By the time you receive this issue, our 61st Biennial Convention and Leadership Conference will be underway (with 400 law students and alumni in attendance from across the United States and Puerto Rico); the 50th P.A.D. Day at the Supreme Court of the United States has been completed (and was so large it was split into two events), and the Executive Office will be preparing for a semester of recruitment, welcoming over 8,000 new brothers and sisters in the coming months.

This issue details some of the successes we've shown as a fraternity this year, outstanding new member benefits we're excited to offer you, and information to help you give back to P.A.D. through the International Foundation; to support the student, the school, the profession, and the community—as is our motto.

We hope you enjoy this issue, and that the success we've achieved this year already inspires you to become, or stay, involved in your Fraternity.



Message from the International Justice

On his death bed, the Emperor Augustus is reputed to have said "have I played my part well? Then applaud as I exit." Out of the chaos

of civil war and a dead republic, Augustus ushered in an era of peace and prosperity under the empire. He imposed Rome's hegemonic control over the Mediterranean basin that would persist for two hundred years or more. Some might call this a success. It depends on one's preference in governing structure.

Now I find myself on the proverbial death bed of the International Justice. My time in office is about to end. I have tried to know my role and to play it well. The questions that vexed me during these past two years will continue to vex the future leaders of this Fraternity: Have we made this organization stronger from the standpoints of governance and finance? Do we offer a better, more valuable benefit to our members at all levels: pre-law, law, and alumni? Have we strengthened the bonds of fraternalism among our members?

For the past two years and more we have engaged in an ongoing discussion about how to improve our corporate governance and how to modernize our governing documents. To meet these goals, the International Executive Board has proposed changes for consideration by the 2016 Convention delegates. Regardless of the final product, this has been a valuable exercise in fraternal introspection.

Speaking of Convention, we anticipate one of the best attended Conventions in the history of the Fraternity, with almost 400 registrations as of my writing. We have revised the Convention agenda to respond to feedback from our members. Through the generosity of the Foundation and District 23, the Fraternity now owns electronic voting equipment to use at Convention and other Fraternity events. Also through the Foundation and the generosity of our members, the Fraternity is providing in excess of \$35,000 in grants to help students and alumni defray the cost of 2016 Convention attendance.

Our other signature events have prospered as well. We inaugurated the Leadership Summit in

2015 which we anticipate continuing in the future. The annual Mock Trial Competition for law school chapters continues to thrive, with a full slate of 32 teams and in excess of 200 students and alumni participating this past year. (Special thanks to Brother Nick Lee for writing this year's case). The 2015 Pre-Law Conference and Expo was the largest ever, with 100 exhibitors and over 250 students attending. The 2016 P.A.D. Day at the Supreme Court also was the largest ever, with 66 members applying for admittance to the Supreme Court of the United States Bar. We have added other significant alumni member benefits, including such items as discounts for continuing legal education through Bloomberg BNA and payroll processing with ADP.

I look back over these past two years and say, "not bad for a bunch of amateurs." As elected volunteers, the Fraternity's Board members give freely of their time and talents to see that this organization thrives. But I would be remiss if I did not credit most of this success to Executive Director Andrew Sagan and the employees at the Executive Office who implement the Board's programs, plans, and dreams. They are the strong dose of reality mixed into my morning cup of P.A.D. coffee.

As Socrates lay on his death bed, drowsy from the drink of executioner's hemlock, he pulled the sheet back from his face and reminded his friend Crito that "we owe a chicken to Asclepius [the god of healing], don't forget to pay the debt." Life is but a brief interval. We are loaned a measure of time, but it is a loan we never repay. I am a lifetime member of the Wythe Chapter of Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity, International. The Fraternity has expanded my world far beyond this small town in rural Mississippi, where I live and where virtually no one other than I has the slightest concept of P.A.D. And so another biennium comes to a close. I look forward to seeing you all on the other side, but simply as Brother King (past International Justice).

Benjamin Thompson Recipient of the 37th Annual James Iredell Award

Iredell Chapter (Campbell University's Norman Adrian Wiggins School of Law) hosted their 37th Annual James Iredell Award Banquet this spring and honored Benjamin Thompson, the current Chairman of Campbell University's Board of Trustees. The chapter hosted 90 attendees and Mr. Thompson and his family.

Since 1980 the James Iredell Award has been presented annually by Campbell Law School's P.A.D. Chapter to an individual who has made significant contributions to the legal profession and to Campbell Law. The award, inspired by the life and writings of the chapter's namesake, honors the recipient's accomplishments, tenacity, and effort.

Past recipients have included two United States Senators, eight



Justices of the North Carolina Supreme Court, five judges of the North Carolina Court of Appeals, and seventeen professors of Campbell Law.

Mr. Thompson received his undergraduate degree cum laude from Campbell University in 1976, and his Juris Doctorate in 1979 as a member of the charter class of the Norman Adrian Wiggins School of Law. In 1997, he joined Wyrick Robbins Yates & Ponton, LLP in Raleigh as a partner and Chairman of the Litigation Practice Section. Prior to this, he practiced law in Harnett County for 18 years.

Ben has extensive trial experience in state and federal courts throughout the United States and Puerto Rico, representing government contracting, pharmaceutical, manufacturing, and technology companies.

The chapter was honored to host Dean of the Law School, Richard Leonard; the President of Campbell University and his wife, Bradley Creed and Cathy





Creed; Campbell board members; Campbell Law professors; and partners from Wyrick Robbins Yates & Ponton, LLP, where Mr. Thompson currently practices. Students were also in attendance to foster chapter networking with local alumni.

The Chapter's namesake, Justice Iredell, gained prominence during the Revolution by fighting for North Carolina's ratification of the U.S. Constitution and helping to organize the state's court system. He was nominated to the original Supreme Court by President George Washington. Justice Iredell is best known for his dissent in Chisholm v. Georgia. Later, the passage of Eleventh Amendment to the Constitution effectively vacated the holding in Chisholm, preventing federal courts from hearing suits by private citizens against the states.

Real Estate Lawyers in Demand

Real estate is one of the most fickle industries around—hot when the economy is growing and cold when it is not. The good news is that real estate is growing again and that means more jobs for attorneys.

Robert Half Legal, a legal staffing agency, reports that the real estate lawyer is the third most in-demand legal position in the South Atlantic region. Real estate is the second-fastest-growing legal industry in the South Atlantic region and the fourth fastest in the Mountain and Pacific regions.

At Brooklyn Law School, real estate law has become the most popular specialization. Graduates are finding more jobs in the specialization's niche areas such as cooperative and condominium representation, said Professor David Reiss,

who also serves as the program director of the Center for Urban Business Entrepreneurship.

If you have the time and money, Reiss thinks additional training in real estate can certainly help attorneys specialize their experience in the law. Course and certificates seem to be

the best option in regards to both time and money.

"Taking a few relevant courses might make sense for most people instead of devoting the time and money that an LL.M. in real estate would entail," he said. "Certain kinds of certificates can also help you stand out from other candidates, like the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) certificate. It does not involve nearly as much time or money as an LL.M. degree would, but it does signal a level of knowledge and commitment to a particular practice area."

Don't worry about getting your real estate license (unless you already have one). Spreading yourself too thin will be more harmful than productive, Reiss said. Attorneys also need to consider the requirements and restrictions of their individual jurisdiction.

"In some jurisdictions, such as New York, members of the bar are exempt from the various requirements necessary to become a licensed real estate broker," he said. "But in my experience, lawyers are better off doing one thing well—being good lawyers—rather than being a jack of all trades."

As with a lot of specialized areas of the law, real estate law has plenty of niche areas in which lawyers can further delve into. This can make you more attractive to clients and employers.

"Specializing in areas of the law relating to real estate can make a lot of sense—co-ops, condos and HOAs; construction law; land use; finance; affordable housing; and foreign

> investment programs, to name a few," Reiss said.

Richard Hermann, a professor at Concord Law School who has written extensively about legal careers, recommends earning certificates in niche areas of the law, as they are inexpensive ways to increase your qualifications.

"Many such programs are available, and quite a few are online and inexpensive," he said.

While real estate can be up and down, Reiss said real

estate law could be a good field even during slower economic times.

"No matter what the economy as a whole is doing, clients are still buying and selling properties, financing and refinancing them, and entering into property leases," he said.

To prepare for careers in real estate law, Brooklyn Eaw School encourages job applicants to have very focused resumes, which increases their marketability.

"We find that students with focused resumes can make a compelling case to a range of real estate employers, even if their overall GPA is not high," Reiss said.

Participating in bar association committees is also highly recommended for networking and learning purposes. Reiss says it is important to notify your network that you are transitioning into a new specialization.

"A good word about your work ethic and ability to learn can help compensate for a lack of direct experience," Reiss said. All that said, Reiss recommends attorneys be sure of their specialization interests before getting too far into the field.

"You should keep in mind that once you specialize, many people will pigeonhole you in that area," he said. "So you want to make sure that you like the practice area and that there is a sufficient flow of work to keep you busy."



The Practice of Law is Fantastic, but...

Stress is far more than a simple concept. It is a serious health risk.

I remember my very last murder trial. I was representing the obviously wrongfully accused beloved pillar of society while the prosecutor was doing all he could to rid our world of yet one more scum bag murderer. The stress was amazing. Each day after beating each other up in court, the prosecutor and I went out for a drink, or two, or three. That, as it turned out, was to be my final trial and yes, I hung the jury.

Isn't it interesting that Marcia Clark never set foot in a court room again after the O.J., trial? There are much better ways to deal with stress then drugs and alcohol. Yoga can be extremely helpful, as can meditation. Exercise of virtually any kind is a big help. I walk a minimum of eight miles every day and by mile number two I am completely stress free. You might also want to consider a gym membership and perhaps a trainer for some guidance. It really needs to be integrated into your practice of law to peak performance professionally and personally.

So yes, earning your way into the honorable profession of law is indeed a joyous achievement, but you will enjoy it better, and longer, with less stress.




