't, and why.

Chapters and members need to continue to innovate in the ways that we let people know who we are, what we are doing and how we can help them. There is nothing wrong with adopting new methods, or incorporating new and old techniques and technologies. However, the one thing we can never change is our focus of Providing Service to the Student, the School, the Profession



and the Community. It doesn't get any better than that!





"Above the Curve!"

The first year in law school is overwhelming to many students. It's often full of confusion, panic, and sleepless nights. P.A.D. understands the 1L experience and our Chapter decided to ease some of the confusion and panic—the sleepless nights, however, are out of our hands!

On September 24th, Fletcher Chapter organized a Student Success Panel that consisted of nine students who signed up for substantive classes in their first semester (Torts, Contracts, Criminal Law, Property). Setting new standards, the Advocacy Center at the University of Florida

Levin College of Law was filled with over 100 first year students looking to get "above the curve."

The student panelists shared their personal exam strategies for obtaining the highest scores in each exam. Among the many recommendations, outlining, practicing, and talking to professors were the most emphasized. The panelists explained that outlining organizes the material learned in class and practicing with problems or previous exams allows students to put their knowledge to the test—before the actual final exam. The panelist recommended that students talk to professors because it allows the student to get a personalized understanding of the material covered in class. Furthermore, it also enables the students to understand how the professor thinks and their expectations on the exam. The entire panel recommended that the first year students attend the Law Review tutoring offered for all first year substantive courses.

The panel also offered other pointers that many students overlook during a high time-pressure exam. A careful reading of the exam instructions and the fact pattern were the top recommendations. Specifically, many of the panelists recommended students to read the exam fact pattern at least twice before writing an answer. The panelists explained that because law school examinations require analysis and application of rules, outlining an exam answer produces an organized and concise answer. Following the Student Success Panel, P.A.D. organized a small social where 1L, 2L, and a few 3L students shared refreshments while discussing exam preparation.

Crowdsource for new ideas.

P.A.D. understands that the first year law school experience is overwhelming and believes in demystifying law school exams. The Student Success Panel event was created to help P.A.D. members get above the curve.







The Road to Most Improved

Engle Chapter needed an image facelift. It was fall 2011 and Engle Chapter was in a rut the size of a \$3,000 debt. By spring 2012, the debt was gone, but so were the members. Elizabeth Smutz and I, as 1L students and new members, made it our goal to improve our Chapter's image and operations at the University of the Pacific, McGeorge School of Law.

The 59th Biennial Convention in August 2012 was our turning point. Sister Smutz and I, as Justice and Vice Justice, had both come from strong Pre-Law Chapters, at the University of San Diego and the University of Arizona, respectively. We knew how a successful Pre-Law Chapter should be run, but a Law School Chapter would be an entirely different endeavor. Engle Chapter was starting the year with \$75 in the bank, a reluctant board, and a handful of active members. At Convention, we took the opportunity to talk with Truman, Dirksen, and Goldwater Chapters. We brainstormed new event and recruitment ideas. We realized that Engle Chapter needed to increase programming, improve publicity on campus, and focus on alumni involvement.

The P.A.D. network at Convention was the first step for this. When Sister Smutz and I asked for help with the Sacramento Area, Past District XXXII Justice David Rothenberg, Past Int'l Associate Tribune



Glenn Milgraum, and Past Int'l Justice John Weitkamp gave us one name: Roger Cartozian. As Past District II Justice, Brother Cartozian (Engle Chapter'74) proved an amazing resource for us and is now our official Alumni Advisor.

The next step was recruitment. When Int'l Justice Ron Winter told us at our District II Conference in September that every event was a recruitment event, we took him seriously. By our fall initiation ceremony, we initiated 26 new members—more than the Chapter had initiated over the entire previous year. We took new avenues to increase interest in the fraternity by targeting 2Ls and 3Ls with a focus on the alumni network. We participated in every student organization fair and co-sponsored numerous events with a variety of other student organizations. We took every opportunity to get the Phi Alpha Delta name out there. By the end of the year, we had 48 new members—triple the number we had the previous year.


Growing & Innovating for Over 100 Years

The ability to communicate between Chapters and the Executive Office, the opportunities to network, and the quality and quantity of programs available to all members due to technological innovations is simply amazing! The key to successful innovation though remains that it be a valuable, thought out addition, instead of just change for change sake.

Oh, the good old days?

When I was a new employee in '97 the newest computer in the office was a 286, we still used modems (think of the screaming robot in the new Muppets movie if you don't know what those are), used dot matrix printers, and had one AOL account for all of the E.O. staff. Believe it or not, that was a huge improvement from the '80's when our only means of communication were snail mail, leadership conferences and telephone.

Today, Chapters and the Fraternity have technological capabilities at our fingertips that just ten years ago few of us could have dreamed of. 

There have been countless other calls where the information in the email came across as impersonal or harsh which was completely the opposite of how it was intended. Why do we make these types of mistakes?

Innovation the right way

The reason that P.A.D. is strong today is that we have not been afraid to innovate while still incorporating what has made us successful

to this point. Law and Pre-Law Chapters initiate around 9,000 new members each year and the number of active Alumni and Law Chapters continues to grow! Why? For example, we all know that Chapter recruiting can take

Should they be surprised if less than half show up and less than half of them join? Absolutely not! While being able to mass email a bunch of people is a great time saver, it completely misses the point of our Fraternity. We are a group of students and alumni who have bonded together for a common cause, and that human interaction is the key to that bond. Chapters must reach out to the individuals personally, even if it is to just leave a message when they're in class. The number one reason people don't join an organization, any organization, is that they don't feel wanted! A simple phone call can and will make all the difference in the world.

Chapters that do this typically see dramatic increases in the quantity and quality of programs held because the officers are no longer trying to do everything by themselves! It's a win-win situation for everyone.

As we discuss during New Officer Orientation Calls, the Pre-Law Conference and Leadership Symposia, the most successful Chapters are also the most introspective. Whenever a Chapter program is held, regardless of how much of a success or failure the event was, the officers and committee members involved need to meet quickly. During that meeting they must analyze what worked, what didn't, and why. Why was there poor turnout for a great event? Did we advertise enough or give our members enough advance notice to get the event on their calendars? Was the event scheduled during mid-terms or opposite of a highly anticipated event on campus? These and other similar questions need to be asked so that the Chapter leaders will be able to include this information in their future plans while also being able to provide guidance to their successors. A Chapter that doesn't do this will surely continue to make the same mistakes and leave itself no room to understand whether or not future changes (innovations) should be considered!

Phi Alpha Delta and our Chapters will need to continue to innovate in the ways that we let people know who we are, what we are doing and how we can help them. There is nothing wrong with adopting new methods, or incorporating new and old techniques and technologies. However, the one thing we can never change is our focus of Providing Service to the Student, the School, the Profession and the Community. It doesn't get any better than that!



We personally emailed and called alumni to invite them to various events. With Brother Cartozian's help, we now have more alumni involved in events—a small, but dedicated group including Beaumont Chapter alumni and Magistrate Judge Kendall J. Newman of the Eastern District of California (Wythe Chapter), who now lends us his courtroom for our initiations.

It was fall 2011, and students would tell Elizabeth Smutz and me that they had never heard of Phi Alpha Delta. But by fall 2013, 2Ls were referring to P.A.D. as 'one of the biggest clubs on campus,' and 1Ls were telling us that P.A.D. was one of the only student organizations that they were strongly encouraged to join at orientation. By our initiation ceremony on September 26th we initiated 29 new members. We are now 91 members strong and we know that more are yet to come.

It was an honor to be selected as the Most Improved Chapter for '12-'13, in addition to the other awards presented to us. Sister Smutz and I look forward to passing on our knowledge of the Fraternity and how to run a successful Law School Chapter to those who come after us.


