





In Memoriam: C. Raymond Judice

On November 9th, 2014 Phi Alpha Delta lost a legend—the Honorable C. Raymond Judice.

Brother Judice began his relationship with P.A.D. on May, 30th 1959 when he became a charter member, and charter Justice, of Houston Chapter at South Texas College of Law. He took to our Fraternity immediately and distinguished himself while in law school. He graduated in 1962 and thereafter served as a volunteer Assistant to the Supreme Justice. He attended his first P.A.D. Convention in 1962 and attended all subsequent Conventions, except 1984 and 1986 due to professional conflicts and 2012 due to health complications.

In 1965 he served as District Justice and provided oversight for Fraternity activities in TX, AR, LA and OK; where his supervision led to thriving Chapters, among the best in P.A.D. at the time.

In 1966 Brother Judice was elected International Historian and, unlike his predecessors in this position, he took his responsibilities to heart and published the first official history of Phi Alpha Delta during his tenure. His historical research resulted in the reclaiming of historical documents, photographs and P.A.D. memorabilia which are now maintained at the Executive Office.

In addition to the presentation of the hardbound history at the 1968 Convention, Ray also presented the Fraternity with a beautifully carved official gavel, which he had commissioned and which we continue to use at official functions today.

Following service as Supreme Secretary, Advocate and Vice Justice, in 1974 Brother Judice ascended to the position of Supreme Justice, the highest elected position in P.A.D. The title of this position

was renamed 'International Justice' in 1976 and, as a result, Ray was known as the 'Last Past Supreme Justice'—a title that he carried with pride.

In 1980 Brother Judice was inducted into P.A.D.'s Distinguished Service Chapter; the highest honor afforded to a P.A.D. member. His dedication and involvement never wavered and he continued to contribute his time, efforts and talents to our operations during his lifetime.

In 1996, he was presented the Barbara Jordan Award for Lifetime Achievement in Public Service. This time, the recognition was for his professional achievements opposed to his fraternal ones. During his professional life, Brother Judice had served a decade as a trial judge in Houston, then almost 25 years as the first Administrative Director of the Texas Judicial System. Many of the innovations in the Texas Judiciary occurred during our brother's tenure and

many at his personal direction. International Justice Fredric H. Pearson referred to Brother Judice as having made "a life-long commitment to serving his fellow man and making integrity a way of life, not a series of random acts."

In 2000, Ray updated the P.A.D. history, copies of which were distributed to all Chapters. He later received the permanent title of 'International Historian Emeritus' in recognition of his continuing involvement.

We were able to see Brother Ray one last time at Convention this year, which he was bound and determined to attend – no matter what.

The P.A.D. International Foundation has established a memorial fund in his honor—the C. Raymond Judice Convention Keynote Speaker Fund, established to bring a notable speaker to each Convention.

We encourage all P.A.D.s to contribute so we can maintain a lasting tribute to our Brother who is so richly deserving of our thanks and continued acknowledgement.

His P.A.D. legacy is unmatched and will live forever, touching every member of our Fraternity both now and in the future. He will be missed.



Message from the International Justice

The Fraternity's season of regeneration has come to a close. It began with Convention in August and carried through District Conferences, Pre-Law Symposia, and new member initiations. It started to wind down about the time of the Pre-Law Conference in late October. During this time frame, we renewed the energy and passion for P.A.D. We literally re-generate as we add a new generation of P.A.D. members. Things quiet down as the holidays loom, poised to start anew in the spring with more initiations, especially in the Pre-Law Chapters, and finishing up with Chapter officer transitions in March and April.

Although there is a definite rhythm to the year for Chapters, the International Executive Board (IEB) carries on, regardless of the time of year. The IEB addresses ultimate questions of our existence as an organization: What is the purpose of Phi Alpha Delta? What is our relevance and how do we maintain it? These are the types of questions that the Fraternity's IEB must return to again and again. Sometimes we toil through operations and day-to-day issues involving members and Chapters, but what the Fraternity does in its daily operations must fit within the framework of a larger purpose, a strategic objective.

The follow up question then is what strategic plan do we put in place to achieve our objective, to maintain our relevance? Until I became a member of the IEB in 2008, I'm not sure I truly understood the IEB's function in the Fraternity. The IEB must think at a strategic level for the entire organization, standing above the day-to-day operations, and setting the Fraternity's future trajectory.

I had the opportunity to visit with the last past Supreme Justice, C. Ray Judice, at a District Conference in Houston recently. He told the story that when he was a law student (in 1959) Phi Alpha Delta was one of seven law school fraternities to choose from at his law school. Over the years, that number has dwindled significantly. Of the two or three law fraternities still in existence nationwide, P.A.D. is clearly the preeminent

law fraternity and P.A.D. aspires to be one of the preeminent law organizations in the United States. Apparently, we have done something right in answering questions of ultimate purpose and relevance.



What do we

do? We create opportunities to enhance and improve the professional and leadership skills of our members. We also create a network (both social and professional) for members across the United States and internationally. My goal as a member of the IEB and as International Justice is to better equip our members for professional success.

But, we do all of this while promoting the bonds of fraternalism. In September and October, I broke bread and shared drinks with law student and alumni members in Tallahassee, Houston, Long Island, and New Orleans. The culminating fraternal event will be our Convention. As of the writing of this article, over 500 members have 'taken the pledge' to attend the 2016 Convention in D.C. (thanks to John Weitkamp and the Take the Pledge Committee). Having been raised and educated in the Old Dominion, it will be good to return to my backyard for the next round of fraternal regeneration.

The Affordable Care Act (ObamaCare) Creates **New Practice Opportunities** for Attorneys By David Holt (Butler, MN Statewide Marshal)

The Affordable Care Act (often known as "ObamaCare") is creating new business for attorneys. Insight into ObamaCare's provisions will help attorneys start or expand their practice and maintain a competitive advantage over their peers. Here is an overview of where ObamaCare is creating opportunities for attorneys:

Employment Law

1. Payroll, Taxes and Fees

ObamaCare requires employers to report information and collect new taxes. Attorneys are needed to implement these changes and represent employers who have not implemented the changes correctly. Some of the reports and taxes include the 0.90% Medicare Tax, The Patient-Centered Outcome Research Fee, The Transition Reinsurance Fee, and Employer reporting of minimum essential coverage.

2. Whistleblower Protections

ObamaCare amended the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) and created new provisions for employers. An employer may not take adverse action against an employee if the employee helps in the investigation and reporting of a violation of Title I of ObamaCare.

3. Workforce Classifications

Businesses will need to determine the status of their employees. This includes Full Time, Part Time, Seasonal, Independent Contractor and perhaps some other classification. Misclassifications can be costly to an employer. Attorneys are needed to correctly classify employees and protect the business during misclassifications.

Healthcare Provider Compliance

Title VI of ObamaCare, relating to transparency and program integrity, is a tool for government agencies to regulate the healthcare industry. The main enforcement agency is the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). Attorneys are needed to both enforce and defend against enforcement actions. Actions will come about from the reporting of overpayments, use of the new Stark Law Self Disclosure Protocol and "transparency reporting" regarding life science business relationships.

Tax Law

1. Individuals/ Families

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) is in charge of collecting the penalties under ObamaCare. Penalties for tax year 2014 will be collected when taxes are filed in early 2015. ObamaCare limits the IRS's normal enforcement power. By law, if you do not pay your federal income tax, the IRS can seize your assets and garnish your wages. ObamaCare forbids these procedures for collecting the ObamaCare penalty tax. It appears the only way the IRS can collect an unpaid penalty tax is to withhold a tax refund. This may elicit some creative filing schemes from taxpayers. The tax return is also the method for claiming an exemption or hardship in order to avoid a tax penalty. Attorneys are needed to litigate the early interpretations of the law in these areas.

2. Businesses

Businesses with more than 50 employees are required to provide

health insurance to employees (implementation dates and regulations vary based on the size of employer.) Businesses that are not in compliance will face tax penalties. Attorneys are needed to advise businesses on how to avoid the penalties as well as litigate the enforcement of the penalties.

Family Law

ObamaCare requires almost everyone to obtain health insurance or face a penalty. This creates new headaches and opportunities for family law attorneys. In family law cases, issues such as dependent benefits, cost-sharing and tax benefit sharing are important to the clients. ObamaCare will have a direct impact on these issues. ObamaCare must be taken into account to maximize the benefit to families. Also, some existing family court support orders were crafted without ObamaCare in mind. This may create unintended consequences.

State and Federal Agencies

ObamaCare grants a large amount of power in state and federal administrative agencies to make regulations and provide enforcement mechanisms. State and Federal agencies will be in charge of the bulk of the auditing, fraud investigation and enforcement of ObamaCare. Attorneys are needed to fill positions in these agencies. Continued healthcare reform will also create JD-preferred policy positions in these agencies.

Best Cities for Corporate and Finance Law

If money makes the world go round, finance lawyers are spinning the globe. Just about anywhere you go, this highly competitive field remains at the top in terms of compensation. And for recent grads, entry level jobs in corporate and finance law have higher starting salaries than in any other branch of law. We took a look at the best American cities for international corporate lawyers in terms of salaries, job availability, and LLM programs.

New York City, New York

It should be no surprise that the home of Wall Street is also a hotbed for corporate and finance law, with average salaries ranging from \$138,000 to \$159,000 depending on title. After a long slump through the recession, corporate firms are hiring again, and the median salary is trending upwards. As a bonus, several Big Apple law schools offer LLM programs in business, corporate, or banking law, including the New York University School of Law and Fordham University School of Law.

Chicago, Illinois

Northwestern University School of Law anchors the Chicago-area corporate law market with an LLM in in Law and Business. The program is designed to introduce international students to American business law and includes a sampling of business school classes as a complement to the standard law classes. Chicago is a metropolis in itself, with a longstanding history in commerce, finance and industry. With 12 Fortune 500 companies and several major financial exchanges headquartered in Chicago, corporate lawyers are never far from hands-on experience.

Washington, D.C.

If regulation is more your cup of tea, you might want to look to the nation's capital, where the Georgetown University Law Center offers three different Master of Laws programs concentrated in finance and law. The Master of Laws in Securities and Financial Regulation and the Master of Laws

in Taxation are particularly well-suited to a campus that's within walking distance to the nation's governing bodies. Another law school in town, The George Washington University Law School, also offers an LLM degree in International Business & Economics—an area of study that should feel right at home for international students.

Columbus, Ohio

Though Columbus may be smaller than the metropolitan markets lawyers love, the city is a bona fide hotspot for large and emerging businesses. Forbes Magazine ranked Columbus amongst its Best Places for Businesses and Careers in 2013, and gave the city an A rating as a top city for business. The city also made BusinessWeek's best 50 cities in America in 2012. For international lawyers looking for an LLM program in corporate law, the Ohio State University Moritz College of Law and Capital University Law school offer two great options.

Los Angeles, California

The Los Angeles financial law market may be cooling down. According to Denney & Associates' biannual report, bankruptcy law in particular saw a downturn with the closure of Stutman Treister & Glatt, a boutique bankruptcy law firm. Nevertheless, for those seeking training, the University of California, Los Angeles School of Law still boasts an extensive LLM program, with tracks in both securities regulation and bankruptcy law.



According to Forbes, attorneys are still one of the highest paid earning professions with median salaries in the six-figure range.

Funding a New or Young Alumni Chapter

If you're starting a new Alumni Chapter, particularly as recent graduates, funding events can be a challenge. Alumni Chapters don't have a school to fund activities or a captive audience to purchase cookies, and new alumni usually don't have extra money to fund events. Alumni Chapters need alternative fundraising methods.


Providing and planning continuing legal education (CLE) courses for members and non-members takes a little work but is a great fundraising method. Find a presenter (look within your membership for a free and eager presenter), a place to hold the event (ask a local law school and they can help with advertising and registration), and (sometimes) pay a small fee for CLE accreditation. The Chapter may charge an attendance fee which raises money and promotes P.A.D. in the community to potential members.

In recent years, the Twin City Alumni Chapter (TCAC) has used Scrip to raise funds. Scrip allows

non-profit organizations and their supporting members to purchase gift cards and receive a percentage of the purchase back as a refund. TCAC members raised hundreds of dollars over the past two years, and allowed members to raise funds to pay Convention-related costs and for the Chapter's general use.

Until your Chapter can raise money, the easiest solution to a lack of funding is to hold low or no-cost events. At these events, attendees pay their own way. For example, dinner events are easy to hold at no cost to the Chapter. Reserve a table at a local restaurant and promote the event with the understanding that attendees are responsible for their bill. Some restaurants are willing to work with organizations and provide a percentage of the night's sales as a fundraising opportunity as well.

It may be more challenging for new and young Alumni Chapters to raise funds, but there are ways to steadily grow those funds to reach the Chapter's goals.
